White filling in for chief

There's a new chief in town in East Jordan...at least for the next 30 days.

At its regular meeting Tuesday night, the East Jordan City Commission appointed city administrator David White acting administrative chief of police.

The commission took the action on White's recommendation after learning that East Jordan Police Chief Jerry Alward had taken a 30 day medical leave.

White's role will be strictly administrative and will involve no police work.

White said that he recommended himself for the position to avoid any possible conflict of interest that could arise from moving one of the city's union police officers into an administrative position.

"I discussed the matter with the city attorney and he concurred that it would be better to avoid such a situation," White said.

In the event that a backup officer is needed during Alward's leave, White said a part-time officer would be utilized.

White, who was on vacation when the commission last met, also brought up the issue of camping fee discounts at the Tourist Park.

At the last meeting, the city received a letter from a long term camper at the park who was upset that the city had discontinued its "every seventh day free" offer for long term campers.

White asked the commission for a guideline for determining how long a guest would have to stay at the park to qualify for a discount. The commission's consensus was 90 days, which is one half of the park's season of May 15 to Oct. 15.

The discount will only apply to

a limited number of spaces at the park as White reported that the park is near capacity throughout the summer.

In other business, the commission awarded the bid for the first phase of the Downtown Development Authority Streetscape Project to Dunkle Excavating of Petoskey for the amount of \$435,275.25 which is nearly \$11,000 over the engineer's estimate. The city received only one other bid on the project and that was from Manthei Development in the amount of \$532,018.

White said that a pre-construction meeting is slated for Thursday and the work will begin as soon as possible. He added that the contract will require that Dunkle have the work completed by Nov. 15 or face a \$400 per day penalty.

The project will include replacing sanitary and storm sewers and water mains, replacement and construction of sidewalks, curb and gutter and street surfaces.

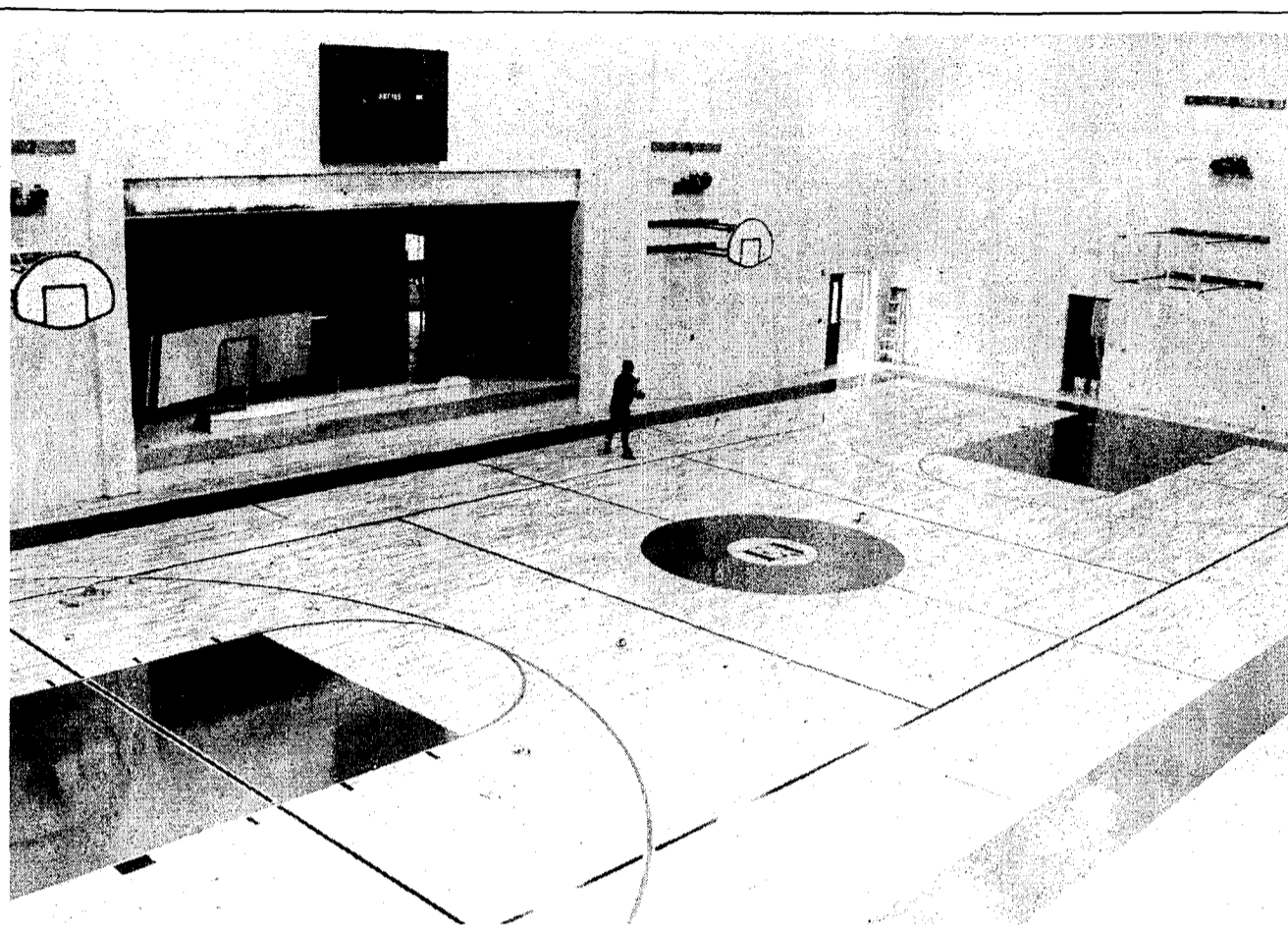
Mayor Russ Peck added that the DDA is putting the finishing touches on a program whereby area residents and businesses will be able to purchase commemorative bricks to be used in the project. Peck said the bricks will likely sell for \$40 each.

Several commissioners were upset with a letter sent to the commission from a county commission committee regarding the use of county inspector to enforce the city's recently adopted housing regulations.

In the letter, the committee flatly denied the city's request for the county's services and gave no explanation.

All of the commissioners echoed Mayor Peck's call for an explanation from the county commission.

"We pay taxes to the county here too, and I don't think we ask for very much," Peck said.

School opening has historic feel

"There is a real sense of history in the district today."

That's how East Jordan School Superintendent Chip Hansen described the feeling at East Jordan Middle School on Tuesday morning as faculty and staff prepared to welcome students at noon into the new building for the first day of classes.

"It isn't that often that a community gets to take part in an event like this. All things considered, it is going quite smoothly," Hansen

said. Despite the excitement of a new building, students will have to wait to make use of some of the school's facilities.

The school's cafeteria will serve cold lunches this week and possibly into next because some of the kitchen equipment is not yet installed and inspected.

The gym will not be available until next week because the final coats of floor sealant, to be applied late this week, require three days to

dry. Even when the floor is ready, the gym will be without bleachers for a time.

The school is waiting to take delivery of the gym's bleachers and the large partition door that will separate the band room from the gym.

In the meantime, students will continue to be bussed to the high school for band class.

Hansen is hoping that both items will arrive later this month.

The district is planning to host an open house and dedication for the school in early October.

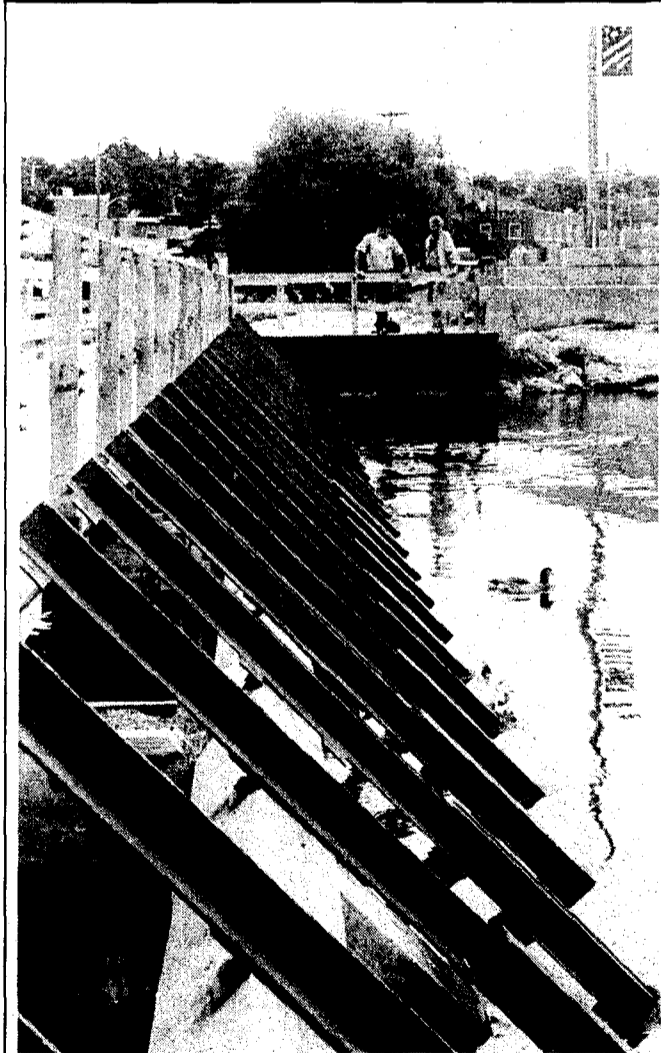

Eventually it may not be only waterfowl and fish that can pass under the Mill Street bridge. Last week engineers from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources took measurements of the existing salmon weir that prevents boat traffic from traveling under the bridge. The study was conducted to determine the feasibility of making a portion of the structure moveable to allow small rowboats and canoes to pass through when the weir is not in use. In the fall grates are placed in the weir to prevent salmon from swimming into the Jordan River to spawn.

Adults and children pitched in to help. Residents, resorters, and vacationers turned out. Folks from nearby communities joined us. Musicians, restaurateurs, busi-

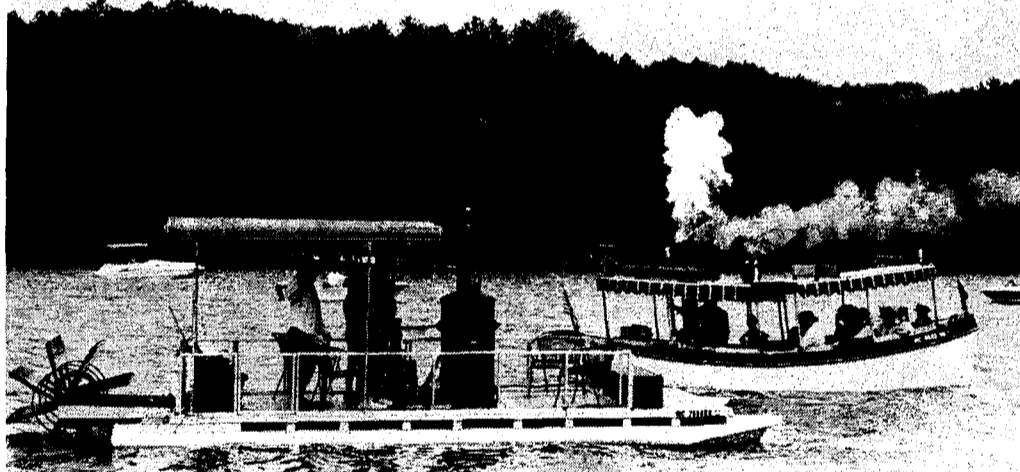
nesses, and professionals donated their time and talents to make the event truly memorable.

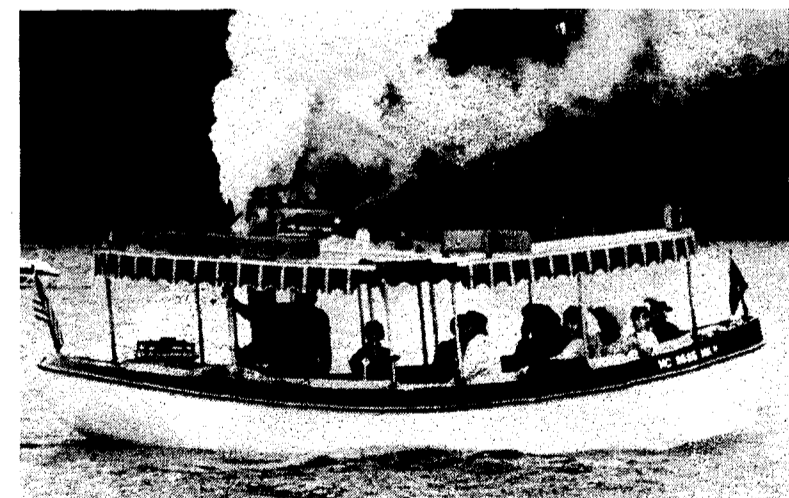

A tradition returns to Walloon

One burned coal, the other burned wood. One was a classic craft from the past, the other... well it wasn't.

What it was, though, was the winner in Sunday's big steamboat race on Walloon Lake, an event that pitted David Beier's "Windemere" against Gene David's pontoon-turned-paddle-boat.

Actually, it wasn't much of a race. It was more a trip back in time to how life was on Walloon Lake. That trip goes back at least 100 years when a friendly competition between two steamboat captains delighted spectators as the two boats raced at their top speeds - about 8 mph.

Steamboats were the only mode of transportation for vacationers to get to their summer destinations on the lake.

One hundred years later "Windemere," owned by Beier, and David's paddle-boat are the only two steamboats left on the lake. And David's is only there part time.

The prop-powered, wood burning "Windemere" makes its home at the Walloon Lake Inn, owned by Beier.

David, a former resident of Walloon Lake, now lives in Portland, Mich. He used mechanical components of his grandfather's old steamboat to make his creation, a coal-burning, pontoon-turned-paddle-boat.

Hundreds of spectators turned out for the event, some dressed in turn-of-the-century clothing, and more than 50 boats followed the action on the water.

After starting fast, "Windemere" fell back and David took the lead for good. He crossed the finish line at top speed - about 7 mph.

The event raised about \$370 in donations for Walloon's beautification committee.

He received his Bachelor of Science in education and his Masters of Arts in counseling from Central Michigan University. He is also a licensed professional counselor and a registered social worker.

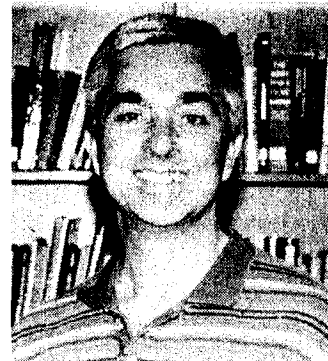
Last year he was the school guidance counselor at Atlanta Junior and Senior High School.

Camp EJ wraps up a successful first summer

This Tuesday the first bell of the new school year rang at East Jordan Elementary School but, unlike most schools in the summertime, the halls were not absent of students this past summer. Instead they were filled with the voices of students taking part in the inaugural year of Camp E.J.

This summer Camp E.J. campers visited the Grass River Natural Area, Big Rock Nuclear Power Plant, Stonehedge Farm, Industrial Magnetics, East Jordan Ambulance Service, Jordan River Fish Hatchery, East Jordan Iron Works, and John Twitchel gave a rocketry presentation.

In addition to Werth, the camp employed three counselors, Sarah Wolf, Andrew Otis, and Mandy Reid. East Jordan School Superintendent Chip Hansen said, "We were very pleased with results of Camp E.J. I think it provided a much needed service for the community."

Hansen added that with the help of a start-up grant from the Charlevoix Community Foundation, the camp broke even and based upon

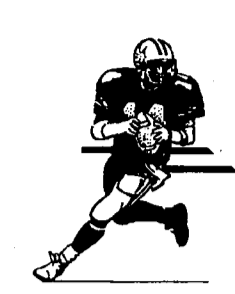
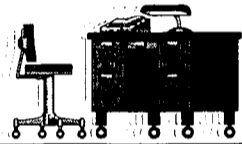

Boyne City junior varsity lost to Petoskey 51-41. Nicole Kurtz was the leading scorer with 16 points. The freshmen avenged an earlier one-point loss to Petoskey with an impressive 47-35 win.

The Lady Ramblers opened their season Aug. 25 with a tight 54-51 loss to Rogers City. But with an experienced squad, fans should expect im-

provement on both the outcome of the first game and last year's 6-15 finish.

The 1997 group includes five returning seniors and three juniors who played on varsity last year. "We have a pretty good nucleus to work with," Neidhamer said. "There are eight returnees, and five players up from a strong junior varsity team." Tri-captains are seniors Sarah Bobowski and Alison Polack, and junior Katie Bernthal.

One thing that this team is lacking is the strong low-post player that it lost, to graduation, in Treana Fiel. "We don't really have that low-post style that Treana gave us," Neidhamer said. "We'll go higher and wider, because we're a better threat outside."

Against Rogers City, the Lady Ramblers had a 10-point lead going into the fourth quarter, and then just "lost momentum," Neidhamer said. Bernthal was leading scorer, putting in 18 points, while fellow junior Seelye added 12 off the bench.

"Every year we've wanted to improve," said Neidhamer. "We will expect to win those close games that we lost last year, and we're looking for a .500 season. We're in a tough league, and have a tough schedule, but we have improved."

Neidhamer talked about the outlook of his season with confidence, and with the number of returning players, it might be some of that confidence that can help the team meet its goals and win more games.

A testing session for those who complete the Sept. 13 clinic will be held in Boyne City and Charlevoix, with the time and dates to be an-


nounced at the Sept. 13 clinic.

The clinic is free and conducted with the help of the DNR and volunteer instructors from the area.

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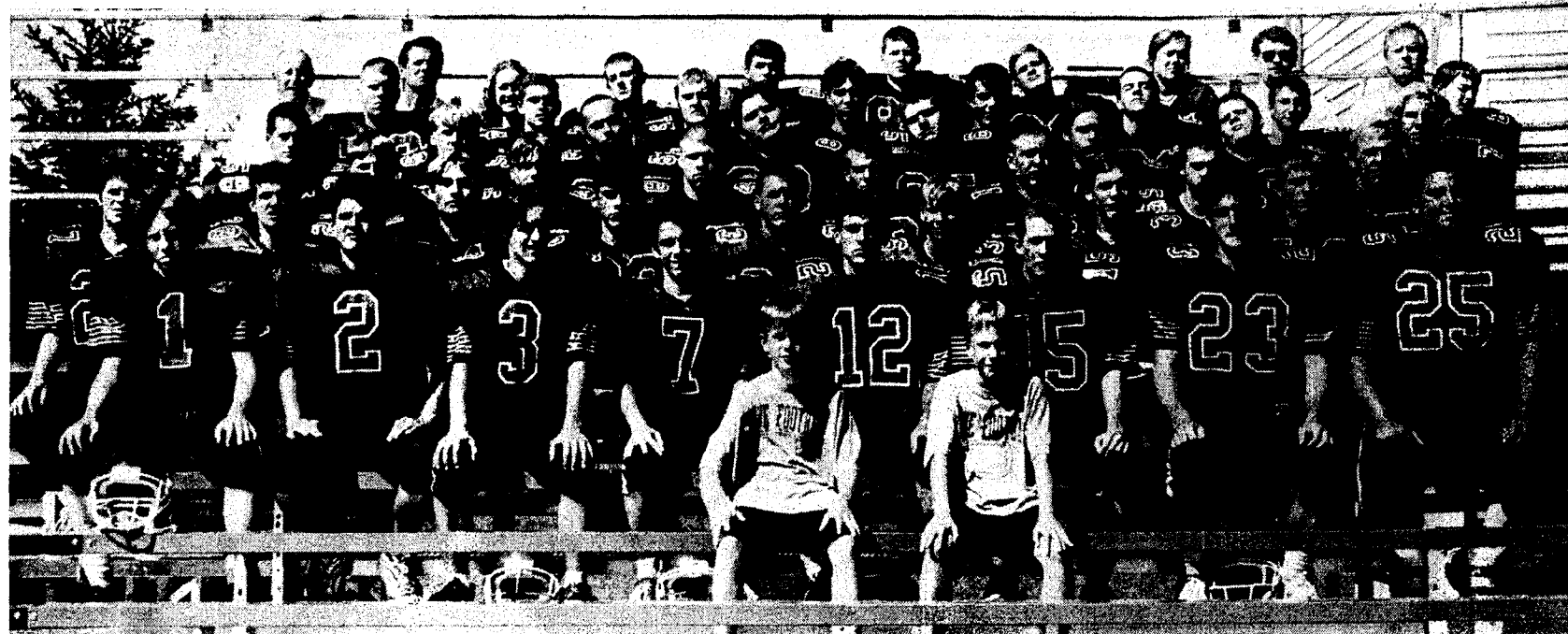

Lady Loggers open with split

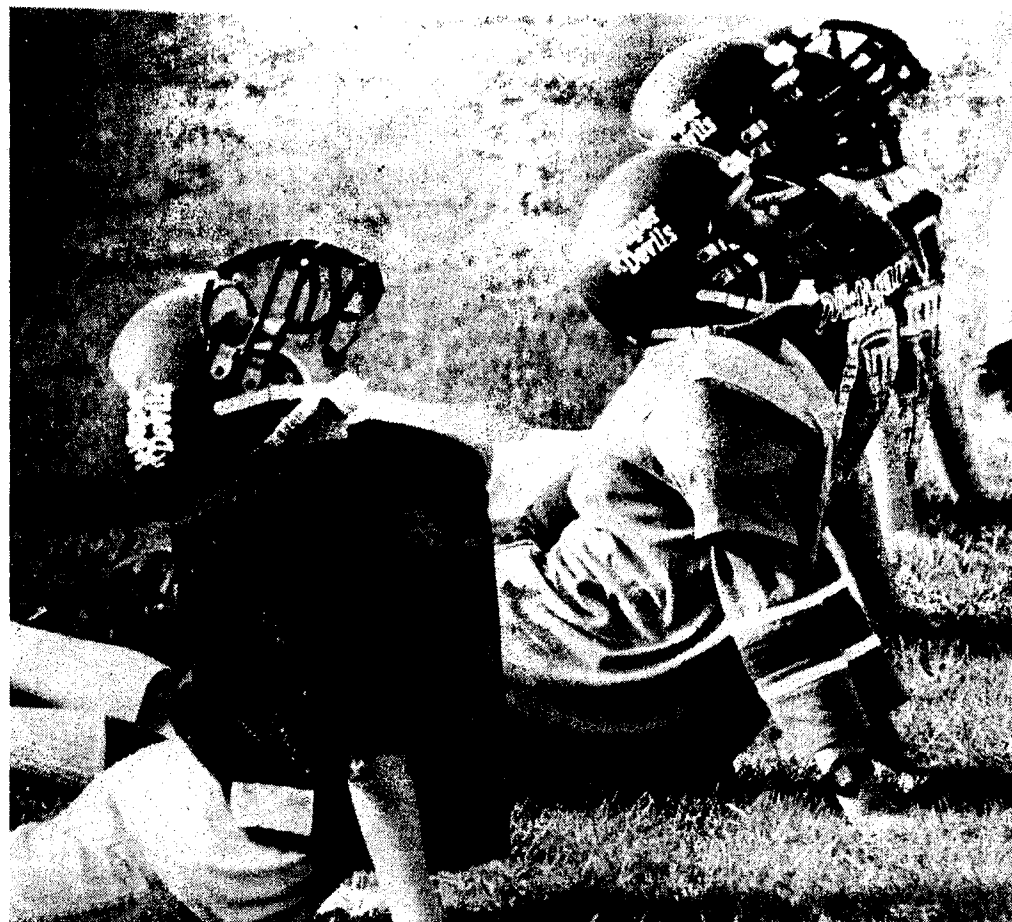
The Lady Loggers of Boyne Falls started the season off last week, finishing second at the Alba Tip-Off Classic.

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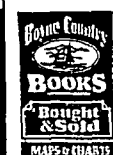
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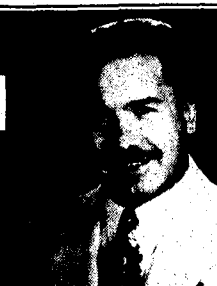
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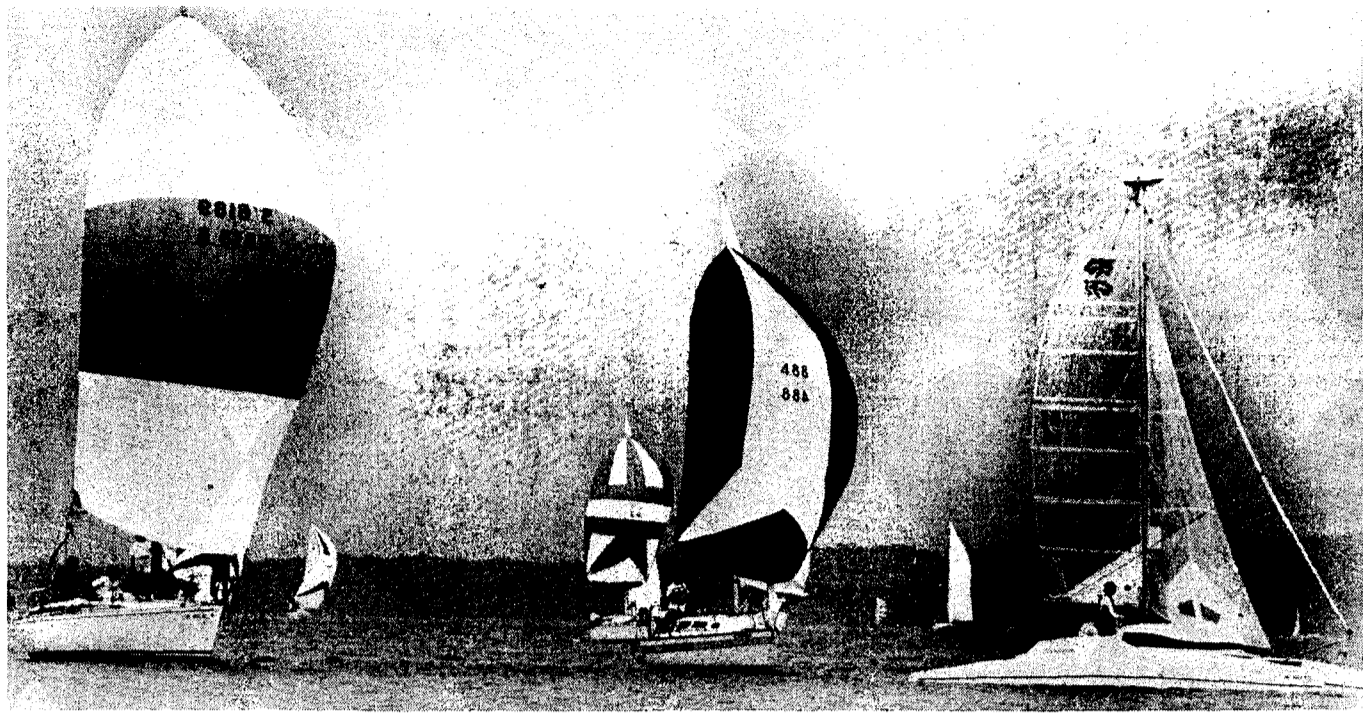


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Red Fox racing
