Dip painted the brick building red the other day. Watching workmen wonder how many different kinds of stores had been in the building over the years.

Then our mind went back to the time E. L. Burdick was selling 13 pounds of sugar for one dollar, and when grandpa was in his prime.

Those were the days when the Temple Theatre was starring Mary Pickford in "Franchon The Crick" and you could step down to R. Mackey's and buy a Runabout Ford for \$390.

The Peoples State Savings Bank was advertising "safety and service." The State Bank of East Jordan was showing \$50,000 capital and saying, "Our hobby is safe banking."

Stroebel Brothers were selling 4-foot woven wire fencing for 29c per rod. G. A. Bell and a lot of other merchants were giving free tickets to the Temple's Saturday matinee in an effort to attract business. And the late W. A. Sack, of Boyne City, well known northern Michigan "meat man" was insisting that: "The sweetness of low price never equals the bitterness of poor quality."

The East Jordan Lumber Company store was telling folks how to buy cheaply by stocking up on canned goods for emergencies.

Gidley's Drug Store was inviting people to leave their day purchases at their store and pick them up after the show. Hite Drug Company was selling drugs, but wall paper was a hot sideline.

Empey Brothers claimed the largest exclusive furniture store north of Grand Rapids.

Hotel Ericks was really modern. The late Chris Taylor, Prop., was telling everyone his rooms had electric lights and steam heat for only \$2.00 per day.

And the East Jordan Board of Trade was composed of modern minded members. The board was telling everyone that the community offered industries unusual opportunities for ideal locations.

The East Jordan Electric Light & Power Co., was telling folks the wonders of electricity and asking them to have their homes wired at once.

E. W. Giles was doing a land office business in his White Star Bakery and Restaurant on Main Street.

The old town was buzzing and Eugene Adams was out to get his share of business at the Temple Theatre. Adams claimed 800 seats with a big 25 x 48 foot stage. He packed them in back in 1912 with "Thelma" — the greatest scenic production to be seen in northern Michigan. And they stood in line to see the stage play, "The Shepherd of the Hills."

The present East Jordan Recreation has one of the finest bowling alleys in northern Michigan today. But bowling is nothing new to ye fair city. Bush's Bowling Alleys were in operation way back in 1904.

Young folks scratch their heads when old timers say: "Those were the days." That's because today you can drive over to Boyne in about 15 minutes; and back in 1912 during the Charlevoix County Fair, folks took the steamer "City of Boyne" to get here for the fair. It left Boyne at 7 a.m. and left East Jordan at 6 p.m. Round trip was 50c.

Speaking about the county fair, a lot of people hereabouts did not believe there was such a thing as an airplane that could really fly. The fair committee wanted to book a plane attraction but they didn't want to advertise it and then have to do a lot of explaining if the machine didn't work.

So the committee went to Bay City's fair to see the machine actually work before they advertised it for the Charlevoix County Fair.

Backing up their advertising the committee told her people of East Jordan:

"There remains no doubt as to the reality of air transportation in various forms of flying machines; we all believe that flights of thousands of miles are made, that men and machines remain for hours several thousand feet from the earth, rising, flying, gliding and lighting successfully, and all in a very natural and bird-like manner."

It doesn't take much to bring back memories. Sometimes just watching red paint going on a brick building will start you dreaming.

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East Jordan To Get \$3,000 From State

The city of East Jordan is to receive \$2,936.90 as its share of the 1953 second quarter motor vehicle highway fund collections. Net receipts of the state fund for the second quarter now going to the state highway department to be distributed is \$26,682, 638, 22.

This money is from all the state gasoline and weight taxes, the diesel fuel tax and a small amount of miscellaneous fees deposited in the state motor vehicle highway fund.

After deductions for non high way uses and collection costs, the rest of the money is divided as follows:

44 per cent to the state highway department for state trunk line highways; in both rural and urban areas; 37 per cent to the counties for expenditure on county roads, and 18 per cent to the cities and incorporated villages for expenditure on their roads and streets.

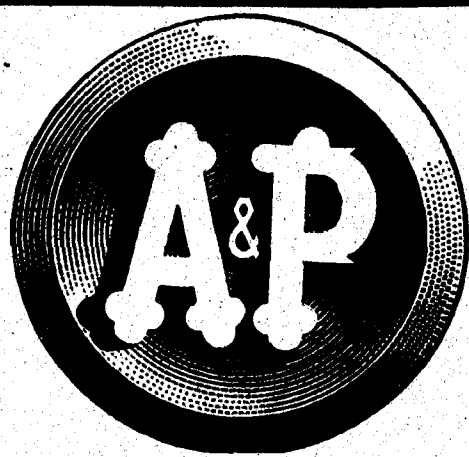

"Check Your Speed" Program Urged By Chief Simmons

Chief Harry Simmons today announced that the Police Department of East Jordan has adopted a firmer policy of enforcing the speed laws. This action is being taken at the official request of the Michigan Press Association for firmer enforcement to combat the rising traffic toll in Michigan.

"The 1953 first five months increases in Michigan are terrifying," the Chief said, pointing to accidents increasing 12%, injuries up 21% and deaths up 13%, according to State Police records.

"To battle this traffic disaster the department will apply a carefully thought out 3 pronged attack," the Chief continued. "I have instructed our officers to increase their vigilance for speeders. Motorists exceeding the speed limit may be expected to be stopped by a police officer, even if they are only going 5 miles over the speed limit," he added.

"5 miles over the speed limit may not seem like much," the Chief pointed out, "but such illegal practice far too often launches a career of traffic violations which leads to more and more severe violations." "As a matter of fact the Chief stated, "a motorist should appreciate being stopped for going 5 miles over the speed limit, if this serves as a forceful reminder and prevents a more serious violation later which might cause a serious accident — perhaps to the same motorist."

"The second prong of the department's attack to save lives will be the policy of charging more motorists with the more serious charge of "reckless driving" instead of "speeding" in cases where the speeder endangered the lives of other people or property while committing the violation" the Chief explained. This will result in a higher fine and a more serious black mark against the driver's license," he added.

"The third part of the department's plan to cut accidents calls for the more intensive investigation of traffic accidents and the placing of charges against one or both drivers for any violations which were committed that caused the accident or contributed to it," the Chief continued.

"Police officers stop motorists for violations at a time when there is no accident in order to prevent a repetition of the violations at a later date when sooner or later

they are certain to cause an accident," the Chief explained. "The justification for charging a motorist for a violation at a time when it actually caused or contributed to an accident is far greater," the Chief added.

In conclusion Chief Harry Simmons called upon all law abiding citizens of the area to give their full support to the traffic accident prevention activities of their police department. "I am sure," the Chief said, "that the great majority of our motorists who obey the traffic laws will be heartily in favor of this plan to crack down on the relatively small percent of motorists who are the violators who are causing the accidents."

Ask Growers To Consider Marketing Deal

Wheat growers should weigh both sides in the wheat marketing quota situation and then vote on August 14, Ed Rehman, County farm agent says.

A two-thirds "yes" vote will provide 90 per cent parity support under penalty controls. A one-third "no" vote will give free marketing but cut support to 50 per cent and that only on allotted wheat.

Here's the situation: "Yes" will put quotas on all farms with more than 15 acres

producing more than 200 bushels of wheat. It will penalize excesses give 90 per cent support for farmers planting within allotments, and hold down production — bringing the supply closer to effective

market demand. "No" will throw out quotas and penalties, but not allotments. Price support will drop to 50 per cent for "acreage co-operators"

Dip painted the brick building red the other day. Watching work men we wondered how many different kinds of stores had been in the building over the years.

Then our mind went back to the time E. L. Burdick was selling 13 pounds of sugar for one dollar, and when grandpa was in his prime.

Those were the days when the Temple Theatre was starring Mary Pickford in "Franchon The Crick" and you could step down to R. Mackey's and buy a Runabout Ford for \$390.

The Peoples State Savings Bank was advertising "safety and service." The State Bank of East Jordan was showing \$50,000 capital and saying, "Our hobby is safe banking."

Stroebel Brothers were selling 4 foot woven wire fencing for 29c per rod. G. A. Bell and a lot of other merchants were giving free tickets to the Temple's Saturday matinee in an effort to attract business. And the late W. A. Sack, of Boyne City, well known northern Michigan "meat man" was insisting that: "The sweetness of low price never equals the bitterness of poor quality."

The East Jordan Lumber Company store was telling folks how to buy cheaply by stocking up on canned goods for emergencies.

Gidley's Drug Store was inviting people to leave their day's purchases at their store and pick them up after the show. Hite Drug Company was selling drugs, but wall paper was a hot sideline.

Empey Brothers claimed the largest exclusive furniture store north of Grand Rapids.

Hotel Ericks was really modern. The late Chris Taylor, Prop., was telling everyone his rooms had electric lights and steam heat for only \$2.00 per day.

And the East Jordan Board of Trade was composed of modern minded members. The board was telling everyone that the community offered industries unusual opportunities for ideal locations.

The East Jordan Electric Light & Power Co., was telling folks the wonders of electricity and asking them to have their homes wired at once.

E. W. Giles was doing a land office business in his White Star Bakery and Restaurant on Main Street.

The old town was buzzing and Eugene Adams was out to get his share of business at the Temple Theatre. Adams claimed 800 seats with a big 25 x 48 foot stage. He packed them in back in 1912 with "Thelma" — the greatest scenic production to be seen in northern Michigan. And they stood in line to see the stage play, "The Shepard of the Hills."

The present East Jordan Recreation has one of the finest bowling alleys in northern Michigan today. But bowling is nothing new to the fair city. Bush's Bowling Alleys were in operation way back in 1904.

Young folks scratch their heads when old timers say: "Those were the days." That's because today you can drive over to Boyne in about 15 minutes; and back in 1912 during the Charlevoix County Fair, folks took the steamer "City of Boyne" to get here for the fair it left Boyne at 7 a.m. and left East Jordan at 6 p.m. Round trip was 50c.

Speaking about the county fair, a lot of people hereabouts did not believe there was such a thing as an airplane that could really fly.

The fair committee wanted to book a plane attraction but they didn't want to advertise it and then have to do a lot of explaining if the machine didn't work.

So the committee went to Bay City's fair to see the machine advertised it for the Charlevoix County Fair.

Backing up their advertising the committee told the people of East Jordan:

"There remains no doubt as to the reality of air transportation in various forms of flying machines; we all believe that flights of thousands of miles are made, that men and machines remain for hours several thousand feet from the earth, rising, flying, gliding and landing successfully, and all in a very natural and bird like manner."

It doesn't take much to bring back memories. Sometimes just watching red paint going on a brick building will start your dreaming.

East Jordan To Get \$3,000 From State

The city of East Jordan is to receive \$2,936.90 as its share of the 1953 second quarter motor vehicle highway fund collections.

Net receipts of the state fund for the second quarter now going to the state highway department to be distributed is \$26,682, 633.22.

Northern Michigan counties will receive the following amounts:

- Emmet, \$50,550.08
- Antrim, \$43,523.87
- Charlevoix, \$44,653.50

Northern Michigan cities and incorporated villages will receive amounts:

- East Jordan, \$2,936.90
- Boyer City, \$5,702.55
- Boyer Falls, \$585.29
- Charlevoix, \$4,239.88
- Central Lake, \$1,393.30
- Ellsworth, \$1,190.66
- Gaylord, \$3,018.22
- Harbor Springs, \$3,116.48
- Kalkaska, \$2,233.33
- Mancelona, \$1,593.19
- Petoskey, \$6,368.43

This money is from all the state gasoline and weight taxes, the diesel fuel tax and a small amount of miscellaneous fees deposited in the state motor vehicle highway fund.

After deductions for non highway uses and collection costs, the rest of the money is divided as follows:

- 44 per cent to the state highway department for state trunk line highways in both rural and urban areas; 37 per cent to the counties for expenditure on county roads, and 18 per cent to the cities and incorporated villages for expenditure on their roads and streets.

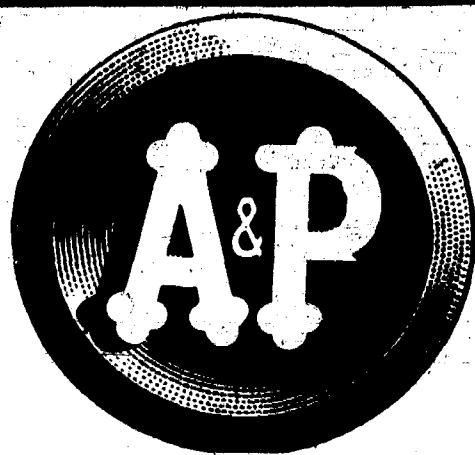

"Check Your Speed" Program Urged By Chief Simmons

Chief Harry Simmons today announced that the Police Department of East Jordan has adopted a firmer policy of enforcing the speed laws. This action is being taken at the official request of the Michigan Press Association for firmer enforcement to combat the rising traffic toll in Michigan.

"The 1953 first five months increases in Michigan are terrifying," the Chief said, pointing to accidents increasing 12%, injuries up 21% and deaths up 13%, according to State Police records.

"To battle this traffic disaster the department will apply a carefully thought out 3 pronged attack," the Chief continued. "I have instructed our officers to increase their vigilance for speeders. Motorists exceeding the speed limit may be expected to be stopped by a police officer, even if they are only going 5 miles over the speed limit," he added.

"5 miles over the speed limit may not seem like much," the Chief pointed out, "but such illegal practice far too often launches a career of traffic violations which leads to more and more severe violations." "As a matter of fact the Chief stated, "a motorist should appreciate being stopped for going 5 miles over the speed limit, if this serves as a forceful reminder and prevents a more serious violation later which might cause a serious accident — perhaps to the same motorist."

"The second prong of the department's attack to save lives will be the policy of charging more motorists with the more serious charge of "reckless driving" instead of "speeding" in cases where the speeder endangered the lives of other people or property while committing the violation" the Chief explained. This will result in a higher fine and a more serious black mark against the driver's license," he added.

"The third part of the department's plan to cut accidents calls for the more intensive investigation of traffic accidents and the placing of charges against one or both drivers for any violations which were committed that caused the accident or contributed to it," the Chief continued.

"Police officers stop motorists for violations at a time when there is no accident in order to prevent a repetition of the violations at a later date when sooner or later

they are certain to cause an accident," the Chief explained. "The justification for charging a motorist for a violation at a time when it actually caused or contributed to an accident is far greater," the Chief added.

In conclusion Chief Harry Simmons called upon all law abiding citizens of the area to give their full support to the traffic accident prevention activities of their police department. "I am sure," the Chief said, "that the great majority of our motorists who obey the traffic laws will be heartily in favor of this plan to crack down on the relatively small percent of motorists who are the violators who are causing the accidents."

Ask Growers To Consider Marketing Deal

Wheat growers should weigh both sides in the wheat marketing quota situation and then vote on August 14, Ed Reberman, County farm agent says.

A two-thirds "yes" vote will provide 90 per cent parity support under penalty controls. A one-third "no" vote will give free marketing but cut support to 50 per cent and that only on allotted wheat.

Here's the situation: "Yes" will put quotas on all farms with more than 15 acres

producing more than 200 bushels of wheat. It will penalize excesses give 90 per cent support for farmer's planting within allotments, and hold down production — bringing the supply closer to effective market demand.

"No" will throw out quotas and penalties, but not allotments. Price support will drop to 50 per cent for "acreage co-operators"

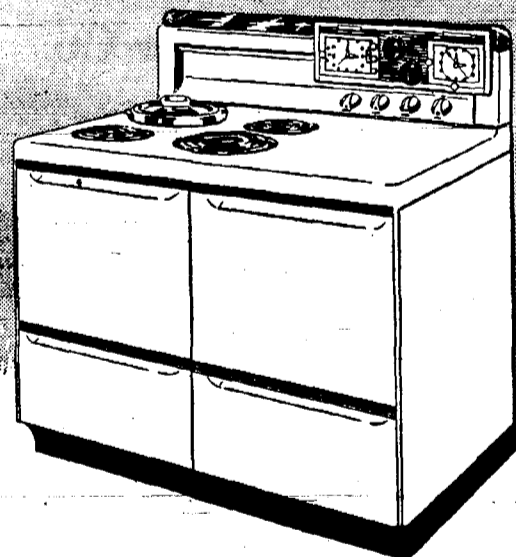
