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Where The Money Goes

We have state sales tax collection figures for Char-Sunday Masses-7:30 - 9:30 a.m. levoix and Emmet counties covering last June.

These figures should be mighty interesting to folks in this area.

Population for Emmet county is given as 16,534; and Charlevoix county, 13,475. There are 3,059 more Wilson Township: people in Emmet than Charlevoix county.

The state collected nearly three times the tax in Emmet than Charlevoix county during June from sale of automobiles; nearly three times as much for clothes and more than twice as much for furniture.


But tax collected on food sales was only \$2,000 more than in Charlevoix county.

Which means people in Emmet county are just about starving themselves to death to make big auto-mobile, clothes and furniture purchases; or people outside Emmet county are spending their food money at home and making major purchases in Emmet county.

ving. A strawberry mulch cuts down cold injury to crowns and roots and delays undesirable early blossoming. That means cleaner berries and fewer muddy spots in the patch later. The specialists recommend a coarse straw that is free from weed seeds for a mulch.







14 such child guidance clinics es tablished throughout the state where children with problems may receive psychiatric, psychologic, social, and educational assistance. Last year almost 200 children and their parents were seen for a total of approximately 1200 interviews at this clinic. In addition to this service the staff spoke to 42 different meetings explaining the purpose and function of the clinic.

It is sometimes difficult to measure the success of the work done with individual children but many fine expressions of appreciation and gratitude have been given the staff by grateful parents, teachers, school superintendents and others interested in the health and happiness of children.

During the past year an innovation was started by the Petoskey Clinic which is of particular interest to Charlevoix County. Part of the staff is spending a day a week in Charlevoix to better meet the needs of this area. At the first, space was generous ly donated in the City Hall, and when it became necessary to make use of these offices for city governmental officials, the city schools made rooms available. Whether or not this service continues on its present basis is entirely dependent on the extent to which it is used. Any child enrolled in school (or

not more than 16 years of age if not in school) is eligible for clinic service. All that is necessary is to obtain permission of the parents







ORDINANCE NO. 85

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 5 OF ORDINANCE NO. 83 OF THE CITY OF EAST JORDAN ADOPTED ON OCTOBER 6, 1953, ENTITLED:

"AN ORDINANE PLACING THE SEWAGE DISPOSAL SYSTEM OF THE CITY OF EAST JORDAN ON A PUBLIC UTILITY BASIS; PROVIDING FOR THE FIXING AND COLLECTION OF SEWAGE DISPOSAL RATES AND THE DISPOSITION OF REVENUES RESULTING FROM THE COLLECTION OF SUCH RATES."

THE CITY OF EAST JORDAN ORDAINS:

Section 1. Section 5 of Ordinance No. 83 of the City of East Jordan adopted on September 15, 1953, be amended to provide as follows:

Section 5. The sewage disposal rates hereinbefore established shall become effective on and after October 1, 1953, and the revenues of the Sewage Disposal System derived from the collection of such rates are hereby ordered to be set aside as collected in the State Bank of East Jordan, Michigan, in a separate depositary fund to be designated SEWAGE DISPOSAL SYSTEM RECEIVING FUND (hereinafter referred to as the Receiving Fund), and the revenues in said Fund are pledged for the purpose of the following funds, and shall be transferred from the Receiving Fund periodically in the manner and at the times hereinafter specified:


(a) Out of the revenues in the Receiving Fund, there shall be first set aside, quarterly, into a separate depositary fund designated OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE FUND, a sum sufficient to provide for the payment of the next quarter's current expenses of administration and operation of the System, and such current expenses for the maintenance thereof as may be necessary to preserve the same in good repair and working order. A budget, showing in detail the estimated costs of administration,

operation and maintenance of the System for the next ensuing fiscal year, shall be prepared by the Water Commissioner of the City at least thirty (30) days prior to May 1st of each year, which budget shall be approved by the City Council. The amounts transferred into the Operation and Maintenance Fund during each year shall not exceed the amount set forth in said budget, unless approved by a twothirds (2/3) vote of the City Council.

(b) There shall next be established and maintained a separate depositary account designated as the REPLACEMENT AND IM-PROVEMENT FUND, which shall be used solely for the purpose of making major repairs and replacements to the system for which funds in the Operation and Maintenance Fund are not available or sufficient and for the purpose of making improvements to the system. There shall be deposited into said account in quarterly installments, after providing for all requirements of the Operation and Maintenance Fund, the sum of One Thousand (\$1,000.00) Dollars in Maintenance Fund, the sum of One Thousand (\$1,000.00) Donars in each of the operating years beginning May 1, 1954 to and including the operating year beginning May 1, 1958. Said Replacement and Improvement Fund shall be established in the full amount of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, not later than the end of the operating year beginning May 1, 1958. If, at any time, it shall be necessary to use moneys in said Fund for the purpose for which it was established, the moneys so used shall be replaced from the net revenues in the Receiving Fund which are not required by this Ordinance to be used in the Operation and Maintenance Fund. (c) Out of the revenues remaining in the Receiving Fund after

provision has been made for expenses of operation and maintenance of the System, and for the Replacement and Improvement Fund, here shall next be set aside, quarterly, into the DEBT RETIREMENT FUND of the City, all the remaining revenues of the System, the moneys so set aside into said fund to be allocated and set aside on the books and records of the City, and used and applied solely and only for the payment of the principal of and interest on the General Ob-ligation Sewage Disposal System bonds in the aggregate principal amount of One Hundred Ninety Three Thousand (\$193,000.00) Dollars referred to in the preamble hereto.
