Last week we said, "Personally, we can't see why Michigan voters decided they wanted to fool themselves by eating yellow oleo." And bingo! A reader postcard to us that, "You eat your butter and I'll eat my oleo. Personally, we can't see where it's anybody's business what they eat, yellow oleo or green apples." The reader signed it, Fair E. Nuff.

And now it looks as though the nation's dairy farmers will have to shoot their milk cows and sell them for meat, for look what S. F. Riepma, president of the National Association of Margarine Manufacturers says:

"It is inevitable that margarine will capture most of butter's markets."

And if this is true the million dollar operation of the Jordan Valley Cooperative Creamery and all other creameries will be scuttled in the path of the determination of the oleo boys from the south.

East Jordan's famous Swans came in for some national publicity this month when Charles Culver, of Bellaire, authored a story about them in the magazine Lincoln - Mercury Times, put out by Ford Motor Co.

We have on hand a copy of "The Enterprise." If you think the old Enterprise was published in East Jordan, you're off the beam. For the date line reads, South Arm, Michigan, Thursday, February 16, 1899.

The issue is 54 years old and that week it was 45 degrees below zero, according to the paper. And a news note says: The Jordan River is now full of logs from one end to the other and it is almost impossible to find space to unload upon shore.

Your publishers are happy to have received an Accident Prevention Award for our July 16th farm accident prevention issue. The award was presented to the News-Herald by the National Safety Council.

The award reads, "... in grateful appreciation for help given the 1953 Stop Accidents Campaign... a campaign designed in the public interest to save lives and thereby Make America a safer place in which to live."

The honor was bestowed upon the News-Herald for the news stories and advertising promotion during Farm Safety Week. The following advertisers cooperated:

Our cities gathered up a head of steam to promote new industry for themselves. Each community has been successful in this regard; and now it is about time the county as a whole began to look for things that will benefit all.

If Charlevoix county as a whole could work together with the cooperation and determination shown by East Jordan within the past year, this would be the fastest developing county in Michigan.

A Charlevoix County Resort, and Industrial Promotional Council without politics, without individual greed, without bickering without glory seekers is needed. One with men and women with vision to see what cooperation can do for all of us.

First North State Farm Meet Set For City

Police Chief Reports Local Safety Plan

Chief Harry Simmons today announced the opening of a state-wide traffic safety campaign aimed at reducing accidents to pedestrians. "Our community is cooperating with the State Safety Commission on this important program to protect the under dog in traffic — the pedestrian," the Chief said.

The pedestrian protection educational program is launched this time of year because increasing hours of darkness make it much harder for motorists to see pedestrians. The official safety slogan for October and November, to be used on posters, leaflets, newspaper and radio programs is "Darkness Hides Walkers — Slow Down." This gets at the heart of the problem — the pedestrian is hard to see and he doesn't know it.

The Chief stated that the police department of East Jordan will give special attention to motorists who commit traffic violations near pedestrians.

Commenting on the unequal battle between the man on foot and the man behind the wheel the Chief said, "It takes very little speed to kill a pedestrian — even 10 miles per hour can be fatal. Once a car bumper hits a pedestrian at knee level and his head hits the pavement, a fatal accident is very likely."

The responsibility of retaining a driver's license requires a motorist to always slow down when approaching a pedestrian — and to be especially on the lookout for pedestrians at night," the Chief concluded.

Merchants To Elect Officers Next Month

Discussion of civic programs and the annual election of officers are on the agenda for the meeting of the East Jordan Businessmen's Association, November 10th.

Chairman M. N. McDaniel appointed the following committee chairmen at the group's October dinner meeting Thursday night at Cal's Tavern.

Leo Sommerville: Special events; Minnie DesJardins, advertising; Bud Hite, welcome committee; Douglas Cook, by laws; and Chris Taylor, local civic improvements.

About 45 members heard the Chairman discuss possibilities for local improvement such as better city advertising, benches in local parks, more flowers in business and residential areas, and organized outdoor activities.

Albert Sinclair gave a brief report on the development of East Jordan's new factory saying construction progress has been satisfactory.

City Park Commissioner Thomas St. Charles gave a final report on the city's tourist park activity for the current year.

Douglas Cook told the group that Bill Malpass has reported that he is willing to turn a ski run area over for city use if the association will take development responsibility Cook also gave a brief description of the State's desire to locate a small 600-man prison somewhere in west Michigan. Development cost will be between seven and eight million dollars.

Chairman McDaniel told the members that the group's industrial committee is not slowing down. Several new industrial contacts have been made and are being followed up for possible new industry here.

Firemen Ask Resorters For Fire Lanes

East Jordan firemen discussed possibility of asking area cottage owners to provide access to the lake, following a costly fire Saturday afternoon.

Called to the Brewer cottage in Eveline Orchard resort, the department could not get the truck near enough to the lake to pump water.

A roadway every so often between cottages to the lake would provide proper fire lanes and save time and money in case of fire, they said.

Firemen arrived minutes after the blaze started but were without water to fight the fire. The small cottage and all contents were destroyed.

Tourist Park Booms Thru The Summer

There were 96 trailers from 9 states at East Jordan's newly developed tourist park this summer.

Park Commissioner Thomas St. Charles gave the final figures for the first time at the East Jordan Businessmen's Association October meeting.

St. Charles said the park took in \$1,175.70 for summer rent, etc. Trailers came from the following states: Michigan, California, Florida, Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, Oregon, Utah and Washington.

Forty-five Michigan cities were represented at the park by trailer owners, he said.

There were 82 trailers from Michigan and 14 from other states. Flint was represented the most this summer with 11 trailers and Florida had the most from out state, 4 trailers.

One of the few nationally approved tourist parks in northern Michigan, the area has been under constant improvement at the direction of St. Charles.

For East Jordan alone, this \$5,500 budget includes \$1,500 for health and welfare, public health nurse, milk program etc.

It includes \$1,775 for recreation, both summer and winter; \$625 for the youth program, including Boy Scouts; \$100 for American Legion Christmas boxes; \$500 for sending boxes and newspapers to local men and women in the armed forces.

For independent state agencies, East Jordan's budget includes: \$150 for the Salvation Army; and \$100 for the Michigan Children's Aid Society.

Also \$750 is East Jordan's share of the Michigan United Health and Welfare fund.

About half of this is for National Defense Fund which includes the USO.

The balance is for research and health services under the following headings:

Health, Arthritis, Polio, Cerebral Palsy, Mental Illness, Multiple Sclerosis or creeping paralysis, Leader Dogs, Hearing, Epilepsy and Cancer.

A very small part of this sum goes to welfare services such as nursing, legal aid, Big Brothers, child care, travellers Aid, etc. Chest President Mrs. John Porter said: "It hardly seems possible so much can be done for so little."

"The amount East Jordan gives to the Michigan United Fund is determined so that every community is asked to give its fair share."

The American Telephone and Telegraph company has worked out a quota giving each state its fair proportion in relation to other states; and in a similar way each county in Michigan is given its share.

You may know that every cent asked for is needed and will be spent wisely, the president said.

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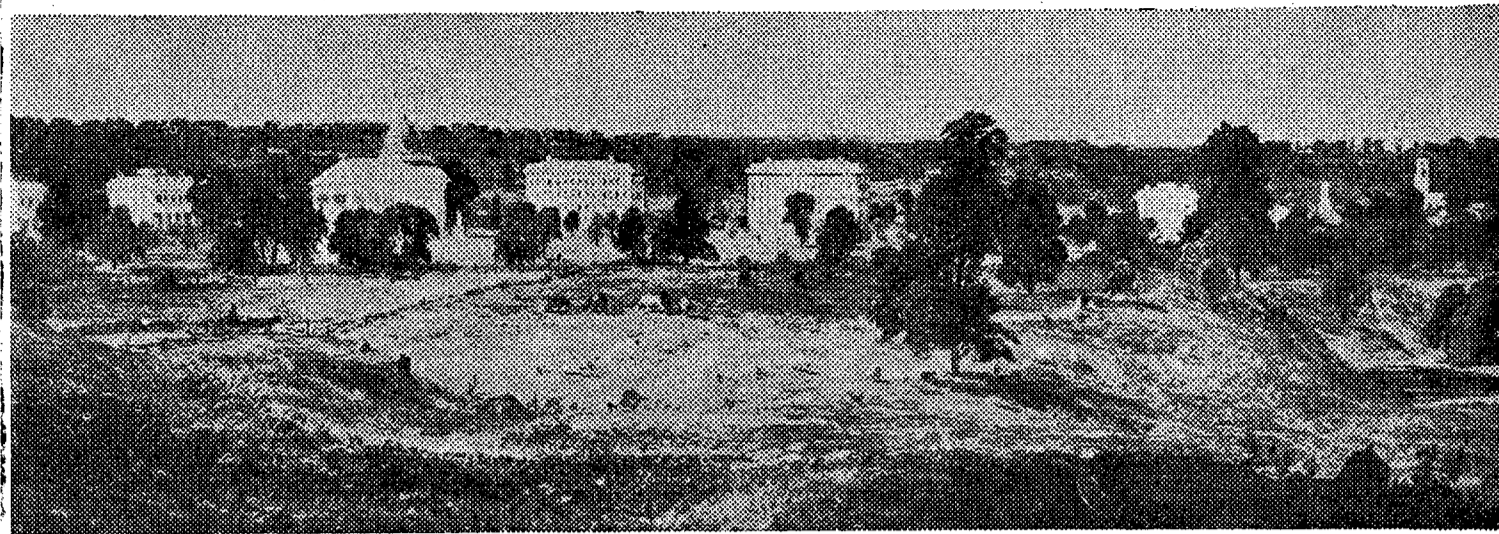
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How U-M Campus Looked 100 Years Ago

East Jordan Future Farmers Experiment On Brock Farm

★ ★ ★

To Show How Soil Erosion Effects Farms In County

A lot of Charlevoix Soil Conservation District operators have been wondering what's going on when driving by the Hiram Brock Farm on M-66 near Iron-ton, stated Bob Reidel, machinery chairman for the Charlevoix Soil Conservation District.

Perhaps some of you when you saw the group of boys working out there thought they were playing hooky. Well that isn't the case, those boys are members of the East Jordan Future Farmers of America, supervised by Dick Schroeder, and they are taking an active

part in building the Charlevoix Soil Conservation Districts Run-off plots.

The first thing the boys did, continued Bob Reidel, was to dig a hole 3 1/2 ft. wide, 28 ft. long, and 5 ft. deep so that 4 tanks could be laid down. These tanks

are the catch basins for the run-off plots.

The East Jordan Future Farmers of America being an energetic bunch have purchased a 1951 Ford tractor and with the aid of a slush scraper plus the bulging muscles of Joe Smith, Bob Russel, Bob Liet, Iron Kettson, Vernal Waldon, Ed Thorsen, Walter Murphy, Paul Liscum, Jack Zoulek and about 30 other boys. They got the hole dug and refilled after the tanks were laid.

These soil run-off plots will be established next spring. There will be 4 plots 7 ft. wide and 124 ft. 5 1/2" long, which when calculated up will represent 1/50 acre.

The purpose of these plots are to show the public the soil and water losses due to erosion by using different farming practices and rotations.

The first plot will be a rotation of continuous corn cultivated up and down the slope.

Second plot will be a C-O-H-H rotation with all crops being planted on the contour. Third plot will be C-O-H-H rotation with crops being planted in a strip cropping program. Fourth plot will be continuous hay.

Similar plots in the Leelanaw Soil Conservation District have shown these results in past three years:

Soil — Corn Annually up and down, 15.9 tons; C-O-H-H contour 1.4 ton; C-O-H-H strip crop 1.0 ton, Cont Hay .8 ton.

Water loss — Corn Annually up and down 23,000 gals, C-O-H-H contour 7,200 gals, C-O-H-H strip crop, 1,620 gal. Cont. Hay 1,410 gal.

One ton of soil is roughly 1/16" over one acre, so on corn annually up and down plot 1 inch of top soil was lost compared to 1/16" of top soil gone in Contour Strip Crop plot. There's quite a difference and these results were in 3 years. A lot of our land has been farmed for 40 years. There's also a noticeable difference of 21,380 saved by strip cropping than in the up and down cultivation. These water figures are for one rain and we get more than one one rain a year. It takes a barrel of water to produce 1 stalk and 1 ear of corn. That difference between a fair crop and a good crop, stated Bob Reidel.

Because the East Jordan Future Farmers of America had the foresight to suggest and see the possibilities of the soil run-off plots and through the financial and technical assistance furnished by the Charlevoix Soil Conservation District and because of the courtesy of Mr. Hiram Brock, the soil run-off plots are becoming a reality.

Big Drop In Egg Stocks

"The tightest egg supply on record" is the blunt description of the situation given by some dealers. On top of the hot spell's discouragement to production, demand has taken a seasonal upswing lately. And on September 1, egg stocks in cold storage totaled only 826,000 cases, a record low for the date. A year earlier the pile was nearly 2.2 million cases.

As a result, the cost of large top-quality eggs has reached the greatest heights since late 1950.

HOWEVER, high prices are spurring a buildup in flocks of laying hens. Last month commercial hatcheries produced 15% more chicks than a year earlier.

One source of relief for egg eaters: Small pullet eggs, a relatively good buy these days are rolling to market in growing amounts.

Commercial hatcheries in Michigan produced 810,000 chicks during the month of August. This hatch compares to 640,000 chicks hatched during August one year ago, and is more than double the 5-year (1947-51) August average. Total production for January through August was 27,010,000 which is 1 per cent above the same period of 1952, and up 8 per cent from the 5-year average.

Going To Paint? Check Weather First, MSC Says

If you're still planning to paint this fall, be sure to take precautions that you won't have moisture trouble later on. That's advice from J. S. Boyd of Michigan State College's agricultural engineering department.

Just because the surface you intend to paint appears dry, that's no sign the wood is free of moisture, says Boyd. Check the weather of several days previous, he suggests, and if it has been warm and dry the possibility of moisture trouble is not too great.

But if heavy dews or rains have fallen in the previous few days, the paint will trap moisture which will cause blisters and paint peeling.

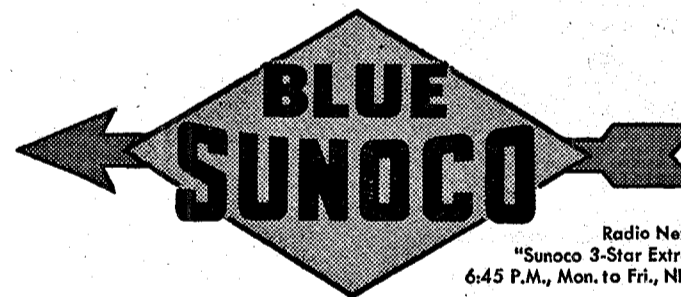

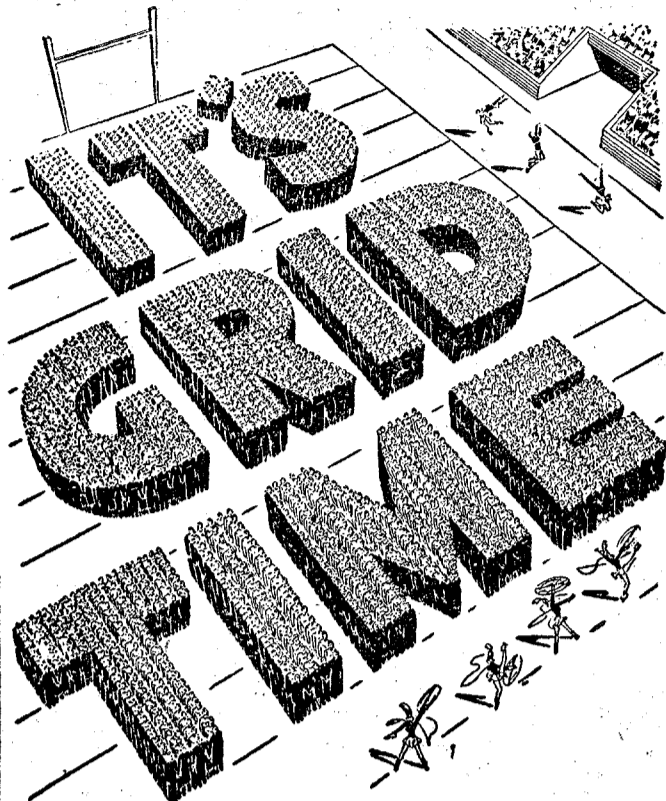

"I've been assigned the job of Asst Bn Operations Officer. What I've seen of my duties so far I like very much. The living conditions are nice here and we're far enough out of Pusan so the place isn't so congested with Korean people.

"I've sure fallen behind on the news and will be glad when I start getting the paper again. 2nd LT Roger R. Benson, Hq, 335th Ord Ammo Bn, APO 973, c-o PM, San Francisco, Calif."

This week I received a card which sort of set me back on my heels. It reads—Dear Sir—if you wish to send my son, A/2c Russell Fyan the paper, his new address is: 91st SRS (M) Photo, APO 328, c/o PM, Box 304, San Francisco, California. Now that is a fine card but it is at least a month too late. All this time we have been sending a paper for Russell Fyan to Forbes AFB at

Topeka, Kansas. Where have those papers been going? None have been returned. We find by experience that the process of sending a man overseas takes at least a month. Wouldn't it have been much better if this man or his mother had taken the pains to notify us when he left Forbes and again when he reached his new overseas address? Our Service Club is glad to send out these papers to the Servicemen but is it asking too much for a little cooperation on your part?

A small change of address finds Don Whiteford in Flight 2858, Squadron 3659 at Sampson AFB, Geneva, New York. There is no comment as yet on how he likes his schooling.

Bernard Pearce writes from Camp Chaffee, Arkansas. "It has been some time since I've written, so guess I'll talk to you for awhile. Two weeks ago today I found out I was going to leave Fort Sill. Here's Al Chandas address for you Bernard. Pvt A. Chanda, Hq & Hq Co, 45th Arm Div, 3rd Arm Div, Fort Knox, Kentucky. Bob Saxton has started an 8 week Quartermaster school at Fort Lee, Virginia. His new address is: Co I, 2nd QM Sch Regt.

Here's a new man at Fort Knox, Kentucky. Ret. Charles R. Shaw (Bob) is in Co B, 2048 ASU RC. Perhaps you can locate Al Chanda at the above address. I'm sure he can tell you where Bob Stanek, Larry Huckle, and Orville Nelson are.

Received a letter from Delwin Morris this past week. "Hope that everyone in EJ are well and everything going good. We are fine and everything in the 328 is fine.
