ludes the USO. The balance is for research and health services under the following headings:

Health, Arthritis, Polio, Cerebral Palsy, Mental Illness, Multiple Sclerosis or creeping paralysis, Leader Dogs, Hearing, Epilepsy and Cancer. A very small part of this sum
