

# East Jordan To Fight Double Court Action

East Jordan is about to have its "day in court." Tomorrow (Friday) the city will be represented in circuit court at Charlevoix as the result of two summonses involving attempts to obtain injunctions pertaining to construction operations of its \$200,000.00 municipal sewage disposal system.

The double barreled legal action exploded against the city eleven months after the Charlevoix County Sheriff's department had served a summons upon the city for the State Waterways Commission.

The state commission went to court and forced the city to make up its mind about a sewage disposal system. The idea was to stop East Jordan from dumping raw sewage into Lake Charlevoix.

East Jordan City Councils had discussed the problems reoccurring for nearly a quarter century and were still shaking their heads.

First concrete action was carried out by the former and the present city councils in answer to a legal prod from the state.

While sweating out what the taxpayers could afford to pay and at the same time eyeing the state's court order, the council was jarred with the thing that has befuddled a good many city councils throughout the state. It was the annoying fact that few property owners are pleased with prospects of a sewage plant near their land.

First to move into the picture was the Jordan River Sportsmen's Club who put the city on notice several months ago.

The members did not then and do not now want the sewage plant located in Sportsmen's Park. The club is seeking an injunction to prevent it.

Second to speak to the council was William Healey, Jr., who is charging the city with the cutting of trees on his property and locating a sewage lift station so close that the valuation and future use of the vacant lot will be seriously impaired.

Healey's first approach to the city was strengthened with a list of signatures

from surrounding property owners which was tossed upon the council table by Healey himself.

He now is seeking an injunction against locating the lift station as called for by present engineering plans.

Both Healey and the Sportsmen's club have hired attorneys and the city will be represented at both hearings in court at Charlevoix tomorrow (Friday).

Thus, since the state pointed a legal finger at the city last December and said a sewage plant must be constructed, the council has picked up a couple of fresh headaches; to which said City Attorney Guy C. Conkle, "the city will certainly fight."

It is felt by both complaints that they have reasonable grounds for legal action. Both discussed their cases with the council before attempting to secure the injunctions.

The city's sewage system engineer is Fred Norton, of Traverse City, who told the council that complete relocation of the lift station alone would probably cost in the neighborhood of \$4,000.

No estimate was placed upon the additional cost of completely relocating the sewage plant itself.

## First Year A Success East Jordan Businessmen Select New Directors

### Less Deer To Be In Woods In Nov.

Does, fawns and buck deer will be legal game for hunters north of route M-55 December 1.

That special "any deer" season of one day follows the regular 16-day statewide deer season of November 15-30.

With all that shooting, it might seem there'll be nothing left of Michigan's deer herd by Christmastime.

But game men pooh-pooh that notion strongly. They say the deer herd is definitely smaller this year because of the heavy kill last year, but this is as it should be for the future welfare of the herd. And they point out that hunting seasons this year are designed to keep the herd down in size without in any way damaging its future.

This year's kill figure, for example, is not expected to come anywhere near the 160,000 total bag of last year for a number of reasons.

First, the 1952 special season lasted three days and included a weekend. This year, the season is only one day and falls during the week, when many persons cannot take time from their work to hunt.

Also, last year, all three days were ideal for hunting; this year a storm on December 1 could mean a small kill and lots of disappointed hunters.

Thirdly, the 1952 special season included all the lower peninsula north of route M-20; this year that area is reduced in size by about a third, with special season hunting permitted in the lower peninsula only north of route M-55.

Thus, estimates of the total kill expected this year run to half the 1952 figure—about 30,000 animals. Some game men say it may drop below that figure, others believe it will be somewhat higher. In any case, the total kill will be substantially down from last year.

Still, game men hope hunters take enough deer so that animals remaining in the woods will have enough natural food to carry them through the winter without trouble.

Taylor said the two signs already up are lighted and operate automatically going on and off according to the time of day.

Minnie DesJardins explained the work of her advertising committee. The committee plans several forms of state wide advertising for the city which will be worked out during the coming months.

Chairman McDaniel further discussed the plan to organize an auxiliary to the association consisting of businessmen's wives who will help with the beautification of the city in general.

At the suggestion of Howard Porter the secretary was ordered to write a letter to the State Highway Commission asking for repairs to M-66 south of M-32; and that the highway not be allowed to remain in its present condition all winter. Only repairs were asked for at this time since plans are being made for major improvement of the highway later.

East Jordan's Christmas program was discussed which includes decorating the business section, a window display program, and aiding the needy thru the American Legion Auxiliary.

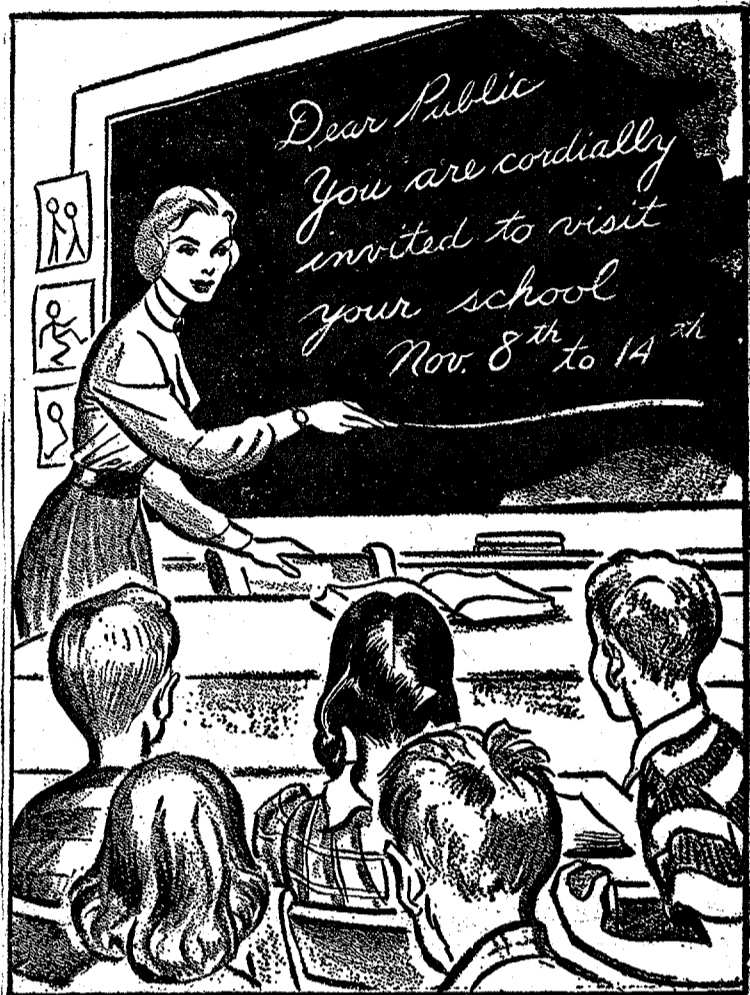
At the suggestion of the board of directors a complete financial report of the group's 1953 activities will be published in the News-Herald next week.

American Legion**

(Continued from last week)

The Legion prides itself on its service to veterans in need and their dependents. It brings cheer to the hospitals, furnishes entertainment, procures legal assistance, medical treatment and financial aid for indigent comrades. It has been instrumental in procuring the passage by Congress of laws which have been of particular benefit to disabled men. It maintains a National Legislative Commission which gets behind every piece of legislation of benefit to ex-service men. It caused the organization of the United States Veterans' Administration.

It was the Legion which sponsored and saw passed legislation which made available to the veterans of World War II the same federal benefits, and in many instances the same state benefits, enjoyed by the Veterans of World War I.

During 1944, The American Legion conceived drafted and piloted through Congress the Service Man's Readjustment Act, popularly known as the G. I. Bill of Rights. In 1945, the organization drafted and piloted through Congress amendments to the bill. In 1952 the organization sponsored and saw passed the G. I. Bill for veterans of the Korean War.

The American Legion provides for contact men between the veterans and the Veteran's Administration. It has secured millions of dollars in compensation for disabled men. It maintains hospitals of its own in several states. It maintains a National Rehabilitation Commission which is constantly looking after the interests of the disabled and their dependents.

Pledged to attend to the welfare of children and particularly of the orphans of its comrades of the World War and the Korean War, The American Legion has a Child Welfare Commission which is actively at work in their interest. The program has three phases: to maintain the home intact wherever possible; to secure proper and adequate foster homes where necessary; and to provide for adequate state laws for care for children and widows.

The American Legion successfully undertook the task of raising an endowment fund of five million dollars for the purpose of providing a method of properly financing our Rehabilitation and Child Welfare programs.

Orchard Notes

This is a very good time of the year to talk about insects as related to fruit crops. The cherry red beetle has not visited us for over ten years; it will come again for one season and then vanish for a number of years.

A prominent fruit grower at Kewadin told his customers that some of his peaches would be wormy this year. He says that this insect may not appear for another ten years and that the ordinary run of insects can be controlled by diligent spraying.

We had to spray our plums and prunes for leaf hoppers and curculio. The materials used and time of spraying are very important.

Apples were sprayed for scab, codling moth, red mite, and also a spray to thin the apples and the same material makes them stick on the tree at harvest time when used ten days before harvest.

The sprayer, like a fire truck has to be ready to go.

A dessert luncheon was served after which an interesting program was presented by Marge Karker of the Michigan Farm Bureau office in Lansing.

A short talk on each of four different types of farming in Charlevoix County was presented by the following: Dairy, Mrs. Aron Brock; beef, Mrs. Leo Berg; fruit, Mrs. Howard Stephens; and turkeys, Mrs. Arlo Wickersham.

then talk to the representatives of the ventilating companies, both before and after the meeting.

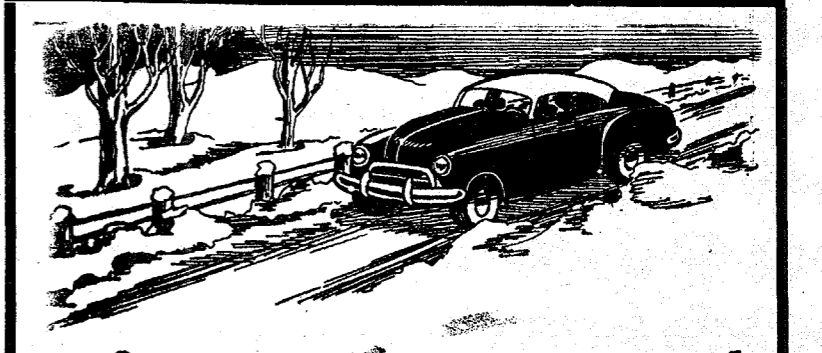

Good dairy farmers are scared of bloat, bugs and lowered production if they don't keep cows in at night, Rebman says.

Extension Dairyman J. G. Hays of Michigan State College points out that frost-nipped alfalfa isn't any worse for bloating cows at night than in the day-time. But in the dark hours a ballooned bosy goes unnoticed.

The bugs the dairymen fear are the bacteria of mastitis. Such bugs work around the clock to cause trouble. The bugs are hap-

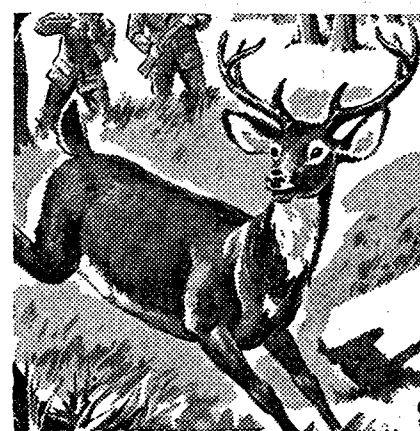

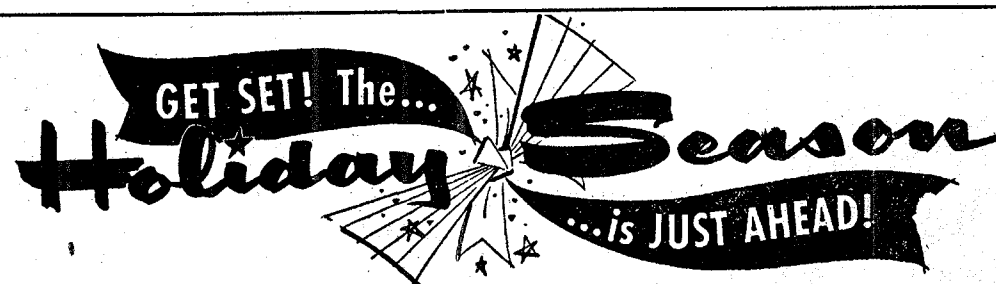
