# Road Commission Breaks 30-Year Court House Tie-up

## East Jordan To Get \$3000 From State

East Jordan will get \$3,006.17 from the state motor vehicle highway fund for the third quarter of 1953.

This includes returns from state gasoline, weight, diesel and other taxes distributed quarterly to counties and cities.

Charlevoix county will get \$45,878.37; Antrim county, \$44,207.73; and Emmet county \$51,816.44.

## Close County Seat Office In Favor of Boyne City

The Charlevoix County Road Commission members Monday voted to end their 30 year connection with the county court house and move the headquarters to Boyne City.

Effective immediately the road commission office will be located in Boyne City with Ralph Hamilton, commission clerk continuing his position at the new location.

## Junior Red Cross Drive Is Now On

The Charlevoix County Chairman for the Junior Red Cross, Mrs. Jean Barden, announced today that the annual membership drive of the Junior Red Cross is now on and extended through November 15th. The goal is to enroll every school child in the Junior Red Cross.

Membership fees are whatever each child cares to give. These dues cover cost of gift boxes to children overseas and the Charlevoix County annual contribution to the National Children's Fund.

It also includes a subscription to the Junior Red Cross magazine which is sent each month to all the school rooms in Charlevoix County.

Hamilton said Tuesday that only the commission office is being moved. No equipment or change in personnel is involved. The move does not affect operations at the commission's garage in East Jordan.

## PASS RESOLUTION

The resolution that cut the commission from any further connection with the county court house said: "Whereas in the interest of efficiency and economy it is desirable to have all phases of the Charlevoix County Road Commission coordinated; and whereas room is now available in Boyne City, now therefore be it resolved that effective immediately the office of the Charlevoix County Road Commission shall be located at Boyne City."

The commission's decision is the result of several years of discussion to sever themselves from the court house. Lyle B. Wangerman, Karl J. Erber and Sam E. Rogers are members of the board.

The decision to leave the county seat at Charlevoix was voted upon at the commission's regular meeting Monday.

## City Wins Two Court Hearings

East Jordan City Attorney Guy C. Conkle reported Tuesday that the City had won both cases involving restrictions against location of the city's sewage disposal plant.

Conkle's request to the court Friday that the case brought by the Jordan River Sportsmen's club be dismissed was granted by Circuit Court Judge Charles Brown, in an opinion handed down Tuesday.

In the case of the City of East Jordan versus William Healey, Jr. Judge Brown decided that Healey was not entitled to receive an injunction against the city locating a sewage lift station near his property.

Work of constructing the city's \$200,000 sewage plant was continued this week.

Conkle said that in the Healey case the plaintiff will pay only his own lawyer's fees and his own court costs.

## The Target - Nov. 15th



East Jordan sportsmen who do not like to play hide and seek with law officers might note the following deer hunting rules.

Anyone using a firearm for deer hunting must have a firearm deer license; archery deer permits are valid only for bow hunting. The hunting tag must be carried in plain view on the hunter's back or cap.

Only buck deer with antlers three inches or longer are legal during the November 15-30 fire-

arm season.

Hunting is allowed only during daylight hours, from 6 a.m. to 7 p.m. and there is no open season on cows, horses or wapita elk.

Seals must be placed on the deer as soon as it's shot and only one deer is allowed each hunter each year, whether taken with bow or firearm.

**Drive Safely . . .**

Chief Harry Simmons today announced a series of 10 safe driving lessons dealing with pedestrians safety. These are being run by the East Jordan News-Herald as a public service to assist in saving the lives of local residents while they are on foot in traffic.

### To Install Long Distance Dial In Birmingham

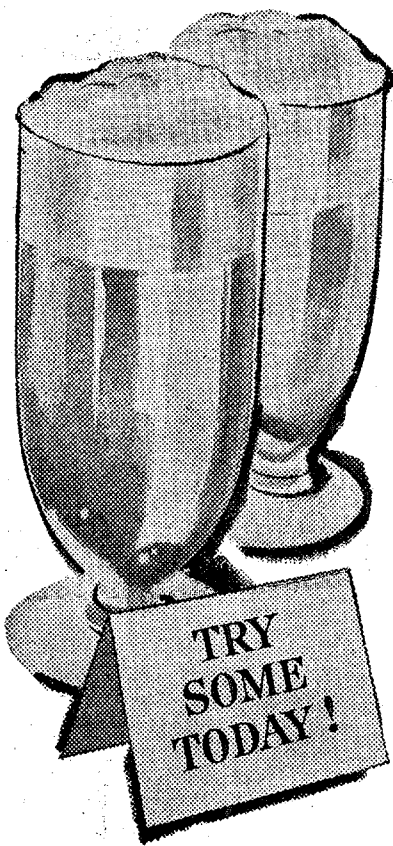

## Watch Protein Supply For Dairy Herds

Watch out for the need of protein supplement in your dairy herd this winter. Ed Rehman, Charlevoix county agricultural agent, says that

much of the legume hay harvested in this area is of poorer quality than last year. Good quality hay usually will fill the protein bill, he explains.

Extension Dairyman J. G. Hays of Michigan State College suggests trying some supplement to the cows in the grain ration; but if there is no boost in production discontinue the additional protein. If there is no increase in the milk yield, it usually means that cows are getting enough protein from their regular ration.

Hays adds that any of the com-

mon supplements such as linseed oil meal or soybean oil meal provide about the same amount of protein. But, he cautions, it's not a good idea to use the high analysis supplement where the crude protein is above 50 per cent. If the crude protein content is above 50 per cent the supplement contains a high percentage of urea.

And Hays cautions, overfeeding of urea will result in poisoning. He suggests taking a careful look at the analysis of the bag contents.

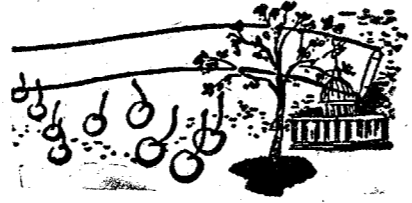

## Prevent Winter Fires Now, Says Ed Redman

You can prevent a costly fire in your home by some attention to some details now—before winter actually sets in, reminds Ed Redman, Charlevoix County agricultural agent.

He points out that a large share of the \$90 million worth of property damage on U. S. farms every year is caused by defective chimneys, carelessness with combustible materials or misuse of petroleum products.

He passes along this advice from the National Safety Council:

Repair cracks or other defects in the chimney and replace rusted or worn-out stove pipes.

Caution all members of the family against using petroleum products to start or hasten a fire.

See that all combustible materials are protected.

Place a metal or asbestos floor covering under wood or coal burning stoves.

Help prevent a fire on your roof by using a spark arrester on the chimney.

See that tank heaters, feed heaters and other types of heating equipment on the farm are installed safely and kept in good condition.

When the heating season is in full swing, be sure that dampers in stoves or furnace pipes are never closed enough to force carbon monoxide or other gases out into the room.

here in many different ways. For this section it first appeared in an orchard about five miles south of my place here. The year of 1942 we had a light crop with also some cherry maggots in tart cherries. However, we have had no signs of the cherry frit fly since that date. Wild cherry trees have been cut down, neighbors that had one or two cherry trees in their yard or orchard have cooperated by cutting down the trees. Also neglected tart cherries soon die. However in and around the East Jordan district some cherry fruit fly crops up every year. This is more than likely due to some orchards being close enough to wooded areas and wild cherry trees. A diligent spray program is necessary.

Here at home we believe that we have the fruit fly and curculio whipped. Prune and plum trees attract the curculio to centers where we can gang up on them. The East Jordan district seems to be a home for insects. They not only have the fly, curculio and case bearer but also the mineola moth that produces a large worm. Mineola Moth or California fruit worm no doubt traveled here in a package of California fruit. This pest appears early and at a time that causes extra spraying and with materials that are harmful to bees, especially to local and wild bees and other pollinating insects.

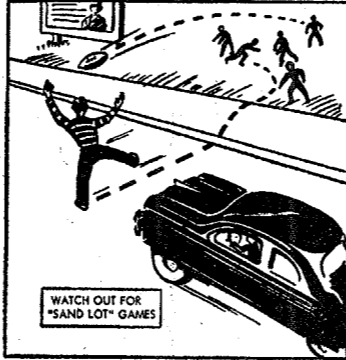

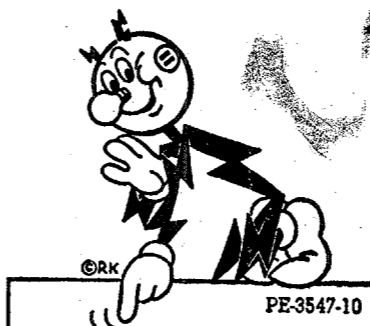

G. I. NEWS

Hi Fellas: A new address for Jim Lewis (Pfc) finds him with the 4th Sig Hq Gp, APO 403, c-o PM, New York, N. Y. Will you drop us a note and let us know where you are, Jim? Does that APO 403 still mean 3rd Army?

Roger Benson has moved again. He is now with the 52nd Ord Ammo Co., APO 234, c-o PM, San Francisco, Calif.

Don Braman is leaving Norfolk on November 12th for the Azores. He is due to spend two days at Casablanca, eight days in Naples and will be back in Norfolk sometime around December 24th. Don's new address is: Donald E. Braman, SK3, "S" Division, USS Whitley, AKA-91, c-o FPO, New York, N. Y.

Here's a letter from Harry Webster in Kumwha, Korea.

"I have been receiving the paper quite regular and have finally caught up on all the local E. J. news. We have been working pretty hard the last few weeks digging bunkers, fixing our tents and in general preparing for winter. The days here are quite warm but the nights are cold and if a guy isn't used to this stuff it can get him down in a hurry.

"By the looks of the paper things are moving right along with the new factory. I know all the guys over here have their eyes on the

paper, watching the new developments at home, just the same as me. To me the paper is No. 1 when I am on free time. There is nothing like reading about home. Tell everyone "Hello" for me. Pvt. Harry Webster, Sv Btry, 424 FA Bn, APO 264, c-o PM, San Francisco, Calif."

Jim Pollitt is around town again. He said he had some leave time to use up and didn't know a better time to do so than right now. He ought to be out before too long. I thought I saw Jim Ruskell with him one day this last week. Jim should be out for good about now too.

Bob Stanek arrived in Camp Stoneman on November 2nd and they had a boat all ready and waiting for him and he shipped out on November 3rd. Destination unknown but we can guess, can't we.

Here's a very prompt letter from Berton Bunker who we just added to our Air Mail list again on October 19th. "I guess I bet your drop you a few lines. I should have written before this. I got my first paper today since being back. I've been back in Korea since July.

"I'm stationed in Inchon where most of the fellows get off the ship and also leave to go home. I can watch them unload on the small boats to come in as the tide

is out. They leave the ships out and bring everything in on LST and LSU's. I guess they have other kinds too. When the boys come off the ship and are coming in there is a Church on a hill and to the right is a school house. Our gun position is right behind the school in the playground.

"If anyone from back there ever gets in Inchon just go to the Service Club. They can call me up by calling Noontide and asking for Noontide Dog One. The CP knows which gun section I'm in and will I will look you up if there are over four men here. I will be down to the Service Club in about ten minutes as we are about six blocks from there. We have to keep four men here all the time and there are seven of us here.

"I was surprised when I got back here. There was a boy from Boyne Falls in the btry that came in the Army with me and Larry Whiteford. I see Larry is still in Bliss. I wish I were there too as it is a lot better than it is here. We train every day and sometimes I think basic wasn't so bad. Last week we had night classes and went to the firing range. And this week we had classes on march order and we were supposed to march order Thursday. But it was a pretty good day so the Army says we will wait for a rain. So yesterday (Friday) it rained all day and we went out. We couldn't have the truck covers on or the gun covers. We were in mud — stuck and out and we got in last night and everything was wet and muddy. We were all morning cleaning the clay off the gun and we will be another day getting everything back the way it was.

"We stand 24 hour watch so I have got 2 hours at night and 2 a day to stand. We have all our winter clothing already so we won't Berton E. Bunker, Btry D. 933 AAA AW Bn (M), APO 971, c-o PM, San Francisco, California."

Hey, I thought someone said this was a new Army. That letter of Berton's sounded just like the same old CS to me.

Don Dixon seems to be quite well satisfied with his berth down in Louisiana. He writes, "Well, I thought I would drop you a line and let you know that I am still alive and in a pretty good place at the present time. I like it here in New Orleans but we will not be here too much longer. Then we will be on our way to Norfolk. I don't like that at all but there is not a thing I can do about it.

"We have a pretty good ship. It is a little bigger than the ones. It is 324' long, 53'6" wide, and has a displacement of 4954 tons so you can see it is a pretty big ship to be running up on the beach with.

"I got some good news yesterday. I made 2nd class so I guess I am not so dumb after all. 'Who said you were, Don?' At least they don't think so.

"The weather has been very nice down here, in fact it is hot in the day time and that is one thing I never saw at home in November.

"I have only received one paper in the last month but I hope they will get to me sooner or later and I think they will. I am writing this on watch so had better cut it short. I have to take reading pretty soon. Donald Dixon, FP2, USS LST 1166, c-o FPO, New York, N. Y."

"I'm sorry your papers are slow reaching you, Don. It must be because of your New York address. They will probably be more prompt when you get back up to Norfolk. Congrats on that new rate.

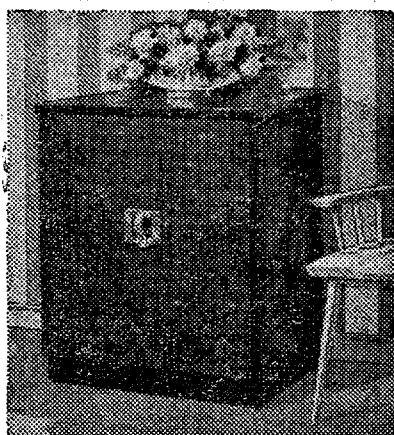
