

More Money work and was a junior 4-H club To Be Deducted From Weekly Pay

The social security tax rate for persons whose work counts toward old-age and survivors insurance is scheduled to increase on the first of January, William E. LaRock, manager of the Traverse City social security office, reminded employers, employees, and selfemployed people today.

This scheduled increase in tax contribution is in accordance with the 1950 amendments to the social security law, and was enacted by Congress in anticipation of future obligations of the program.

Employees in jobs covered by the law will have 2 percent into earnings of \$3600 a year; their employers will contribute an equal amount.

The new rates will apply to all taxable wages paid after December 31, 1953, regardless of when
