

# Hospital Pledge Money Slows Down, May Stall Work

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East Jordan, Charlevoix, Ellsworth \$26,000 Behind

East Jordan residents are \$3,000 behind in payment of their pledges made toward construction of the new Charlevoix Area hospital. There are 52 delinquent accounts here, 21 of which have made no effort to pay at all.

Down in Ellsworth there are 51 delinquent accounts including 26 who have paid nothing. They owe \$3,505.34.

## Legion Auxiliary Will Not Hold Chicken Supper

The American Legion Auxiliary Unit 227, regret to announce that they will not hold their annual Chicken Supper for the benefit of the Community Christmas Basket Fund. Several people around town have been asking about the supper, and the Auxiliary greatly appreciate the interest the people of East Jordan have taken in this affair. But due to many circumstances we find it impossible to hold the supper.

We are endeavoring to raise funds for this program by other means.

Over in Charlevoix, in the city where the hospital is being constructed, there are 150 delinquent pledges including 91 people who have made no effort to honor their pledges. Charlevoix pledges are running \$19,000 behind collection.

December 1st delinquent pledges in the Charlevoix, East Jordan and Ellsworth areas totaled \$26,196.79.

A provision in the federal grant agreement through which federal funds were to be raised to aid in construction says that: The building must be 25-percent completed by funds contributed by the residents of the area before federal grant will be forthcoming.

It was reported in Charlevoix this week that this will only be possible if pledges are paid on time.

It is pointed out that 45 percent of the total of \$600,000 which the hospital will cost when completed has to be raised locally.

Fred W. Willis, chairman of the board of directors, reported that construction will be hampered and present funds depleted unless pledges, now past due, are paid at the earliest possible date.

The 44-bed hospital was started by the Strom Construction Company, of Grand Rapids, last July and excellent weather has enabled workmen to put the building "under cover" before bad weather set in.

If construction progresses according to schedule, the heating unit will be completed within the month thus making it possible for workmen to continue during winter months.

Construction of partitions as well as installation of electrical and plumbing facilities are under way in the building heated by a number of pot-bellied stoves until the steam plant can be installed.

Speaking about the non-collected pledges Chairman Willis said: "It would be unfortunate if the project would be delayed because some people have not honored their pledges or are delinquent in their payments."

Summer residents who made pledges toward the hospital fund show practically no delinquency in payment.

## License Plates For New Year Now On Sale

Michigan's 1954 license plates the first to carry the state's new slogan, "Water Wonderland," went on sale Tuesday at Strehl's Garage where Bob Strehl conducts the Secretary of State's branch office.

### Police Give Safe Winter Driving Tips

If any motorist in East Jordan has failed to get his automobile into condition for winter driving, the arrival of December should shock him into action, Chief of Police Harry Simms warned yesterday.

"The season of hazardous driving is here or near, and we might as well face it," the chief said. "The time to make your car winter-safe is before the accident."

Chief Simms offered the following rules of longevity, supplied by the National Safety Council:

1. Don't blame the weatherman for accidents. Be prepared.
2. Get the "feel" of the road when starting out on slippery mornings.
3. Keep the windshield clear of sleet, fog, and frost. And be sure the windshield wiper blades, defrosters, and all lights are in good condition.
4. When streets are covered with snow or ice, use tire chains, which cut stopping distances in half, and increase traction from 4 to 7 times. Remember, drive slow on ice or snow.
5. When you stop on ice, do not jam on your brakes. That is inviting a skid. "Pump" the brakes until the car comes to a halt.
6. Keep a safe distance between your car and the one ahead. You'll have a hard time explaining why you couldn't stop, if the car ahead was able to.

### More Money To Be Deducted From Weekly Pay

The social security tax rate for persons whose work counts toward old-age and survivors insurance is scheduled to increase on the first of January, William E. LaRock, manager of the Traverse City social security office, reminded employers, employees, and self-employed people today.

This scheduled increase in tax contribution is in accordance with the 1950 amendments to the social security law, and was enacted by Congress in anticipation of future obligations of the program.

Employees in jobs covered by the law will have 2 percent instead of the present 1 1/2 percent deducted from their pay beginning with the first of January up to earnings of \$3600 a year; their employers will contribute an equal amount.

The new rates will apply to all taxable wages paid after December 31, 1953, regardless of when earned.

Having worked on the South Water Street Produce Market in Chicago as early as 1910 and then again a couple of winters in 1928-29, last week while in Chicago, I visited the South Water Street Market in order to know and learn the trend of the apple business. This particular market is on the way out. It is very limited as compared to twenty years ago. It was thought by some that there would be no apple market there twenty years from now—or perhaps a market for frozen and canned apples.

The teamster union boss said that high wages had something to do with it. There were none of the old apple houses there.

The Thomas S. Smith & Co. is one example of the present trend. Their juice and canning apples are processed near their orchards in Michigan and Illinois. Their fancy apples are stored at the Great Northern Storage and Mr. Smith has an office downtown. He sells direct to chain stores mostly.

The prospects of consigning apples to the South Water Street Market Stores were very poor.

There were no peddlers wagons putting out cheap apples. On Maxwell Street, the cheapest street in town, apples were selling for ten cents each. These were western box apples.

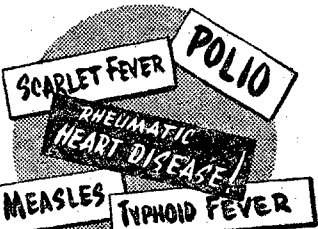


