



Telephone Co. To Lay Cable Across Atlantic

The Long Lines Department of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company this week announced plans to construct the first telephone cable system across the Atlantic Ocean.

The announcement stated that an agreement had been signed, for construction of the cable, by the American Telephone and Telegraph Company, the British Post Office, which organization provides telephone service in Great Britain and the Canadian Overseas Telecommunication Corporation, which furnishes overseas communications for Canada. It will be owned jointly by these three organizations.

To take three years to complete at a cost of \$35,000,000 this cable will provide physical telephone connection between the United States and the British Isles to supplement radio circuits now in use, and will have three times present circuit capacity.

Spanning the Atlantic with a cable system capable of carrying

telephone conversations will be the achievement of a goal visualized many years ago. Many technical and economic problems had to be solved before construction could be undertaken. Developments of the past few years in the art of telephony and the growing demand for overseas service have now made it technically and economically feasible to proceed.

"Everyone interested in sound conservation policies was shocked at the Republican-controlled Senate's refusal to confirm East, for political reasons only. No one dared argue against his superb qualifications for the job," Murphy said.

"If I am elected Senator from this District," Murphy continued, "I will fight for confirmation of men of the quality of Mr. East."

Murphy, who still farms the land he was born on, has been a member of the Antrim County Board of Supervisors for 15 years. Murphy said he not only sup-

Why Buy Christmas Seals?

Medical authorities this week issued timely reminders on why East Jordan residents should be sure to remember to buy generously of tuberculosis Christmas Seals this year.

From the standpoint of finding tuberculosis in time, before it spreads, Charlevoix county residents should know that "there are obstacles in the search for tuberculosis," said Dr. Virgil N. Slee, of Hastings, president of the Michigan Health Officers Association. Stressing the importance of buying Christmas Seals, Dr. Slee terms tuberculosis "unequaled as a problem in the field of public health."

In another statement arriving at the offices of the East Jordan News Herald, Dr. H. D. Ireland, Grand Rapids, president of the Michigan Sanatorium Association hailed Christmas Seal contributions as "spearheading the drive for more and better sanatoriums throughout Michigan . . . assisting in the enactment of more progressive legislation . . . helping in rehabilitation work . . . in medical research . . . and in health education."

Still another appeal to Charlevoix County residents was voiced by Dr. Albert Heustis, state health commissioner, who pointed out Seals, the Michigan Tuberculosis Association "conducts an intensive year-round educational campaign that is so necessary to the eventual solution of this problem of tuberculosis." The health department director said, "We're all in this fight together. Your continued support will help bring us a step nearer to our goal of stamping out tuberculosis in Michigan."

FARM PAGE . . .

We are definitely on the side of the younger generation because there are so many of them and because they have most of the votes and the purchasing power.



These young sons of Mr. and Mrs. Gerritt George Drenth watched the special meters on the refrigerator and stove measure the electricity used. The 9 cu. ft. refrigerator with 2 cu. ft. frozen chest used just 2 KWH a day for a full year. The electric stove prepared meals for a family of six; using less than 4 KWH a day.

Two farm families, one in Ellsworth and one in East Jordan have measured the amount of electricity used on each farm appliance for a full year.

A report issued by Ed Rebman Farm Agent shows the amount of electricity used and the work done by each.

The farm families cooperating were Mr. and Mrs. Gerritt George Drenth of Ellsworth and Mr. and Mrs. George Klooster of East Jordan.

Separate meters measured electricity used by the milking machine, the milk cooler, the water pump and the milkhouse water heater on each farm. In the home the meters measured the energy used on the stove, the home freezer, refrigerator and hot water heater. A barn cleaner and a five horsepower hay drying fan were also measured at Kloosters.

Pumping water used only 3 1/2 percent of the 25,000 KWH used on the two farms. Pumping water for the home, the cows, chickens and pigs, the garden, etc., used 512 KWH at Kloosters for the full year; 350 KWH at Drenths.

Milking 15 cows a day on each farm used just over one KWH a day. Cooling the milk took less than one KWH a can at Drenths; 1,995 ten-gallon cans of milk were cooled using 1,425 KWH. At Kloosters, cooling used a good deal more electricity. It took 2,738 KWH to cool 1,593 cans. This shows the importance of having the right machine for the job at hand. While Drenths' cooler is a modern immersion cooler, Kloosters' is older; is too large for the amount of milk cooled and was built for cooling milk in bottles. A machine in poor mechanical condition or of the improper size may be quite expensive to run.

The electric gutter cleaner at Kloosters used less than a KWH a day. The hay drying fan used 1,668 KWH to dry 50 tons of hay; less than the expected 50 KWH per ton as the weather was very favorable.

Hot water for the milkhouse took about four KWH per day. Hot water was used for washing utensils, for washing udders, feeding calves, chickens, pigs and other uses.

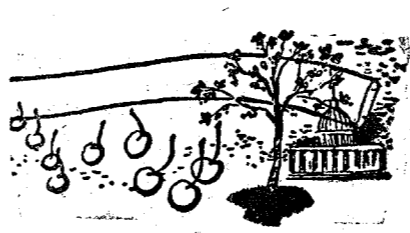
HOME BIGGEST USER
Hot water for the home was the largest user of electricity of any of the appliances measured. Thirty gallons of hot water were used each day for dishes, laundry, baths, cooking and many other uses; and 8.5 KWH were needed to heat it.

The cook stove at Drenths cooked three meals a day for a family of six, a total of 6,570 meals for the year. 1,430 KWH were used to operate. Kloosters used their stove only part time; it used 920 KWH during the year.

The two 18 Cu. Ft. freezers stored 1,000 pounds each of beef, pork and chicken, plus 150 quarts of fruits and vegetables. Use was almost the same on each farm; 568 KWH at Drenths, 572 at Kloosters.

Orchard Notes



By C. Fairman

THE MOUSE PROBLEM

Sometimes orchardists run long times without mouse injury and all at once some unexpected winter month, mice will cause serious damage. The growers that have had mouse injury are the ones that protect the fruit trees

from mice. Back in the '20s I hauled manure to put around spring planted trees and lost every one of them.

I have a neighbor across the way that I kept talking to about mice. Last winter his injury by mice on four and five year old Montmorency trees was very ex-

tensive. One does not know when they will come in.

For young Montmorency cherry trees on cultivated land, we take a shovel, clean away rubbish and bank up with earth. In case of a spot where snow may drift too deep, we tramp the snow, especially during a thaw. For young apple trees in straw mulch, our screens take care of the mice. Remove mulch from close around trunks and don't tie screens tight to tree.

To reinforce protection, add some poisoned oats just under the straw next to the screen especially where mulch is deep and where snow may pile up. For older apple trees that may have part of the old screens on, we put poisoned oats under scrap lumber. Several

kinds of poisons may be used in several different ways.
