



No Child Without A Christmas

East Jordan Auxiliary Plays Santa With Wide Open Heart mas preparations.

"No child without a Christmas." BIG PROGRAM That's been the thought behind Auxiliary's community Christmas program for many years.

And this year as legion members and friends work night and day preparing gifts for the needy the thought is the same: "No child without a Christmas."

"I believe it started during the depression. Letters were written to Santa, and the American Legion Auxiliary helped him fill the orders.

"At that time money was very scarce and none of us had too much but we tried to share and helped those who were in need. Many hours were spent sewing, making clothes for school children tieing quilts, and making complete layetts for the welfare."

GIFTS FOR WARMTH

Shoes and stockings were main items children needed in order to go to school.

A tag day on the streets each fall helped raise funds for the Auxiliary to buy shoes and stockings and in some cases underwear.

Legionaires went to farms and brought in surplus potatoes or vegetables and stored them in the basement of the A and P store, one farmer butchered a hog and gave it to them.

This food was issued to families as needed along with government surplus food which the Legion

had charge of issueing.
Some of the boys met the fish boats as they came in early in the mornings and took the undersized white fish, some of these were taken around to the needy right away. What was left was salted down and given out during the

It was during this time that the first Christmas shows were given for the school children. The Legion gave out nuts and candy to each child.

The Auxiliary had to look after the children while in the show and each member was responsible for two rows of children.

To be able to go to a show those days was a rare treat, and one that the children all looked forward to."

The program has been carried on through the years with variations. When Christmas boxes were first given out old dolls, and toys were repaired and used, but there

was never enough to go around. The idea of a new doll for every girl and a new toy for the boys was born and the Auxiliary appealed to the women of East Jordan to dress a doll. The response was spontaneous. Now each year some women look forward to dressing a doll as part of their Christ-

December 20, 1913

The Firemen bent every energy to saving the adjoining buildings and property and succeeded.

Fortunately the wind was from the lumber yards which are filled and this valuable product was untouched by the flames. The planing mill and other buildings were also saved. Burning embers were carried over half a mile. Mill A received several of the embers several fell on Main Street. Plans are already underway for the rebuilding of the burned mill and the cost of this mill probably run over \$20,000. The boilers are intact and it is thought the big engine is still usable. Plans are being made to get Mill A, which is now being operated during the day, in a working condition that will warrant a continuous run of day and night during the remainder of the winter months so the men made idle by the fire will have steady employment.

December 21, 1923

The Northern Dairy Products Co. is laying the foundation for East Jordan's new Cheese Factory on their recently purchased site on State Street opposite the Town Hall. The product of about 500 cows has been promised and milk will be received in March. President Loeb also is manager of the Loeb Farms, Charlevoix.

One of our oldest settlers Levi Metz died at his home in South Arm Township December 11th. He was one of the men who helped build the streets of East Jordan when that city was a mere village.

The funeral was conducted by Rev. John Hackett who nearly forty-three years ago united the couple in marriage.

December 22, 1933

Mrs. Catherine Walsh has received a "thank you from President Roosevelt which acknowledges the receipt of a rug. Mrs. Walsh will be 81 next June, says, 'I just got to thinking, he's working hard and I'm not doing very much so I might do something for him." The result was a hooked rug, the main motiff being a large NRA Eagle.




