Author Stuart said: "I knew just such a boy very well and I have eaten many good meals cooked by his grandma, using this very luncheon set of the story."

Using a Christmas Seal research grant, Dr. Edith M. Lincoln, of Bellevue Hospital, New York, has found that in her experience, children with lung-type tuberculosis do not develop such serious complica-tions as TB meningitis when treated with isoniazid, one of the newer TB drugs. Anyone who has ever seen or heard of a case of tuberculosis meningitis knows how much this one research project means. This type of tuberculosis once meant certain death. Making this progress against it is a good example of what is meant when you are asked to buy Christmas Seals.

A Christmas Sermonette

Luke 1:68 and on: "Blessed be the Lord, the God of Israel; for He hath visited and wrought redemption for His people, and hath raised up a horn of salvation for us . . . we . . . should serve Him without fear, in holiness and righteousness before Him all our days."

In one of the issues of the Salvation Army's "War Cry" there is an article by William F. McDermott in which he tells of a newspaper cartoon from the first World War, portraying the form of an American soldier supine in death on the field of carnage, a bayonet driven through his heart and pinning him to the ground. His body lay face upward, his arms outstretched, making the figure of a cross. His eyes were open and staring skyward, yet the artist had succeeded in making them hopeful and appealing. They seemed to shine even in death. The drawing bore the caption, "You can kill the body, but you cannot kill the soul."

The artist had captured the eternal fact that there are some things which cannot be destroyed. Because our souls have been redeemed, because our souls cannot be destroyed, because the Babe of Bethlehem wrought redemption for us, we should serve the Babe of Bethlehem without fear, in holiness and righteousness all our days!

Are YOU serving Christ in holiness and righteousness? OR, have you succumbed to the paganisms of today whiche are daring to steal Christmas label? Do you steal the Christmas label by drinking whiskey in any manner, shape or form? It is called the "Perfect Christmas Gift." What an affront to the Eternal God that a poison to body, and especially to soul, is termed the "Perfect Christmas Gift."

Dr. L. N. Field, writing in "One" Magazine, says, "Santa Claus can be made to endorse and bless any kind of scene, merchandise, or endeavor, from hot water bottles to hard liquor, from gin rummy to honky tonk, from poker chips to bras. That is certainly more than the Christ Child is willing to do."

This article, "Is there a Santa Claus?" was in response to a letter to the old New York Sun written by Virginia O'Hanlon in September, 1897. It has been called the most famous editorial article that has ever been written. It has been reprinted in every conceivable form, in every quarter of the globe. Yet 50 years after its publication there is still a tremendous demand for it in the weeks preceeding Christmas.

"Dear Editor:

I am 8 years old. Some of my little friends say there is no Santa Claus. Papa says 'If you see it in The Sun it's so.' Please tell me the truth, is there a Santa Claus?

Virginia O'Hanlon, 115 West 95th Street"

Virginia, your little friends are wrong. They have been effected by the skepticism of a skeptical age. They do not believe except they see. They think that nothing can be which is not comprehensible by their little minds. All minds, Virginia, whether they be men's or children's, are little. In this great universe of ours man is a mere insect, an ant, in his intellect, as compared with the boundless world about him, as measured by the intelligence capable of grasping the whole of truth and knowledge.

Yes, Virginia, there is a Santa Claus. He exists as certainly as love and generosity and devotion exist, and you know that they abound and give to your life its highest beauty and joy. Alas! How dreary would be the world if there were no Santa Claus! It would be as dreary as if there were no Virginias. There would be no child-like faith then, no poetry, no romance to make tolerable this existence. We should have no enjoyment, except in sense and sight. The eternal light with which childhood fills the world would be extinguished.

Not believe in Santa Claus! You might as well not believe in fairies! You might get your papa to hire men to watch in all the Chimneys on Christmas eve to catch Santa Claus, but even if they do not see Santa Claus coming down, what would that prove? Nobody sees Santa Claus, but that is no sign that there is no Santa Claus. The most real things in the world are those that neither children nor men can see. Did you ever see fairies dancing on the lawn? Of course not, but that's no proof that they are not there. Nobody can conceive or imagine all the wonders there are unseen and unseeable in the world.

You tear apart the baby's rattle and see what makes the noise inside, but there is a veil covering the unseen world which not the strongest man, nor even the united strength of all the strongest men that ever lived, could tear apart. Only faith, fancy, poetry, love, romance can push aside that curtain and view and picture the supernal beauty and glory beyond. Is it all real? Ah, Virginia, in all this world there is nothing else real and abiding.

No Santa Claus! Thank God he lives, and he lives forever. A thousand years from now, Virginia, nay, ten times ten thousand years from now, he will continue to make glad heart of childhood.

Conservation Department Sums Up 1953 Operations

Conservation in Michigan took a number of strides forward during 1953, important strides that in the end are going to mean much to the people of the state.

As populations continue to spiral higher and higher, the realization grows that natural resources are definitely limited and extremely precious to all concerned.

With driving impact, Michigan is learning that conservavation has got to mean more than hunting and fishing, more than planted trout and traditional deer seasons, more than big timber at the sawmills and state parks on a summer after-

All those things are important enough in their own way, but oth- maged and the 10-year average is er aspects of conservation are about 17000 acres of damage anlooming larger as the years progress and more and more these things demand our attention.

The matter of water, for exmple, claimed the interest of the ample, claimed the interest of the conservation department's geological survey division with increased emphasis as a large number of municipal and industrial water supply studies were processed. The City of Detroit, searching for a pure water supply, suggested it might have to build an aqueduct 45 miles or more in length to import water from Lake Huron. Other cities were giving studied attention to water supply and pollution problems.

Operators searching for petroleum were drilling deeper during the year, indicating shallow well operations in Michigan may have passed their peak.

Continuing its program of blocking in forests, game areas, parks and wildlife projects, state land buyers purchased nearly 11 .-000 acres of land for public use. Tax reversions brought another 1300 acres under state ownership.

But lands in public domain did not increase through department purchase during the year, 13,000 acres and 3,800 platted lots were sold at auction land that did not fit into state projects or that was otherwise unsable by the public.



in the right direction, but none of them provides the basic stepping stone from which we may begin climbing toward peace. The 'right thing' is still beyond our mental reach. But we must take steps to find the answers, through endless research for a formula for peace.

"The solution may not be found in government or among men in high position. Intelligence is not a monopoly of position or title. The common people can think, too. It is a typically American characteristic to produce at each crises in our affairs a man from the people who arises out of comparative obscurity to such great stature that he becomes a symbol of America . . . America is rich in such men. One such man will arise and inspire a world wide movement for peace if we call upon him loudly enough.

"The foundation of our structure is education, not in UNESCO pamphlets but in international enlightenment on a very high plane. A beginning must be undertaken in the U.S., Canada, Great Britain or elsewhere at a place where the atmosphere is conducive to advanced thought and encourgaement will be given. A few men of recognized stature and intellect, sincere in the cause of peace and who have never held political office, should gather there and point

"Such a place would become, in effect, an international university of research for peace. Every accomplishment toward world peace and self-determination for the past three thousand years should be exhumed, studied and analyzed.



Thermometers Can Be Dangerous, Mothers Warned

"It would probably be better or a mother not to have a thermometer unless she understands fluctuations of 'normal' temperature."

So states Dr. Ernest H. Watson, associate professor of pediatrics and communicable diseases in the University of Michigan Medical School, in outlining some helpful common sense information on the use of the clinical thermometer in the home.

First of all, variations of a degree from the 'normal' of 98.6 are regularly found in healthy people.

As a matter of fact, "There is tendency for the body temperature to be low (below 98 degrees) on awaking in the morning and a tendency to be higher (99 degrees) in the later afternoon and evening," Dr. Watson says.

Keeping this in mind the mother may save herself undue anxie-

"If mother takes the child's emperature only when he seems induly warm, or has some sign of illness, the thermometer becomes a valuable aid to the phyician," the doctor advises

Specifically, Dr. Watson enumerates three "musts" for users of the home clinical thermometer:


1. Always check the thermoneter reading the last thing before taking the temperature. The frantic discovery of a high reading may result from having held the thermometer under the hot water tap.

2. Grasp the thermometer firmly when shaking it.

3. Use a rectal thermometer on young or very sick children, Often we dislike a person who to eliminate the possibility of bitis first to say the very thing we ing or swallowing.




