

Michigan State College reached that conclusion after an extensive study of population changes in Michigan from 1940 to 1950. Back in 1940 rural birth rates

were higher than in the urban popllation, and the increasing migration of people from farm to city was blviee to city was believed to be the thing that would tend to level off the population. But that belief was proved unfounded. By 1950 the birth rate in cities was substantially greater than

for rural areas. And in 1940, people in the lower economic strata of the rural population had the most children. But by 1950, those in the high income abote were the most prolific
