January

Funeral Services were held for Joseph Cihak. Thirty-five joined the new East Jordan Businessmen's Association. An East Jordan Industrial Development Corporation was being formed. Romaine Plumbing and Heating opened on Main Street. Services were held for Mrs. Joseph Bugai. Supervisors closed the court house on Saturdays. Judge Charles L. Brown filed for nomination. Judy Malpass was named head of the local chapter, National Honor Society. Lyle Wangerman, of Boyne City, was named chairman of the county road commission. The Northwest Michigan Industrial Development Council held its second annual meeting at the American Legion home. Funeral services were held for Agnes Porter. Marian Danforth won the county cherry pie baking contest. Ernest Kopkau cleaned city streets with home made snow removal machine.

February

The American Legion held its annual membership dinner. Services were held commemorating the 30th anniversary of Pather Malinowski's ordination. Ellsworth Lancers won 12 straight games. Barney Milstein was named a county delegate to the state Republican convention. Don Whiteford signed with the Chicago Cubs. East Jordan Iron Works announced a 5c per hour increase to all employees. Ernest Pinney was killed in a plane crash in Japan. Judge Charles Brown took the election 4 to 1 over his opponents. Harold Henderson died in an auto accident. East Jordan farmers raised hob over foreign beef being sold by some grocers. Funeral Services were held for Eva Mae Baker. Arthur K. Rouse, Boyne City, was nominated by Republicans for a position on the state board of agriculture and became the first man in Charlevoix county ever to appear on a state ballot.

March

Funeral services were held for Mrs. Lillian Kile and Leonard Swafford. Johnny Knight, Charlevoix Mayor, died. Fire swept the T. F. French farm buildings. East Jordan Red Devils grabbed the Northern Michigan district "C" basketball title. The Rebec-Sweet Post celebrated the American Legion's 34th year. East Jordan Red Devils won Regional Basketball tournament. Taylor, Bussler file for Mayor. Leo Somerville quit politics. Liquor question was placed on ballot. Ken Shepard won state FFA award. Businessmen started a labor survey. Sally Swafford was named valedictorian and Sally Nesman, Salutatorian at the high school. East Jordan Businessmen favored the Iron Works expansion program.

April

Military rites were conducted for Ernest Pinney. East Jordan made plans to entertain 1,000 Boy Scouts. The East Jordan Cooperative held annual meeting. Floyd D. Rice began a life sentence for murder. Chris Taylor was elected mayor. Services were held for Dr. W. H. Parks; also Patricia Love. Lutheran Church held dedication ceremony. Jordan Valley Cooperative Creamery held annual meeting. H. A. Dahlquist purchased the old East Jordan Lumber Company store from Leo Somerville and Wade Healey.

May

Fred Vogel ended 30 years of business when Tom Galmore took over the Standard Service station. Keith Evans was named "most valuable player." Funeral services were held for Mrs. Frank Kenny who died in an auto accident near Ellsworth. More than 500 students from northern Michigan paraded in a band festival. The City Council approved Alberta Nowland as city clerk and Fred Vogel as treasurer. East Jordan welcomed 1,000 Boy Scouts. Annual Poppy Sale started. Edward Wood was killed by electrical shock while working on the Deer Lake road. Funeral services were held for Mrs. L. G. Bunker. American Legion announced Memorial day program.

June

The county road commission announced \$100,000 improvement program for Deer Lake road. The high school held graduation services. Dedication ceremony was held when new lights were turned on at the city athletic field. Dahlquist Stores, Inc. announced they would open their new store here July 1st.

July

Cherry growers were asking for pickers to save their crops. The Masonic Lodge leased Shedina's Furniture Store for a meeting place. The Charlevoix County Herald owned by Mr. and Mrs. Paul Lisk was sold to Mr. and Mrs. Marshall Styles, owners of the East Jordan News. The newspapers were combined and named the East Jordan News-Herald. Funeral Services were held for Walter Moore of South Arm Township.

August

Funeral services were held for Vern Jones who drowned in Monroe Creek. Ralph and Millie Hitts, of Traverse City, became new owners of East Jordan Cleaners. Funeral services were held for Mrs. Ray Russell. Ladies of the American Legion Auxiliary burned the mortgage on their kitchen. The East Jordan Industrial Development corporation signed a contract with a manufacturing plant to construct a new factory building here. The city council let contract to construct a sewage disposal plant.

September

Rep. Victor Knox attended an East Jordan luncheon. The Charlevoix County Fair opened. Police announced they were enforcing the 2-hour parking law. Funeral services were held for Mrs. Christine Deryn who died as the result of an auto accident. Funeral services were held for Mrs. Syneva Omland. The city council passed a curfew ordinance. J. Douglas Cook was named Public Administrator for Charlevoix County.

Hale Brake, state treasurer, announced he would run for Governor. Charlevoix County Farm Bureau held its annual meeting. Sears Marine began laying pipe across the lake for the sewage disposal plant. Claud Pearsall was called back as President of the County fair board.

East Jordan American Legion Auxiliary carried out its annual Christmas program of helping the needy. Funeral services were held for Bill Hennings. Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Rogers and Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Wilkins celebrated wedding anniversaries. George Whaling was hospitalized after a logging accident.

The city council in special session Tuesday night unanimously rejected a request from William Healey, Jr., to purchase a lot owned by him for \$2,100 plus an additional \$200 for damages.

Healey made the \$2300 request in his legal action against the city which involves a sewage disposal lift station adjacent to Healey's vacant lot.

Pays \$300 Fine

A fine of \$300 and a year's probation was handed down in Grand Rapids federal court this week in the case of Kenneth Slough, of East Jordan, who was in court for violating the wage and hours act.

Slough pleaded guilty and made repayment to employees, the judge noted in handed out sentence.

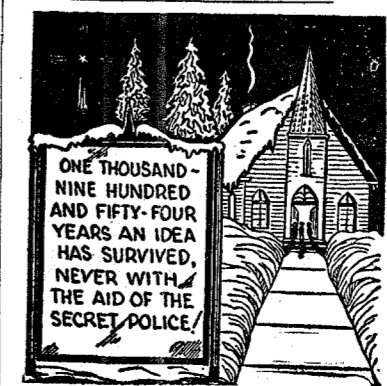
Do Not Drink And Drive, Simmons Warns

Chief Harry Simmons today called upon all motorists to make a special effort between Christmas and New Years to cooperate with the holiday traffic safety program aimed at reducing drunk driving accidents.

"It is only natural that our department should make a special effort to apprehend drunk drivers during a time of the year when there are a great many more celebrations than at any other time," the Chief said. "Our department has made every effort to warn persons who drive after drinking that to become drunk and then drive is considered the most heinous traffic offense because of the complete innocence of so many motorists and pedestrians who are run down by drunk drivers. We have used posters, table tents and radio messages. And, the newspapers have given us splendid cooperation—all to warn motorists that Drunk Drivers Go To Jail' and that drunk drivers lose their licenses," the Chief added.

Today's traffic has become so rapid and so complex that a point as been reached where making special arrangements to get to and from a holiday celebration is an important traffic safety plan.

In conclusion Chief Harry Simmons said, "Remember, excessive drinking is the thing that gets you into a traffic jam faster than your loved reactions and poorer driving ability can get you out. It takes less alcohol than you think to give you that feeling of exhilaration which results in your driving too fast and taking too many chances."

Population On Rapid Increase

Michigan's population shows no signs of leveling off. In fact, there may be as many as a million and a half more people in the Wolverine State by 1960.

Michigan State College reached that conclusion after an extensive study of population changes in Michigan from 1940 to 1950.

Back in 1940 rural birth rates were higher than in the urban population, and the increasing migration of people from farm to city was believed to be the thing that would tend to level off the population. But that belief was proved unfounded. By 1950 the birth rate in cities was substantially greater than for rural areas.

And in 1940, people in the lower economic strata of the rural population had the most children. But by 1950, those in the high income brackets were the most prolific.

Other population changes in the decade termed the most significant: A great movement of people from cities to the suburbs—far greater in number than people moving from rural areas to the cities. That's despite the fact that reduced from more than three Michigan's farm population was and a half million to about 856,000 during the past 30 years. Increases in the rural parts of the state numbered 263,000 from 1940 to 1950—nearly 15 percent of the rural population. At the same time increases in the urban parts numbered 66,000—about 2 percent of the 1940 urban population.

The vast increase in the rural population has led some experts to predict that by the year 2000 the southern portion of Michigan will be made up of cities and suburbs and only a sprinkling of farms.

Industrial expansion in the 40's attracted people from other states

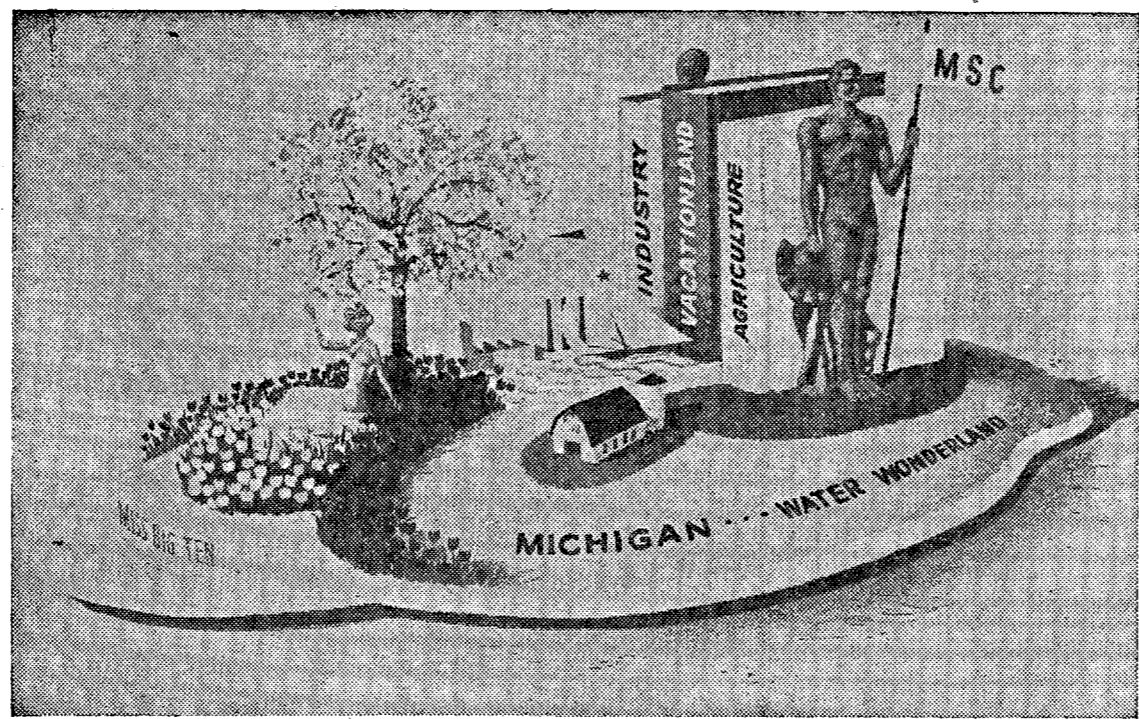

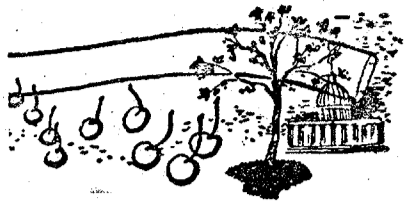

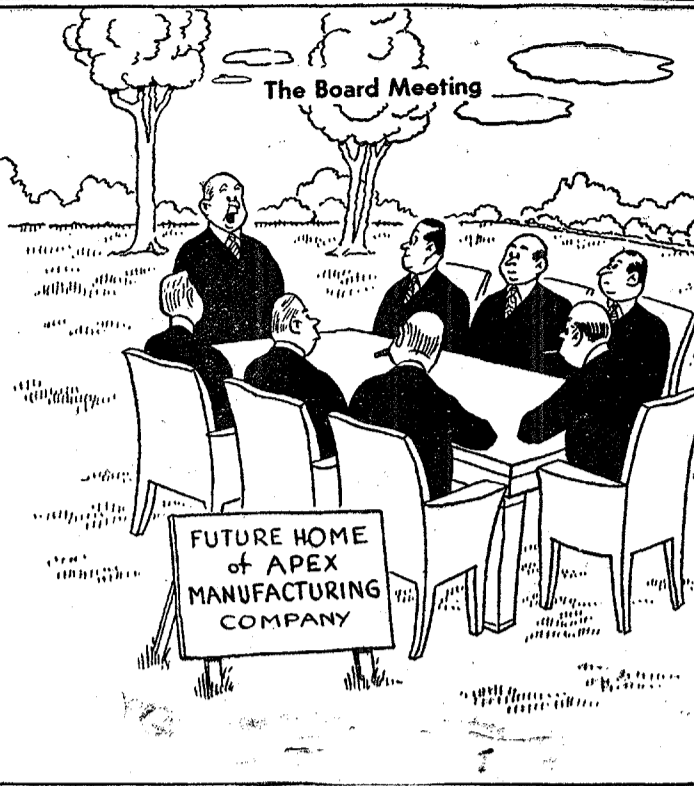

The Serviceman's Letter



G. I. NEWS

Hi Fellas: Sorry I washed out on you men last week. Seemed as though everything in the book was thrown at me last week. But I must report that things are looking up again now. Any storm can be weathered with the proper amount of perseverance.

I want to take this opportunity to thank you servicemen who sent Christmas Greetings to the Service Club and other members of this community through me. It is good to know that our efforts have not been wasted.

Fred Holland, Dick Misner and Murray Nelson have probably been wondering just what happened to their letters. The fact is that I was saving them for inclusion in the letter for the Christmas issue of this paper, the copy for which was to be in the office on Saturday December 19th. So I'll include them herewith. Fred wrote—"Just a note to wish you and all the people in EJ a Merry Christmas. We are out at sea now and will be until the 13th when we get into Yokosuka for the holidays. Our departure date from Japan is still January 17th and our stateside arrival the middle of March. We are still hoping to go back by way of South Africa.

"It seems we have been hitting Sasebo and Yokosuka just at the wrong time so consequently I have not seen any of the men from home. We were in Inchon Harbor for one day but I was only on the get a chance to look anybody up. beach for about 2 hours so didn't. Sure is good to get the paper and so fast too. But I'm wondering what happened to the write-ups they used to have on the football games, etc.

"I got some good news the other day when the ratings came back and I found I had made RD2. It means about \$25 a month increase and I sure can use it. Fred Holland, USS Cogswell, DD 651, Group I "O" Div. c-o FPO, San Francisco, Calif."

Dick Misner wrote from Denver, Colorado on December 5th. "Just a line to let you know I have a new address. I am attached to the Air Reserve Records Center which is just getting organized here in Denver."

"Only seven more months to go and I'll be done with the service for good. This is the best assignment I've had yet. Denver is a beautiful place. The work is still with International Business Machines and there's only three other Airmen beside myself. All the rest are civilians. One hundred and two of them. We've got the job of teaching them.

"I hope to visit EJ after my hitch is up. Thanks again for the paper and a Merry Christmas to you all. T-Sgt Richard D. Misner, 2740 Madison St. APO No. 1, Denver, Colorado."

Murray Nelson wrote from Bad Neuheim, Germany on December 6th. "Am inclosing a clipping that I like and other than that have no news except to say hello and to tell you I receive the paper quite regularly. We are as well here as can be expected and have no snow yet. We have a lot of field work and are kept busy. Many thanks

The clipping Murray sent was headed "29 More WOJGs in Europe Win Promotion to W2" and read as follows: HEIDELBERG, Nov. 30, Twenty-nine warrant officers, junior grade, in USAREUR have been promoted to the temporary rank of Chief Warrant Officer (W2), USAREUR reported today. The New chiefs with date of rank from Nov. 27, are: . . . Murray R. Nelson, 22d Inf Regt, Ervin Prevo left El Paso, Texas on November 28th and his new address is now with the 96th Field Maint Sqn, Altus AFB, Altus, Oklahoma.

The town has been swarming with uniforms for the past week and I suppose it will continue for several days yet as many of the leaves extend over the new years. After dropping out of sight just about a year ago Don Olson just as suddenly appeared again in EJ last week. He calmly walked into his fathers home just in time for a big supper, Don, who has spent the past year knocking around the Pacific Islands with the Air Force, is home on a 30-day leave. We hope that when he leaves this time that he will let us know where he lights.

Joe Chanda finally made it home and I ran into him down in Baders Gas Station one night last week. He let me in on the secret that his new wife was a WAC who hog-tied him over in Japan and then let him loose to pursue his lonely way home to the States alone. He is expecting her to reach the states any day now. Joe is due back at Fort Sheridan on December 28th.

Joe Hammond, George Rogers, Hersh Young, Ivan Nemecek, Don Whiteford, Earl Bennett and Max Sommerville all made it home for Christmas. Joe, instead of being on the high seas as I thought, has been cooling his heels down in Norfolk for awhile. George still has his good deal down in Millledgeville, Georgia. Hersh was down in Cuba but has finally landed the transfer he wanted and after four weeks of schooling down in Newport will be leaving for a teaching job in California. Ivan reached home on December 9th and is due back at the same Base on the 31st. Ivan is now A-1c. Don Whiteford made the grade down at Sampson AFB and is now assigned to permanent personnel there. Christmas dinner to be served US military personnel generally will follow this menu: Crabmeat cocktail with sauce and lemon wedges; roast turkey with dressing and whipped white potatoes; laETAO giblet gravy; cranberry sauce; whipped white potatoes; glazed sweet potatoes; scalloped corn; buttered green beans; assorted relishes; hot rolls; butter; mince-meat pie; fruit cake; ice cream; assorted fruits; mixed nuts; assorted candy; coffee."

Boy, that's more than us poor civilians had.

Pvt Russell Hofman has arrived in Korea and is located about five miles North of the 38th Parallel somewhere along the line. His address is: Tk Co, 38th Inf Regt, APO 248, c-o PM, San Francisco, California.

Dean McPherson has a small change of address. He is now with the 7280 Maint Gp Box 540, APO 30 c-o PM, New York, N. Y. He is now located about 14 miles outside of Casablanca.

Larry Huckle is probably on his way overseas by now. He was assigned his holding address last week in Fort Lewis. It is Pvt Robert L. Huckle, Prov Co SE 1687, APO 613, c-o PM, San Francisco, Calif.

Here's that letter from Pee Wee that had that menu inclosed. Got separated in my papers somehow. "I guess it is about time I dropped you a few lines and let you know I'm still OK. Not much has happened since I wrote last but I did make Cpl in October. It is OK, I can use the money. There isn't any place to spend it over here but I can send it home.

"I am a baker now. I have been baking since October. It is a good job but I don't think there is a good job in the Army. I don't know when I am coming home but I sure would like to get out of this place. I am going on R & R again next month and I shouldn't have too much time left after I get back off this one. I hope.

"Well Jake, I've got to go and get to work now so I will close for this time. Merry Christmas to all you guys. Cpl Lyle R. Peck, Co C, 578th Engr Bn, 40th Inf Div, APO 6, c-o PM San Francisco, Calif."

Fred Burbank wrote on Dec. 5th from Naples, Italy. "Rather quiet from Naples, Italy. "Rather quiet here right now, so thought I would drop a line over two. Arrived here in the Med the 15th of November. From the moment we dropped the hook in Gib until this present moment, I have had time for just three things; work, eat and sleep. I have never seen a more messed up mess in all of my life. Every time we turn around we are doing something wrong, or have done something wrong, so we have spent most of our time here correcting our mistakes.

"To date we have hit only two ports; Golfe Jaun, France and Naples, Italy. We are at present in Naples or the vicinity I should say. From the looks of the anchorage they have assigned us, we are closer to Greece than Italy. I don't know if it is fear or just plain dislike. Quite a bit of our time has been spent on operations. Hither

and yon. So far about all we have been is excess gear, primarily designed to waste Navy fuel. We rendezvous with a few ships, zig-zag a little and run off to another rendezvous.

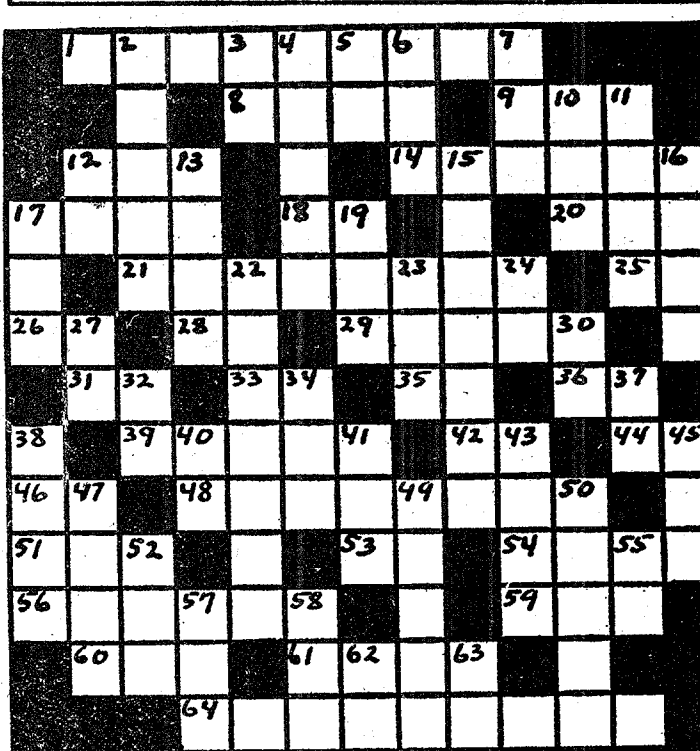
"If the schedules are correct, we shall be in Naples for Christmas. About the only thing we are missing is snow. Cold we have plenty of. The temperature is about the same here as in Michigan, but it is rather damp cold. After Shore Patrol last night, I am quite sure that I have two pieces of ice in my legs in the place of bone. But then we never had it so good. Fred F. Burbank, YN 3, "C" Div, USS Diamond Head (AE 19), c-o FPO, New York N. Y."

Floyd Dufore didn't make it up here for deer hunting but he writes from El Toro. "Just a few lines to say Hello again. I arrived back in the States the 30th of October. Am awful sorry I didn't get up to EJ this time but instead I went South and got married. I'm back out in California now. Should be here for quite a while now.
