State Police told the News-Herald that Primrose was driving the automobile that smashed head-on into another killing Mrs. Martha Ann Dean, 70, of Brown City, and seriously injuring Mrs. Beatrice Graham, 44, of East Jordan.

OVER THE BACK FENCE

We got to wondering what happened back in 1933, 20 years ago, so we looked it up.

The NRA eagle was born, the CWA, CCC and other combination of letters symbolizing the force of the war on depression came about. We had the first national banking holiday in the history of our country. The United States went off the gold standard, and the American dollar was discounted in foreign markets for the first time. The 18th amendment was repealed. Russia was recognized by our own government.

Former President Coolidge died. Zangara fired five shots at Franklin Roosevelt in Miami, missing him but killing Mayor Cermak, of Chicago. Michigan was the first state to vote repeal of the dry amendment. President Roosevelt ordered prison and fines for violators of NRA. Mary Pickford filed divorce suit against Douglas Fairbanks. Wiley Post flew around the world in 7 days, 18 hours, and 49 minutes. World's Fair opened in Chicago.

The RFC loaned fifty million dollars to China so she could buy our wheat and cotton from us. Ring Lardner, American humorist and playwright died.

Franklin D. Roosevelt and John Nance Garner became president and vice-president of United States.

Here in East Jordan the Temple Theater was remodeled and opened. W. P. Porter received two threatening letters from a youth who wanted \$150, "or else." The case was taken up by federal agents.

Round steak was selling for 12c per pound. Fireman Matt Swafford was killed when he took hold of a 110-volt wire while fighting fire in the basement of the C. W. Hipp store.

Eleven citizens sponsored a quarter page ad asking residents to vote "dry." Milstein was elected mayor by 10 votes over Watson. Fifteen cents per hour was set as the wage for emergency fire fighting by the conservation department.

The Muskegon Oil Company drilled for oil on the Adam Skrocki location in section 15—Jordan Township. In Circuit Court at Charlevoix Laverne C. Rouse brought suit for libel against Clark Haire, editor and publisher of the Boyne Citizen.

Pathe News, Inc., filmed the smelt run and "as it is the regular order of business for someone to fall in the river every night, Teddy Kotowich played this heroic role."

The East Jordan branch of the Northern Auto Company was gutted by fire.

These were some front page news stories in 1933—20 years ago.

Along about this time the government boys were talking about a Poll tax or Head tax. Each person over 21 was supposed to stop in at the local city hall and pay their \$2.00 head tax.

Right now we don't know what become of this federal order or law, but it seems a large number of people never paid the tax on their head.

We heard stories about collectors being driven off property with guns and wide-spread refusals to pay the \$2.00.

All the above happened under severe depression conditions. Although the country voted for the Democrats, East Jordan and Charlevoix county voted Republican.

And if the fair board's report is accurate the county staged one of its most successful fairs with a terrific number of cars and people at the fairgrounds.

This is not difficult to believe, because other successful financial events took place during the depression. For instance, Parker Motor Freight was born and thrived when businessmen were going broke.

So 1933 was a topsy turvy year when men rose to great heights or fell to the wayside, according to their sights and ambitions.

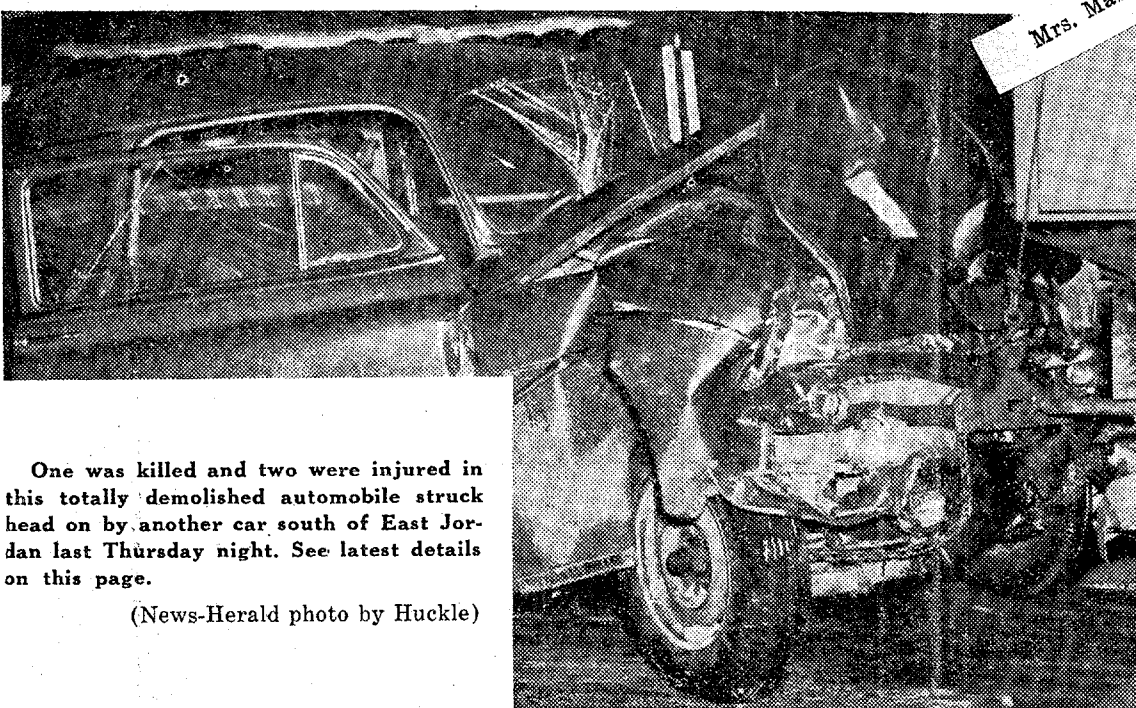
Believe It Or Not Would Like To Say Believe It Or Not

May Lease Fairgrounds For East Jordan Football Games

Three history-making moves took place at a board meeting of the Charlevoix County Agricultural Society here Thursday.

(1) The board talked seriously about hiring a woman promotional secretary.

(2) Veteran board member Judge Charles Murphy resigned and walked out in a huff because of his opposition to running a fair on Sunday.

(3) The board agreed to discuss the turning over of the fairgrounds to the East Jordan board of education for football games in the fall.

Turning big guns behind plans for the 65th annual Charlevoix County Fair, the board talked to Mrs. Doris Huckle regarding her ability to aid in promoting the 1954 fair.

Declining to act as secretary, Mrs. Huckle, local business woman discussed the possibility of becoming the fair's promotional secretary. Her experience dates back to her work at the Michigan State Fair in Detroit.

President Claud Pearsall was named as the man to attend the meeting of shows in Detroit and to book entertainment for the fair.

THE BOARD, in making tentative plans for the fair, hopes to schedule hot rod races, horse pulling contests, an all-county talent show and possibly present an actual wedding before the grand stand the last night.

Dates for the fair this year are September 4th, 5th, and 6th. Saturday, Sunday and Monday. Monday is labor day.

Including Sunday as a fair date was objected to at previous meetings by Judge Murphy who has been associated with local fairs for nearly half a century.

When the board agreed to hold the event on Saturday, Sunday and Monday, Murphy arose, announced his resignation and left the meeting room.

Plans are under discussion for a complete revamping of the fair regarding usual entertainment and general promotion. If Mrs. Huckle is hired she will become the fair's first woman secretary.

At a recent board meeting county farm agent Ed Rebnan, declined to continue as secretary. The group elected Richard Schroeder, local teacher, but Thursday night Schroeder told the board that pressure of school activities would not permit him to carry out the work.

CHRIS TAYLOR and Dan Bennett were named by President Pearsall to meet with the East Jordan Board of Education to talk further with the school regarding a request to use the fairgrounds for football games.

Publicity Chairman Barney Milstein said serving will be between 5 and 7:30 p.m. Guy Watson is in charge of ticket sales and reports that tickets may be purchased from any Rotary Club member.

Plenty of Reading Library Loans 12,000 Books To 8,000 Readers

Nearly 9,000 visitors used the East Jordan Public library during 1953 a summary shows. They used more than 12,000 books and paid fines totaling \$74.63.

Although the library's fiscal year ends June 30th, the report for the full year of 1953 shows that 8,607 people took out 12,435 books.

It was also announced that the library received a \$500 gift check from the State Bank of East Jordan.

Other gifts were: Ten books from Mrs. C. Bradshaw and 2 books and 13 pocketbook westerns from Mrs. R. Carney.

New books for adults include "Stephanie" by Karmel—a handi-cap story with a hospital as a setting, but not depressing. Stephanie is a Polish refugee who had suffered much and not only helps to change the mental and physical conditions of her associates, but in doing so cures herself.

Another light romance book for adults and younger readers is "My Sky Is Blue" by Erdman, the story of a young school teacher in a New Mexico town.

New books on the juvenile shelf are "Snow For Christmas," an any time of the year story; "Johnny Fremont, Western Pathfinder" by Tousey, a pioneer book and; "Walt Disney's Mickey Mouse Birthday Book," a collection of Mickey Mouse stories with many colored pictures.

City Council Disposes With Disposal Trouble

Has the city council eliminated its legal headache caused by construction plans for the city's sewage disposal system?

City Attorney Guy C. Conkle says the council can breathe easier and rest assured that \$193,000 is forthcoming from bonding companies with which to pay for construction.

The attorney this week announced sale and delivery of the city's general obligation bonds to Detroit and Grand Rapids firms.

Originally the bonds were under a non-litigation clause and the money was not forthcoming because the council was defending itself against two circuit court cases involving location of the disposal plant and one lift station.

Circuit court action was brought against the city last October by the Jordan River Sportsmen's Club which sought an injunction

preventing the city locating the disposal plant in sportsmen's park.

AT THE SAME time another court action was brought by William Healey, Jr., who wanted to prevent the city from locating a sewage lift station in a public street adjacent to a vacant lot which he owns.

Circuit Judge Charles L. Brown heard the cases at Charlevoix denying both requests.

Healey's motion to extend his case to the state supreme court was set aside at the request of the city attorney.

But Healey later requested that the city purchase his vacant lot for \$2,100 plus \$200 damages and for this he would withdraw further attempts to carry the case to the higher court.

THE COUNCIL, however, voted formally against paying Healey, saying they had once offered him \$1,000 for the lot, which he refused.

All court action against present construction of the system has been eliminated and with construction money available the city is continuing the work.

During the legal action the construction was underway most of the time.

From the beginning the city was under court order brought by the state waterways commission to stop dumping raw sewage into the Jordan River and the south arm of Lake Charlevoix.

As of this week the council is clear of all legal trouble in connection with constructing the system.

Budget Cuts Essential

The Administration must intensify its economy program, regardless of attacks on it by spenders and "do-gooders."

The Administration did a good job in cutting more than \$6,000,000,000 from the budget it inherited from the previous regime for the current fiscal year.

That represents commendable progress, even tho budget balance is not yet assured. If Congress agrees to the Administration's proposals, it means that the government is curing itself of "the ingrained habit of extravagance."

This is all to the good. A balanced budget means a sound dollar and an end to the threat of inflation. The Administration must continue to strive for further reductions in spending, regardless of the demands of pressure groups.

We are now testing 14 varieties of sweet cherries, 14 varieties of plums and plums, the same with peaches and apples and 6 of pears. While we are not 100% commercial, we are enough so as to make expenses. And we like to give the general public the benefit of our experiments free of charge.

Our late ripening red plum, the "Elephant Heart" grown and sold by Stark Bros. only, struck us as being the best tasting and nicest plum of all. This plum is slow to come into bearing, and bears the heaviest every other year. It is the Japanese type and needs one other

plum variety along with it. For those who want a tree or two of plums in their yard or garden, they should try "Elephant Heart." It is juicy and solid red clear through.

The "Bassington" cherry and most other fruit trees can be found at quite a few different nurseries.

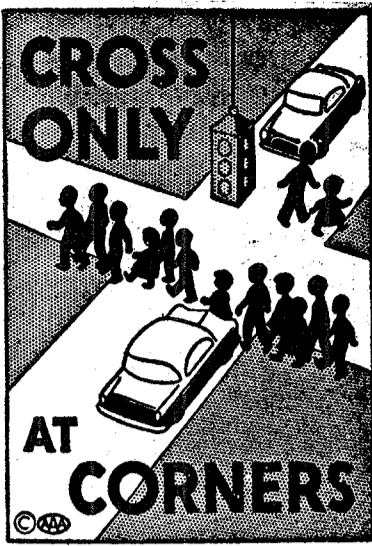

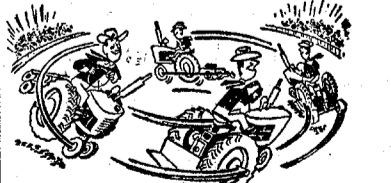

Poor Sawing Hurts Value Of Lumber

Poor sawing can spoil lumber for home use or cut its sale value cautions William G. Stump, forest products extension specialist at Michigan State College. It also adds to the waste.

Well-manufactured lumber for farm or commercial use should be of uniform thickness, width and length, and square-edged and trimmed, reminds Stump.

Some objections to native lumber for farm or commercial use come from poor processing or use of species not suited to the job, the MSC wood specialist notes. Varying and inadequate thicknesses greatly reduce commercial market appeal, he explains. Allowances should be made for shrinkage in drying; lumber should be sawn thicker than desired when used.

Lumber grades usually are disregarded in sawing for home use—when the primary consideration is to saw out the material needed. But it's different with lumber to be sold on commercial markets.

For commercial sales, lumber should be sawn to produce the biggest quantity of higher-grade material. Poor sawing results in ex-

Stump offers these suggestions in selecting a mill to custom cut your logs; Look at the slab pile to see if good lumber is wasted. Look at the finished lumber to see if it is properly manufactured. Try to pick a mill man who can saw for grades and who knows how to saw for industrial markets.



January Chicks Need More Care

January-hatched chicks are beat only as money-makers by those hatched earlier. But they require special management.

Ed Rebman, Charlevoix county agricultural agent, passes along these tips on raising chicks in winter months:

A stationary brooder house is an important part of the equipment. It should be large enough to give a square foot of floor space per chick up to 12 weeks and 2 1/2 square feet of space per pullet up to time of laying. A house 20 x 20 feet will accommodate 400 chicks, if a farmer buys straight-run chicks the 12-week-old pullets would have more than 2 square feet when cockerels are marketed.

Minimum requirements for the brooder house are: Feeding space—an inch per chick the first two weeks; 2 inches from 2 to 6 weeks, and 3 inches, after 7 weeks. Waterers—two one-gallon fountains per 100 chicks up to 3 weeks and two 3-gallon fountains from then on. Feed and water will be saved if feeders and waterers are raised as birds grow so they do not need to bend down.

Thrown-out mash makes expensive litter. Feeders should only be filled half full.

Wet spots on the floor are ideal for coccidiosis germs; moisture and heat develop the infection. Waterers should be on wire stands and kept from dripping.

State May Increase Size Of Legal Trout Taken

A recent suggested increase in the size limit of trout has the backing of scientific research, the conservation department notes.

Surveys and studies made by the department's institute for fisheries research during the last several years indicate that brook and to some extent brown trout reach the present legal size limit of seven inches before they spawn for the first time.

If the present law was changed so an angler could not take a trout smaller than 8-10 inches, young trout might then have chance to spawn before becoming legal game for the fisherman.

For rainbows, a change in the size limit would not matter so much; few rainbows reach maturity before 10 inches in length anyway, and mortality by accidental hooking of under-sized rainbows is so high that size limits play little part in their protection.

The suggested change in size limits came during a recent conservation commission meeting when a number of possible protective regulations were suggested.

The possible changes will be discussed at a public hearing at Higgins Lake training school

30 p.m. All interested groups are expected to send delegates to that meeting.

Other suggested changes include a ban against so-called "hardware" fishing lures in certain areas, a regulation against all-night fishing for trout, and a decrease in the creel limit.

Another possible change, suggested by institute officials, was a possible later general opening of the trout season, perhaps moving it to the second Saturday in May.

At present, the season opens the last Saturday in April. Institute studies show that from April until July, trout grow rapidly and recover condition quickly after the lean months of winter.

"Fly-fishing only" regulations have not been included in any discussion of proposed changes, and commissioners emphasize that this sort of regulation is not on the horizon. At the same time, they point out that proposed changes do not include a ban on the use of artificial baits for fall rainbow fishing.

More information, slides, charts and other material on size limits, seasons and other fish factors will be available for discussion at the public hearing on the 22nd, institute officials say.

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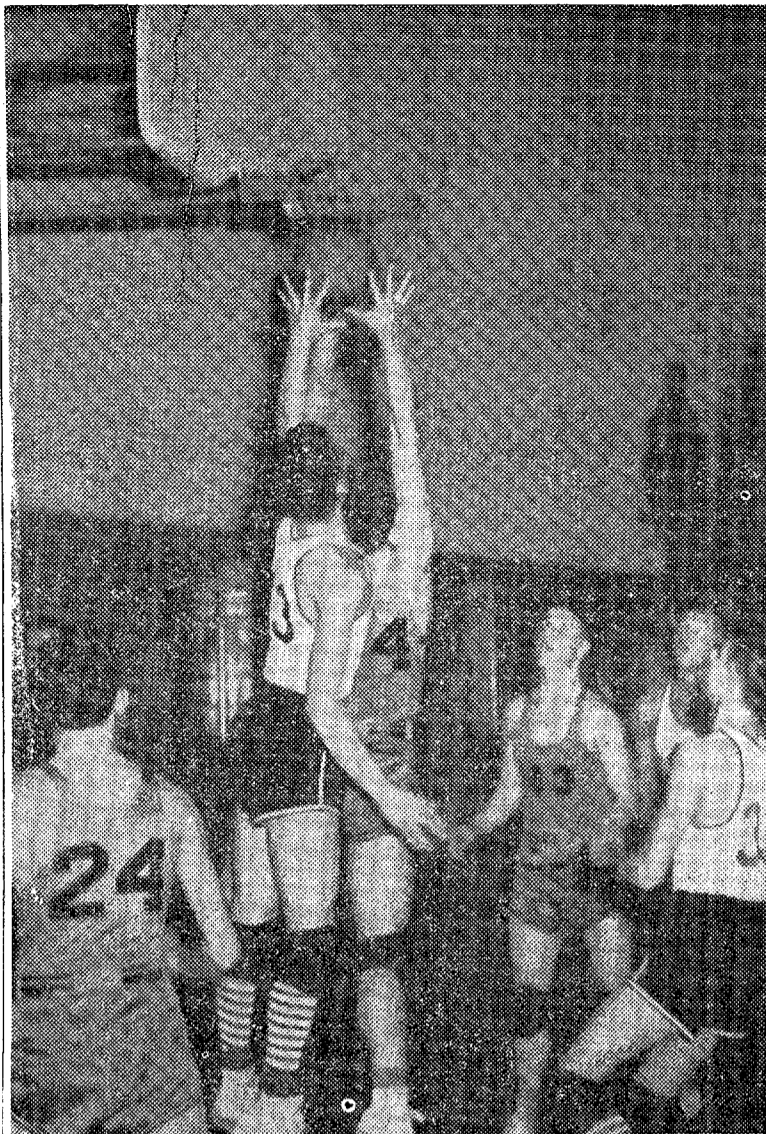
