Council Votes To Pay \$8000 On \$16000 Structure

The East Jordan City Council has completed arrangements with the State Waterways Commission to construct a \$16,000 city dock on the shore of Lake Charlevoix adjacent to Veteran's Memorial park.

The council voted to spend \$8,000 of the \$16,000 required following a meeting with the State Waterways Commission at Traverse City. The state agency pays half the cost.

In special meeting here the council decided to pay for the new dock in following manner: \$4,000 will be paid in cash with the other \$4,000 being paid in two installments—\$2,000 in 1955 and \$2,000 in 1956.

When the city council and Waterways commission agreed upon the method of financing, the council went into action immediately approving a motion by Alderman Rebec that the dock be constructed.

The Eveline Orchards of East Jordan reports a good crop of apples this year. Official reports from California, Oregon and Washington state that the crop of sweet cherries has been cut by frosts. Some certain varieties of sweets will be light; Main crop varieties of sweets look good as of today, here. According to the Eastern Fruit Grower, a magazine published in the east, apple juices should be fair for many years to come. The juices of 1952 and 1953 and all future juices are the result of many non-profitable orchards going out, and from not packing inferior apples and poor varieties. This applies to other sections also.

Advertising and promotional work has helped apples.

Where we reported no Montmorency Cherries, we now expect to harvest a light crop. The crop of Montmorency varies from tree to tree, all the way from fair to none at all.

Many sections have front damage to apples and peaches during the spring. This is a good fruit section as apples, pears and peaches and sweet cherries seldom, if ever, are affected by spring frosts.

Cure Hay In Barns, By Silage

Rains that discourage northern Michigan farmers in field curing of hay could be blessings in disguise, suggest Ed Rebman, Charlevoix county agricultural agent. They may encourage more use of two better ways of preserving hay,-grass silage and barn curing.

Both grass silage and barncured hay save more of the dry matter and protein than field curing does, agrees Dennis L. Clanahan, Michigan State College farm cropsman for northern Michigan. He also cites a three-year study of the U.S. Department of Agriculture at Beltsville, Md., to support his view.

The dry matter loss from field to feed amounts to 15 per cent for silage, 16 per cent for barn curing and 28 percent for field curing, the survey showed. The protein loss is 16 per cent for silage, 23 percent for barn-cured hay and 36 per cent in field curing.

Barn curing involves forced air; if field-chopped hay goes into the barn with leaves intact and high feed value, it must be mow-dried for safe storage: hav that is chopped must be drier than long hay. Hay dried in the field loses leaves and feed value.

Grass silage making and barn curing both go hand-inhand with use of a field chopper, advises Clanahan; the other costs are barn drying equipment in the barn in one case, a vertical or horizontal silo in the other.



He writes: "Well, I've been in Uncle Sam's Army 13 days now and so far I don't like too well. According to the Cadre down here, we can't do anything right. But I guess it's their job to toughen us up for worse things we'd go through if we ever had to go to war.

'Camp Chaffee is in the NW corner of Arkansas in the Ozarks not too far from Oklahoma. There is a sizeable town about 9 miles from the post. It is Fort Smith, Arkansas with a population of about 50,000 people. The Arkansas sun beats down pretty hot, every day around 100 degrees or more. They say down here it is cool now. When it gets hot it gets to be 120 degrees in the shade.

'I would like to know if there is anyone down here from EJ. I sure would like to see someone from the old home town. It certainly will be nice to receive the News-Herald. It'll be just like gotting a letter from home.

'Well, Jake, it's 8 p.m. now and we have a long day tomorrow. We get up at 4 a.m. each morning but soon we'll be able to sleep until 5 a.m.

'We have the best company down here for Church attendance of about 6 companies which is about 1500 men. We had 100% attendance, 220 men, last Sunday.




Girl's Camp To Be Held
