## **Study North** Roads In **New Survey**

Northern Michigan and Charlevoix county highway needs will come under a survey to be conducted by the State Highway

Department. The State legislative highway study committee has authorized Commissioner Charles Ziegler to let a contract for a 15-month

study of road needs in the state. The study will be conducted by the Automotvie Safety Founda-

tion of Washington. Sen. Haskell L. Nichols of Jackson, committee chairman and Rep. Emil R. Peltz, of Rogers City, vice-chairman, were authorized to sign the contract for

the committee. Rep. Peltz discussed northern Michigan highway needs at a recent north-state highway meeting at Jordan Inn.

At that time county highway officials explained what is being done to prepare a complete northern Michigan road map showing all good blacktop county roads in the area.

It is expected that the 15month survey and the northern Michigan project will be included in the over-all picture of

road needs. Preliminary reports are hoped for in time to present to the Legislature next January.



VOLUNTEER HELP, materials and money have rebuilt the foot bridge across Jordan River at sportsman's park.

The 125 foot span is the third constructed for local fishermen and visitors. The other two were washed out due to age and continued high river water. The new span is the first in two years. The present bridge was constructed voluntarily by Walt Hickox, Elmer Green and other sportsmen. Financial contributions were collected at the Duck Inn with 18 persons offering aid. To date they are: Harry Simmons, Andy Anderson, Harold Miller, Vern Whiteford, Red Sheri-

dan, Keith Annear, Chris Taylor, Harriet Malpass, Doris Huckle, Elmer Green, Walt Hickock, John Porter, Bruce Malpass, Joe Bugai, Ed Portz, Frank Atkinson, Les Schultz and Ray Barrick. The group needs about \$15 more to meet bills in addition to the \$74.90 spent for materials.

Those wishing to contribute to repair and development work at the park may leave their contribution at the Duck Inn.

Walt Hickox obtained two deer for the park, a buck and a doe. They are housed in a pen built by the City of East Jordan. Additional work has included the repainting of the Sportsmen's Club sign with businessmen

paying for the paint. Birds in the park and on the river, which have drawn numerous visitors to the city for many years are increasing. There now are between 35 and 40 swan in the river; 40 wild canadian geese and 200

mallards. Also two pair of the very rare wood ducks. The sportsmen's club have been feeding the birds through the winter months. Additional funds will be needed next winter to feed the birds and deer.

The sportsmen were offered a pair of peacocks but there are no quarters for them here. High water has caused damage for several years, but present levels are about 18 inches lower than last year. The water is still about two feet above normal.

All work at the park is voluntary and the sportsmen need additional labor, materials and funds with which to continue the improvement work.

## **Boat Owners** That License

Members of the State Waterway Commission are warning boat owners that immediate enforcement of the boat license law goes into effect today.

With nearly 80% of owners of boats 16 ft. or more in length having failed to pay the annual state license tax, this all out enforcement drive is expected to cause a rush on Secretary of State branch offices throughout the state.

The present enforcement program will be expanded to the entire state during the month of July. State and local police and agents of the Secretary of State's office will start checking all marine areas and issue warning notices or violation tickets for unlicensed boats in the same manner as they are given to those owners whose cars are without proper plates. The violation is a misdemeanor calling for appearance of the boat owner in court. Violators can be fined up to \$100.00.

The yearly licenses are issued in marine areas by branch offices of the Secretary of State and some marine supply dealers. The revenue goes to the State Waterways Commission to be used solely for the building and improvement of docks, harbors and other navigational facilities. Moneys received from last year's collections will be expended on new construction in East Jordan Grand Haven, Pentwater, Frankfort, Harbor Springs, Cheboygan East Tawas, Port Austin, Detroit and at Black River Harbor,

Could your family use 1,400 loaves of bread with your next gro-

Do you need 117 cotton shirts, or 91 cotton house dresses? Will your refrigerator or deep freeze hold a six-months' supply of pork, and enough butter to last your family three months?

Before you decide that these questions are just too absurd to answer, let it be explained that your Government now owns outright or else has under loan sufficient wheat, cotton and butter to provide every family in the United States with those quantities, and enough corn to raise the pigs for your half-year's supply of pork and pork products.

Here is the Government's dilemma: Commodity Credit Corporation has about \$6.5 billion invested in farm price support operations. It costs CCC more than \$700,000 a day just to store these commo-

And more storage space will be needed in the near future.

#### SUPPORTS CENTERED ON SIX COMMODITIES

Nine-tenths of this vast sum committed to price support operations is tied up in six basic commodities—wheat, cotton, corn, rice tobacco and peanuts.

The basic commodities, however, account for only 23 percent of the Nation's total farm income. An additional 56 percent of farmers' receipts comes from commodities which are not under price supports. The present price support program encourages some farmers to raise wheat and corn for storage, rather than as feed for the pro-

duction of meat, milk and eggs. Administration recommendations, now before the Congress, are designed to correct these defects in the present program. Under these proposals, more emphasis would be placed upon production for dietary wants and requirements. Likewise, they are designed to help move more farm products into wider areas both at home and abroad, reduce the staggering surpluses, and encourage sound land use pat-

## **Orchard** Notes



By C. Fairman

At the present time every fruit grower is doing more or less spray-

There are a great many fungicides and insecticides to choose from. The fungus diseases are mostly shot hole fungus on cherries, apple scab on apples and peach scab and brown rot on any stone fruits. Some of the spray materials are injurious to foliage. Some are injurious to man. Some spray materials are safeners to render harsh materials less harmful.

The most of our best materials are a bit high priced, although not as high priced according to results obtained and health to mankind. Copper—sulphur—mercury have been harmful to foliage for us here at home. Arsenate of lead has been harmful to fruit and foliage and is bad for man's health. Especially where one is doing alot of spray-

Parathion is very dangerous and in some cases has caused instant death. We are waiting to see more about malathion which kills all insects and is not harmful to man. Methoxychlor, trade name -Marlate—a close relative of DDT kills all of the common insects as curculio, codling moth and cherry fruit fly, aphids, leaf hoppers etc.

## 26 Year Cherry Fruit Fly Fight Successful

Value of a 26year-old fight to eradicate cherry fruit fly, which menaces Michigan's 31/2 million bearing commercial cherry trees, is showing up, according to G. S. McIntyre, director of the Michigan Department of Agriculture.

Some 20 seasonal inspectors, most of them high school agricultural teachers, during the next few weeks will check commercial plantations and backyard orchards in all parts of the state for signs of cherry fruit fly. Within recent years finds have been few in commercial orchards, although infestation has been found among cherry trees in urban areas where frequently spraying is neglected.

There are two species of cherry fruit flies in Michigan, according to C. A. Boyer, chief of the Bureau of Plant Industry of the Michigan Department of Agriculture. One is the white-banded fly and the other is the dark

#### New Ways To Fight Those Garden Pests

Backyard gardeners have a couple of friends to help battle plant diseases and insects. They are "all purpose" dust and "all purpose" spray, reports Ed Rebman, Charlevoix county agricultural agent.

Extension specialists in horticulture, plant pathology and entomology at Michigan State College point out that the new mixtures contain insecticide, miticide and fungicide in varying combinations. Methoxychlor, malathion, ferbam and rotenone are some of the chemicals used.

Although operators of large creages may find it more to their advantage to treat individually for certain troubles, the "all-purpose" sprays or dusts solve the problems of the small

Spraying, perhaps for fruits, or dusting, in some cases handier for gardens, should be repeated every week or two up until two weeks before harvesting the sperialists suggest. Rotenone is a good insect killer for use on beans and leafy greens where a poisonous residue might be bad for humans eating the vegeta-

bodied fly. They are about the size of a small house fly, and appear late in May or in June derending on weather and latitude.

They first feed on the leaves and developing fruit. After mating the female cherry fruit fly lays small white eggs beneath the skin of ripening fruit by making an almost invisible puncture in the skin of the cherry. These eggs hatch into small white maggots about a quarter inch long inside the cherry.

Infested fruits are a serious hazard to the Michigan cherry canning industry, the nation's

Inspectors take samples which are tested in laboratories established by the Department. Samples from southwestern Michigan trees are processed at a laboratory at Benton Harbor. Samples from other cherry regions are tested in a mobile laboratory which is operated during cherry

Because of this yearly inspection, infestations of cherry fruit fly are diminishing. Where infestations are found, fruit can not be sold, but must be picked and buried under a layer of hydrated lime two feet under the earth. Spray programs in commercial orchards have helped cherry growers to win the fight against the pest.





## Wheat Marketing Quotas

Charlevoix County wheat farmers will be issued wheat marketing cards during the latter part of June according to LeRoy Hardy, chairman of the Charlevoix County ASC Committee.

The official wheat marketing card, MQ-76, pictured here, will be needed by every wheat farmer when marketing his 1954 crop. A marketing card will be issued to every wheat producer who shares in the wheat crop on any farm where the wheat acreage is not more than 15 acres and also to producers on farms where the wheat acreage is more than 15 acres and where the acreage allotment has not been

Final measurement work on 1954 wheat acreage has now been completed and each wheat farmer who has exceeded his wheat allotment has been notified of the acreage that he would have to dispose of as green manure, cover crop, hay or pasture in order to avoid marketing quota penalties. Mr. Hardy, advises any wheat farmer who is not sure of where he stands as far as marketing quotas are concerned on his farm to get in touch with the Charlevoix ASC Office located in the Bank Bldg., Boyne City, Michigan.

Farmers who share in the wheat crop on any farm where the wheat acreage is more than 15 acres and is in excess of the farm allotment will not receive a marketing card until the penalty on the wheat produced on the excess acres has been satisfied. Mr. Hardy stated that the penalty for excess wheat is \$1.12 per bushel and can be satisfied in one of the following three ways: (1) Payment of the penalty in cash at the ASC Office,

(2) Storage of the excess wheat either in a warehouse or on the farm, (3) Delivery of the excess wheat to the Secretary of Agriculture through the local ASC Office.

Storage or delivery of excess wheat must be accomplished within 60 days after the harvest

alty can be satisfied only thru cash payment.

Farmers who store excess wheat will be permitted to underplant their 1955 wheat allotment and will then be authorized to remove all or part of their 1954 sell it on the open market.

All elevators, feed dealers excess wheat from storage and milling companies and other wheat buyers are cooperating in the control of wheat marketing. beginning July 1. Commercial wheat buyers are required to maintain certain records and account for all wheat purchased during the marketing year July 1, 1954 through June 30, 1955. Instruction meetings for wheat buyers will be held to review the marketing quota regulations and the forms to be used.

Hardy cautions individual farmers who may buy wheat for feed or seed from other farmers that the farmer who is selling the wheat must show a marketing
