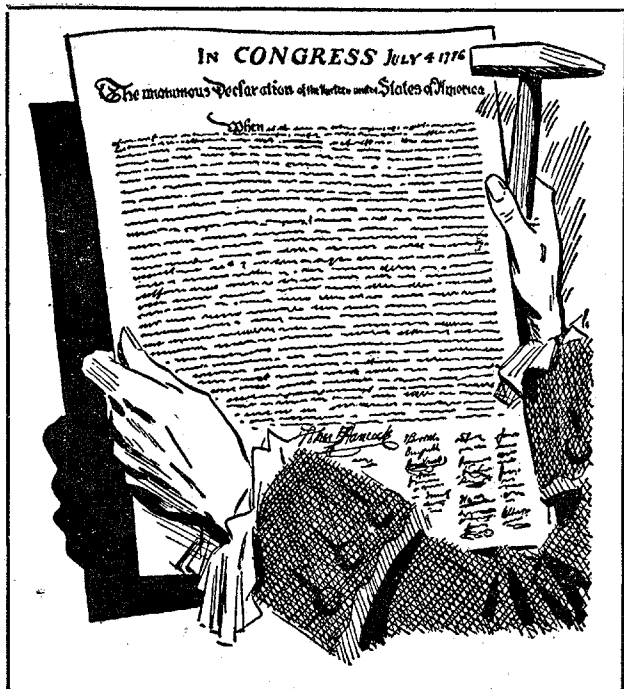

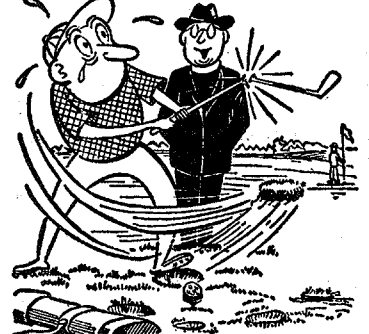

JUNE 27, 1924

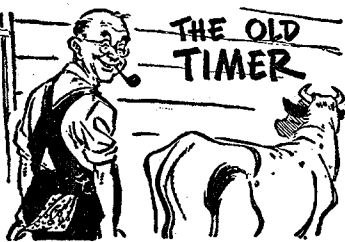

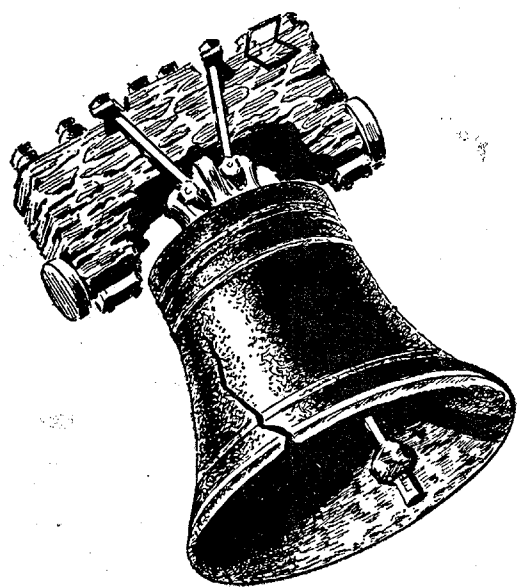

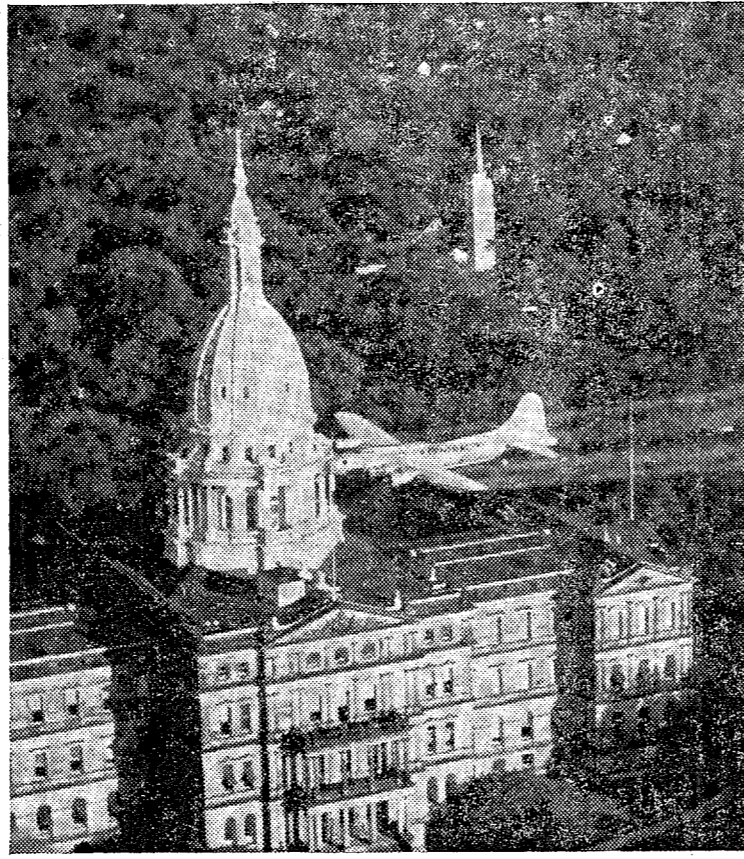

In the text accompanying the recipes, Mrs. Watts compliments the culinary skills of Michigan farm women, saying that the women of Northern Michigan know how to make dozens of cherry dishes and all are wonderful. She also boasts the Michigan festival as one of the nation's great fiestas.

Counties Get \$128,000 By Land Sales

Strong competitive bidding sparked recent public auctions of state-owned lands in six lower peninsula counties, lands workers say, with more than \$128,000 being returned to county treasuries through the sales.

Auctions were conducted by conservations department lands workers in Ann Arbor, Pontiac, Port Huron and Detroit.

All lands offered in the Pontiac and Detroit sales were purchased and only a few scattered parcels remained in state ownership when the Ann Arbor and Port Huron sales ended.

When state-owned lands are sold, money paid by purchasers goes into the treasury of the county in which the land is located.

As a result of the sales, Wayne county's treasury will receive about \$85,000, the Oakland county treasury will receive about \$15,000 and Macomb county will get about \$13,000. St. Clair county will receive \$11,000, Monroe will get \$2,200 and Washtenaw county will receive about \$1,900.

In nearly all cases, land offered in the Wayne and Oakland county sales went across the board for prices well above the appraised evaluation.

In recent years, land workers have noted an increasingly high interest in lands offered for sale in metropolitan areas.

Crop School On July 7th

Farmers from Charlevoix county who want the latest information on varieties, culture and fertilizing of forage and field crops can get it on Wednesday, July 7 at Michigan State.

The joint Farm Crops and Soil Science Field Day will be a busy place, notes Ed Reberman, Charlevoix county agricultural agent, with hundreds of farmers expected to pay a visit to the college farms.

Plan Ahead For Wheat

Wheat harvest time is insect trouble-starting time for Michigan growers unless they plan ahead and do something about it, cautions Ed Reberman, Charlevoix county agricultural agent.

Plans should be made now to store wheat in cool, clean bins at 12 to 14 per cent moisture and to head off the sawtooth grain beetles, brand bugs and meal worms with pre-storage sprays.

Ray Janes, Michigan State college entomologist, notes that these insects do not come from the fields—unless they are in dirty combines going out. Most of the linger in old grain.

Sweep the grain bin walls and floors, clean the ceilings and spray the inside of bins about three weeks before putting in grain. If you want a handy mixture, put a pound of DDT or methoxychlor—the 50 per cent wettable powder in each case—in each 2½ gallons of water for spraying.

Feed bins in the storage area also should be cleaned and treated, reminds Janes, and new wheat should never be stored on top of old.

New wheat, oat, barley, alfalfa, clover and other crop varieties will be seen along the wagon tours and emphasis will be placed also on corn — hybrids, heavy populations, chemical weeding, and nitrogen sidedressing.

Hi Fellas:

The resort season is with us. The streets are swarming with sunglasses, sport shirts and shorts. The fish are still biting good and good catches are reported regularly.

The following excerpts are from a letter written by Ken Vrondran to his mother shortly after he reached his new duty base in Japan. "I am about 30 miles from Tokyo right now but should ship out within the next couple of days. I go to Okinawa from here, which is a little Island south of here. I will be over here for 18 months now because they pulled my orders. I was supposed to go to Korea, which would only have been 12 months. But that is way it goes.

"It is a lot better over here than it was back in the States. We don't have to pull any KP for they have the Japanese girls doing that. And the Japanese men pull the guard duty and keep our barracks clean. All that I have done since I've been here is sleep and eat. It is the rainy season over here now and it rains about every five minutes.

"I will be glad when I get to my permanent station so that I can settle down for awhile. I hate this living out of a bag. I packed that bag the 14th of May and still haven't got it unpacked. We haven't been paid since the first of May. My new address is: Pvt Kenneth Vrondran, 930 Engr Avn Bn, APO 239, c-o PM, San Francisco, California."

Sounds like Ken is having the movin' blues. Cheer up old boy, it might get worse before it gets better.

Leonard McRoberts checks in from Japan, also. "Well, I thought maybe I had best drop you a line as I haven't written to you for about 6 months."

"I have changed jobs since the last time I did write. I am one of a four man alert crew now and like my work. We work 24 hours on and 24 hours off.

"It's June and still colder than all get out here in Japan. We still have to have a coat on out on the Flight Line.

"I'm getting the paper every week and want to thank the people of EJ for sending it. I think all of us boys look forward to it every week. See you all in about 11 months. A-3c Leonard G. McRoberts, Hq Sqd, 49th ABG, APO 919, c-o PM, San Francisco, Calif."

"Warren Frank, Jr., was in town this last week. Warren is home for a 14 day leave after which he will be on his way to Japan.

Bob Shaw has been moved. His new address is: Pvt Charles R. Shaw, A Btry, 2nd AAA Bn, 1st Armd Div, Fort Hood, Texas. I told you last week about Gerry Olson having to stay on in the service. His address is: Sgt Gerald Olson, Co D, 314 Sig Bn (Const), Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri.

Fred Burbank was due to be home this last Sunday. Haven't seen him as yet.

Bud Kopkau wrote from Sampson AFB just before he was due to leave the states for Texas. "Well, I got the paper today and saw that everyone was writing so thought I had better write to you again. It's been about a month since I wrote the last time."

"I am the last one on Sampson from E. J. and I will be leaving here the end of this week. Then I'll be on my way to Texas too. Guess I'll be down by Don Saganek and I will be down there for about 90 to 150 days and then I guess I'll be home. They are having a big weekend here this weekend but we'll just be here for one day of it. We leave here Friday morning about 5:00. This completes our 52 days of training. We had KP all day Tues and

boy that is a job. But it will be our last one, I hope.

"Don't send my paper here any more but send it to — A-3c Ernest F. Kopkau, 3320 Tec Tug Wg, Amarillo AFB, Texas. Say Hello to everyone up there for me and I will close this now and go eat. I can't miss that as they sure feed good down here. For the rest of it I like it very much. Bud."

Here's a letter from Roger Benson over in Yong Chon, Korea. "I guess it's about time I let you know I'm still over here and that I'm receiving the paper OK. I want to thank everyone who makes it possible. Sure is nice to be able to read about things that happen back in the old home town and also to keep up with the other fellows from EJ who are in the Armed Services.

"Bob Saxton pulled five days TDY last week and got up here to see me. As you know he's down in Pusan which is only about a 3 1/2 hour train ride from here. Sure was nice to see someone from the home town and exchange bits of news.

"Mike Brennan and I have been keeping close tab on each other. I hope to get up to see him or get him down here before I leave. I guess Harry Webster is up there someplace near Mike.

"Well, my boy (not girl, as you had in the paper) is two months old today. Won't be long and I will be home to see him.

"I'm still in the same place and I've got the same job; that's operations officer for the Ammunition Depot. I still like the work and dislike Korea. All we're doing now is shipping a little ammo for training use by the Korean Army and getting a good inventory for the starting of formal property accountability on 1 September. I'm also accountable property officer for the Depot. I hope to get out of here before they can stick me for anything.

"Guess that's about it for this time. Say Hello to everyone for me and thanks again for the paper. Lt. Roger R. Benson, 52nd Ord Ammo Co, APO 234, c-o PM, San Francisco, California."

Sorry about that slip-up on the boy, Roger. I must have been seeing or hearing double. Harry Saxton showed me some of the pictures Bob took when he was up to see you. That's quite some dump you are working at.

Hersh Young sent a clipping home from his paper out in Port Hueneme, California about the flood they had there that damaged their house trailer. I don't have space this week to include the whole clipping but will quote the following. "HIGH TIDE FLOODS PORT HUENEME BEACHFRONT AREA. A sea-wall was undermined at Port Hueneme last night by night tide ground swells, causing a beachfront area of homes, trailer court and citrus packing houses to be flooded but damage was held to a minimum and a sand dike is being constructed to prevent a recurrence. A 10 o'clock last night the water slowly started seeping around the seawall, according to City Engineer Walter Moranda, and gradually topped a portion of the wall allowing water up to three feet deep to form in the residential area. A lake one-half mile long was created along the beach area behind a ridge of sand built up by a recent dredging operation northwest of Port Heuneme. C. W. Welch, operator of the trailer park, said that women and children residing in the trailers were taken across the street to a hotel and inn for the remainder of the night. One trailer was floated off its blocks and some were invaded by water."

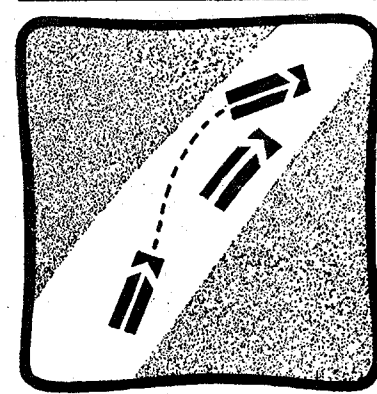
