To Miss Wagbo, who learned to speak Norwegian as a child, the opportunity to be one of the students visitors to Norway has a special significance.

Participating in the student project that is sponsored by St. Olaf College, Northfield, Minn., Miss Wagbo will have ample opportunity to take planned trips to important spots of interest in Norway along with summer school activities designed to promote better understanding and friendship between this country and Norway.

As a teacher of homemaking for the past six years in Midland city schools, Miss Wagbo will especially be interested in the famous "Oslo breakfast" by which school children of the city have added some four and one half inches to their height, according to recent reports of internation-

New Fire Truck Will: Raise Dept. Efficiency

There will be two fire trucks going to local fires from now on, Fire Chief Sherman Thomas announced Wednesday. With the purchase of a new truck the city now is able to better fight all types of fires quickly and more efficiently. All members of the department turned out for a training session with the new truck and equipment, Monday night.

The men tried out the new pumping equipment near the lake. It's a high pressure fog unit which uses much less water but reduces heat and flames faster than the older equipment.

Chief Thomas said the unit uses very little water only 450 gallons and at the same time does a better job than the older equipment.

Its operating pressure for both straight stream and fog is 850

The new truck was nurchased by the city council several weeks ago. Four members of the fire department brought it up to East Jordan from Lansing last Thurs-

Thomas said the new equipment aids greatly in fighting out of town fires since less water is needed and there is faster ability to quench a

The fog penatrates into the fire and puts out the blaze with less water and less water dam-

Attending a two day firefighter training school course on the high-pressure fog apparatus at John Bean Division plant in Lansing were: Chief Thomas, Roy Gokee, Marion Jackson and Tom Breakey.

The truck consists of a used

streets. "Figures show some 80 percent of all traffic accidents are due to someone's carelessness. Experience shows that when the public becomes alarmed at this costly toll in lives and property and decides to do something about it, the total of deaths and injuries can be reduced below pre-







Counties Get \$128,000 By **Land Sales**

Strong competitive bidding sparked recent public auctions of state-owned lands in six lower peninsula counties, lands workers say, with more than \$128,-000 being returned to county creasuries through the sales.

Auctions were conducted by onservations department lands vorkers in Ann Arbor, Pontiac, Port Huron and Detroit. All lands offered in the Pon-

tiac and Detroit sales were purchased and only a few scattered parcels remained in state ownership when the Ann Arbor and Port Huron sales ended.

When state-owned lands are sold, money paid by purchasers goes into the treasury of the county in which the land is loca-

As a result of the sales, Wayne county's treasury will receive about \$85,000, the Oakland county treasury will receive about \$15,-000 and Macomb county will get about \$13,000. St. Clair county will receive \$11,000, Monroe will get \$2,200 and Washtenaw county will receive about \$1,900.

In nearly all cases, land offered in the Wayne and Oakland county sales went across the board for prices well above the appraised evaluation.

In recent years, land workers have noted an increasingly high interest in lands offered for sale in metropolitan areas.

Crop School On July 7th

Farmers from Charlevoix county who want the latest information on varieties, culture and fertilizing of forage and field crops can get it on Wednesday, July 7 at Michigan State.

The joint Farm Crops and Soil Science Field Day will be a busy place, notes Ed Rebman, Charlevoix county agricultural agent, with hundreds of farmers expected to pay a visit to the college farms.

Plan Ahead For Wheat

Wheat harvest time is insect trouble-starting time for Michigan growers unless they plan anead and do something about it, cautions Ed Rebman, Charlevoix county agricultural agent.

Plans should be made now to store wheat in cool, clean bins at 12 to 14 per cent moisture and to head off the sawtooth grain beetles, brand bugs and meal worms with pre-storage sprays.

Ray Janes, Michigan State college entomologist, notes that thehse insects do not come from the fields-unless they are in dirty combines going out. Most of the linger in old grain.

Sweep the grain bin walls and floors, clean the ceilings and spray the inside of bins about three weeks before putting in grain. If you want a handy mixture, put a pound of DDT or methoxyclor-the 50 per cent wettable powder in each case—in each 21/2 gallons of water for

Feed bins in the storage area also should be cleaned and treated, reminds Janes, and new wheat should never be stored on top of old.


