Scholarships For Farm Youth

Charlevoix county banks each year cooperate with Michigan agriculture to help young farm folks obtain courses in farming at Michigan State college.

They are among the 250 Michigan banks taking part in the educational program for young farmers.

Although some banks have had disappointing experiences with the plan, they are still willing to go along with the idea.

They provide \$100 scholarships to young people who want to further their education in a 8 weeks course at MSC.

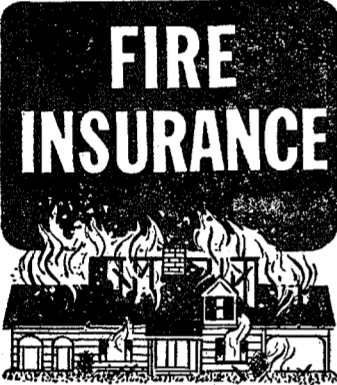
In some cases the young folks have not finished their course or left the farm shortly after the course was finished.

The main plan of the scholarships is to aid the youth for better farm living and no person should take advantage of it if they do not intend to make good use of the education.

In Charlevoix county these short courses are made possible by the State Bank of East Jordan and Boyne City, the Charlevoix County State Bank and the Charlevoix State Savings Bank.

Pastor Dale Larsen To Be Installed, Lutheran Church



Dale M. Larson, 26, graduate of the Lutheran Theological Seminary, of St. Paul, Minnesota, will be installed as the first resident minister of the East Jordan Evangelical Lutheran Church Sunday, July 18th. Rev. Larson will serve both East Jordan and Elk Rapids churches. It is his first ministerial post after being ordained at his home town church Trinity Lutheran of Thief River Falls, Minnesota, June 6th.

The Lutheran Church was organized in East Jordan April 7, 1905 with 16 charter members. First services were held in homes around the city until the church was constructed in 1911.

In April last year a 36x40 church annex was completed. The annex includes a kitchen, dining room, minister's study, two rest rooms, storage space and furnace room.

Pastor for the past several years has been Phillip Fretheim of Suttons Bay.

Indian Pageant At Harbor Springs July 23rd & 24th

Forest green setting of the annual Ottawa Indian Pageant at Harbor Springs this year will be dominated by a colorful 30-foot hand-carved totem pole.

The pole, which is usually located in front of the Michigan Indian Foundation's Chief Blackbird Museum, will be featured in an episode of the pageant, as its history is enacted by the Ottawas.

More than 100 are included in the cast of this year's pageant. From Arizona, native Hopi Indians will conduct traditional tribal rites as their songs and dances unfold the story of northern Michigan's Ottawa Indians based on Chief Blackbird's historical record.

Musical numbers featuring songs from "Rose Marie" will be sung by a Community Chorus accompanied by the Harbor Springs High School band.

Performances are scheduled for Friday and Saturday evenings, July 23 and 24, at 8:30 p.m. in the 7,000-seat Ottawa Indian Stadium at Harbor Springs.

Frank Sweet and Pete Sweet of East Jordan, brothers of the groom, were ushers.

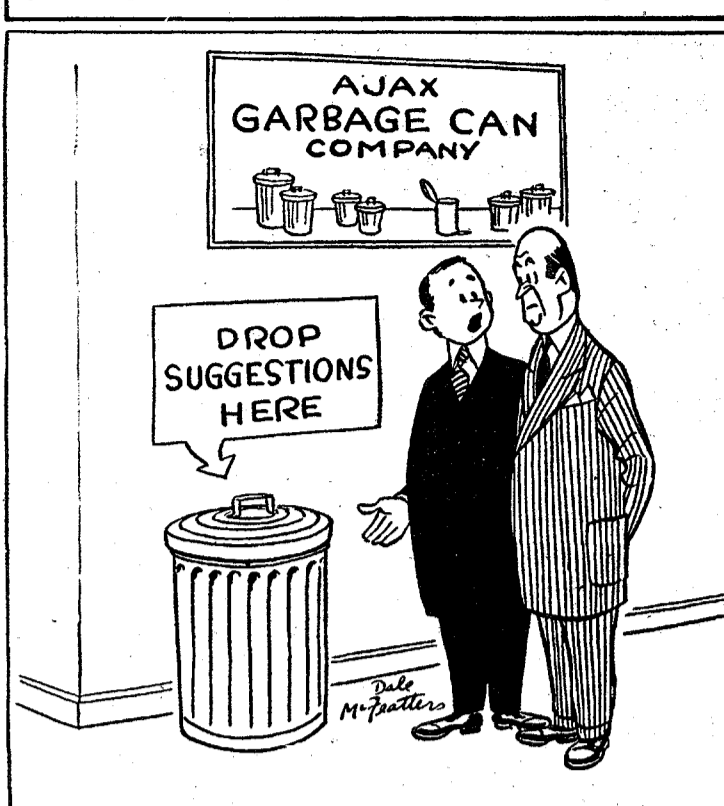

Last night we had Ship's Talent Show by Oslo students and ship's crew. A ballet group dressed in life-jackets with their little up-chuck boxes gave the cutest finale. They celebrated all night because it did not get dark. Out on deck at 1:00 a.m. we could see for miles. Today water is very choppy and the weather rainy. A total eclipse has been arranged for 1:30. Everyone by now has acquired the leaning tower of Pisa stance and seem to take the North Sea in their stride. Children all over the boat raise the usual hob. A capricious wave just threw a pail of water in the port hole and drenched passengers nearby.

3:00 practice for Oslo SS for greeting Bergen—"Ja vi elsker dette land" ("Yes we love this land") and Star Spangled Banner.

At Orientation we had the president of the Life Boat Association address the group. America—U. S. A.—Norway, have government supported and organized associations. We were told of the work done. Through the work of these associations an average of 22 lives per day are saved on the Norway coast and several thousand are helped. The association was organized by a Norwegian who missed his booking on the Titanic, and when he heard about the sinking he used his engineering skill in organizing the Life Boat Association, and since that time all icebergs are charted and radioed to all vessels crossing the sea. Planes help in this work.

prow of the boat all alone. He is clad in heavy clothes but I wonder how he keeps warm. It looks so cold and lonely up there. Rugged soul!

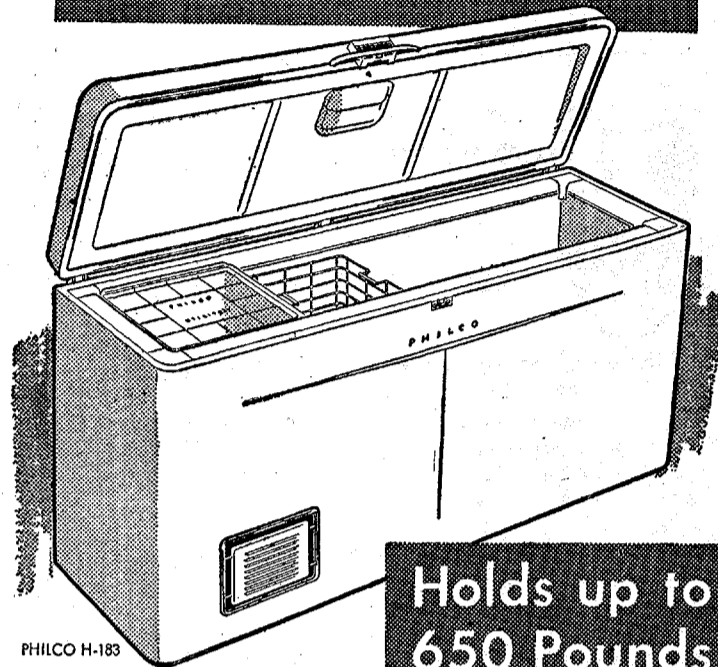
One of our table partners and another student just did the Schottisch very well for the entertainment of the onlookers.

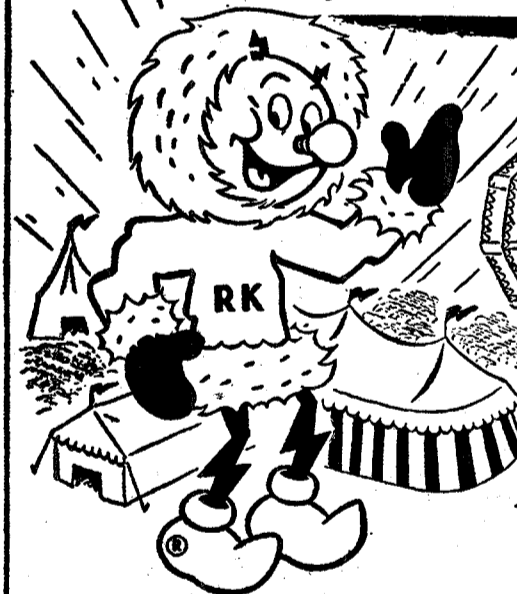
