#### Rural Areas Liked Umlor Best In The Primary Vote

In the recent Primary election for Charlevoix county sheriff, Lester P. Umlor, of Hayes Township, formerly of East Jordan, gathered more votes from the 15 townships than any of the other seven candidates.

The total vote of townships gave Umlor 196 votes; Rose was second with 190; Harper 155; Ikens 144; Winnick, 71; Kanoff 61; and Smith 30.

However, in the three cities, East Jordan, Charlevoix and Boyne City, Glen Rose topped Umlor by 279 votes.

Russell Harper ran second to Rose in total county vote. With nearly 100 ballots tossed out in Boyne City because of both sides being marked, Harper fell 127 behind Rose in the official

If all discarded ballots in Boyne City had counted for Harper, he still would have fallen short of tieing Rose in total county vote. What would have happened in a heavier turnout of voters is anybody's guess.

The city of Charlevoix put Rose ahead of all other candidates. He picked up well over half of his total vote from that city. He fell behind in both total Jordan and was six behind in total township vote.

Results of the voting shows that hometown candidates were backed up.

Among the candidates, Rose and Ikens were the most familiar to the vast majority of county voters. A big surprise to a large num-

ber of voters was the fact that Ikens ran third in total county vote; and that he picked up so few votes in Boyne City and East Jordan. It was expected that the vote would be split in Charlevoix with so many candidates running from that city.

Political observers believe that if a larger number of voters had turned out the pattern of voting would have been the same. Possible difference would be the number of votes given Harper at Boyne City which might have given him the edge over Rose.

But it is believed by many that with a larger turnout, Rose would still have remained on top of the county-wide tabulations.

Thus, the election surprises were the large number votes polled by Umlor; the few votes polled by Ikens; and the large number of people who did not know how to mark their ballot proper-

Biggest surprise was found in the number of total votes cast. They were far below the total number of registered voters in the county.

The company points to the fact that few cities are without rail service; and that a city of this size without such service would be greatly retarded in future expansion and development.

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
#### No Excuse!

A few remarks after making a trip through the Michigan fruit belt. At the Circle Three Orchards, Newaygo there is a good crop of McIntosh and a light crop of other varieties . . . the Circle Three orchard sprayed their apples twenty seven times and have very little scab . . . while they do not work on Sunday, it was thought by them that if they had sprayed on Sunday, there would be no scabby apples at all . . .

For the state as a whole Spys and Delicious apples will be lighter than last year . . . Over the peach belt as a whole there will not be an over supply of peaches as young plantings are not old enough at this time to replace the trees frozen out of few years ago . . .

In our section trees that have been well sprayed have a good crop of peaches . . . over the state as a whole most nurseries have sold out of sweet cherry trees on account of extensive new plantings in

In general frost damage at a certain time, damage from excess rain and in certain spots—light land drought damage all accounts for a slight reduction in Michigan fruit crop this year.

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
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
