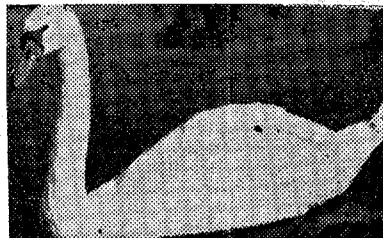

Fishing For Trout Ends Sunday

Fishing on trout lakes and Rivers ends Sunday but conservation department fisheries workers point out that now is a good time for fishing on other waters.

Trout fishermen must hang up their boots for another year except for those who wish to angle for lake or Mackinaw trout on non-trout waters in the extended fall season.

In general, trout lakes and streams close to all fishing on Sunday with few exceptions, but on other waters the non-trout species, in general, may be taken at least through the remaining months of 1954.

Pike and walleye fishing will also continue until March 15 on non-trout lakes and there is no closed season on these species on non-trout streams. Large numbers of anglers will enjoy trolling or casting for them thru fall months.

Local Gardner To Import Flowering Bulbs

John Seiler, of the "Big Jug Gardens" reported this week that because of the insistent call for flowering bulbs he has decided to make them available to customers this fall.

Tulip, daffodil, crocus, and amaryllis bulbs will come directly from the great bulb growing center of Sassenheim, Holland. They will arrive late this month for October planting.

The tuberous rooted begonia bulbs, which mature later and must be cured before shipment, will not arrive until December, he said.

These should be started in February, Seiler explained. Bleeding heart clumps will also be secure.

"All bulbs," Seiler said, "will be top size and quality."

ORDINANCE NO. 90
An Ordinance Relative to the Licensing of Merchants within the City of East Jordan, Michigan.
The City of East Jordan ordains:
Section 1. It shall henceforth be unlawful for any person, persons, partnership, or corporation, to do business within the city limits of the City of East Jordan, without first obtaining a license there for from the City Clerk of the City of East Jordan.
Section 2. This ordinance shall apply to any person, persons, partnership, or corporation, doing business at an established location within the City of East Jordan or those who do business over an established route or routes within the City of East Jordan.
Section 3. Upon application duly made by an authorized representative of any business above defined, such application to include:
a. Signature of Applicant
b. Location, route or routes of the subject business.
c. Assessed valuation of the personal property upon the tax rolls of the City of East Jordan.
d. Tender of the license fee hereinafter provided.
The City Clerk shall forthwith issue the applicant a license.
Section 4. The license fee for the merchants license herein required shall be \$50.00 per year or any part thereof, effective on September 18, 1954 and continuing each year thereafter; PROVIDED, that each merchant shall receive a credit against the above mentioned license fee for each dollar of personal property tax he was assessed in the then current year; not to exceed \$48.00, PROVIDED, further, that those business locations which have a personal property assessed valuation of \$2,000 or less, shall be subject to a license fee of \$2.00 only.
Section 5. No license issued under the provisions of this ordinance shall be transferable and its use shall be limited to the person, persons, partnership, or corporation in whose name it was issued.
Section 6. Any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof in a court of competent jurisdiction, be punishable by a fine not exceeding One Hundred dollars (\$100) and costs of prosecution, or imprisonment in the city jail or county jail not exceeding thirty (30) days, or both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court.
Section 7. Every merchant as above defined engaged in business in Section 2 of this ordinance shall prominently exhibit the license provided for by this ordinance. Failure to do so shall constitute a violation of this ordinance.
Section 8. If any provision of this ordinance is found unconstitutional or beyond the corporate powers of this city, it shall be construed to be separable from the balance of the said ordinance and shall not render the remainder of the said ordinance null and void.
Section 9. All ordinances or parts of ordinances conflicting with the terms of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

ORDINANCE NO. 89
Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, whether licensed or not, who is a habitual user of drugs or narcotics or any person who is under the influence of intoxicating liquor or narcotic drugs, to drive any vehicle on the streets, highways, alleys or within public parks of the City of East Jordan.
Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any person to drive any vehicle upon the streets, highways, alleys or within public parks of the City of East Jordan, carelessly and heedlessly in wilful or wanton disregard to the safety of others, or without due caution and circumspection, at a speed or in a manner so as to endanger or be liable to endanger any persons or property.
Section 3. Any violation of Section 1 or Section 2 of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$100.00 or by imprisonment in the county jail for not more than 90 days or both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court, together with costs of the prosecution.

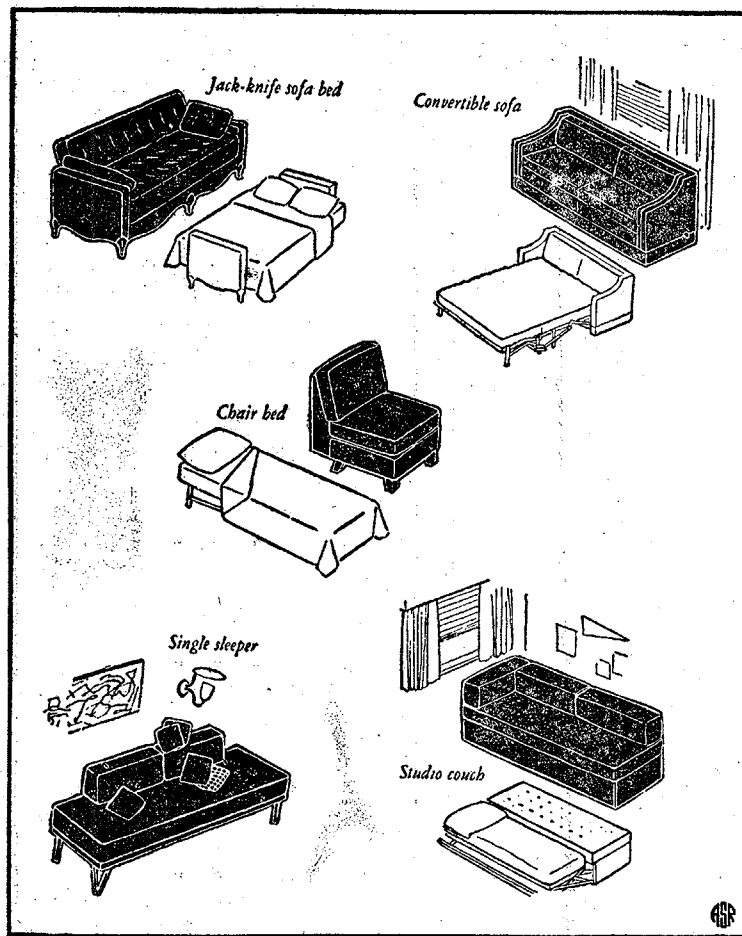

Orchard Notes . . .

. . . Claude Fairman

Stopping to pause every three months or so, the county agent in cooperation with the college staff and district horticulture agent can give spraying dates and notices for spraying for this or that. There is also a wonderful lot of bulletins, spray calendars, etc. at the county agent's office, and also from the soil conservation staff.

Where soil has been burnt out, washed away or blown away, it takes a lot of time and money to replace it.

Certain types of soil can be selected for planting certain types and kinds of fruit. Contour planting can help save soil washing. Contour planting also makes it easier to pull sprayers up grade.

Orchard sites hemmed in by forests are more liable to be frosty. The soil conservation can also help with wind breaks. McIntosh apples are easily blown off when mature. All of us remember wind whipped cherries.

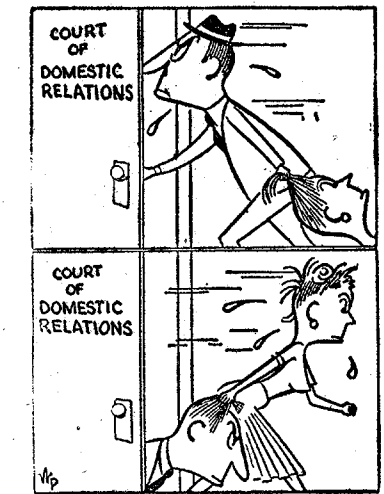

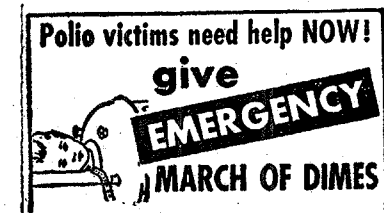
