Down at the Northern Auto Company they were offering a "remarkable value in the motor car field - a new Ford touring car for \$295. If you didn't have the cash you could make monthly payments on this huge amount.

The Michigan State Telephone Company carried large ads in the newspaper announcing that from now on they would be known as Michigan Bell Telephone Com-

The Temple Theater was starring such "greats" as Tom Mix, Douglas McLean, Bebe Daniels and Richard Bartle-

The 1924 Studebaker, a big six, seven passenger sedan was selling for \$2,685 FOB factory.

The State Bank of Boyne Falls showed \$114,000 on hand in its annual published report.

Radio fans were bragging about the long distances they could get on their "receivers."

Death claimed Woodrow Wilson, World War I President of the U.S.

Joe Maddock, an East Jordan Red Devil, was doing big things in the nation's football.

Newspapers throughout the country claimed him an "Allwestern tackle and one of the greatest players ever on a University of Michigan football

In the fall of 1924 he was assigned as head football coach for the University of Oregon.

An Oregon newspaper said: "Maddock is not only a product of "Hurry Up" Yost's coaching system, but he served under the great Ann Arbor gridiron mentor in 1920 and 1921 as assistant

Contractors Rogers and Moore, of East Jordan paved the city streets of Muskegon on a \$192,000 contract.

Fire swept a westside store, Houghton & Kowalske's with losses up to \$5,000. It had stood for 40 years.

Howard Porter was elected Mayor with a 179 majority over Mayor Dicken.

Grinnel Brothers were selling Steinway pianos in East Jordan

The 40th annual Charlevoix county fair in East Jordan found the fair board completely out of debt with \$15,000 worth of property paid for.

Nathan F. Leopold, jr., 19-year old student at the University of Chicago, son of the millionaire owner of the Manitou Steamship company and Richard Loeb, also 19, son of the millionaire vice-president of Sears, Roebuck & Company confessed the planned murder of Robert Franks, 14 year old son of Jacob Franks, a retired millionaire. The families lived in Chicago.

Arthur Secord and Paul Franseth, both East Jordan high school graduates were named the best two college debaters in Michigan. They were studying at Western State at Kalamazoo.

The city council was making first arrangements to construct a tourist park.

The nation was having quite a "to do" over LaFollette's 3rd party.

Boyne City voted a \$25,000 bond issue to construct a new gym. It is the one used today.

Mully Maurice DeLoof, a member of East Jordan's 1924 Northern Michigan championship baseball team signed a contract to play with the Indianapolis Base Ball Club of the American Association.

A Christmas holiday feature at the Temple Theater in 1924 included "The Shooting of Dan McGrew" and "Thy Name Is Woman" with Ramon Novarro and Barbara LaMarr.

There's a controversy developing over the 85-year old grist mill at Advance.

The structure, one of northern Michigan's oldest historical sites, may be torn down if area residents continue to ignore a move to develop the mill and the immediate area for sight-seers.

One resident has already offered \$100 to repair the two story building and the Advance Board of Commerce is seeking additional donations for the project.

William Sanderson, a member of the board of commerce and a Charlevoix county supervisor, is spearheading the drive.

So far the movement has picked up little support among those who say the site has been an "eyesore long enough and should be torn down."

AND SO fate of the old mill has developed into a "To be or not to be" question.

Sanderson will suggest to the Northern Michigan Electric Cooperatives Inc., that a small area of land be set aside for public use close to the mill.

The suggestion will be made when the electric company is in circuit court in October on a land claims hearing. The \$10,000,000 electric steam power plant is near the mill.

Several ideas have been offered for future use of the old mill. Some would like to see it restored and turned into a historical museum. Some want to develop a public area along Porter Creek and use the mill as a restored historical site.

The grist mill was donated to the Advance Board of Commerce by Dr. Charters and it is the belief of many around Advance that it should be restored as an attraction for county visitors.

ADVANCE corners, for many years called "42nd Street and Broadway" is one of Charlevoix county's busiest intersections.

County highways leading from Charlevoix, East Jordan and Boyne City intersect here in front of the now controversial grist mill at Porter Creek.

The name "42nd and Broadway" was so called by the late Frank Beals who purchased the Advance store several years ago and which is still operated by the family.

Advance's first settler William Harvey Porter bought land there from the U. S. Government in 1859 and in 1865 constructed a sawmill on the site. Later he built the grist mill which drew farmers from throughout northern

Porter was a brother-in-law of the late William P. Porter of

East Jordan. Many photographs have been taken of the old mill and in recent years Dr. B. J. Bueker, of East Jordan, did a painting of the now historic structure.

AND NOW the call has gone out for funds to restore the site and to preserve a bit of the old for those who enjoy remembering the way of life led by our ancestors.

Sanderson suggests that donations be made to the Advance Board of Commerce in small amounts so many area residents might have a part in bring back to life something of historical value not only to Charlevoix county, but for the residents of northern Michigan.


Today my daughter, who is 7 years old, started to school as usual. She wore a dark blue dress with a white collar. She had on black shoes and wore blue gloves. Her cocker spaniel, whose name is Coot, sat on the front porch and whined his canine belief in the folly of education as she waved good-bye and started off to the hall of learning.

Tonight we talked about school. She told me about the girl who sits in front of her, the girl with yellow curls, and the boy across the aisle who makes funny faces. She told me about her teacher, who has eyes in the back of her head, and the trees in the school yard, and about the hig girl who doesn't believe in Santa Claus. We talked about a lot of things—tremendously vital unimportant things, and then we studied spelling reading, arithmetic—and then to bed.

She's back there now-back in the nursery sound asleep, with "Princess Elizabeth" (that's her doll) cuddled in her right arm. You guys wouldn't hurt her, would you? You see I'm her daddy. When her doll is broken or her finger is cut or her head gets bumped, I can fix it-but when she starts to school, when she walks across the street, then she's in your hands.

She's a nice kid. She can run like a deer and dart about like a chipmunk. She likes to ride horses and swim and hike with me on Sunday afternoon But I can't be with her all the time; I have to work to pay for her clothes and her education. So please help me look out for her. Please drive slowly past the schools and intersectionsand please remember that children run from behind parked cars. Please don't run over my little girl.

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



those in nearby communities have felt the steady financial increase as the result of East Jordan's over all stepped-up industrial production.

Much additional revenue was brought to the city this summer as the result of a well organized state-wide advertising project. With the resort business generally slower about the state, many local places of business reported increased sales from local and visitor trade.

Low-point in summer activities was caused by the cherry crop failure which resulted in many women and younger people being unable to increase their income through the cherry industry. The blow struck not only farmers, canning companies, and workers, but scattered places of business usually dependent upon "cherry crop trade."

IT WAS reported that a successful cherry crop would have seared local worker and business income to heights not reached here in many years. That's combined with all other stepped-up

City-wide civic improvements have kept pace with higher employment and with strengthened business conditions.



Mrs. Secord had selected six men — all but one being natives of Michigan — Will Carleton (1845-1912); James Whitcomb Riley (1849-1916); Ben King (1857-1894); Douglas Malloch (1877-1938); Edgar A. Guest (1881); and Ernest Jack Sharpe

An interesting resume of the life of each was followed by brief excerpts from their work. A rhyme was also read from the pen of Warren W. Lamport, (18-55-1948) pastor of the East Jordan Methodist Church from 1907
