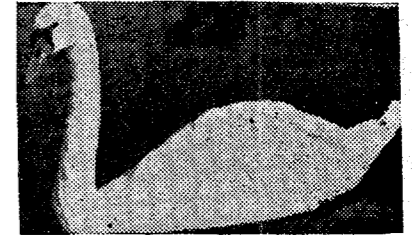

East Jordan Cow Rates High Around Michigan

Rainbow Winnie Bess, an outstanding Milking Shorthorn, raised on the Scott's Rainbow Farm, East Jordan, is winning blue ribbons around Michigan.

Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Scott sold the animal to Stanley Powell last fall.

Since then the Shorthorn won the Grand Champion ribbon at the Lake Odessa District Fair and won Reserve Senior Champion in the two year old class and Reserve Grand Champion in all classes at this year's Michigan State Fair.

The Scotts sold the animal to Powell last October. Powell who has a large farm near Ionia is a widely known Michigan Farmer and legislative counsel to the Michigan Farm Bureau at East Lansing.

Constant increasing enrollment at the East Jordan school has school officials talking about construction of two new classrooms.

A serious look at the future and discussion about school additions took place at the last meeting of the Board of Education.

Present enrollment is 34 above last year, which is about one additional class of students.

Last year, Supt. E. E. Wade said, there were 487 students in the elementary grades and 377 in high school. The 1953 total was 864.

This year's enrollment of elementary students was 511 while the high school's was 387. This makes the present total of all students now in school up to 898.

Supt. Wade and school board members, looking to the future, see conditions which will demand additional space for the increasing enrollment.

East Jordan Woman Killed In Auto-Train Accident

A former East Jordan woman, Mrs. Anna Robinson, 31, was killed outright Tuesday when a train struck the stalled auto in which she was riding near Holland. Two other women were also killed.

Mrs. Robinson, the mother of four daughters, is the former Anna Brintnall, of East Jordan, and daughter of Luther Brintnall who now is living at Boyne City. She graduated from East Jordan high school.

Her husband is Sam Robinson, Jr., and the family lives in Fennville.

Luther Brintnall is a brother

of Arthur Brintnall, of East Jordan.

Police said the three women were on their way to work at the Davis Die Cast Co., at Holland when their car stalled on the railroad tracks. When they were about to proceed a train struck the car tossing it 150 feet through the air. It was demolished.

The two other killed at the same time were: Mrs. Grace Liewehr, 40 and Mrs. Allene M. Smith, 31, both of Fennville.

Mrs. Robinson suffered severe brain concussion and internal injuries and died at 5:50 p.m. Tuesday. The bodies were taken to the Chappell funeral home at Fennville.

Looking Backward

Reviewing The News-Herald

September 19, 1914
Saturday was a Voo-Doo day in East Jordan. There was an assault, burglary, a fatal accident, a leg broken and two buildings burned.

Friday the 13th will have no terrors for East Jordan people hereafter as Saturday the 12 contained about as many startling affairs as can, within reason, happen to our peaceful city in a given 24 hours.

The day opened with a row down on State Street in which one of the combatants was hit over the head with a beer bottle inflicting serious wounds. Whether the bottle was full is debatable, but there can be no question on this point as far as the participants are concerned.

The Temple Cafe was burglarized. When Frank Phillips came to work in the morning he found \$50.00 missing.

Albert Kile, 49, was the victim of a fatal accident at the East Jordan Lumber Company's Camp 6. The funeral was held at the East Jordan Methodist Church.

W. P. Porter severely fractured his leg when a railroad velocipede on which he was riding struck an open switch and was ditched. He was hurrying to the scene of the Kile accident.

Saturday night about 9:30 flames were discovered in the left of Mackey's Livery located on the corner of State and Second Streets. An alarm was immediately turned in and all the horses, about 16 head, together with the buggies, etc. were saved. The loft was filled to capacity and made the saving of the structure and impossibility. Work of the firemen consisted in endeavoring to save the adjoining buildings. Charles Shedina's blacksmith and wood working shop adjoined this and soon was also in flames. Nearly all this structure went to the ground except the front part of the lower floor.

LETTER BOX

TO HUNTERS, FARMERS, & SPORTSMEN:

Approximately 100 pheasants have been raised and recently liberated in the city of East Jordan with the hope that they will survive and multiply so hunters will soon be able to enjoy good pheasant shooting in our area.

No attempt has been made to get a closed season; if they are outside the city limits it will be perfectly legal to shoot them if you wish this season.

However, we all know, from the Sportsmen's Clubs past experiences and from Del Carson's try at getting them started last year, that unless hunters and sportsmen give them a break this season, they will not survive.

Let's all get behind this little flock, fellows, and not only refrain from shooting them, but because they're ground feeders when the snow comes and you see them around your house, throw some feed and grit, and with good luck there may soon be plenty of pheasants.

Big Bob Romback scored in the third period from the one, chalking up the only count for that quarter.

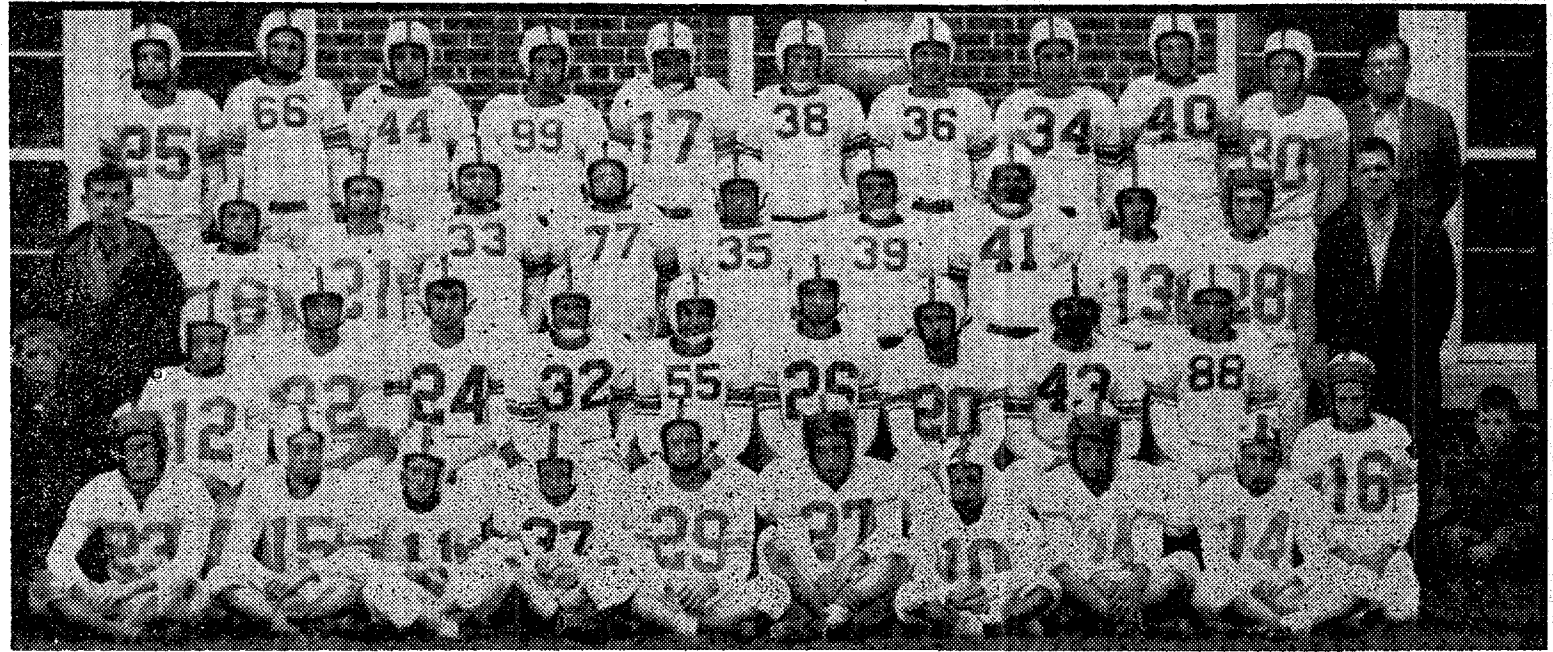
The fourth period saw Wilson and McGeorge race across pay dirt. Darbee picked up one extra point via kicking.

Northern Michigan Businessmen Take Serious Look At Straits Bridge

Northern Michigan businessmen are jockeying for position in the wake of the Mackinac Bridge, St. Lawrence Seaway and changing times.

Location of new highways to the straits has them worried; the number of summer visitors who will zoom right on up into the northern peninsula frightens them; and they are wondering what the seaway will mean to the north.

So Gov. Williams isn't the only one who wants to know what Highway Commissioner Charles Ziegler has in store for 1956.

Businessmen are demanding to know what kind of roads to look forward to.

Resort communities are losing hundreds of thousands of dollars they say. That's because would-be owners refuse to build motels, hotels and places of business when they aren't sure about new highway locations.

There's much guessing about turnpike and toll roads to the straits from southern Michigan.

A nightmare to resort cities is a highway department tendency to route new roads around cities.

That's why there is so much talk about organizing an association of cities.

On the west side of the state the organization is developing to include every city from Three Rivers to Mackinaw City along US-131. The movement started at Cadillac.

Communities from Gaylord south to Standish are also discussing an organization to look after businessmen's interests.

It looks like the highway department will have to deal with the biggest pressure group in history.

Ziegler is known, however, to have a different idea about increased traffic to the straits.

He can't see enough to merit vast highway expansion. And he knows a big highway to the bridge means another on the other side.

Ziegler isn't alone in some of his ideas about the bridge.

The farther one goes south from Petoskey the less excitement he finds about it.

Huge numbers of residents around the north are downright disappointed. They feel boat rides across the straits are top attraction for summer visitors.

During the big clamor favoring bridge construction last year there were many waves of unorganized opposition never public.

Much of it was found in areas where resort business might be lost by those traveling on up across the bridge.

Charlevoix, Emmet, Cheboygan and Otsego county resort owners and businessmen are being warned to extend great effort to keep summer visitors after the bridge is opened.

Resort and conservation officials say business will be extremely competitive between the two peninsulas.

Many communities hope increased business brought about by the St. Lawrence Seaway will help offset any loss to upper peninsula via the bridge.

Slugger White, the home town's star hitter, dropped by the other day to talk baseball, and to "tell one" on himself.

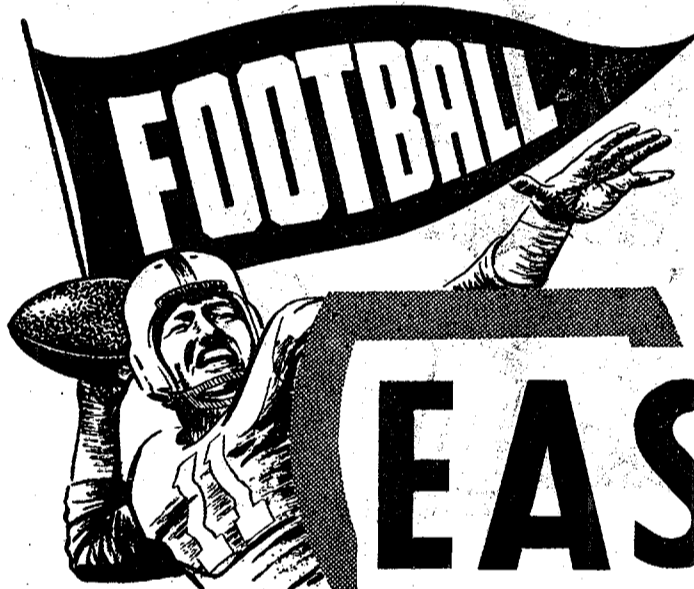
