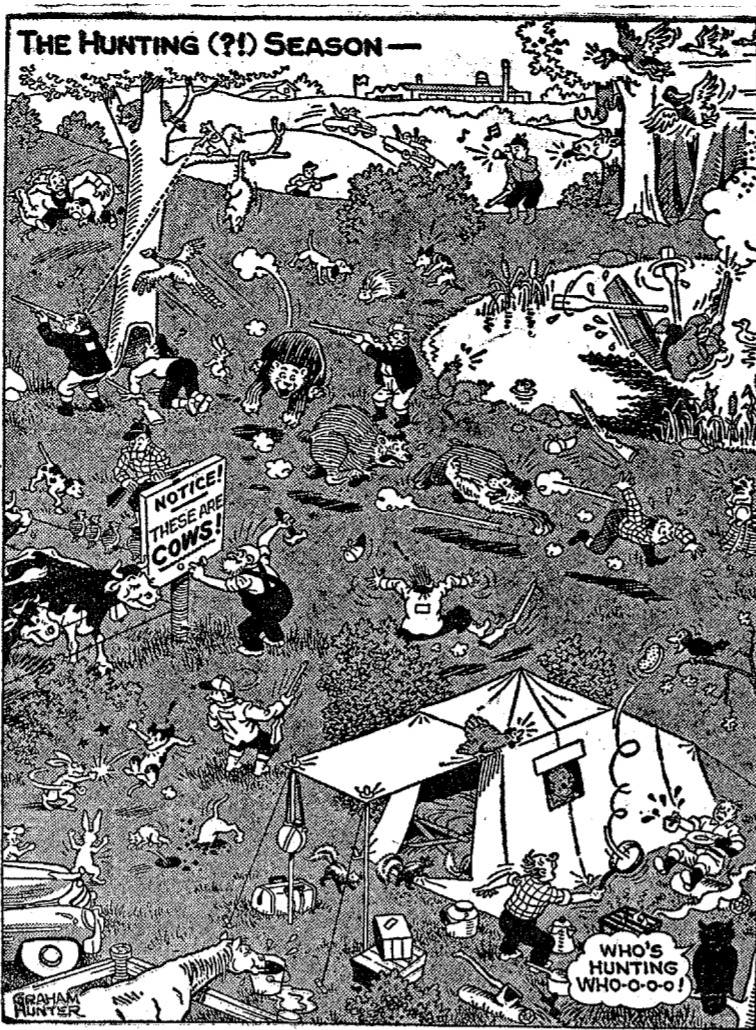
### The American Way

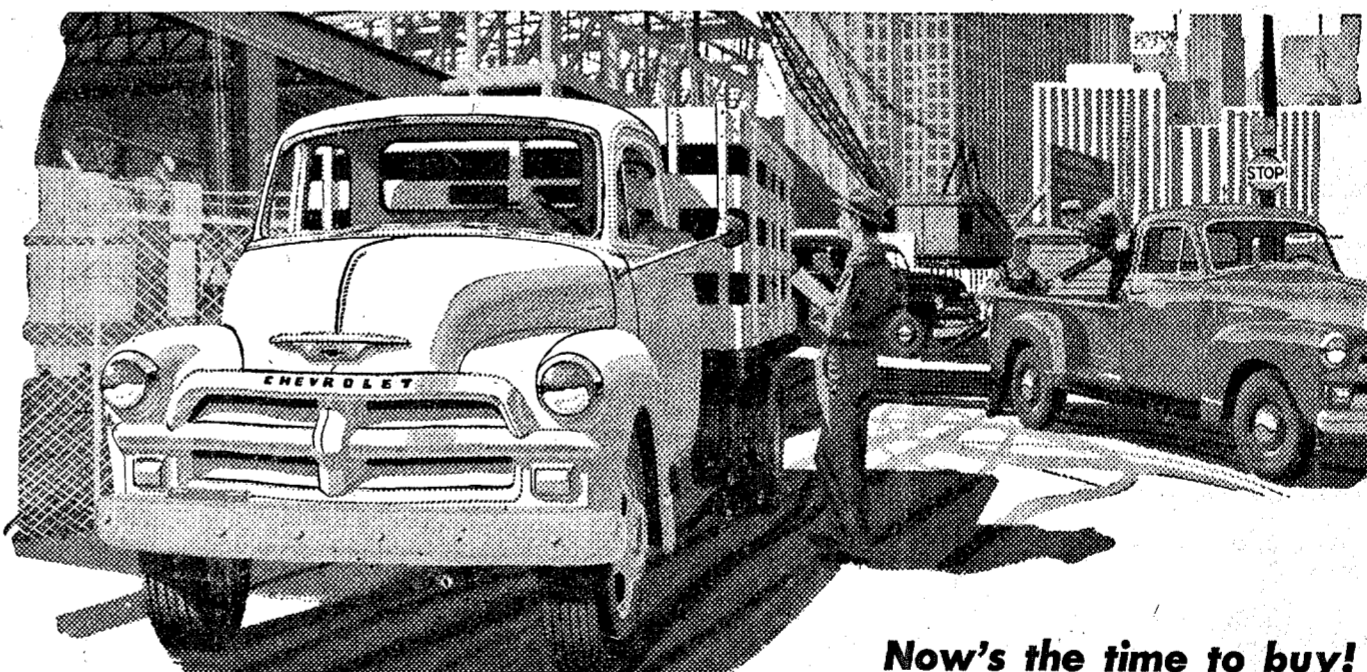

# BOYNE STRUGGLES TO SLIM FIRST 7-YEAR WIN

The Boyne City Ramblers slopped over into the win column against the Red Devils Friday for the first time in seven straight years in an uneventful 7-0 struggle that left everything to be desired in a football game.

With three East Jordan players on the sick list, two playing and one on the bench the visiting Ramblers were still hard put to nudge the Red Devils with a one score margin.

It was Boyne City's first conference win of the season. Boyne City opened the first play of the game with a fumble which was immediately recovered by East Jordan. The Red Devil drive ran out and the punt went into the end zone.

A couple of plays later Rambler Rothenberger squirmed around East Jordan's end and shook off Red Devils for some 60 yards.

With first down and goal to go the locals held the Ramblers for three downs until Boyne nudged the ball over the line for the only score of the game.

The extra point came via a pass.

Boyne City was plagued with penalties which cost plenty in yardage.

The visitors excelled in their passing attack, end around spurts and overall weight, which raised many an eyebrow at the slim winning margin at the final gun.

The Ramblers were unable to develop a rout against the all-out Red Devil determination, which changed observers' opinion about Boyne City rolling over the north C circuit this season.

## Champ At Boyer Mountain

Champion Stein Eriksen, winner of the '53 Olympic all-events championship will make his debut as a professional at Boyne Mountain lodge December 15th. With the signing of Eriksen to head the Boyne Mountain ski school, it is expected that national attention will now be turned upon Michigan.

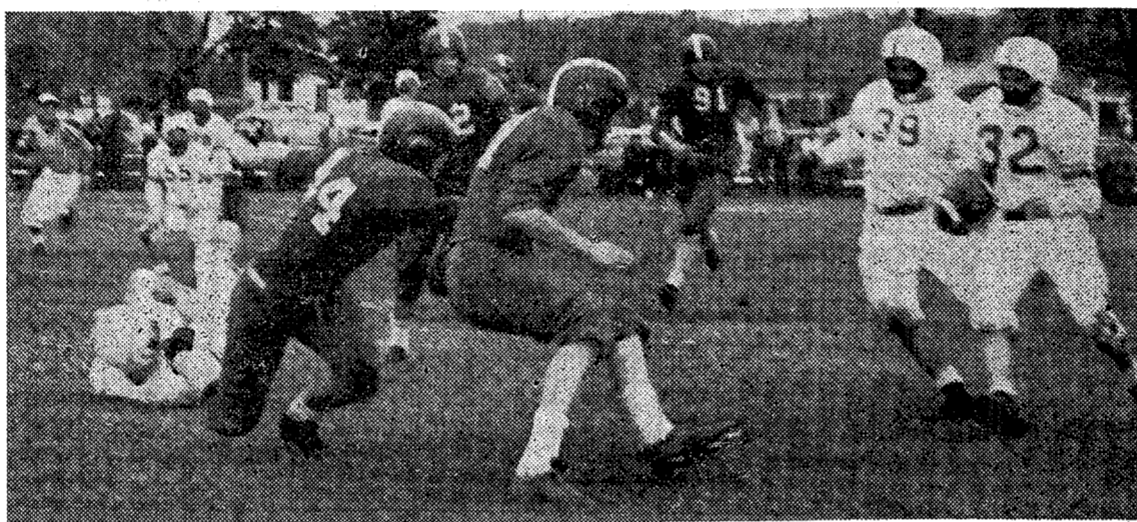

### South Arm 4-H





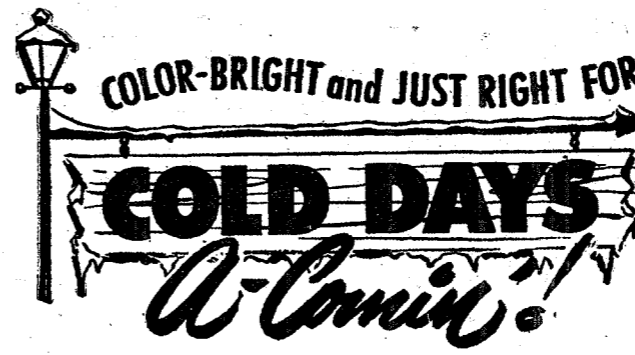
