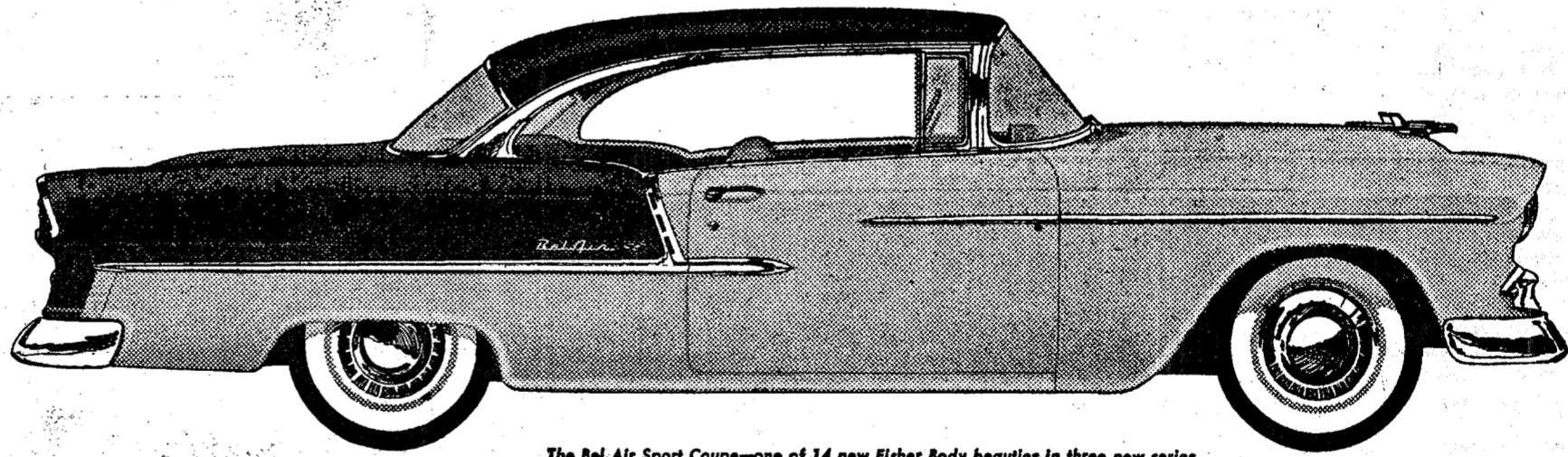

### County Football Teams Whip Northern Opponents

If you want to see the unusual in football look around you. You'll see everything happening on the gridiron.

It is a much different season for northern Michigan Class C play.

One thing holds true. You've got to be good to move in against Charlevoix county football. It has been a long time since any one team has come in and raced over East Jordan, Boyne City and Charlevoix in a single season.

From the records it looks much like the county teams will shut out the others again.

Boyne City remains in top conference play after they whipped Harbor Springs. Charlevoix is close behind and East Jordan is in third place.

Charlevoix broke Mancelona's record of tying its games this season. East Jordan came home from Gaylord with an 18-6 score in their favor. It was the same score which resulted in the Boyne City-Gaylord fight a week earlier.

Biggest news of the week was the removal of Pellston from top rating when they were forced to forfeit two games. A 19 year old player is ineligible on any Michigan high school grid iron.

Throughout the north the word is that no team is outstanding this year. Top teams of the season are Boyne City and Charlevoix with both schools having fielded better outfits in the past.

Although there have been a couple of ties, no Charlevoix county team has lost a game outside the county this season.

The Charlevoix Rayders are way out front with points scored against Class C teams this season. They have chalked up 114 points against loop foes.

Boyne City, playing three games so far, has 58 points in C competition and East Jordan 45.

East Jordan will take on the Harbor Rams Friday afternoon and Grayling will travel to Charlevoix. Pellston will visit Boyne City and Mancelona will go over to Gaylord.

The Rayders will probably have little trouble with the Vikings and East Jordan should run over the Rams. There is little doubt that the Ramblers will down the Hornets and it looks like Mancelona is headed for another tie with Gaylord.

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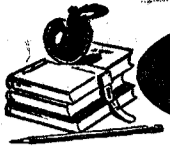

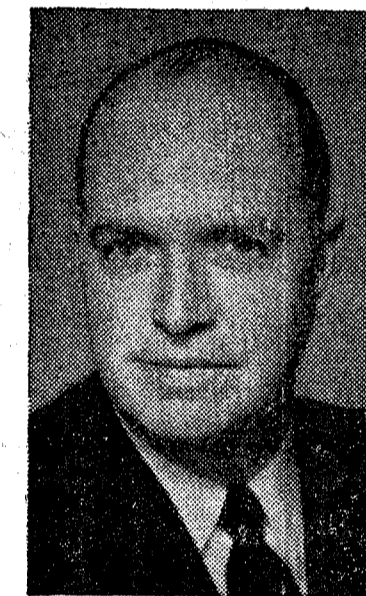

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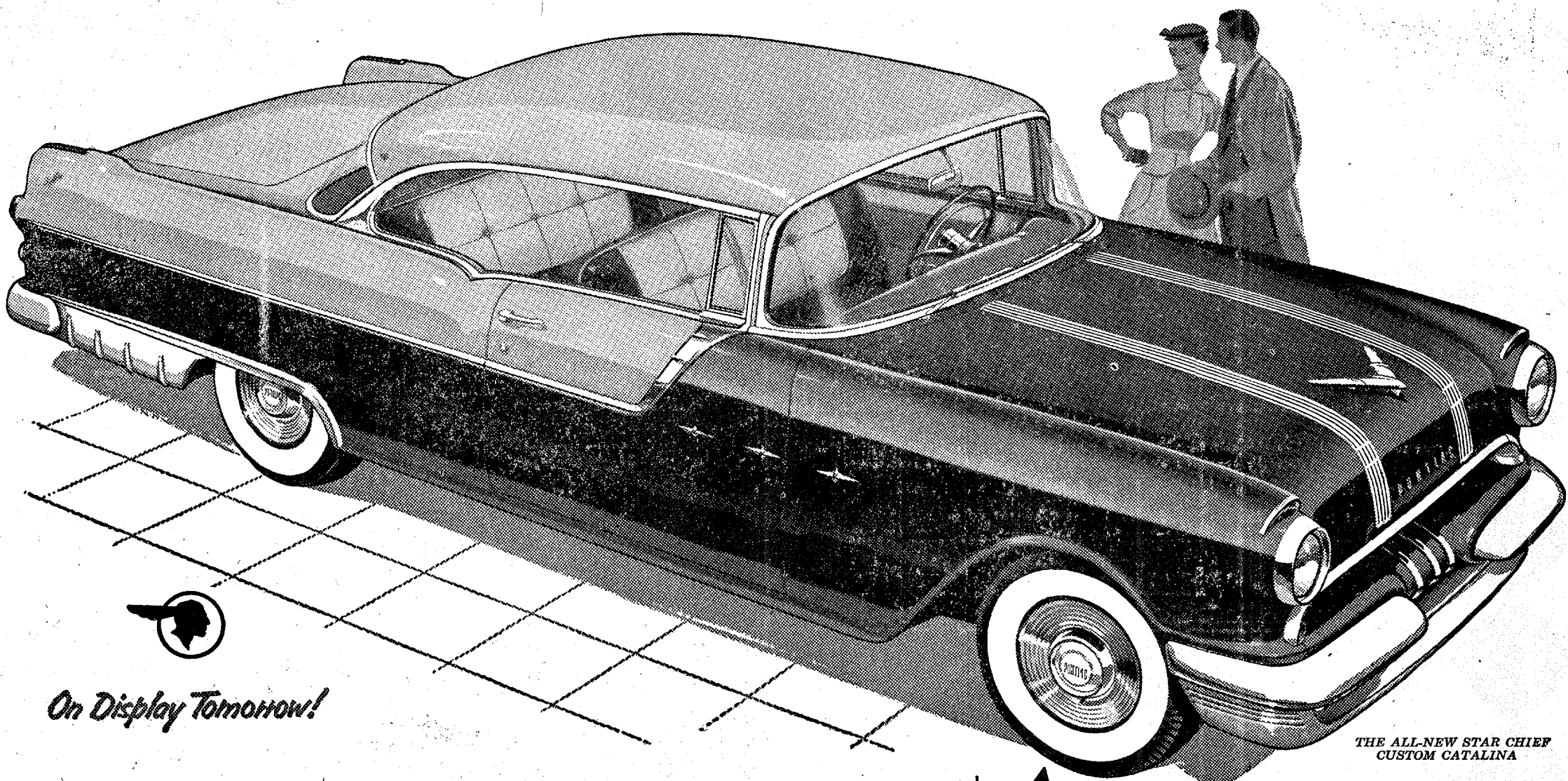
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
