Rev. John Stanley Harker, President of Alma College, will be the guest minister at the East Jordan Presbyterian Church Sunday morning, October 31st. This will be Rev. Harker's first visit to East Jordan.

Dr. Harker became President of Alma College in January, 19-51. During the three and a half years that have elapsed great gains have been made by the College. The faculty has been substantially enlarged. A slow but steady growth has been maintained in enrollment. The physical plant has been improved, the most noticeable improve-

ments being the construction of two new buildings on the campus The Jerry Tyler Student Center was opened in February, 1953 and the Van Dusen Commons went into operation with the beginning of school, 1953.

A new athletic field with a modern concrete stadium was built during the past summer and the Reid-Knox Administration Building will go under construction this fall.

Alma College was founded by by and is under the control of the Presbyterian Church of Michigan. It is a fully accredited college of liberal arts, coeducational, and with a limited enrollment of 600.

Dr. Harker, a native of New Jersey, is a graduate of Grove City College, Grove City, ePnnsylvania, and McCormick Theological Seminary. He holds his Master of Arts and Doctor of Philosophy degrees from the University of Pittsburgh. In 1941 Grove City College conferred upon him the degree of Doctor of Divinity and in 1952 he received the degree of Doctor of Laws from Cedarville College.

Pick a warm day late this fall and give your cattle the delousing treatment. Don't wait for winter.

Whether you have beef or dairy cattle, a good treatment for lice will show up as a welcome sign in your account book, reminds Ed Rebman, Charlevoix county agricultural agent.

For beef cattle is a choice of insecticides, Rebman points out. Here are the recommendations from the Michigan State College entomology department:

In 100 gallons of water any of these may be used: 8 pounds of the 50 per cent wettable powder of DDT, or 11/2 pounds of the 25 percent wettable lindane powder, or methoxychlor-8 lbs of the 50 percent wettable pow-

But, he cautions, only methochlor of the three materials should be used on dairy animal for lice control.

Lindane, according to the entomologists, can be used on dairy cattle for mange control. But. they, say, milk should not be sold for three days after the treatment. If lindane is used for control of mange in beef cattle, it should be at least 10 days before sale or slaughter, the en tomologists emphasize.

Be sure to spray all the animals in a herd, Rebman cautions, because lice can spread quickly.






