Then I stopped and looked again—for there, hanging on the spare tire was a sign: "This car NOT for sale."

Asked Granny what was going on. "Joe," she says, "it's this craze for old cars. Everybody wants to buy my Franklin. But it has served for years and it's not for sale at any price."

From where I sit, it's strictly the new cars for me—but Grandma Taylor, and others, are certainly welcome to their "old faith-fuls." It's simply a question of preference. Same with a choice of beverages. For instance, I like a temperate glass of beer with supper. You may prefer coffee. Fine! The important thing is that we respect each other's choice—and "ride along smoothly" together.

wings or either end. The Sind Government owns many large tractors and crawlers and other farm equipment which is repaired and maintained in these workshops. The present inadequate workshop employs 200 men and when they move to the new one the whole program will be expanded. The U. S. Govt. has furnished the new workshop with \$250,000 worth of shop equipment. My work will be to help get everything set up, operating, and see that men are trained to operate any equipment that they do not clearly know how to operate. Also I will help set up a training program for tractor operators, mechanics, and village leaders who will go back home and help farmers in their area. Our house is across the road from the workshop. An entire agricultural college is being built on the same site and will be occupied next summer. Our house is among many others where the college personnel will live.

After our first week of adjustment to the food, water, climate etc., everyone is well and strong. As the days move along, we have an increased feeling of being a part of the country here. I have been assigned a jeep for my work and we have been able to get around town and see the people and customs here. It is very busy here with all kinds of transportation; donkeys, camels, bicycles, motor cycles, English cars, Americans cars, gasoline driven street cars and buses. It is very common for us to stop at an intersection between a donkey cart and a camel cart.

The climate is very steady here with the temperature in the 90's each day and 70's at night. The humidity is very low so we do not mind the heat.

I have found time to go fishing already and it was a very enjoyable day. Four of us hired a local boat and went about 20 miles down the Arabian Sea Coast and trolled for anything that would strike. I caught five fish, two of them were surmay (king mackerel); one of these weighed between 30-60 lbs. (estimate) two others were Berocuda and one is unknown to me. They were all big fish. We gave three away but kept the two surmay and have had six meals off them and still there is some left in the refrigerator. I have some pictures that I will be sending you when I get some prints made.

As I said before we have not had a bit of news from EJ so I cannot comment on a thing going on there. We think of home often and our friends there. Even though our contribution may be small here, we are proud of the opportunity to be able to help these fine people in Pakistan.

to make sure plant industry laws are not violated.

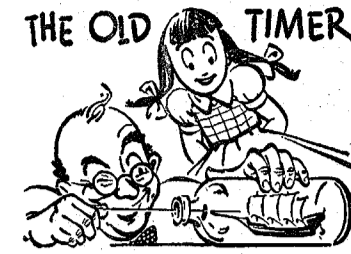
If you buy trees or boughs from the original owner, you must get a legal bill of sale made on triplicate forms from the state.

Property owners may transport Christmas trees or evergreen boughs from their own property with out a bill of sale. But they must prove ownership.

Moving native trees or plants with roots attached is a different matter. The bill of sale alone is not enough. An inspection of the trees or plants is necessary

before they may be removed from the property on which they are growing.

old in 1925. KDKA, Pittsburg, first radio station, had been operating just four years.

Construction of the new bank building has brought about much discussion about banks in East Jordan.

A reader writes in to say that East Jordan's first bank was organized by George B. Martin. (Alexander Bush wrote the name George E. Martin). While building a frame structure to house it on the site of the present State Bank, he conducted his banking business in the D. C. Loveday store.

In 1891 (Mr. Bush said it was 1892) Mr. Martin sold the bank to Reuben R. Glenn and Alexander Bush; and it operated under the name of Bush and Glenn. Reuben Glenn died in 1895 and Mr. Bush sold his interest in 1897 to Reuben's father, Joseph C. Glenn, Reuben's brother.

In 1899 they built the present brick building which stands on the corner of Esterly and Main streets.

In July, 1901, the bank was reorganized as the State Bank of East Jordan with a capitalization of \$20,000; and the following officers were named: Joseph C. Glenn, president; Walter L. French, vice-president; and George G. Glenn, cashier.

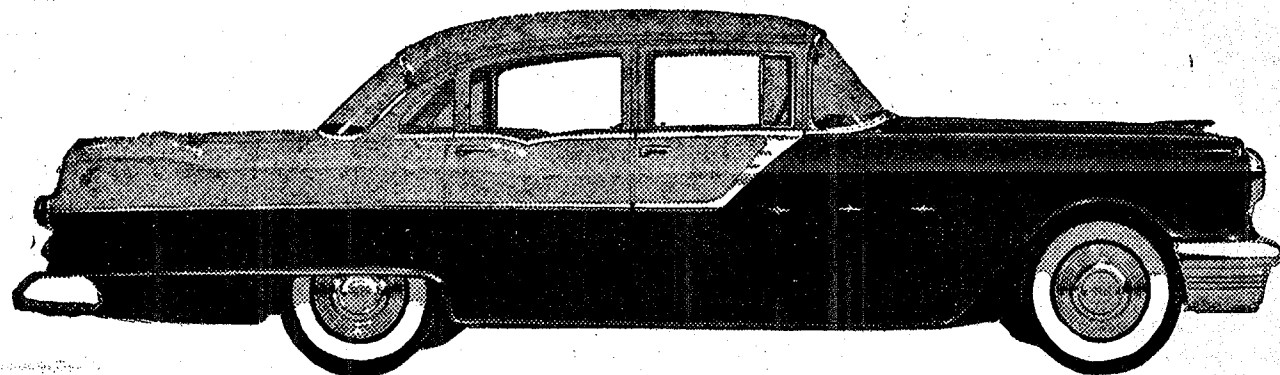
