The East Jordan Board of Education has won an unusual circuit court hearing requiring two Antrim County townships to increase school taxes.

The court case attracted wide interest with school boards and boards of supervisors throughout Michigan awaiting the results.

Echo and Jordan Townships in Antrim county, a part of the East Jordan school district, were ordered by Presiding Circuit Judge Howard Campbell, of Cadillac, to levy taxes based upon a

state equalized valuation for spread 5.84 mills on Antrim school purposes.

JUDGE CAMPBELL was sitting on the bench at Bellaire in place of Circuit Judge Charles Brown, of Traverse City. The East Jordan school attor-

ney William Downs said that earlier the allocation boards had met and agreed upon the proper tax levy for the two townships.

JUDGE CAMPBELL'S opin-

ion handed down in the East Jordan school case was perhaps the first test of the attorney general's ruling.

It was also the first time a school district had gone to court and won such a tax claim without going through regular State Tax Commission procedure.

Winning the suit now means the East Jordan school will receive a total of \$2,809.26 from the two townships.

If Antrim county had been al-

lowed to assess the townships upon county valuations the school would have received only \$1,-974.91.

* * * THUS THE court case resulted in the East Jordan school being able to receive an additional \$834.35 from the two townships for operation of the local school.

Without the extra money, the school charged, it would not have been able to take care of those students coming here from the two Antrim county townships.

There is no vaccine, no "quick" cure, no relief from high costs at present. TB cases stay up in numbers . . . more than 5,600 in 1953. TB deaths down to 607 in Michigan last year.

Also I will help set up a training program for tractor operators, mechanics, and village leaders who will go back home and help farmers in their area. Our house is across the road from the workshop. An entire agricultural college is being built on the same site and will be occupied next summer. Our house is among many others where the

justment to the food, water, climate etc., everyone is well and strong. As the days move along, we have an increased feeling of being a part of the country here. I have been assigned a jeep for my work and we have been able to get around town and see the people and customs here. It is very busy here with all kinds of transportation; donkeys, camels, bicycles, motor cycles, English cars, Americans cars, gasoline driven street cars and buses. It is very common for us to stop at an intersection between a donkey cart and a camel cart.

Christmas Tree Laws Enforced

Sale of Christmas trees and evergreen boughs, estimated to

be a \$5,000,000 business in Michigan, will start soon; and the state agriculture department will set up road blocks on highways are not violated.

If you buy trees or boughs from the original owner, you must get a legal bill of sale made on triplicate forms from the state.

Property owners may transport Christmas trees or evergreen boughs from their own property with out a bill of sale. But they must prove ownership. Moving native trees or plants with roots attached is a different

matter. The bill of sale alone is not enough. An inspection of the trees or plants is necessary

before they may be removed from the property on which they are growing.


