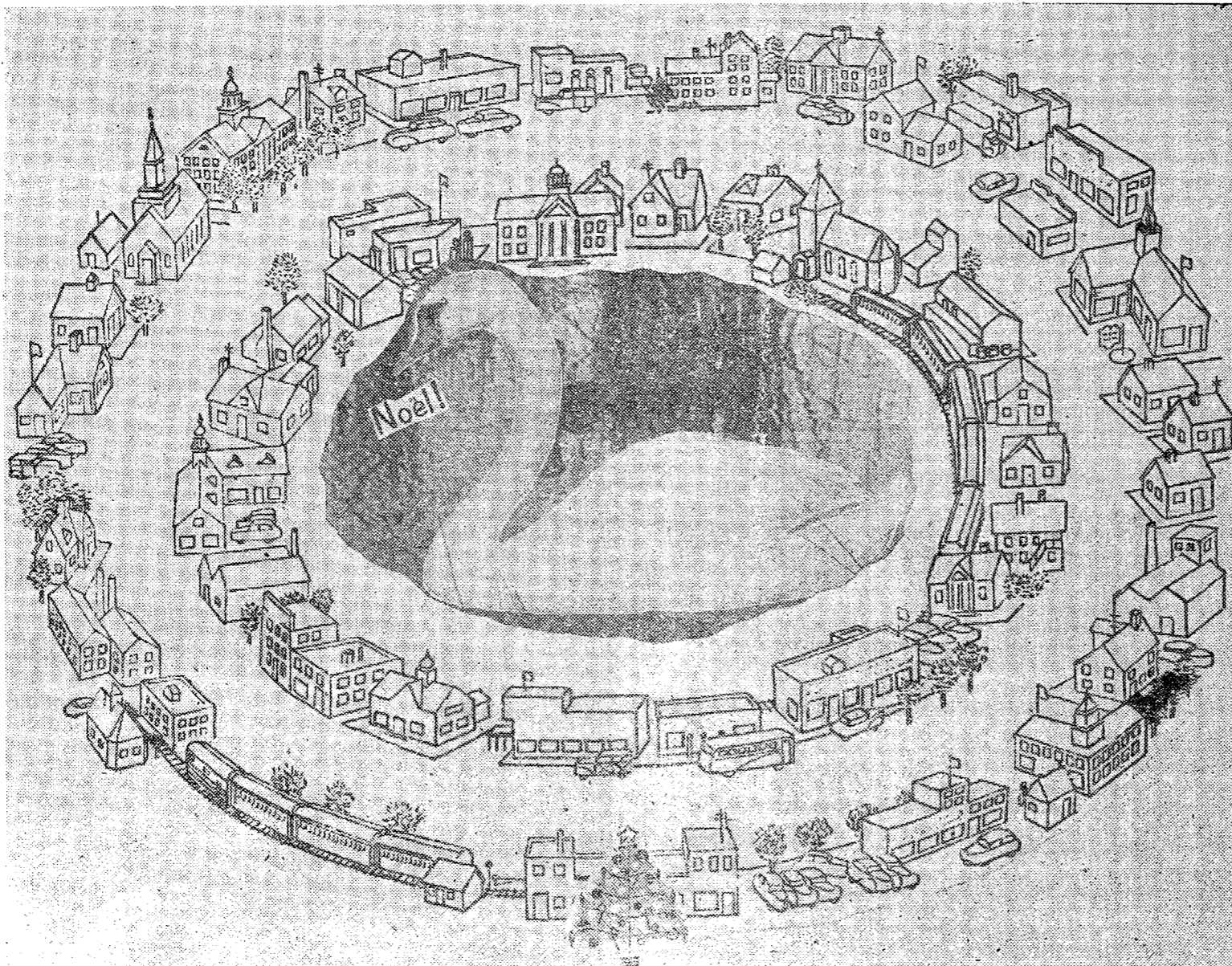
There is nothing like music to spread the feeling of Christmas. All this holiday season the singing of carols and other Christmas music has been ringing out over the city from atop the bank building.

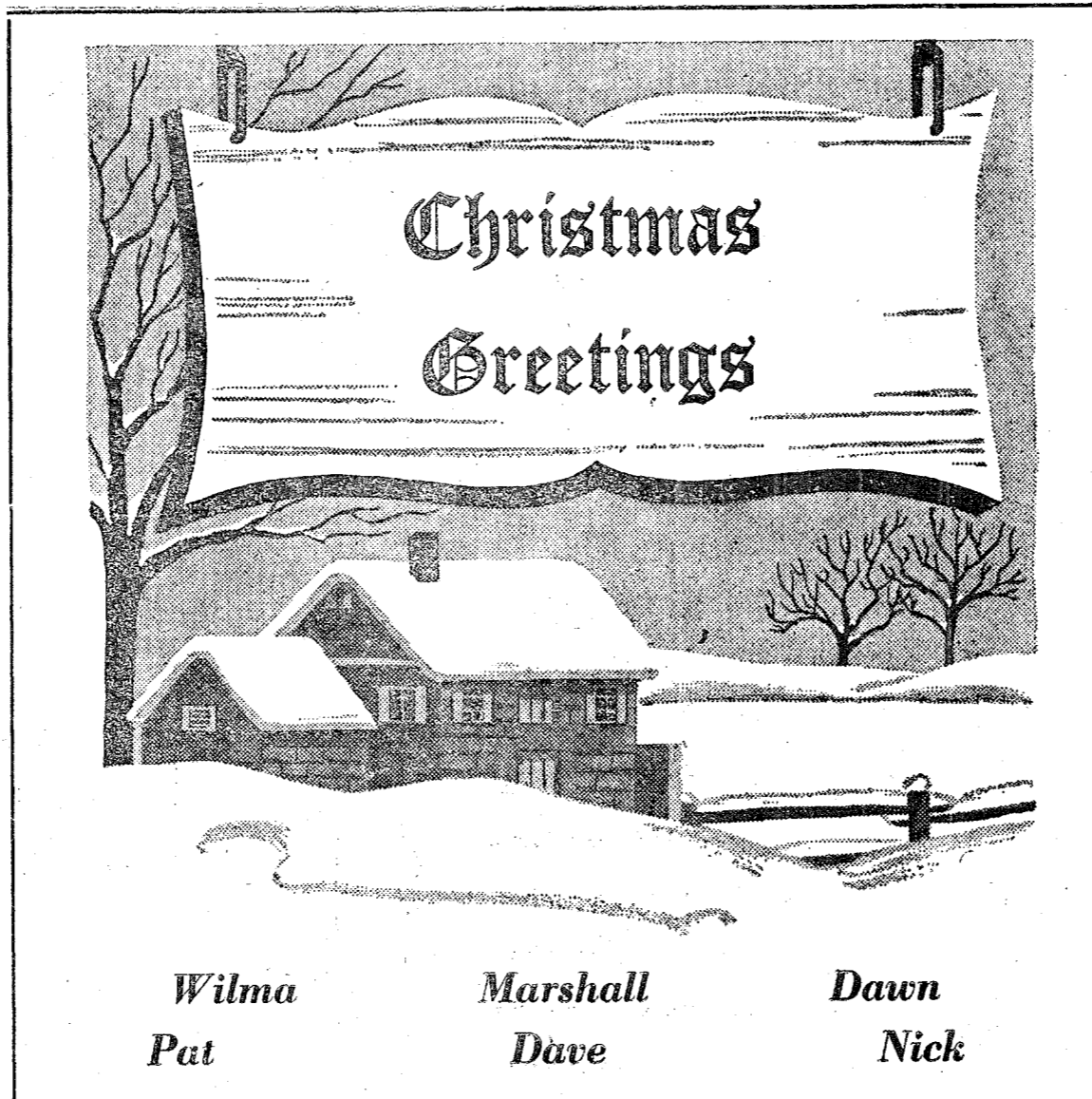
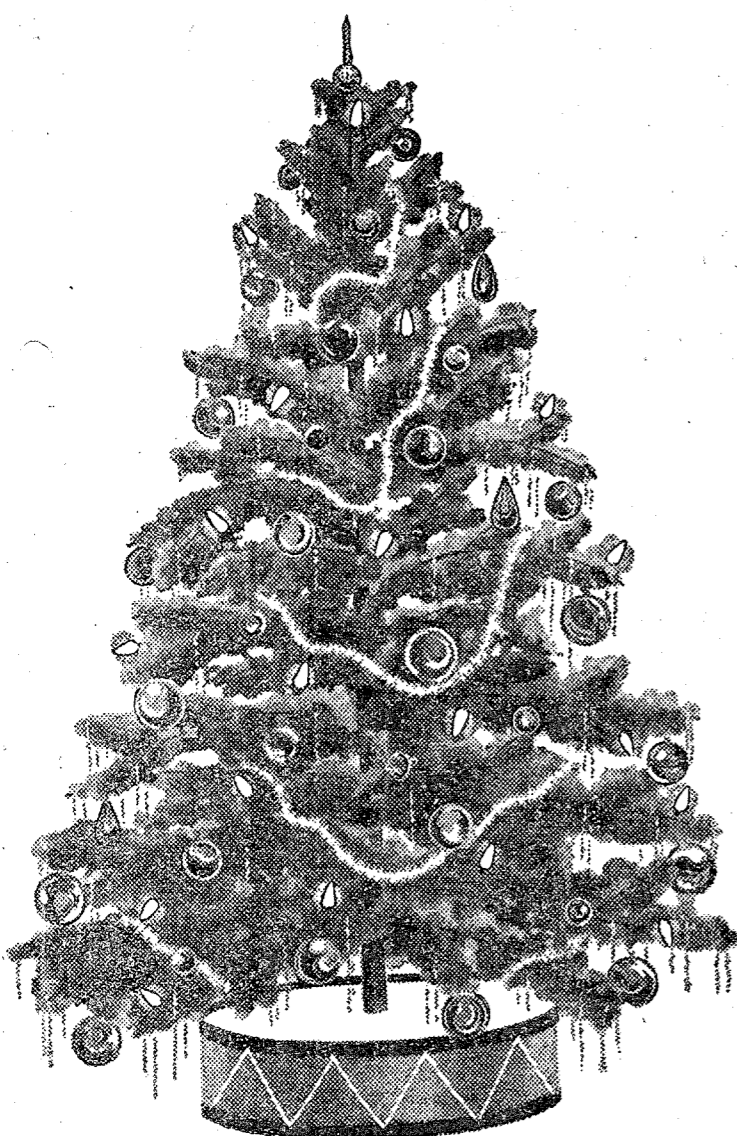

### CHRISTMAS SERMONETTE

### The Comfort Of Christmas

I am sure there will be opportunity for each of us this year and soon to hear somewhere on the radio, the great "Comfort" passages from the 40th chapter of Isaiah, as sung in the now famed oratoria of Handel, "The Messiah." When the tenor soloist reaches for the high and tender notes of the famous recitative, we are all aware of a new and tender experience of God. "Comfort ye, Comfort ye, My people, Saith your God."

Of all the needed messages of the Christmas Season, this is the one which comes to us today with real freshness. We who celebrate Christmas with sincerity, know that the coming of Christ was the means of bringing God's comfort to a weary world such as our own. Certainly, we need to proclaim it to a world in which a large part of the population stands in need today of real comfort. But we need to discern ever so clearly, what is the real comfort that can satisfy the world today.

Part of it, of course is the clothing of people and providing shelter for them, and feeding the hungry mouths. But there is more to it than this. The prophet Isaiah was told to tell the people that "her warfare" was ended. They were not at war, but they had been the spoils of war. They were slaves now.

Today, the miseries of the world are not because of actual warfare as we know it but because we are the spoils of war. Slaves we are to miseries of misunderstandings or the daily battle of just trying to keep going. Its not only inflation, and taxes, juvenile delinquency. Its not simply the bad news on the international scene, or the verdict from the operating room or unpaid bills. Its not just failure in health, the loss of a job, or low grades on exams. Its all of these and their never-ending succession, one on top of the other, torrents of trials and downpours of tribulations that make this life a daily warfare.

The real comfort that comes to us, with such as this for our daily living, is not that God will show us the "way out of it" but that He will show us the "Right way in." And that right way in is with the conscious faith that we do not walk this life alone, forever frustrated, but that there is one who walks beside us, to guide us.

It was not only that her warfare was ceased but also that her iniquity was pardoned. Deep in our hearts we all know how sin wraps its octopus arms around us and drags us under time and again. Deep in our hearts we each know that our selfishness time and again causes us to scorn truth and right and the pleasures of the moment become our downfall. Deep in our hearts we know that for want of courage in our lives we succumb to the sins of our day, not just because we like them, but because we are not strong enough to withstand them. And all of this could become a burden too great for us to bear were it not true, that a great part of the comfort of Christmas comes through the knowledge that our sins can be forgiven.

Here is a man for instance who was a representative from his native land of Czechoslovakia to the United Nations but a few years ago. He was hanged because he confessed some slight deviation from "the people's truth." Suppose that all through life that would be our fate for deviating from God's Truth. Suppose we could NEVER be pardoned.

One of the real issues of our times is whether the gloomy gospel of pardonless guilt of communism will take over the joyous gospel of Christian forgiveness. But Christ will prevail over this gloomy gospel only as each Christian in his heart seeks the assured pardon of God.

This is the place to talk about the "Way out". We are certain that we can never be comfortable with God as long as we insist on taking sin with us. And if we have felt hopeless about our sins, here is the answer. Like the story told of the old Scotch elder, when passing the Communion elements, came to a young girl, whom the whole congregation knew to have sinned, but who had crept back into the church for the comfort she had once known there. She held her head down and started to reach for the bread but withdrew it. Then the wise old Scot said to her, "Take it lassie, it's for sinners. That's it. Christmas is for sinners and that takes in about everybody."

He pardons us. This is the joyous gospel of comfort that God intends for his people.

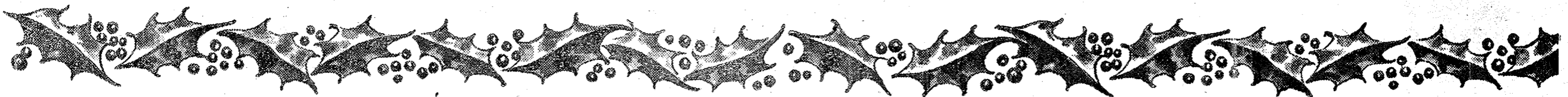
It is my sincerest hope and desire that not alone shall I claim this comfort for myself, knowing it can be true, but that peoples all over the earth shall know it. If we know, others can know. Isn't it time that we were telling this story of comfort?

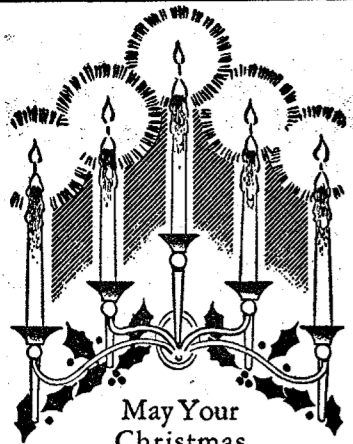
### How 'Silent Night' Christmas Prayer Came Into Being

The time, the day before Christmas Eve, 1818; the place, a tiny mountain village in Austria. The organ of St. Nicholas Church was broken and the organist, Franz Gruber, could not repair it in time for the midnight mass, for which he had planned a musical program. He went to the young parish priest, Joseph Mohr, in distress.

Father Mohr agreed to write words for a simple melody if Gruber would compose one which could be sung to the accompaniment of a guitar, which the organist played. Walking home that cold, clear night after having administered the last rites to a dying woman, the priest gazed upon the heavenly canopy of stars, and the inspiration for the verses came to him. Next day, Gruber set them to music, and "Silent Night, Holy Night" was given to the world.

greenery along the full length of the railing, securing them with florists wire or cord. Then space Christmas cards along the covered railing, wiring them to the branches.

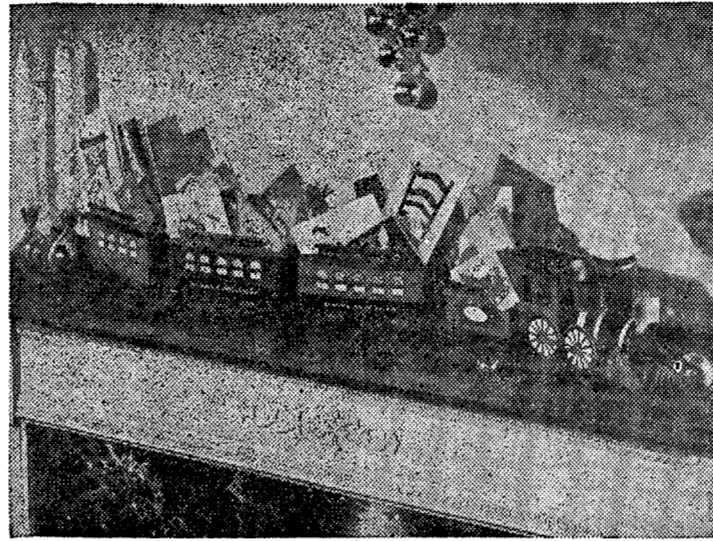

The Christmas cards you receive will say "Season's Greetings" twice if you display them in gay home decorations such as these.

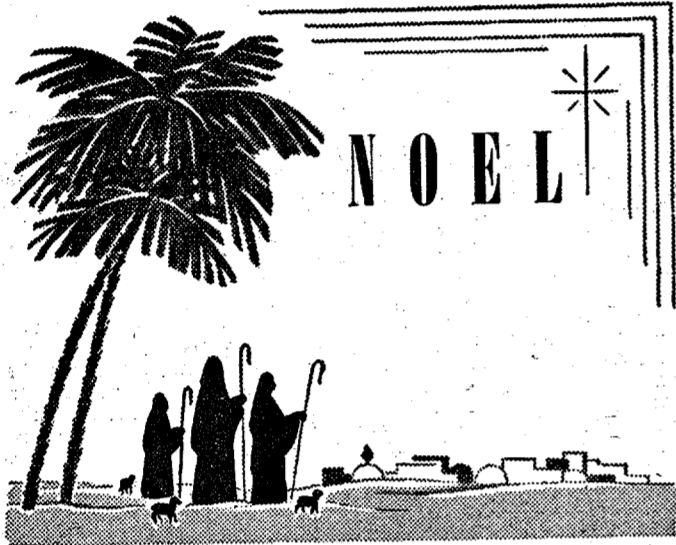

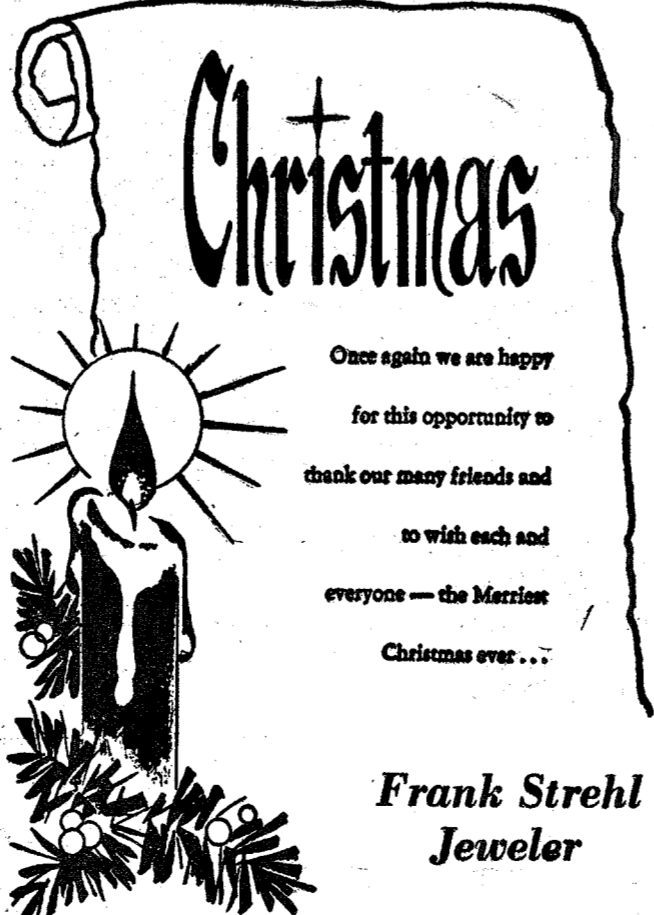

## Warn Against Christmas Tree Fires

The Michigan Department of Health today warned residents to guard against the dangers of Christmas tree fires.

Each year Christmas tree fires are more common than most people realize. Precautions for protecting families from this holiday hazard are:

1. Don't set the tree up too far ahead of time. (This will reduce the chances of it drying out before the holidays are over)
2. Set the tree in a pan or special holder so it can be watered regularly.
3. Before trimming the tree, check over all electrical equipment. Make sure there are no loose connections or bare wires.
4. Place the tree as far away from hot air registers as possible.
5. Always disconnect the tree lights when there is no one around to watch it.

Residents are cautioned against use of glass-ball fire extinguishers which are sold for use on Christmas trees. When tested by the department's occupational health engineers, they failed to put out Christmas tree fires.

## Thin Ice!

Look out for thin ice! Already in this ice fishing season, several drownings and near drownings have been reported.

State fisheries workers urge extreme caution until surface layers of ice have chance to thicken.

The problem is especially dangerous where successive freezes and thaws make a continuing touch-and-go situation.

## Devils Fall To Lancers, But Lead Conference

The East Jordan Red Devils dropped a close thriller on the local court to Class D Ellsworth Tuesday night, 53 to 52.

Although it was the first season loss for the locals it makes no difference in the northern Michigan class C conference standings.

DeYoung of Ellsworth was high point man for the D outfit with 27 points and Danforth was tops for the locals with 16.

Coach Saxton said the Red Devils made 32 percent of their shots for the night.

East Jordan was on top of the C conference today with four wins and no losses. Boyne City, Charlevoix and Pellston are tied for second place with three and one.

All three judges rated the dress shop's window well above other's in the contest.

Al Thorsen, of Thorsen Lumber Company, received second place with a television and appliance window which judges said ranked with the best commercial windows in large cities.

Third place went to Taylor's West Side Grocery where judges felt the excellent lighting arrangement and living room Christmas display were outstanding.

HONORABLE mention went to Jordan Heating and Refrigeration. The three windows mentioned after first place was named, were voted very close. Judges spent about one hour judging the last three.

The judges were: Mrs. John Clark, of the Northern Michigan Electric Company, Boyne City; Walter Martins, Consumers Power Company, Traverse City; and Fenton Bulow, Charlevoix County Clerk, of Charlevoix.

Award money totaling \$50 is given by the State Bank of East Jordan, in \$25, \$15 and \$10 amounts.

Method of judging was given the visitors following a dinner at the Jordan Inn. Attending from East Jordan were: William Grauel, of the State Bank; M. N. McDaniel, of the Temple Theater, representing the East Jordan Businessmen's Association, and Marshall Sayles, of the News-Herald.

The judges were well pleased with the manner in which merchants decorated their windows throughout the city. They commented upon service stations which used small window space to help the spirit of Christmas.

THEY ALSO gave the city of East Jordan a pat on the back for the excellent street decorations and the gaily lighted and well shaped community Christmas tree at the end of Main street.

It was the opinion of the judges that East Jordan merchants are taking more active part in decorating for Christmas than in many northern communities.

The car belonging to Steve Kotowich was taken early Sunday night after it had been parked in front of Eva's Toyland store.

## New Deadline For Filing Petitions

East Jordan voters are reminded that a recent city charter change moves the annual spring primary election to the third Monday in February.

Because of the new primary election date for East Jordan, nominations for the ballot must be filed with the City Clerk's office by January 22nd.

East Jordan will be electing a mayor, aldermen, a justice of the peace, constables and supervisors. The charter change eliminates the usual caucus held here and now supervisors will be nominated by petition.

The charter change came about in order to have East Jordan's primary election fall on the same day that similar elections were held throughout Charlevoix county.

## Federal Tax Date Coming

That Federal tax date is coming up.

January 17th is one due date. That's for final payment of 1954 calendar-year estimated tax by individuals who have previously made declarations.

That's the due date also for full payment of estimated tax for 1954 by farmers who are not filing final returns by the end of January and by individuals (other than farmers) who for the first time are required to make declarations of estimated tax.

That is unless they decide to file a final return for the year and pay all of the unpaid tax on or before the January 17 date.

Farmers may file final return of 1954 income in order to eliminate need for filing January 15 estimate.

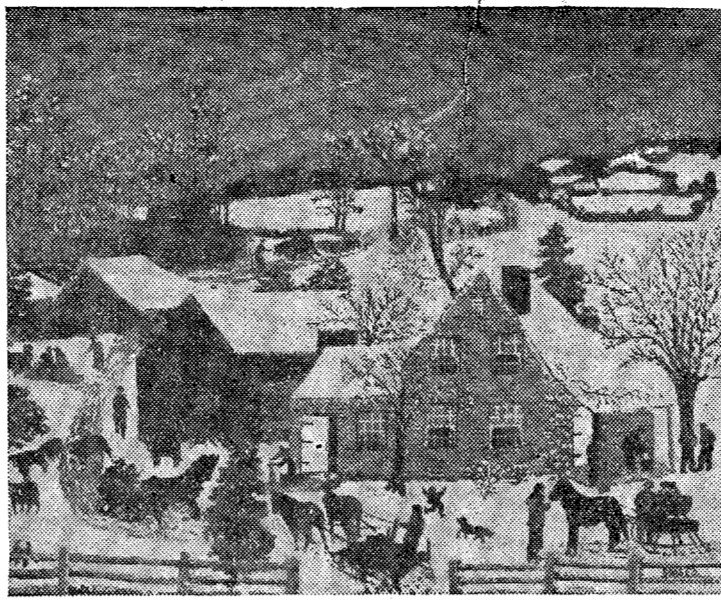

## Grandma Moses at 94 Is A Christmas Tradition

EAGLE BRIDGE, N.Y.—This is Grandma's town. It's really not a town. It's little more than a collection of farms. But grandma has given it fame.

Here in the rolling hills of the Taconic range, 200 miles from New York City, lives Grandma Moses. Her full name is Anna Mary Robertson Moses, but most folks call her Grandma. Some say she's the best-known grandmother — and painter — in the world.

Grandma Moses is a little old lady who sprang from obscurity to fame as a great "primitive"

artist. She was 78 before she started painting seriously. And now, at the age of 94, Grandma Moses is a Christmas tradition.

No other artist's work has achieved such popularity at Christmas time as hers. For some eight years Hallmark Cards has published Grandma's works as Christmas cards, and each year their popularity is greater than before.

"There seems to be complete understanding between Grandma Moses and Christmas—similar to that enjoyed by Charles Dickens, and by Washington Irving," a friend and neighbor said recently.

"She has unerring taste for subjects and scenes that appeal to every age."

Grandma painted four new canvases for Christmas cards this year. They're panoramic scenes of the countryside in upper New York state, a land she has known and loved most of her life. Some show the chores and activities of farm life. Others feature popular rural customs.

Grandma is a poetess, as well as an artist. She recently wrote: "Oh what joy and pleasure as we get together, to go for the Christmas tree; what aircastles we build as we slide down the hill; who can rebuild what we see on that Christmas tree."

Few but Grandma Moses have been able to rebuild, with such purity and beauty, what they saw on the Christmas tree.

Norris Co., Morris Auto Supply, Cadillac; R & L Auto Electric Service, Petoskey; A & A Service, Manistee; Reliable Distributing Co., Ludington; and Electric Service Supply, Alpena; Most of these concerns operate branches in other northern Michigan cities.

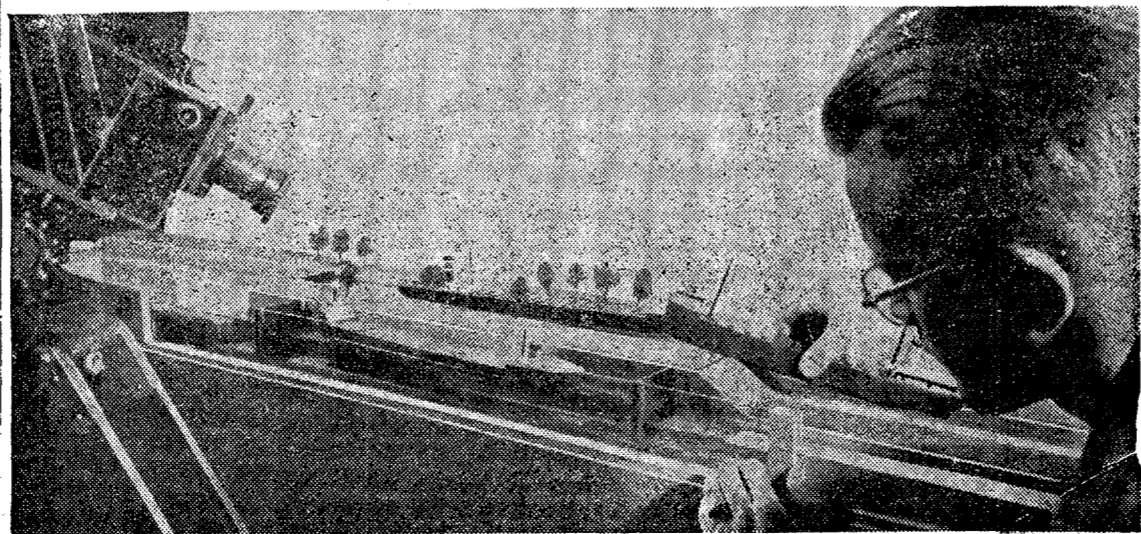

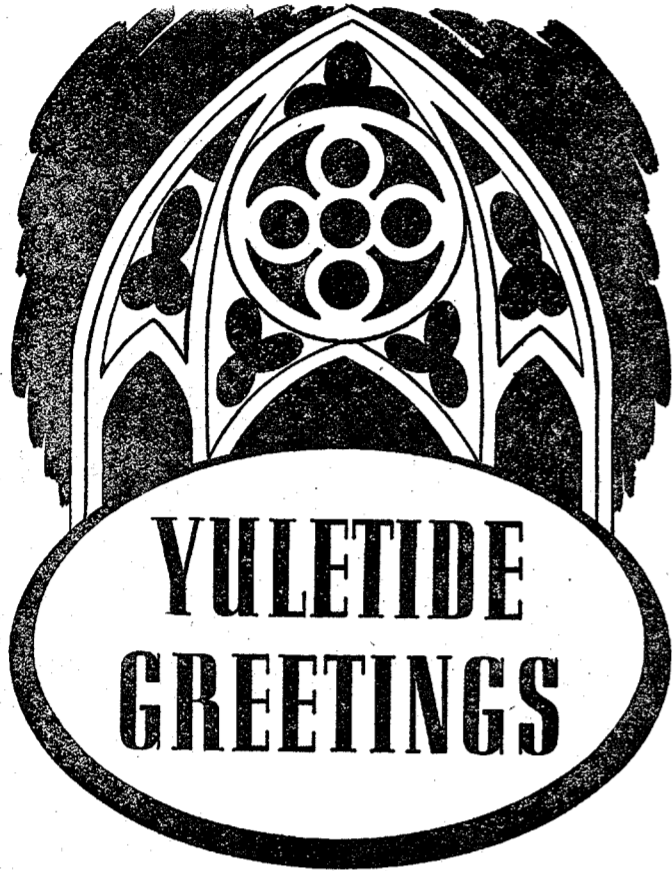
Each year the best photos

### First TB Seal Sold In 1907

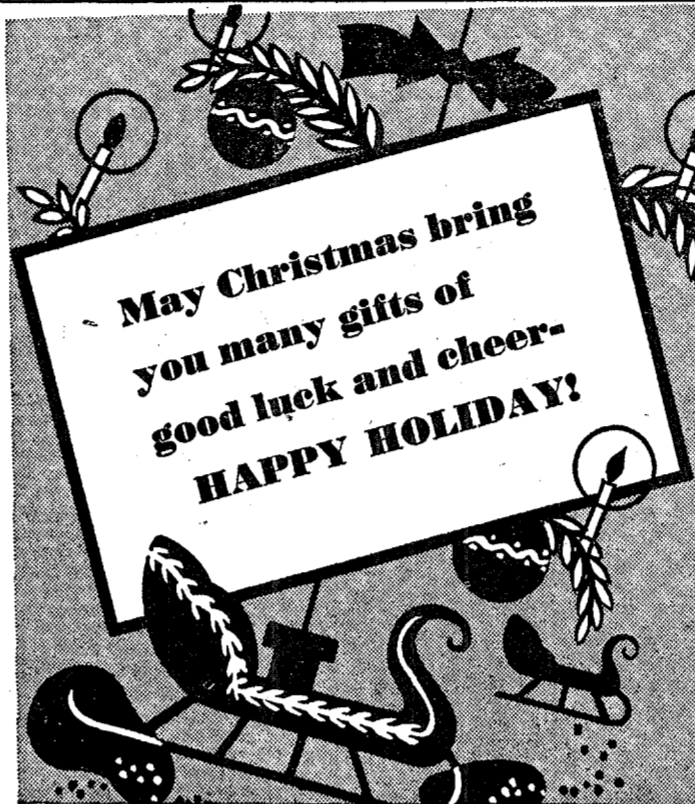
Leafing through old newspaper files shows a march of exciting and many times heart-warming stories have come out during past Christmas seasons. One of the best is brought to mind in connection with the Christmas Seal Sale of the Michigan TB Association.

Actually, the story broke in the Philadelphia North American on Friday, Dec. 13, 1907. On one of the inside pages of the "North American" was this quiet phrased paragraph:

"If you got a letter from Wilmington, Del., yesterday, it's likely that there was one stamp more on it than was needed to pay Uncle Sam for the carrying—not a sure enough postage stamp, but a "Merry Christmas" one like this picture." Printed beside those few lines was a reproduction of the first American TB Christmas Seal.

Since that time, the TB association says Christmas Seals have helped save an estimated 6,000,000 American lives from TB—a mission which will be continued next through your 1954 Christmas Seal contribution. So the small story, even though it appeared on Friday, the 13th, grew into a dynamic voluntary campaign.

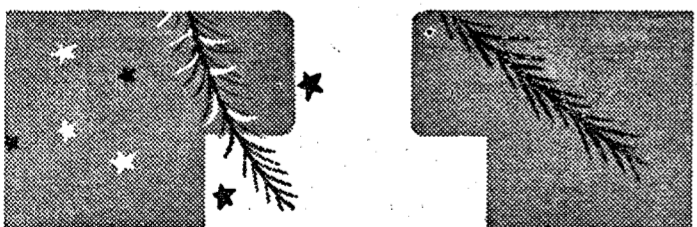

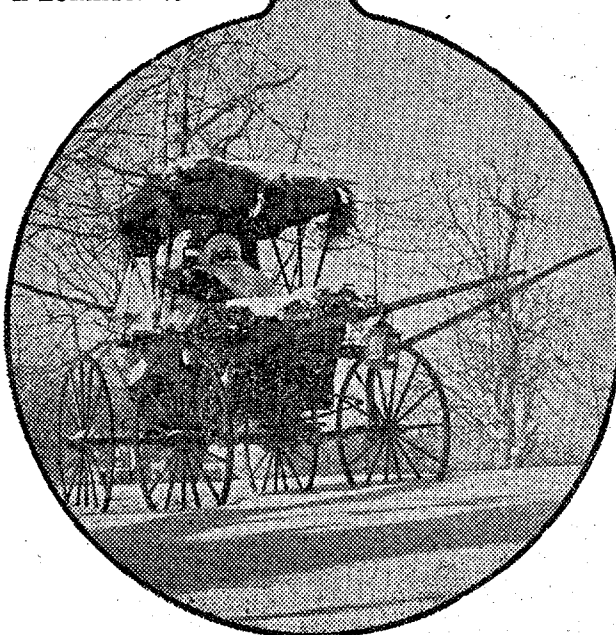

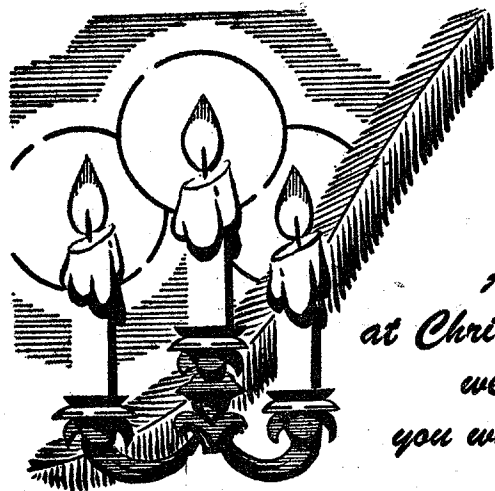

**Make A Holiday Cookie Sleigh!**



A new holiday idea that will delight the youngsters in your family is a fun-to-make Christmas decoration that can also double as a fun-to-eat Christmas dessert! Here's how the small-fry can make it:

**Sunshine Holiday Cookie Sleigh**

- 3 tablespoons soft butter or margarine
- 2 cups sifted confectioner's sugar
- Milk
- 4 boxes Clover Leaves
- 1 package Hydrox cookies
- 2 18-inch candy or plastic canes

Empty 1-lb. Sunshine cookie assortment box (about 11 1/2 by 5 by 2 in.) Make a simple butter frosting by combining butter, sugar and enough milk for spreading. This serves as "cement" to hold cookies in place. Build sleigh inside of empty box, which serves as temporary outside framework for first row of cookies. Follow these easy steps:

- (1) Cement together 2 vanilla Clover Leaves, sandwich style. Repeat with 2 chocolate Clover Leaves. Stand these double-thick "bricks" all around inside of box, alternating light and dark bricks. Also cement with frosting between bricks. You will have 3 dark and 3 light bricks along each side of box, and 2 1/2 bricks standing against each end, cemented along all edges.
- (2) For second row, cement bricks alternately light above dark in checkerboard pattern. Omit fourth brick on each long side of box to make door to sleigh. Cut bricks next to this opening diagonally as shown, to form doorway. Cement each in place.
- (3) The body of the sleigh is now complete. At the rear of sleigh where seat is made by stacking Clover Leaves, cement third row of bricks in checkerboard pattern, cutting bricks near opening diagonally as shown. Trim top edge of sleigh along front and sides with halved round Hydrox Cookies.
- (4) Let sleigh stand overnight to harden cement. With a sharp knife, cut away all 4 sides of the box, leaving only the bottom in place.
- (5) Fasten sleigh to candy or plastic runners (parallel under sleigh 2 inches apart) with 3-inch strips of adhesive tape. Fill sleigh with cookies or small Christmas gifts. And don't forget to put a Santa in the driver's seat!

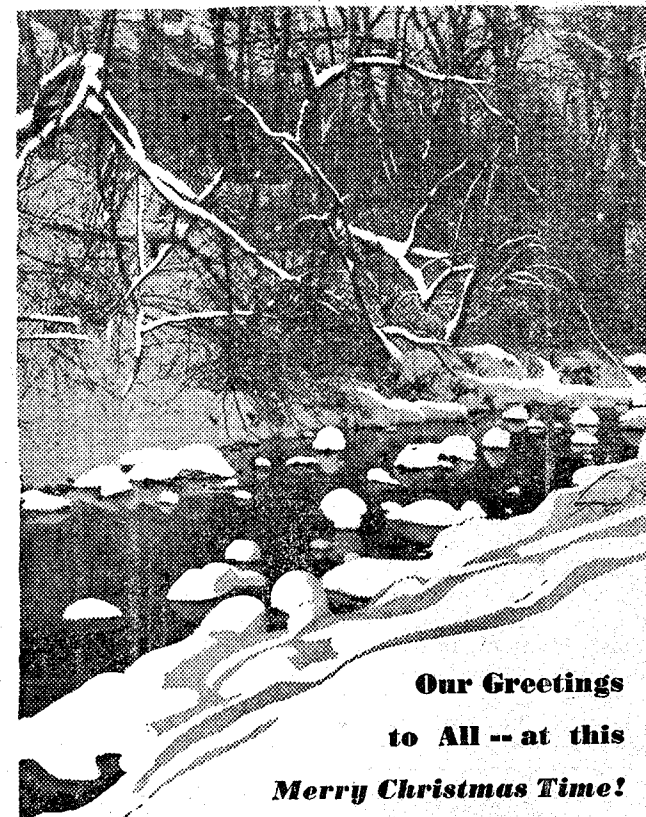

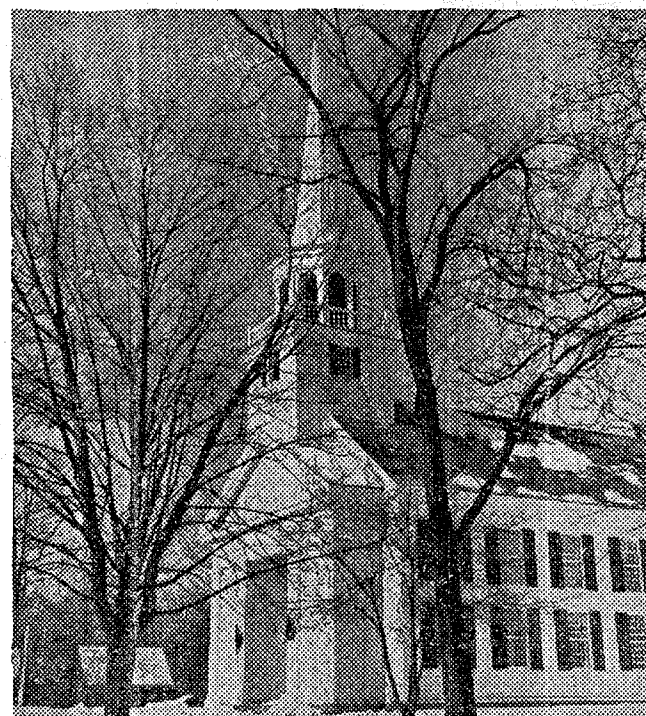

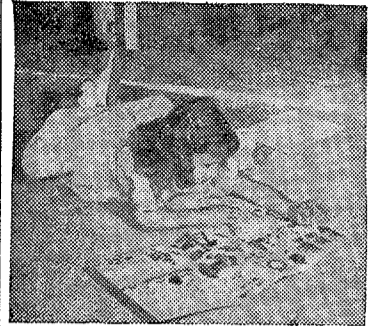

Advent cards enhance a child's Christmas, teach its meaning.



## Santa Claus Plan For Lawn or Roof

A Santa Claus on your roof or lawn is just what you need to keep the family right on top of Christmas. Here's one that's simple and economical to make and it requires a minimum of cutting.

Designed by Pat and Jerry Gropp for construction from just one panel of 3 x 4-foot exterior fir plywood with waterproof glue, it's a do-it-yourself Christmas display item you should be able to accomplish in a weekend.

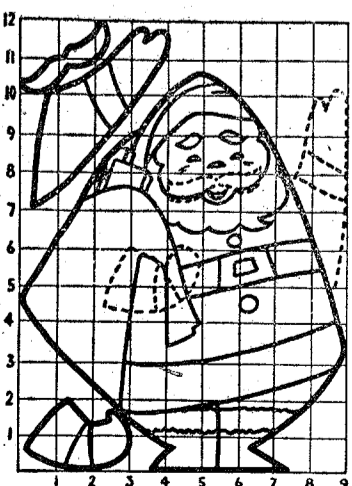
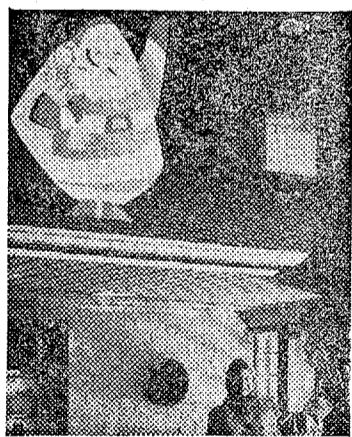
### DRAW GRID

To make a cut-out like this, simply draw a grid with lines 4" apart as shown in the plan sketch. You don't need any special artistic talent to draw the full-size figure on the plywood. Just make the design lines cross the full-size grid at the same points shown in the plan drawing.

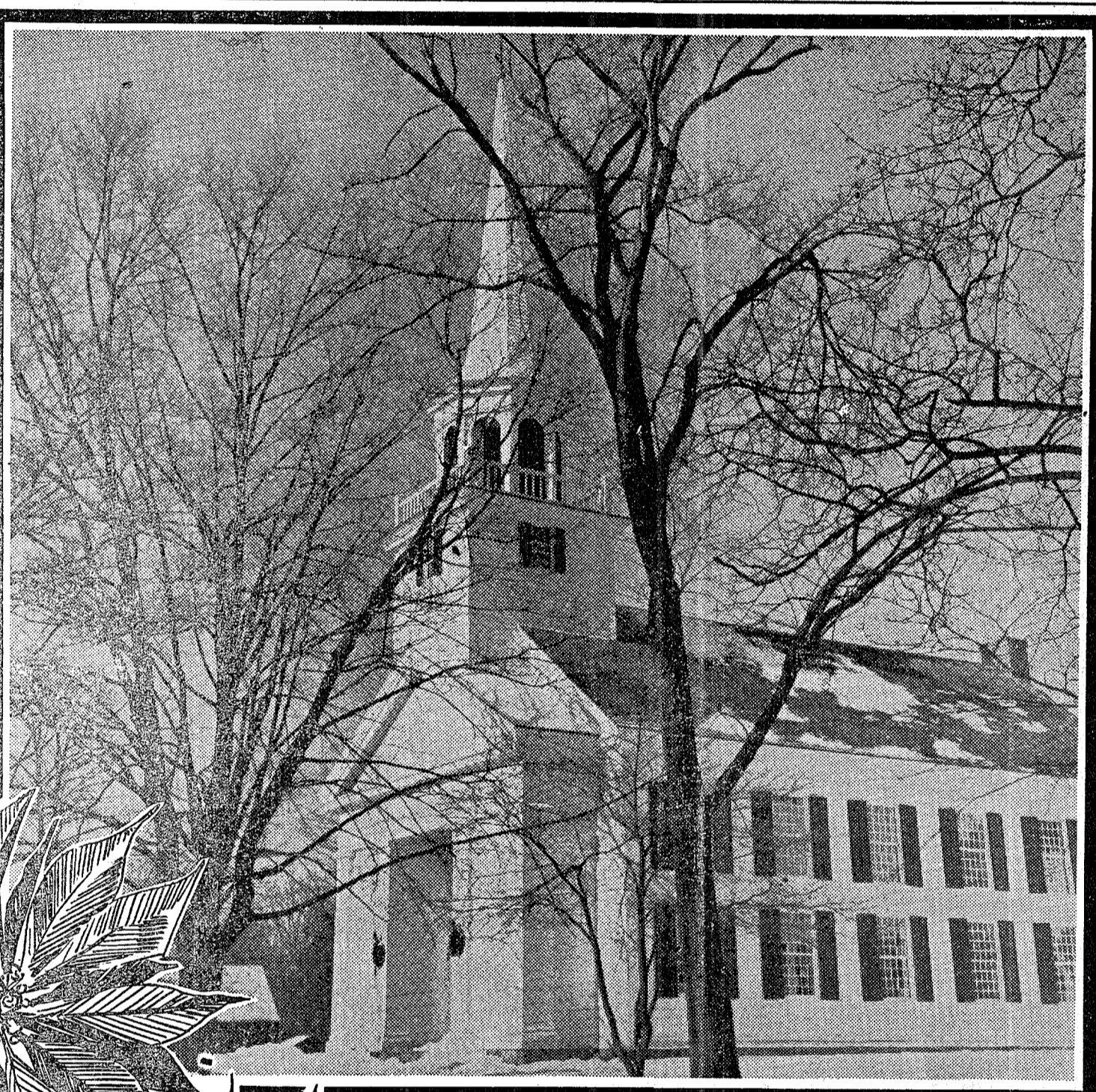

When the figure is cut out attach the separate parts where they belong as shown by the dotted lines.

### SEAL EDGES

To finish the figure, daub the edges of the plywood with a heavy mixture of white lead and oil. Prime both sides of the figure and then paint the design with bright contrasting colors. Use a good exterior house or trim paint and use a flat finish paint if you wish to reduce glare from floodlighting.




SANTA CLAUS figure is simple to make with fir plywood. Use 1/2" panel and draw lines for grid 4" apart. Keyhole saw is good enough to do the job.

A Small House Look Larger**



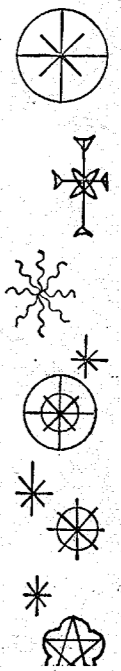
Smaller houses really come in to their own at Christmas. If you've ever wished you could make your house look a little larger, then do it with Christmas lights this season.

Naturally there's some expert reasoning behind such thinking but, even a quick glance at the pictures will show how the illusion is gained.

Secret, according to General Electric's George Howard, holiday lighting specialist, is to use the tiny new C-7½ bulbs in outdoor strings. These tiny jewel-like bulbs which are in perfect features may be placed about four inches apart for a jewel-studded effect. Actually, close placement creates the illusion of a continuous solid line of light which makes the house seem larger. Easy way to do this is with pin-type sockets which can be placed wherever wanted on the wire.

In the picture window indoor Christmas tree lights are "scattered" against a flameproof midnight blue crepe paper sky. Lighted twin choir singers, 18 inches high and made of red and white plastic, "sing" from a Noel hymn book. Stars which are small aluminum frozen pie tins pinched into five points and inserted over bulb sockets, are held in place with fine wire.

A large red and white translucent rope-twist candle adds a welcome at the doorway. Blue and white lighted bells are hung from the center lock on the inside of the other front window.

## Christmas Symbols Stem From Ancient Legends

The symbols of the Christmas season, now steeped in tradition, had their origin in ancient legends that have survived for centuries. According to researchers for Hallmark Cards, on which many of them appear each Yuletide, each symbol has a story behind it.

The bell, ancient legend states, became a Yuletide ornament because all the earth's rang in celebration of the birth of Christ on that first Christmas morn. Decorating the Christmas tree with gay ornaments is said to stem from an old legend of how trees of the Holy Land blossomed and bore fruit on the

night of the Nativity.

Christmas candles are symbolic of the Star of Bethlehem and of enlightenment. Centuries ago, the English and the Irish lit great Yuletide candles nightly in homes and churches from Christmas until Twelfth Night. The first Christmas tree was said to have been cut and brought indoors by Martin Luther early in the 16th century.

The story of the poinsettia comes from Mexico. A Mexican child was saddened because she had no flowers to lay at the creche in her church. 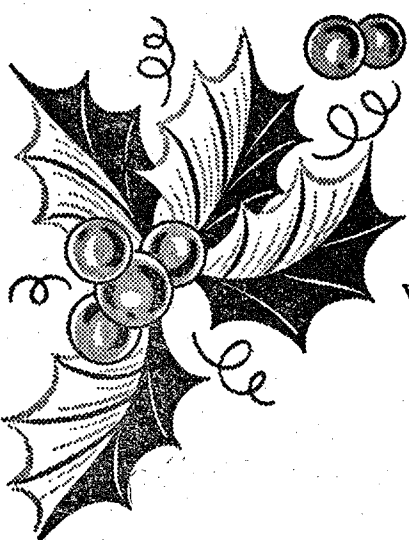

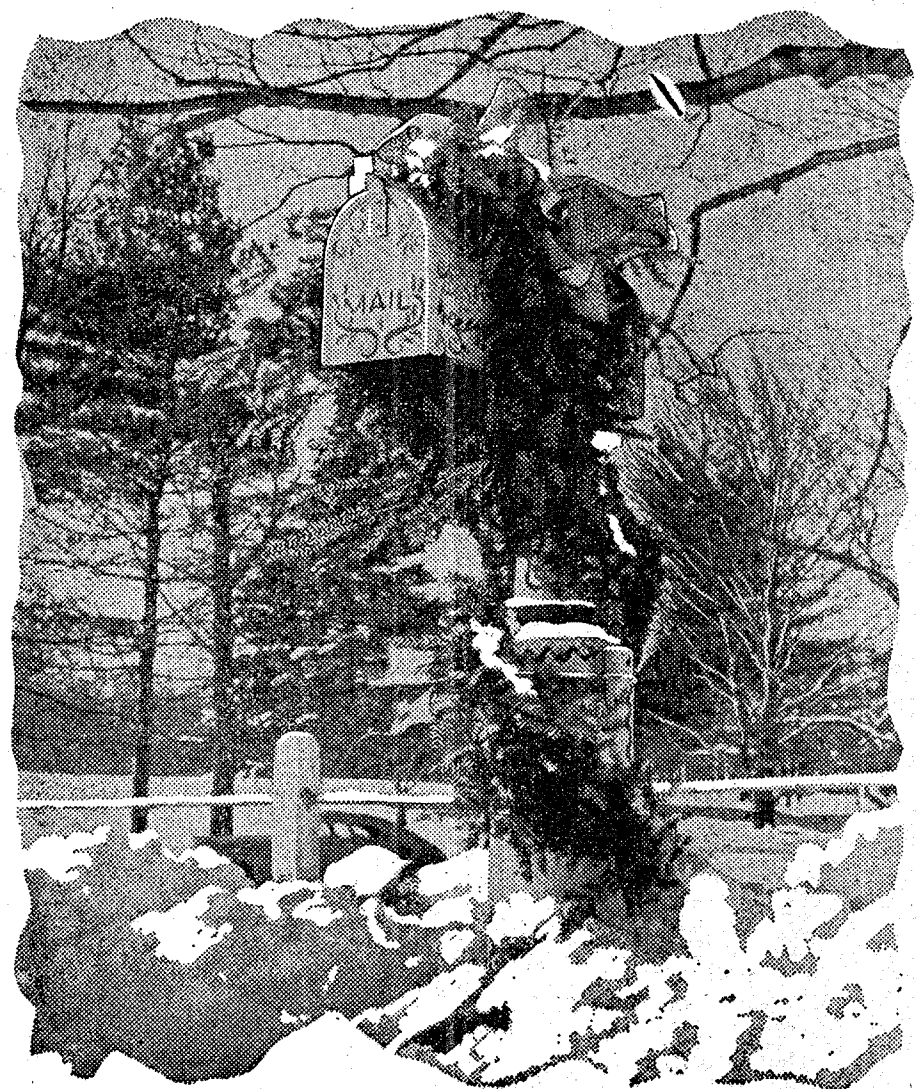

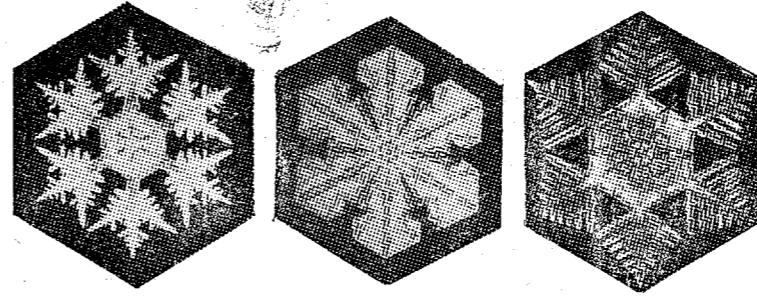

At the upper right is Bartholome Murillo's "The Little Conception," which was painted in

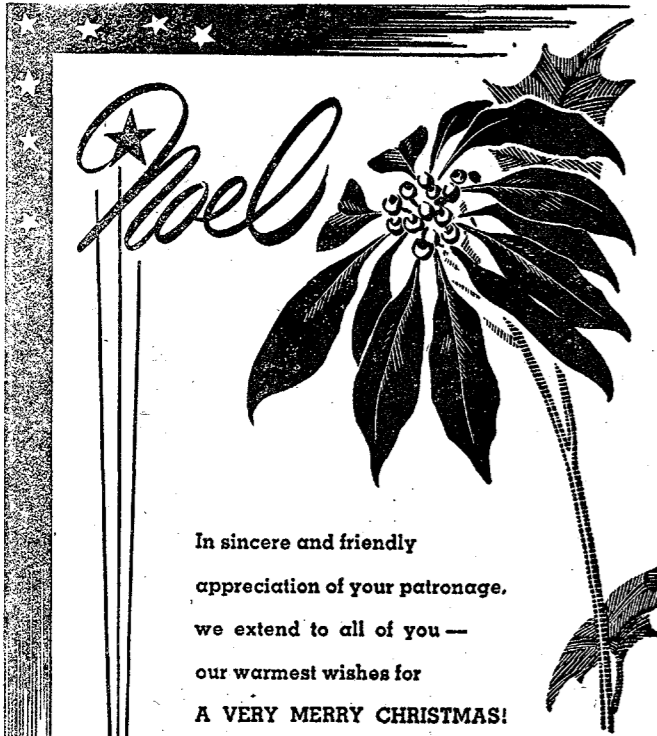

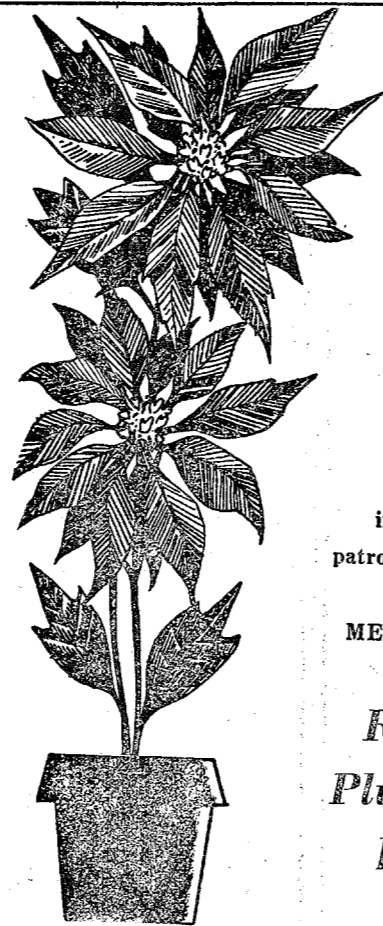
Six-Sided Snowflakes Lend Beauty To Winter

Snowflakes float down to earth in an almost unlimited number of shapes, according to Lewis S. Ramsdell, University of Michigan mineralogy professor. The flakes form freely from water vapor in the air and usually take some variety of a six-sided star, such as those above. The lace-like patterns, he says, happen because the water vapor contains so little of the crystallizing material needed to fill out the design.

Here are a few photographic tips which Don Mohler, General Electric photographic lighting specialist suggests you keep in mind when taking holiday pictures.

First, no handheld snapshots! Even at F-2 it takes 1-25th of a second for color snapshots—too slow a speed for rock steady results. Always use a tripod even with fast black and white film. Also remember that color always needs about four times as much exposure as black and white.

Weather is a real factor as you plan ahead for outdoor shots after dark in winter. Below freezing temperatures slow down shutters. Play safe and make a time exposure running from one to 15 seconds or longer and a cold, slow-working shutter will not be nearly so much a factor as at snapshot speeds. Don't forget to wait for snow to enhance the scene you want to shoot.

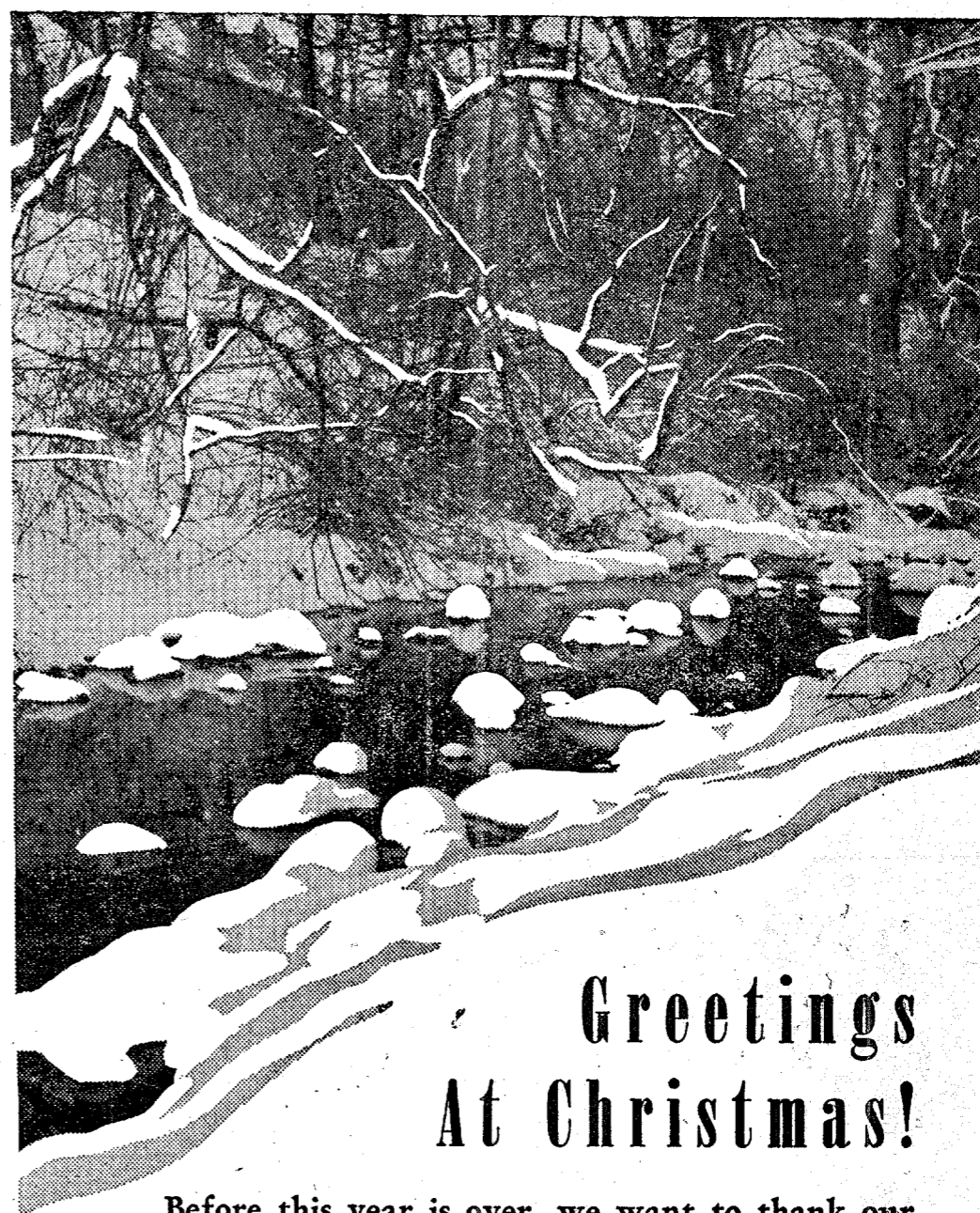
Time of day can make or break a picture. When shooting a

decorated home or building you don't want to lose the outline and you may even want some tone or color in the sky. Get set up by sundown and shoot while there is still some glow in the sky and keep shooting until dark. With camera locked to tripod, all views will be the same only the lighting effect will be varied.

You may also want to try firing a flash during one of the exposures at dusk and another after dark. Work around F-4.5 or larger about 15 to 30 feet from your subject. In color a basic exposure would be three to four seconds at F-4.5 or 60 seconds at F-16.

Wind can also be another hazard. When lights and decorations are moving, they can often ruin a time exposure. If possible try to shoot outdoor pictures on a still night.

When taking outdoor movies, your best recourse, advises Mr. Mohler, is to give your movie camera all the exposure you can and to shoot as early in the evening as decorations are lighted. Put your movie camera on a tripod—open the lens wide—F-1.4—F-2.8—F-3.5. Also, if you can, slow your camera down to eight frames per second.

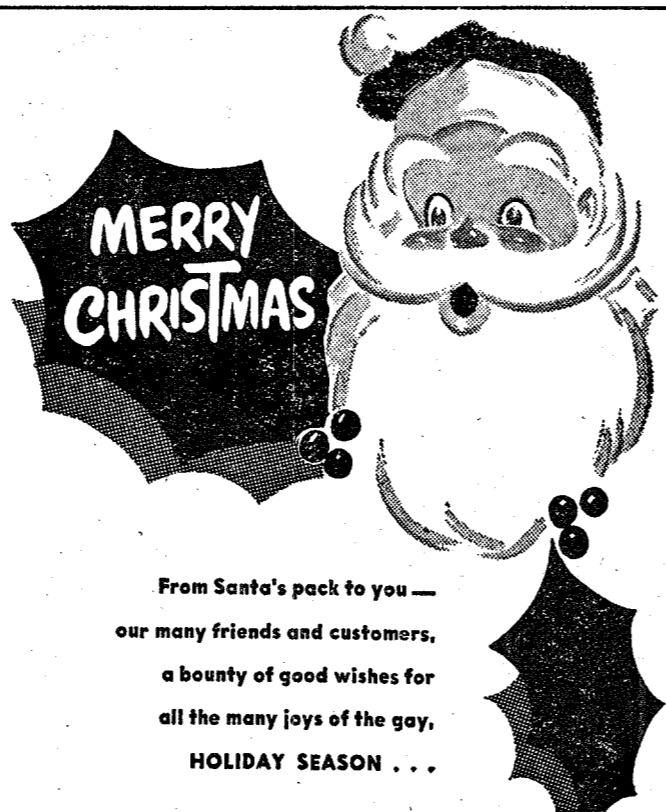

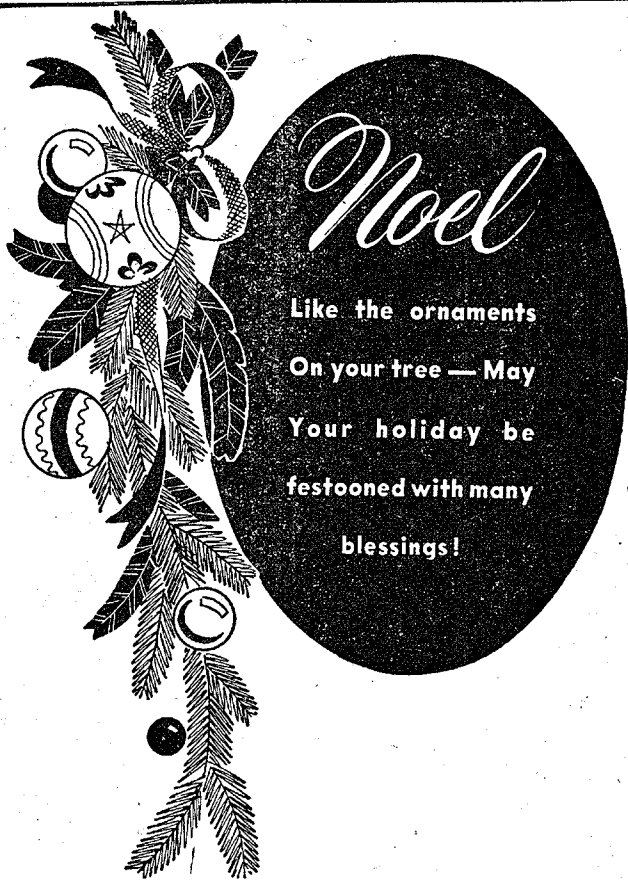

### Yule Card Custom Began 1846

The Christmas card idea you will carry on this year had its origin just over 100 years ago in Victorian London. There, a middle-class Englishman named Henry Cole commissioned artist John Calcott Horsley of the Royal Academy to paint an illustration for a greeting which he sent to 1,000 friends. The cards depicted a Victorian family at the festive board and the traditional Yuletide customs of giving to the poor. They also bore the now - classic greeting: "A Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year to You."

By the 1870's a German lithographer who had immigrated to Boston began producing Christmas cards that were such masterpieces of reproduction that experts marvel even now at their color and quality. In a brief span of 20 years, Louis Prang started a trend which continues today in reproducing art masterpieces as Christmas greetings.

For example, famous canvases of the Madonna and Child by such artists as Murillo and Van Cleve have been reproduced this year by Hallmark Cards. Fine contemporary art is also widely used, with work by such painters as Sir Winston Churchill, Grandma Moses, Streeter Blair, Edmund Lewandowski and other Americans and Europeans.

Although today's Christmas greetings bear little resemblance to the cards sent by Henry Cole in 1846, one element has remained almost unchanged. Hardly a one fails to repeat his message: "A Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year to You."
