

The News-Herald ran two full pages containing news and pictures of East Jordan's high school graduating class. The American Legion announced plans for Memorial Day. East Jordan's summer recreation program was announced by Gayle Saxton.

East Jordan's 7-acre tourist park enjoyed its biggest summer with 41trailers registered from eight states in one day. Mount Clemens Metal Products Company held open house for public inspection of the new factory. East Jordan residents launched a city-wide celebration for the return of Queen Marian Danforth from her trip in Chicago. The East Jordan and Southern Railroad expressed concern over declining use of the local road. Charlevoix county welfare rolls hit \$1,300 per day. The Petoskey Cement plant was reported sold Boat races here drew 40 entries from northern Michigan. There was much speculation over future use of the county fair grounds. Services were held for Addie Barber. The merchant's association was working with new industrial prospects.

SEPTEMBER Governor William's speech at the county fairgrounds drew 2,000 listeners. More than 1,000 persons attended boat races here the same day.
