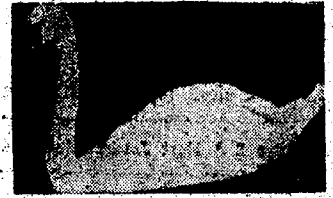

#### Polio Swim Program Underway

Swim for polio will start at Boyne Mountain's swimming pool Monday. Those wanting to swim in the outdoor swimming pool may pay \$1.00 and also get a chance to vote for a queen at Boyne Mountain.

East Jordan March of Dimes Chairman Alex Sinclair said Wednesday that the swim project will run each Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday through January. Money received at the pool will go to the polio fund, Sinclair said.

It is expected that East Jordan will enter a girl in the polio swim queen contest.

Also committed to aid the local polio drive is the East Jordan Rotary which voted Tuesday to volunteer help.

The club sponsors a local pancake for polio supper and members volunteer to help in the drive throughout the community.

#### Council Discusses Radio

The city council Tuesday night discussed the possibility of installing a two-way radio system in the police car. The council received a request from Charlevoix to "hook" in on a county police radio set up whereby Charlevoix, Boyne City and East Jordan police would be connected by radio.

The will of a 78-year old East Jordan farmer who died December 30, apparently leaving only one survivor, bequeaths an estate valued at about \$40,000 to charity and orders the burning of United States bonds with the apparent intention of saving the government money, according to a will filed Monday with Probate Judge Floyd Supp.

Frank H. Foote, a native of Nora, Ill., and a resident of South Arm township, the last 30 years died December 30, 1954, at Charlevoix hospital after a brief illness.

Older residents and close friends of Frank Foote said Wednesday that he came to Charlevoix county 45 years ago. Foote was first engaged at Charlevoix as a bookkeeper and shortly after purchased the farm on M-66. It was said that he lived in a tent on the land until he constructed the present home.

It was said that Foote was formerly a Chicago bookkeeper who left for the north and went into seclusion following a Chicago girl's refusal to marry him. Many believed he was a certified public accountant, but he always denied it.

His will, dated Feb. 17, 1950 was witnessed by a local physician and a dentist and is "in perfect legal order," according to Judge Supp. It provides that a sister, Mrs. Minnie Gibson, 86, of Meadville, Miss., receive the income from industrial securities on deposit in the State Bank of East Jordan the securities themselves to become the property of the Red Cross. The income, too, reverts to the Red Cross after the death of Mrs. Gibson.

#### FARM GOES TO MSC

The will specifies that Foote's 30-acre fruit farm, which he had operated single-handedly for the most part, be offered to Michigan State college for afforestation or experimental purposes.

If the college refuses the property, the farm is to go to Charlevoix hospital, the will provides.

The document also instructs that government bonds locked "in a trunk" at the farm "be burned, and the debt represented canceled." Foote also ordered that his five shares of stock in East Jordan Cooperative Company be burned and that obligation, too, be canceled.

Judge Supp said "If more people would do this (burn government bonds) the nation would be out of debt in no time."

#### MUST CHECK VALUE

The judge explained the monetary value of the various securities apparently owned by Foote will not be known until his deposit box at the bank is opened.

This will be done when an heir or legatee files suit to have the will probated, Judge Supp said. If this is not done within 60 days a creditor may seek the writ. Only known creditor, however is Watson funeral home which took care of the funeral arrangements.

A large collection of books was left to East Jordan Public Library, or if refused, to the Charlevoix city library.

In a further proviso, Foote ordered:

"It is my wish that my body go to the nearest medical school that wants it. If none does, and anybody insists on giving me a conventional funeral, my executor is authorized to reimburse him for his trouble and expense, using therefore cash in bank or selling some of the industrial securities herein above referred to. This clause applies also to the expenses of administration and

to doctors' bills. If any, should there be a cash balance left, it is to go to the Charlevoix hospital.

#### LOCKS UP HOME

Judge Supp ordered Police Chief Harry Stansons to take a routine check of the Foote farm home Monday and then lock it until such time as some action on the will is started.

Foote's neighbors described him as a retiring man who had a few very close friends, among whom were the witnesses to his will. A bachelor, he was said to have been an evidently well-educated man, although he was noticeably reticent about his past.

His only known affiliation was with Rock Elm Grange of South Arm township.

Funeral services were held December 31 at Watson funeral home. They were conducted by Rev. Edward O. DeLaven, pastor of East Jordan Presbyterian church.

The body was shipped to the University of Michigan medical school the next day.

#### City Politics Are Quiet

East Jordan politics were quiet Wednesday with only two petitions filed, taken out at the January 21st filing deadline neared.

According to the clerk's office a petition for Barney Milstein for supervisor from the third ward and a petition for Joseph Wilkins for constable for the third ward were the only ones taken out up to Wednesday.

The city must elect a Mayor, justice of peace, aldermen, constables and supervisors. The new primary election date for East Jordan is February 21, 1955. This was brought about by a change in the city charter.

If petitions are not filed for city offices before January 21st, those wishing to run after that date must run on slips it was said.

### Rotary Club, City Council Talk About Local Ice Rink

#### Bridge Talk Scheduled For East Jordan

Lawrence A. Rubin, secretary of the Mackinac Bridge Authority, will deliver an address at the East Jordan high school 8 p.m., January 31st.

Rubin will be the main speaker at the annual meeting of the Charlevoix Soil Conservation District scheduled for that time.

The speaker will present an illustrated lecture entitled, "Construction Progress on the Mackinac Bridge."

Ed Rebnan, secretary of the district soil group, said:

"All of us are keenly interested in this great undertaking of the construction of the Mackinac bridge. I am sure that everyone will find this meeting both educational and enjoyable."

The board of directors of the conservation district is inviting the public to hear the Mackinac Bridge story. There will be no charge.

#### Winter Ferry Schedule Starts

Winter Schedule of the Michigan State Ferries across the Straits of Mackinac, between St. Ignace and Mackinaw City, is now in effect.

The new schedule will be in effect until April 20, depending on ice conditions in the Straits at that time and when it will be possible to use boats other than the icebreaker Motorship Vacationland.

On the Winter Schedule, the Vacationland leaves Mackinaw City every two hours, beginning at 5 a.m. with the last boat at 11 p.m. Boats leave St. Ignace every two hours, beginning at 6 a.m. with the last boat at 12 midnight.

Members of the East Jordan Rotary Club Tuesday discussed the need for an ice skating rink in the city with several suggestions on location and maintenance.

Three possible locations were discussed: The area near the school building, the city athletic field on the west side; and an indoor rink in the room behind the post office.

President Keith Annear cited the need for an ice rink with the hope that the club might stimulate interest among other organizations and individuals.

It was pointed out that in the past up to \$400 has been spent to maintain a rink at the school. It was also said that about 20 days of good ice skating is all that can be expected during the winter.

Members discussed the advisability of using the west side athletic field with the thought that both educational and lights might be provided.

IT WAS suggested by Ted Malpass that the club and other groups consider the possibility of installing an indoor rink in the city building behind the post office.

President Annear appointed a committee to study the possibility of a rink and to advise the club upon the findings. The committee consists of Ted Malpass, Bill Porter and Percy Penfold.

Annear appeared before the city council Tuesday night to discuss possible use of the city building as an indoor rink.

Mayor Taylor appointed Harry Simmons and Dan Bennett to experiment with a part of the community building floor and see if it could be used for a rink.

If it is possible to use the building for an indoor rink, it was felt by the council that a rink might be installed there for next winter's skating.

The Charlevoix county board of supervisors Wednesday were taking action to sell the Charlevoix county fairgrounds to the East Jordan board of education.

Clarence Meggison, chairman of the supervisors buildings and grounds committee, told the News-Herald Wednesday that the supervisors turned the proposition over to his committee.

Meggison said the prosecutor was asked to draw up a resolution to complete the sale and to name proper parties who must sign the deed.

The resolution obtained by the committee must be presented to the entire board and voted upon, Meggison said.

It was also said that a proposal for bids must be prepared to offer fairground buildings for sale which are not wanted by the East Jordan board of education.

THE LOCAL school some time ago deposited a \$1,000 check with the county clerk as good faith of their intention to purchase the grounds for an athletic field.

Meggison said the deal would probably be completed by Thursday since it looked like all of the supervisors were in favor of selling the grounds to the school for athletic purposes.

#### Red Devils Face Gaylord Friday Night

Coach Saxton's Red Devil five will host the Gaylord Blue Devils at the local gym Friday night.

The East Jordan outfit will be defending their season's record of no defeats in class C competition. The locals ended play before the holidays with four wins and no losses which left them ahead in the northern C loop.

Charlevoix will visit Pellston and Boyne City will travel to Harbor Springs and Mancelona will attempt to down Grayling on the southern court.

Big threats in northern C play this season are Charlevoix, East Jordan, Pellston and Boyne City. Other schools have instilled less fear in their opponents so far.

The teams are settling down to the last half of the basketball season, which will wind up in two months with district tournaments.

#### New Law Requires Mud Guards

Truck operators are reminded by State Police that the new law requiring mud guards or similar equipment on their vehicles went into effect January 1.

The law was enacted at the last session of the legislature. Every commercial vehicle and every combination of a commercial vehicle and trailer or of a truck tractor and semi-trailer when used on a highway shall be so constructed or equipped, or so operated, as to prevent water or other road surface substances from being thrown from the rear wheels.

#### Road Work

### Sheriff Rose Takes Over, Appoints County Deputies

Charlevoix county's first new sheriff in 22 years took office January 1st after naming an under sheriff and deputies around the county.

Glenn Rose, of Charlevoix, elected to the sheriff's office in the November balloting is the first new man to take over the county's highest police post since January 1, 1933.

He replaces a man who was so well liked throughout the county that he could not be beaten at the polls for 22 years straight. That was Floyd Ikons, who decided not to run for reelection last November.

Ikons and his wife, who served as matron at the county jail, are moving to a new house at 117 Antrim street in Charlevoix.

Sheriff Rose picked Claude Pearsall, of East Jordan, as his under sheriff. Pearsall is not a new man in public life. He has been a member of the board of supervisors, head of the county fair, and now is a member of the county road commission.

**POLICE CHIEF** Harry Simmons, of East Jordan, was re-named as county deputy by Rose. Boyne City's Chief of Police Floyd Neville, was also re-appointed as deputy. In Charlevoix, Rose named Glenn Pemberton, John Geer and Joseph Smith.

Other deputies named were: C. T. McCutcheon, Wallon Lake, Leslie Baker, Boyne Falls and James H. Gallagher of Beaver Island.

Miss Janet Rusnel of Muskegon and Jim and Franklin Rusnel of Flint, were Christmas weekend guests of their parents Mr. and Mrs. Raleigh Rusnel.

## NORTHERN LIGHTS

They are the squeezingest people up in Cheboygan. They squeeze 100,000 gallons of apple juice out of nearly 99,000 bushels of apples this year. Big apple country, Cheboygan.

They want to keep track of all the records in the Otsego county court house at Gaylord. So they installed a photo recording unit in the clerk's office to enable the register of deeds to photograph every record that must be kept on file in his vault.

Now it's M-66. Other cities along state highways in Michigan have formed associations to guard their present highways when big plans are made for improved highways to the new Mackinaw Bridge. It is expected now that Charlevoix, East Jordan and Mancelona will join the M-66 association being formed at Ionia.

Dairy farmers who want pointers on the control of mastitis—a disease which costs Charlevoix county thousands of dollars in milk and cow losses each year—can get them at a Better Milking Clinic on Tuesday, January 25, at East Jordan High School Auditorium.

The all-day program with speakers and demonstrators from Michigan State College and several milking machine companies, is under sponsorship of the Charlevoix County extension service. Doors will open at 9:30 a.m. and close at 4 p.m.

Farmers who have no troubles yet with mastitis can learn how to keep it out of their herds and those who have infected herds can find out how to rid their cows of this costly disease.

## Sharpies Selling Silly Sugar Syrup

You'll be eating pancakes and maple syrup before long. The season is approaching.

And the State Department of Agriculture warns customers not to get gypped when they buy the syrup.

Three men are under arrest in Indiana for selling 174 gallons of substitute maple syrup for \$3.65 per gallon. Their syrup was made from sugar and water with only maple flavor added. This syrup normally sells for about \$1.27 per gallon.

Michigan law requires maple syrup be made by evaporation of maple sap or concentrate and must contain not more than 35 per cent water. It must weigh at least 11 pounds to the gallon.

The label must identify the product as maple syrup. Read your label is the advice given by the department of agriculture.

Maybe you are paying maple syrup prices for sugar, water and artificial flavoring.
