May Have Polio Vaccine For 663 County Children

Detailed plans are now being worked out for the possible administration of polio vaccine to 663 Charlevoix county children who will be eligible to receive it if it is licensed, Dr. A. F. Litzberger, director of District Health Department No. 3 has announced.

As was announced earlier by state health officials, all first and second grade pupils in public, private and parochial schools are included in the planned program, he explained. It also will be available to others through physicians at the same time.

But parents are warned by Dr. Litzberger not to jump to the conclusion that the current planning indicated the vaccine already has been effective.

"The vaccine which will be furnished by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis is the same vaccine that was given 440,000 children last spring," he said. We do not know yet whether it really prevents paralytic polio. Until April (when we learn the results of the evaluation study now being conducted by the University of Michigan, we cannot know if the vaccine is effective.

"BUT WE CANNOT wait until then for planning for the protection of as many of our children as possible. Vaccinating large numbers of children is a big and important job, entailing many procedural tasks that cannot be performed over night.

"If the license is granted in April, we must be ready to start vaccinating at once, so that, if possible, we can finish before our schools close and the polio season starts. We want to give the vaccine early so that many children can be protected before polio appears in their communities.

The polio vaccine will be furnished from a supply being purchased by the National Foundation with March of Dimes funds. It will be made available by the National Foundation without charge for the product by State Health Officers for use in the above group, if licensed by the Federal Government. Supplies also will be distributed through usual channels at the same time.

The National Foundation has financed the development and production of the Salk vaccine. Contracts were made with manufacturers for a supply of vaccine costing \$9,000,000 in March of Dimes funds. This enabled the manufacturers to keep their production facilities in operation during the waiting period and be ready to go into full production as soon as the vaccine is licensed.

"Vaccine will be given by the Health Department this spring only to those eligible children whose parents sign forms requesting it," Dr. Litzberger added. It is a completely voluntary program. The forms have been distributed through the schools. We should like to know as soon as possible how many eligible children we must provide for, if the vaccination program is carried out. If the vaccine is not licensed, there will be no program."

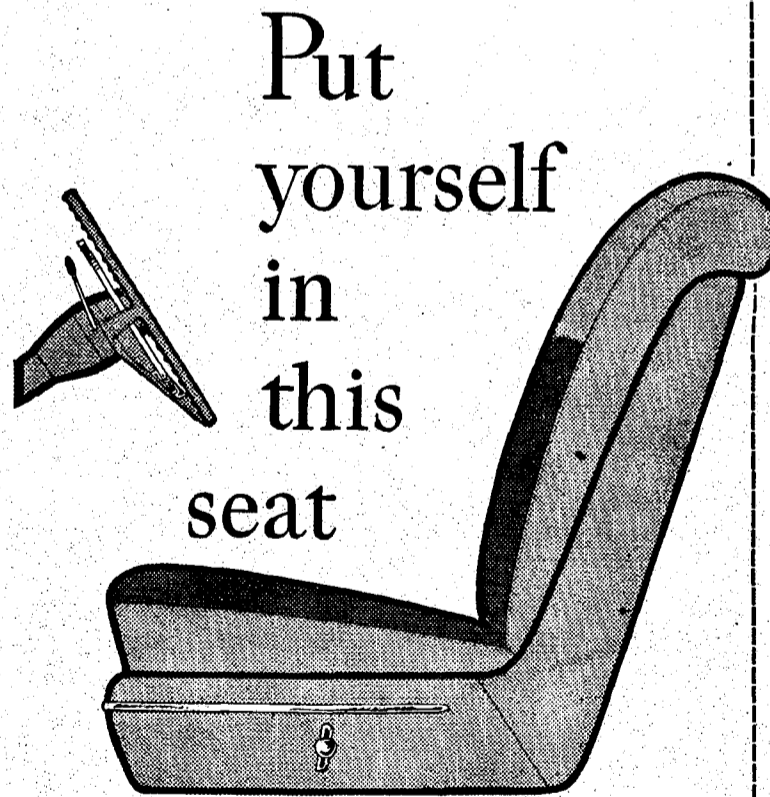

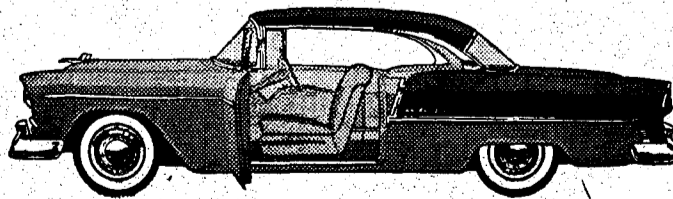

Discuss County School Problems

Porter Tells Of Urgent Need For More Local Class Rooms

Charlevoix county residents attending an all-county educational mass meeting here Thursday night were told that East Jordan must have additional classrooms for students.

Howard Porter, president, State Bank of East Jordan, told the 300 adults from all parts of the county that East Jordan's grade school was constructed "half a century ago at a cost of \$16,000."

Porter said the building is unsafe for the students now taught there.

Speaking on the need for new classrooms in our schools today, Porter said Michigan will have an increase of 7,000 children per year for some time; and he pointed out the wide need for additional classrooms in many schools.

He cited the non-school construction years from 1932 to 1948, claiming that during those years many present buildings became obsolete.

A constantly shifting population and high birth rate is making more school space absolutely necessary, he said.

East Jordan's high school is of more recent construction because the former buildings burned down.

SPEAKING of Charlevoix county's financial ability to educate children, Porter said we have much less money, behind each student than many other schools in the state.

Speaking on school financing, Guy C. Conkle, jr., Boyne City attorney said Charlevoix and Antrim counties are the two most backward in Michigan.

Conkle pointed to the difficulty of conducting proper schools on the four mills levied for that purpose in the two counties.

Conkle said there are 700 school districts in Michigan which have no schools, but transport their students to nearby consolidated units.

It was said that more and more school financing is coming from state and federal agencies; and that when adults no longer support their schools they lose interest.

MICHIGAN, it was said, will need 2,000 new school rooms per year until 1970.

Speaking of adult education, Mrs. Kit Carson, of Charlevoix said it is constantly available. The public library was termed an excellent place for adult education. University extension classes and local night school

classes pave the way for adult education.

Mrs. Carson said one out of every four persons make use of some form of adult education.

The meeting was conducted by Charles Robinson, Charlevoix County superintendent of schools.

He called the meeting to better acquaint adults with county school affairs and with the many problems which our schools must meet.

IT WAS HELD in connection with the Presidents' "White House Conference" on education.

Robinson left the adults with the information that 71 percent of students entering the first grade finish high school.

"What," he asked, "becomes of the other 29 per cent?"

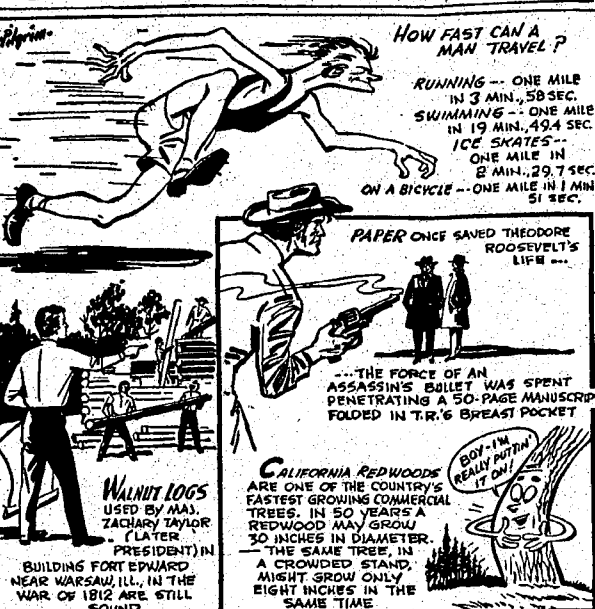

Jehovah's Witnesses Plan Message

A spokesman for Jehovah's witnesses announced plans today for delivering a special message to the world.

Mr. Charles M. Staley, local presiding minister of the East Jordan congregation, revealed some of the details of this special campaign, which includes sponsoring the public lecture entitled "Christendom of Christianity—Which One Is 'the Light of the World?'"

All congregations of Jehovah's witnesses throughout the world (there are approximately 14,000 in 159 lands) will participate. Mr. W. H. Wright will deliver this discourse locally, to which the public is cordially invited. It will be delivered at the local Kingdom Hall at 108 McKenzie in East Jordan at 8 o'clock Sunday afternoon, April 3.

After the discourse a new 32-page booklet containing extraordinary information will be given free to each person in attendance. Some 600,000 of Jehovah's witnesses will then begin distribution of millions of copies of this special message in many languages throughout the world.

It is the desire of Jehovah's witnesses to place a copy in every home. Mr. Staley said the contents of this specially prepared booklet had not yet been made public, but its message was unique and would be of special interest to persons of all faiths.

Advance preparation and the world-wide scope of this special campaign give indication that this may well be one of the greatest religious proclamations in modern history, Mr. Staley said.

He went on to tell of local plans that have been made, stating that Jehovah's witnesses here are ready and eagerly look forward to this special campaign.

MSU or MSC? Discussed At Lansing House

A packed gallery listened to and received a liberal education in legislative procedure on Monday night and Tuesday when H. B. 156, proposing to change the name of Michigan State College to Michigan State University, was debated at length on General Orders and on Third Reading.

A highly controversial bill, debate became a bit heated as proponents successfully fought off all efforts to first recommit the bill, and secondly to postpone action for a few days so an informal hearing could be held.

Sponsors of the bill maintained nothing was to be gained by delaying House action, contending that a public hearing could be called on the bill in the Senate. No one denies that MSC lacked university status, but opponents claimed the proposed name would lead to confusion, principally in the matter of bequests.

The bill has now gone to the Senate and has been referred to the Senate Judiciary Committee.

ANOTHER BILL introduced is HB 332, a fair trade act, which would require a minimum markup of 2% on all merchandise handled by wholesalers and a 6% markup by retailers. Previous fair trade bills of similar nature, to do away with discount sales, met with stiff opposition and got nowhere. It remains to be seen what happens to this bill this year.

LAKELAND, Fla.—How does it feel to be a rookie breaking in with a major league ball club? Well, it depends upon the individual. Our new first baseman, the veteran Ferris Fain, for example, did not experience the usual thrill of most young rookies.

After playing in the Pacific Coast League four years and competing against many big league stars on a service team during World War II, he broke in with the Philadelphia Athletics in 1947. Inasmuch as there was no one else to play first base Ferris knew he had the job cinched from the start, so he did not feel any particular excitement.

\$50,000 ROOKIE

Just the opposite is J. W. Porter, the good-looking prospect recently released from service for whom Tiger boss Spike Briggs turned down a \$100,000 offer by the White Sox.

Porter, who later was traded by the Six to St. Louis and then to us, was a \$50,000 bonus rookie when he trained with Chicago in 1951. Only 17 and just out of high school, he was thrilled with everything and awed even of the batboy.

A catcher then, Porter thought he might make the team his very first year when he batted .365 in spring training, highest of any White Soxer. But Manager Paul Richards thought he first should have some seasoning (the bonus rule wasn't in effect then) and sent him down to Waterloo of the Three-I League, the same league 'Ol Diz started in. Porter's biggest thrill during

that first spring was hitting a triple, double and single off Ned Garver, then with the Browns. Now the two players are teammates, of course, and I'm sure Tiger fans will be glad of that fact when they see Porter in our outfield. He's a nice kid, with an even disposition, but he sure is mean with that bat.

OUTFIELDER KALINE

Outfielder Al Kaline, like Porter, is a bonus player but he differs in that when he signed with Detroit the bonus rule had been changed to require players getting more than a \$4,000 bonus to remain with the parent club.

This didn't matter to Al, for he proved he had major league ability from the outset by playing regularly the entire season with the Tigers.

Of course, when he came to Lakeland last year, fresh from a high school in Baltimore, he was plenty nervous, as well as thrilled.

But Manager Fred Hutchinson took him in hand, talking to him privately and easing his tension.

His biggest thrill was against the Philadelphia Phils, when he clobbered a homer and triple off their ace, Robin Roberts. This happy event no doubt helped Al land a regular berth with the Tigers, the youngster batting .276 in his first season and spraking defensively.

White Pine Makes Come Back In State

White pine, once king of Michigan forests is staging a comeback.

Where the cutting of "round forties" once left thousands of acres of stump-land, there are growing today new forests.

At present there are approximately 437,000 acres of young fully stocked white pine stands. During the past four years, the white pine acreage has increased by approximately 41,000 acres.

White pines have two major

enemies — forest fires and blister rust. Both are being effectively controlled in Michigan.

White pine blister rust is a disease that came to this country from Europe early in the century. It has spread to all important white pine regions of the United States and Canada. The first report of white pine blister rust in Michigan was in 1916.

IN ORDER to propagate and spread through a white pine

stand, the disease has to grow during summer months on the leaves of current and gooseberry plants. It cannot spread directly from one white pine to another.

The spread of infection is halted by destroying currant and gooseberry plants growing in pine stands or within a 300-foot radius. An effective control program of this kind is being carried out co-operatively between the Bureau of Plant Industry of the Michigan Department of Agriculture and the U. S. Forest Service

Approximately 89 percent of the white pine in Michigan has been given initial protection to date.

Last year 18,236 acres of white pine were protected by destroying 381,151 gooseberry and currant plants. Records in the Michigan Department of Agriculture show that on the average one man working one day can afford this protection for six acres of white pines.

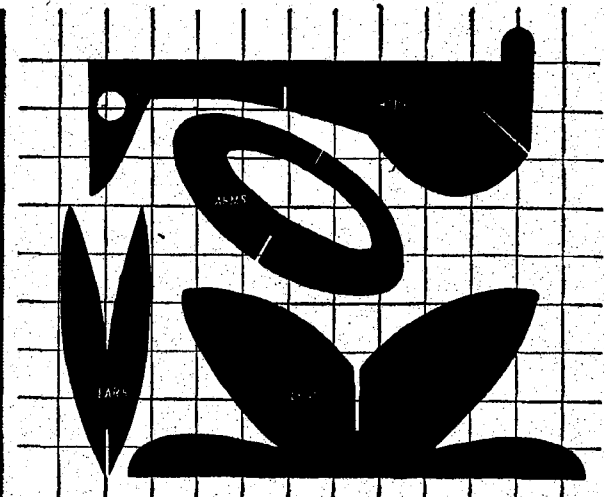

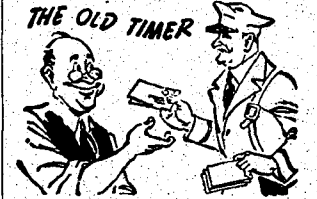
You can send my paper to Ivan E. Kitson, Airport Trailer Park, Route 1, Box 83, Atwater, California, where my wife and I are renting.

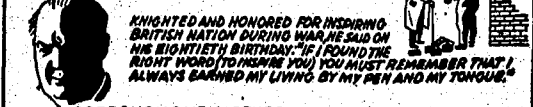
