Lynette Bulow Gets First Polio Shot In East Jordan **First, Second Graders** 

Little eight year old Lynette Bulow, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Chris Bulow, Tuesday morning received the first Salk vaccine shot for polio in northern Michigan. She is a second state student. The highly publicized vaccine was given at a brief ceremony in the office of school nurse Betty Robertson. The tiny bottle was handed to Dr. A. F. Litzenburger by Mrs. Wal-ter Davis, Charlevoix County Polio Fund chairman. It was brought to East Jordan

from' the Grand Rapids distribution center for northern Michi-gan by Mr. Reynolds, Charlevoix County sanitarian.

Dr. Litzenburger is director of Michigan State Health Dist-rict No. 3, which Charlevoix, Antrim, Emmet and Otsego coun-

ties. Tuesday morning's administration of the new polio vaccine was the first given in the above area. Shots were to be given to first and second graders of which there are 182 enrolled in the local school. Mrs. Robertson said 175 parents had returned cards requesting their children receive the vaccine.

IT WAS SAID there should be enough vaccine available within a few months for the priority groups set up by the polio



My business consists of, mainly, two products or services, Advertising and Entertainment. Last year my advertising was sold to several of the businesses of East Jordan and my entertainment was sold to one business in East Jordan which in turn resold it to the public at a profit. Because I was unable to renew the sale of my entertainment with the same account for 1955, I was therefore desirous of selling my products or services in a package deal to sixty of the businesses or individuals, at a small weekly cost, and these people in turn presenting this entertainment and advertising free to the publie of this community in appreciation of their patronage. It was the belief of myself and my customers that an advertising program of this nature would benefit, profitably, not just one or a few, but the entire community in general, by increased revenue from tourist and outlying area spending, attracted to this community by this program.

It was intimated that I may have been leading people to believe the Businessmen's Ass'n. was behind my business because my simple sales agreement was typed on a sheet of old East Jordan Chamber of Commerce stationery. This statement is untrue. Before I presented my sales agreement to the people of East Jordan, I thoroughly and completely struck off with pen and ink the Chamber of Commerce letter head from this stationery. In so doing, I believed I com-pletely changed the status of this piece of paper, and certainly did not expect any person to mis-take my intentions. May I say, however, it has been my supposition that most organizations of businessmen were, in general, to

promote the civic prosperity by supporting local business, ento couraging new businesses come to the area, publicizing the town by legitimate promotion. and lending aid to suitable recreational projects for the community at large. My business is in harmony with these general aims, and I can see no reason why I should therefore have been singled out for discrimination by the members of the board of the local Businessmen's Association. The articles asked local busi-

nessmen not to do business with out of town solicitors. If I am considered an out-of-towner, then what must I do in addition to renting an apartment for nine months, paying out over an \$11,-000 payroll for 1954 of which the most part was cashed and spent in your town and spending a large proportion of my own personal earnings on myself and my family in your town? I repeat, what must I do to become one of you, to become a neighbor, and member of your associations and your society. If. by (quote) "out of town fund solicitors" they refer to salesmen whose main residence is out-oftown, then their proposed reso-lution would ban salesmen for grocery supply houses, drug suppliers, film salesmen, hardware suppliers, and salesmen for outside radio and television stations' advertising, newspaper and magazine advertising, and many, many more. This would, in effect, constitute a form of embargo or monopoly. Such a re-solution is not in the American tradition of free enterprise. It is my first experience with a situation wherein a board of dirctors of an American businessmen's association sought to control it's members to the extent of

interfering with whom they do business. It is hard to believe that the entire board did, or that the members could consider backing such a resolution; but I wonder if it might be that certain individuals are trying to protect their own business from the healthy competition of free enterprise. Because I understand that

some of the residents of East Jordan have recently been swindled by a former sales and service organization, I hereby present my promotional program for East Jordan and my personqualifications to become, once again, a businessman of your community, for public examination:

(a) I propose to hold a weekly radio and stage show and dance which will be FREE to the public; the radio broadcasts to be on station WATC, Gaylord, and WFYC, Alma, advertising tour-ist attraction of East Jordan, and inviting tourists to spend their vacations in this community. The free show and dance, at the suggestion of several of the local businessmen would be held in the building at the tourist park There would also be a weekly amateur contest for the children, with cash and other valuable prizes. A prize each week to the trailer in the park coming from the greatest distance, and showcards throughout Northern and Central Michigan inviting tour-i ists and neighbors of other communities to be the guests, on Thursday nights, of East Jordan at the free show and dance. All of this including my complete musical and show organization at a cost of only \$2.50 per week, per sponsor.

(b) My qualifications to do business in East Jordan are; I

am an American, and a resident of Michigan for 87 years. I am a property owner in Ionia, Montcalm, and Mecosta counties. I rented a residence in East Jordan during a part of 1954, and wish to return this year. I have operated businesses in Michigan or a total of twelve years since 1936. I am a married man with four children. I am an honorary member of the Mecosta County Sheriff's Department. I am a member of a world-wide fraternal organization which has a local lodge in East Jordan. I have paid my dues and applied for membership in the East Jordan Businessmen's Association. In three years my Musical organization has made long run appearances in over 17 Michigan communities. During this time our radio shows have been carried over seven Michigan radio stations. During this time, through donated TV, Radio and Personal Appearances, we have raised nelped to raise, nearly \$10,-000 for Charitable funds. I have never failed to fulfull an appearance contract, written or verbal. If these qualifications are not enough, then for Goodness' Sake, Gentlemen, tell me WHAT must I do to become one of you?







Robert White, MSC extension agricultural engineer will be in the county to carry out the demonstrations.

The first will be held at the Ed Topolinski farm, half way between Boyne City and Boyne Falls, and the program here will start at 8:30 a.m.

The afternoon demonstration will be at the Aaron Brock farm a mile and a half west of Ironton, starting at 2 p.m.

Many farmers are operating plows that are not in adjustment. The plows that are out of adjustment waste fuel, requires more power, does a poor job of plowing and thereby makes for a poorer seed bed. Most adjustments are simple in order to ring a plow into good working order.

agent. Some vegetable growers ou weed killers on during the driest days because they figure the weeds will die faster.

Weeds are killed most effectively when there is enough moisture to make the seeds germinate in the surface soil.

Chemicals are recommended for selective weed control and are most effective in killing germinating plants. With the excep-tion of 2, 4-D, they will not kill older plants at the recommended spraying rates.

Don't make the mistake of disturbing the crop rows right after putting on the weed killer. The crop may be cultivated, but soil should not be thrown on the row, says Rebman. The chemical layer may be broken and seed brought to the surface where




