1955 tax rate for Charlevoix county has been set by the coun-ty tax allocation board at its final meeting held at the courthouse

The tentative rate set at a meeting May 13 was adopted for all tax units except Charlevoix township where the rate was in-creased from 1 to 2 mills and in four school districts. Major increase was in the Boyne Valley rural school district where the rate was hiked from 8 to 12 mills. In the Norwood township district, which is fractional with Antrim county, the rate was in-creased from 8 to 9 mills. In Bay Shore and Melrose township unit, districts which are fractional with Emmet county, the rates were decreased. In the former district the rate was dropped from 13 to 11.5 mills and in the Melrose township unit from 12.5 to 12.4 mills. Tentative rates ad-opted for all other tax units follow: St. James and Paine towntend. ships on Beaver island, 5 mills each; Bay, Boyne Valley, Evan-geline, Hudson, Marion, Nor-wood, South Arm and Wilson townships, 2 mills each: Eveline and Melrose townships 1 mill each. Charlevoix and Hayes townships, the village of Boyne Falls and the cities of Charlevoix, East Jordan and Boyne City received no millage. Murray No. 1 school district was allocated 13 mills; North Bay No. 1, Chandler township, Charlevoix and East Jordan school districts. 12 mills each; Boyne City school (Jump to Back Page)
