early this quarter. In doing so it will enable consumers to use water on lawns and gardens during the months of June, July, August and Sep-tember at a special rate. This will be the same as was charged for a three months period in 1955

Users will be charged the re gular rate on water; on the sev er consumption rate you will h charged the average on the three previous quarters.

For example: If your average consumption rate on sewer for the three previous months was \$3, that would be the sewer conumption rate charge for this four month period, regardless of the amount of your water consumption.
