* * * The above is from the Constitution of the State of Michigan Article III, section I: Elective Franchise.

In the last election held in Charlevoix county about half of the people entitled to vote went to the polls. If this sort of disregard for our American system of free government continues, it can be rightly feared that the day is coming when the above number III article will be struck from Michigan's constitution.

thin more.

Now and then a few trees Now and then a few trees show up that were affected by last year's drought. These are being marked so as to trim them them back and very bad trees are being dehorned — that is, cut back heavy enough in order to grow all new wood.

While the fruit grower has fungus diseases such as apple scab and shot hole fungus for cherries and a wide variation of

cherries and a wide variation of insects to combat it seems to me that weather conditions are the worst set back. Such as too much
