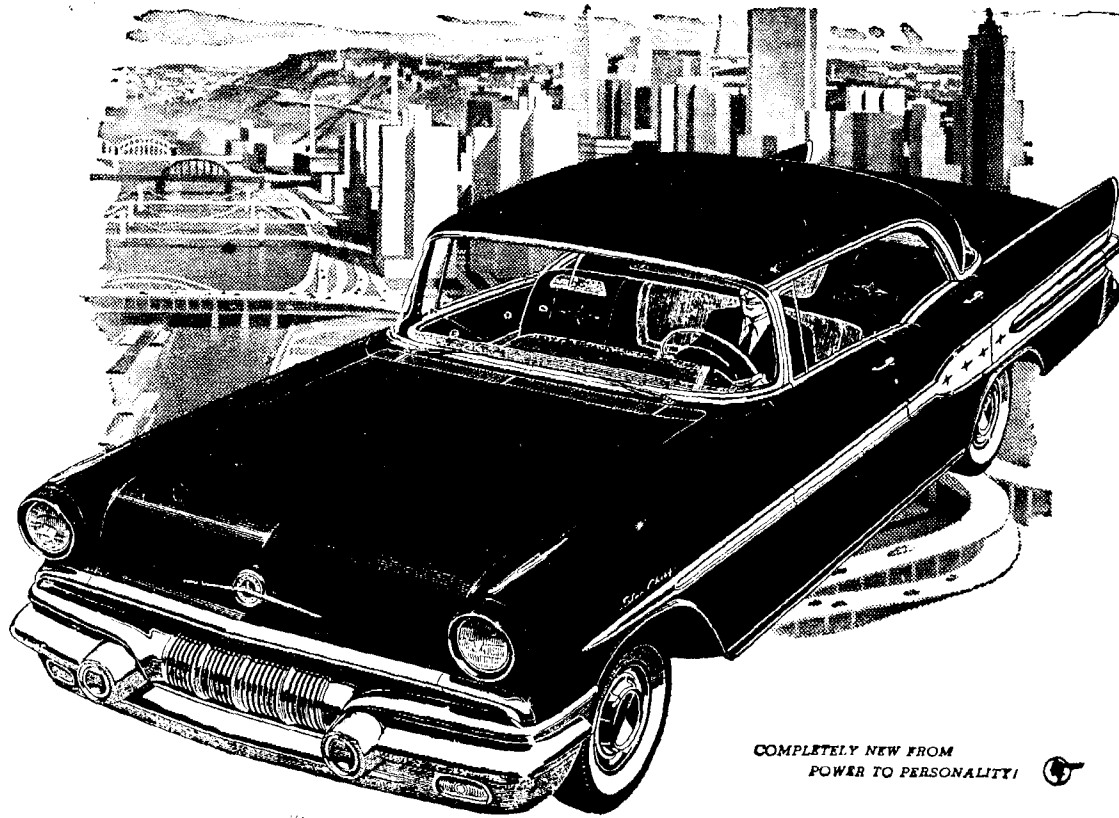

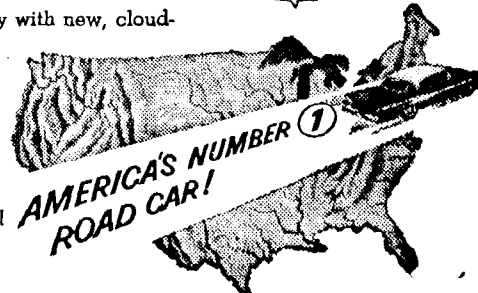

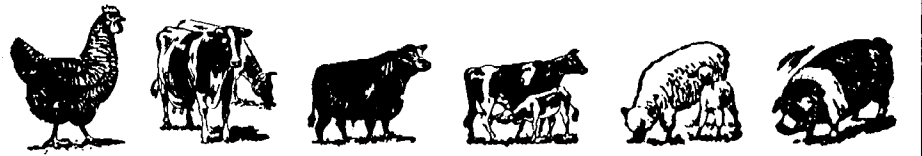

## Big Discussion: Can You Make Money On The Farm In '57?

### Charlevoix Antrim Farmers To Talk Rural Economics

Two northern Michigan farm meetings dealing with economics on the farm have been set for December, it was announced this week.

The annual "Barnyard Economics" meeting for Charlevoix county farmers has been set for 1:30 p.m. Wednesday, Dec. 12th at the East Jordan high school farm shop. The building is located in downtown East Jordan.

"Decisions for profit in 1957" is the theme of a farmers' meeting to be held 10 a.m., Dec. 13th at the town hall in Kewadin; and again at 1:30 p.m. the same day at the court house in Bellaire.

Charlevoix county farm agent Ed Reberman said a Michigan State specialist in agricultural economics will lead the East Jordan discussion.

HE WILL ALSO deliver talks at the two Antrim County meetings, farm agent Walter Kirkpatrick said.

Everett Elwood is the specialist who will talk on present day farm economics.

There will also be representatives of the Social Security agency and local A.S.C. representatives at the meetings.

East Jordan's meeting will be composed of three sections: (1) The outlook for 1957 and income tax changes for 1956; (2) A discussion of the soil bank and your farm; (3) Operation of the soil bank program and whether or not it will make money for you.

Reberman said current changes in the social security program is of great interest to many farmers and that it is important that all farmers are made aware of these changes.

THE ANTRIM county meetings will follow the same theme for farmers in that area. Local social security representative Mr. Kalmback will answer questions there, Kirkpatrick said.

Visitors at the annual Charlevoix County Home Demonstration Christmas party will hear about life in the middle east and Pakistan.

Main speaker will be Mrs. Richard Schroeder, of East Jordan, who with her husband and family have just returned from a two year stay in that country.

The meeting will be held 2 p.m. December 12 at the Church of God recreation hall in Charlevoix, Clare Brown county home demonstration agent has announced.

MR. SCHROEDER, a former East Jordan high school agricultural instructor, represented the United States government in Pakistan where he was a farm machinery advisor to the Pakistan government.

His first public discussion of that country was made before the members of the East Jordan Rotary Club a week ago.

Mrs. Schroeder's talk before the home demonstration group will be on clothing, food and

other aspects of homemaking of the Pakistan people.

She will also display many articles collected while abroad, Clare Brown said.

### Co-ops and Taxes

The N. T. E. A. has long carried on a campaign designed to mislead the public into believing that co-ops do not pay taxes.

he new film is built around a dramatic situation, with a pretty girl, love interest and all the "fixin's." It does not make an effort to explain that co-ops pay the same taxes paid by other businesses operated in the same way. Instead, by implication, it seeks to make co-ops appear as a shady political influence.

Contributors to N. T. E. A., who like to list their gifts as income tax deductions, are doing no service to the nation in fostering this type of propaganda.

## Rural Zoning Requires Aid Of Residents

Efficient use of land and natural resources demands careful planning, says Louis A. Wolfanger, Michigan State zoning specialist.

Every county and township in the state may create a commission to prepare and recommend land-use plans. To have a good plan, however, the people must participate, points out Ed Reberman, Charlevoix county farm agent.

The first step in forming a plan is a careful study of land and natural resources of the county or township and their present uses.

Then, the planning commission considers such questions as these: How good is each use? What improvements can be made? What are the unused opportunities?

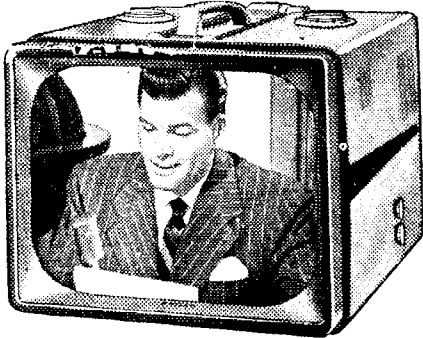
BECAUSE LAND, resources and people vary, uses which are best in one part of a township may be out of place in another part. Thus, some areas are best suited for farming while others should be used for homes, commercial enterprises, industry, recreation, forestry or other uses.

These findings are then summarized in a plan or "blue print" for the county or township. This plan may also show what roads, schools, and other facilities will be needed.

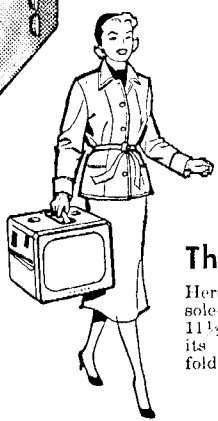

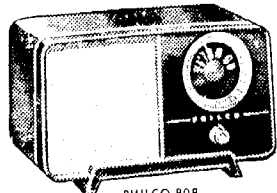

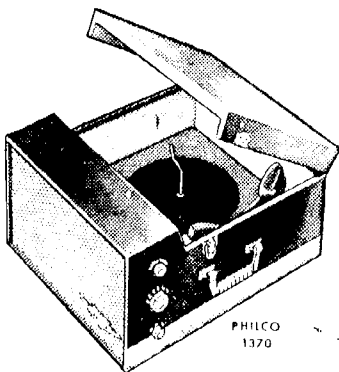

Plans are being talked about for a grading and packing center with cold storage and a marketing center near our neighborhood for the fresh fruit trade—such as strawberries shipped as fresh fruit and sweet cherries sprayed for long keeping and shipping and all other fruit, especially apples, grown for the fresh fruit trade.

Spraying for brown rot on sweet cherries will be studied and practiced. A study will be made of containers for the various fruits. Fruit will be prepared for sales for the heavy buyers.

More will be known about definite plans after the spring meetings are over.

We do have opportunities for shipping fresh fruit, especially strawberries, sweet cherries and apples. Much is on the way in favor of fruit growers.

Notice, I left out peaches. Our season is late for the general overall peach trade. Home trade likes the early varieties that we grow, but when the northern Michigan demand is filled, the trade stops abruptly. However Gerber will take the Amber Gem variety, a cling stone of the late ripening kind.

# LOOKING AROUND JORDAN TOWNSHIP

This story begins for us in 1884, when Lauchlin MacClean, who lived on the crossroads east of East Jordan, was at long last able to welcome his relatives who had traveled all the long miles from Glasgow, Scotland to join him in this new country.

East Jordan at this time was embroiled in a bitter fight with Boyne City over the question of who should have the county

seat a battle that East Jordan lost the next summer, giving Boyne the honor; this honor they held for 13 years.

But if East Jordan was a lively little town with a fair population for that time, Antrim County, especially that part joining Charlevoix on the south could still be considered new territory for altho the first homesteaders, the William Jaquays, had settled

in the county 17 years before, and a few had followed, settling in the valley region, they had to be pretty hardy souls, for there was still a good deal of big timber and the roads (so called) were more like cow trails, winding in and out among the trees, so that when some one driving oxen and wagon attempted the steeper hills, they had to contend with an impending possibility of a tongue over tailgate misadventure.

This then was the country as John Craig; lately a railroad office employee of Glasgo, and his family, saw it when they arrived at the end of their journey.

They had started months before and luck had been with them, for the long Atlantic crossing had been made in only 11 days.

When John, with his wife, Catherine MacClean, and their 5 sons landed at Mt. Forest, Canada, winter was at hand and weather conditions were such that they decided to wait for spring, before going farther, for the trip was much faster and easier in those days if made by water. Early spring found them afloat again, sailing through the

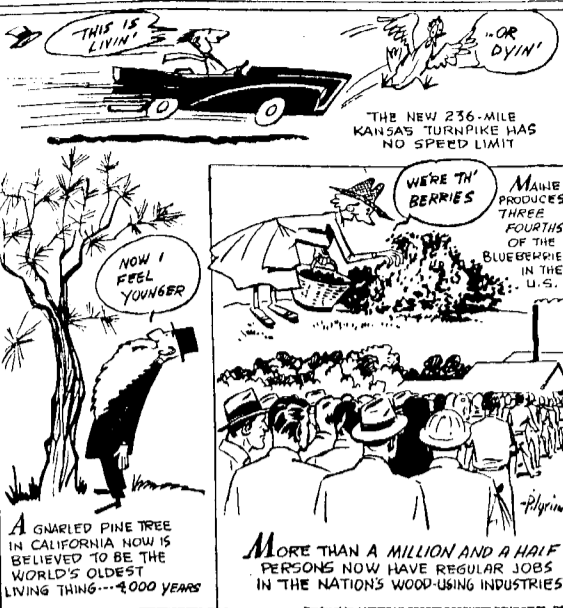

There is now only the younger son George left to tell the tales of the first early years in America but if you can get him to talk he could tell you many things about the old roads, old farms and old neighbors — John Chatterton, Bill Webster, David Raley and John Severance are all real people to him and his stories include some of the teachers of those times too including Mary Rogers and Frank Porter.

George finally sold the old home place but it will still be known as the old "Craig Place" to many people for many years. Though tragedy found its

mark in many of the Craig name through Jack the name will be perpetuated for many years; for his eldest son, James, (deceased) who married Ruby Boyer (also deceased) has 3 boys as well as 3 daughters and Jack Jr., married to Vernetta Faust, also has a son and a daughter. treacherous waters of the Great Lakes. Changing boats at Charlevoix they took to the inland water route and finally arrived in East Jordan.

After some time spent with Catherine Craig's brother, Lauchlin MacClean, they decided to settle in Antrim County; and the final selection was a well situated place in Jordan Valley, on the section line, with a small creek on it and good rich soil.

After clearing a small plot of land Mr. Craig erected a small log house which was to shelter them for several years. Those years were not easy ones — farming is never easy, and to attempt to support a family of 7 on a farm that was mostly virgin timber kept them working from daylight to dark every day.

By the early 1900's John Craig had doubled his acreage by adding another plot he had obtained through negotiation with a neighbor and had now 60 acres under cultivation and had his farm well stocked with sheep, cattle, hogs and horses, the latter being a specialty with him, for horses were at a premium at that time.

It was about this time too that he homesteaded another 40 acre strip of swamp land, and from this strip he took logs for lumber to build a new and larger home. It was from here too that the eldest son, Jack, obtained lumber to build on his place, the farm he had bought joining his fathers and on which he settled with his wife, Mabel Richard, whom he married in 1901.

These years were happy ones, but their happiness was not un-mixed with sorrow for in those years their second son, Angue who was 23 years of age, in the prime of life and the height of expectation was fatally injured in a runaway accident; and a few years later James the fourth son also lost his life in a hunting accident. These were hard blows but some how they held up with a true Scottish perseverance.

After a long and full life Catherine Craig passed away in 1915, and John followed only 3 years later, leaving 3 sons, Jack, Charlie and George.

Charlie and George stayed on the farm keeping up the house and tending the fields until 1942 when Charlie passed away, leaving George on the farm alone. Jack who was living with his

wife Mabel on the next farm, raised a fine family of 3 boys and 3 girls and when their children were raised and nearly all married they retired from the

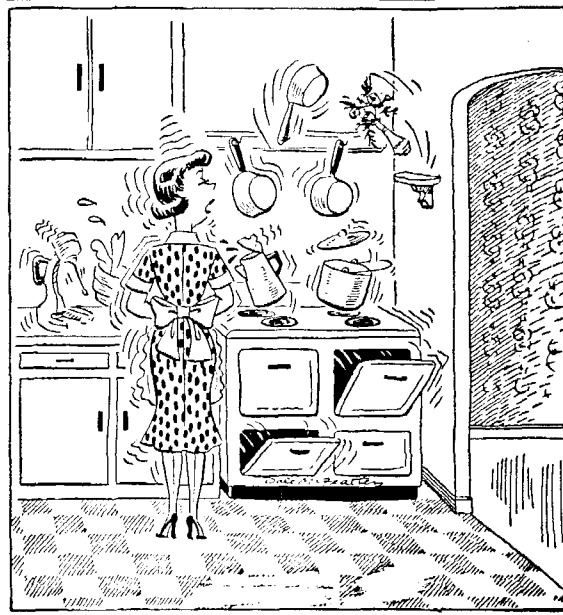
