Services Held Here For A. Lawton

Mrs. Amanda Lawton quietly passed away in the late evening of Thursday, November 29th. She was born at Olivet, Michigan January 14th 1867, to Rev. and Mrs. Elan Branch.

On May 10, 1877 she was baptized in the PawPaw river one mile west of Lawrence; and united with the first Baptist church of Lawrence. She began as a regular Sunday School teacher at the age of sixteen and continued to teach almost constantly until the time of her death.

She was united in marriage to Frank Lawton October 26, 1898. Her husband died July 9, 1905. In 1913 she with her family moved to a farm near Charlevoix where they and an aunt lived until 1925, when they moved to Grand Rapids. They returned to their farm in 1929 where she lived until her death.

She united with the First Baptist church of Charlevoix by letter June 1919. She was also a member of the WCTU of Charlevoix.

She is survived by two sons, Jess at home and Frank of Arizona.

The funeral services were held at the Watson Funeral Home in East Jordan Monday, December 3rd at 2:00 p.m. Burial was in the family lot near Lawrence, Michigan. (contributed)

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Orchard Notes . . .

At this time of the year nursery catalogs are being mailed to growers. Some are growing small orchards and working out some are keeping up their larger commercial orchards.

Orcharding consists of regular planting. Today improved strains are needed. Old trees need removing; outdated kinds and strains are not being planted today.

Where there has been an old apple orchard, a new site should be selected for cherries as cherries do not do well following apples.

In fact new sites should be selected for everything. Usually the second cherry orchard could follow cherries, but not the third. Newly cleared land should be under cultivation for a few years before planting fruit trees. Otherwise some trees will be pesty and break down early. Trees will be uneven in size.

Steep hill sides are out today. Wind breaks are nice when planted the west side. However, we must avoid frost pockets. Small three cornered strips should be avoided. Use land where more plantings could be added to it.

Prevent Christmas Tree Fire

A burning Christmas tree can bring death and terror into your home unless you take proper precautions.

You have probably seen a Christmas tree burned outdoors. The roar and power of that fire are awesome when not under control. However, Clare Brown, home demonstration agent, points out that safety measures can be taken, which are recommended by the National Safety Council.

Don't buy your tree too early. When you do buy it, store the tree in a cold place until you are ready to set it up. At that time place it away from radiators and other sources of heat. Obviously

Boyne City Man Heads Nation's Top Seed Processing Plant

One of the nation's most efficient seed processing plants is under the management of a former Charlevoix County man, Orvin W. Burdick, of Boyne City. He is well-known among Charlevoix county farmers, having served six years as assistant manager of the Boyne City Cooperative Company.

Burdick takes considerable cooperative and management experience to his new work as manager of the Farm Bureau Services' 36-year-old Seed Department at Lansing.

The Farm Bureau's modern plant was built at Lansing this year and contains equipment de-

and then began his work in the field of Michigan agriculture.

He returned to Boyne City after Ferris and gained valuable experience at the Boyne City Cooperative.

From there he went to Petoskey where he was manager of the Michigan Potato Growers Association plant.

For six years after 1945, Burdick was fieldman selling Farm Bureau Service commodities to member cooperatives and other dealers. He was promoted in 1951 to supervise a number of Farm Bureau Service branch elevators and cooperatives managed by Farm Bureau Services.

FOR THE LAST 2 1/2 years, before his recent appointment, he has been manager of Services Order and Purchasing Department at Lansing.

Burdick is another of the many Charlevoix county men who have been trained to serve in Michigan's agricultural industry.

His father, before his death, served many years at the Boyne City post office. His mother still resides in that community. Mr. and Mrs. Burdick live in Grand Ledge. They have three daughters.

The Advent Ring

Light a candle for every Sunday in Advent and thereby, light your home throughout the holiday season.

To make a simple, but effective Advent ring, begin with a wire base bent in the shape of a wreath. Into this wire form place blocks of Styrofoam. Clip greens from your fir trees and wire them to the blocks of Styrofoam. Now you have a wreath of greens.

Use florists' wire or other kinds of wire to form a four sided cone coming to a point above the center of the ring. Over each of these four pieces of wire put 2 inch purple ribbon. Where the ribbon meets at the tip of the cone tie a bow. Also tie bows where the ribbon is attached to the greens.

The finishing touch comes by inserting the four candles in the Styrofoam base between the points where each bow is attached to the greens.

Now your Advent wreath is complete. Just light one candle each Sunday in Advent past.
