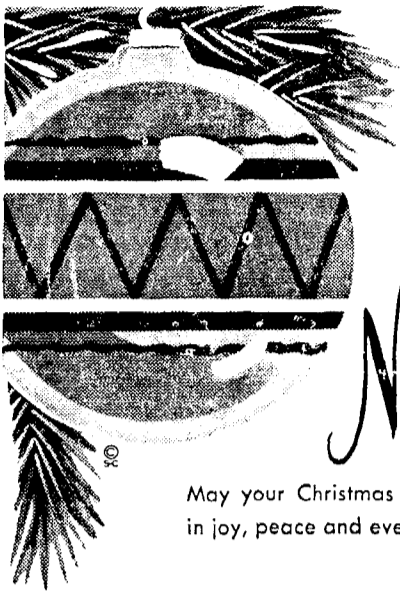

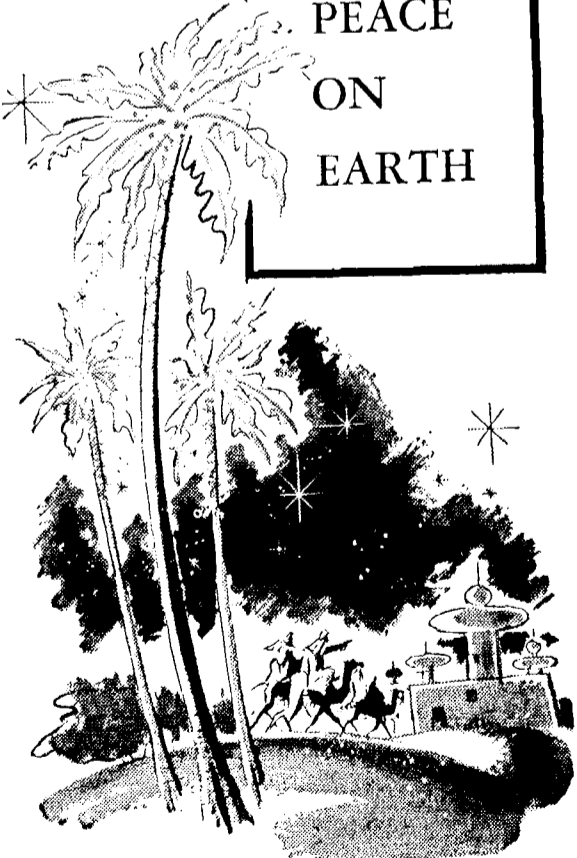

We are making our mother's and dad's gifts for Christmas.

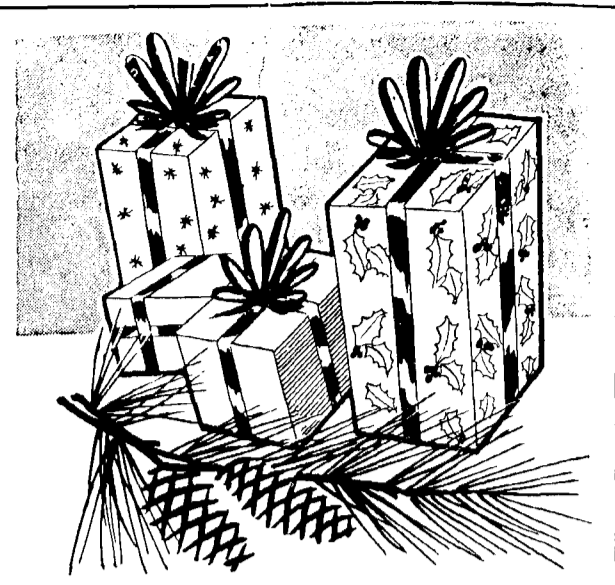
We hope to see many parents at the program Thursday and to visit our room afterward.

Let's Look At The New Farm Year

Almost everything that Charlevoix county farmers have to buy for farm production will be higher in 1957. Here's the picture in brief:

Farm machinery: With higher steel prices and increased labor costs, prices of farm machinery are expected to be about 2 percent higher in 1957 than last year.

By shopping around, you may still be able to get a good allowance on trade-ins. Farmers with limited capital should consider buying used equipment.

Building and fencing materials: Slightly higher.

Fertilizer and lime: These will be bright spots in the farm cost picture. Prices will probably be no higher than in 1956.

Seeds: Prospective seed supplies indicate that prices will be somewhat higher than the fairly low levels of 1956. This is especially true of forage crop seeds, which will be in demand for acreages put in the Conservation Reserve. Buy such seeds early.

Wages: With the increase in industrial wage rates and the competition between industry and agriculture for workers, farm wage rates will rise about 3 percent.

Your Farm Neighbors

John Brock

JOHN R. WIELAND: Here is one of Charlevoix County's busiest farmers. John's dairy farm is located on Barnard Road near Charlevoix, where he also grows certified seed commercially.

As president of the Charlevoix county Farm Bureau, John aids in shaping a better future for area farmers. His fellow farmers elected him to this high office at the group's board of directors meeting last October. He holds office in the county organization as a member of the Barnard Farm Bureau group. He also is a member of the Barnard Grange.

His interest in dairying has resulted in his selection as a director of the Traverse City district of the Michigan Milk Producers Association. John is also secretary of that association's local in Charlevoix. He manages

their trucking operations out of his area.

Another important position held by Mr. Wieland is that of president of the Ellsworth Farmer's Exchange at Ellsworth, a well-known northern Michigan farm cooperative.

His interest in farming is further shown by his position as a director of the Antrim-Charlevoix Artificial Breeders Association as well as his directorship in the Charlevoix County Soil Conservation Service. He is also a member of the Charlevoix Co-operative Company.

When we speak of "real" farmers, we have in mind men like John Wieland, who are actually working farmers with an interest in the future of agriculture.

MARK SAUNDERS: Out on old M-66, near Ironton, Mark Saunders is becoming something

of a well-known raiser of beef cattle. Herefords. Although Mark is a dairy farmer in his own right, he is much interested in the raising of beef cattle. He is a member of the Ironton Farm Bureau Group; and his knowledge of farming and his desire to aid county agriculture is shown by his selection to the board of directors of the Charlevoix County Farm Bureau. Mark is well-known in Charlevoix county as one of our "real" farmers.

ALFRED CRANE: Although a newcomer to Charlevoix County, farming is not new to Alfred Crane. He came to the county in 1953 from Illinois and purchased the Loyal Barber farm between East Jordan and Boyne City on the Deer Lake Road. Alfred is building a Holstein herd and is selling milk to Boyne City. He is a former director of the Charlevoix County Farm Bureau and a member of the Deer Lake Farm Bureau Group. His farm address is Route No. 1, Boyne City.

JOHN BROCK: The words "Brock" and "Farming" are almost one in Charlevoix County, so well-known is the family among rural people. John sometimes is confused with his brother Hiram, the well-known turkey raiser on M-66, north of East Jordan. John was at one time a turkey raiser at his farm on old M-66, but today he is milking 25 Holsteins and operates a flourishing dairy farm. Some of the best asparagus in the county is raised in Charlevoix county. John is one of the producers.

John is a member of the Evline Farm Bureau group and is a former director in the Charlevoix County Farm Bureau. He has been in Farm Bureau work since 1947.

More recently John has been selected as Charlevoix county agent for Farmers Petroleum Co-operative, another one of the area's "real" farmers.

Lumberjack Meeting

Michigan loggers, sawyers, lumber buyers and others interested in the production, selling, buying or utilizing of hardwood lumber will meet at Michigan State University, Jan. 7-11, for the first Hardwood Lumber Grading Course.

Information on natural defects, defects resulting from seasoning and how to increase yields of high-grade lumber from logs will be presented by MSU faculty members. The events are co-sponsored by the MSU department of forest products and the Cooperative Extension Service.

County Grange Wins National Recognition

The Barnard Grange and its lecturer, Mrs. Charles Wiesler, have received state and national recognition in two contests sponsored for Grange groups.

The ideas incorporated in a Booster night program arranged by Mrs. Wiesler received a blue ribbon for first place in state competition and a second place in national competition.

Merle Eddy, state lecturer, said it was the best program of its kind he had seen during his years as lecturer and the first that was good enough to be entered in national competition.

INCLUDED IN the prize-winning program were a talk on "Special Education" by Charles A. Robinson, Charlevoix county superintendent of schools; selections by the 16-voice Grange chorus and the Grange quartet and a specialty act by the children of the Grange.

The Barnard Grange also received second place in national competition for organizations with less than 150 members. This was a national contest for lecturers. Points were given for activities sponsored by the Grange and ideas presented by the lecturer.

The honors came to the Barnard Grange through the efforts of Mrs. Wiesler who credits the Grange members for their fine cooperation. "Without this it would not have been possible," she said. —Charlevoix Courier

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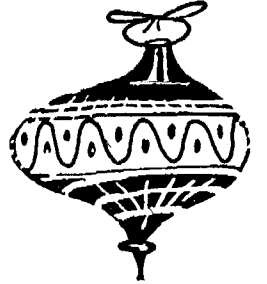
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FFA NEWS

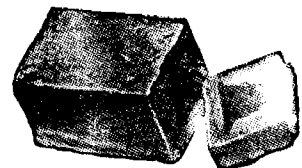

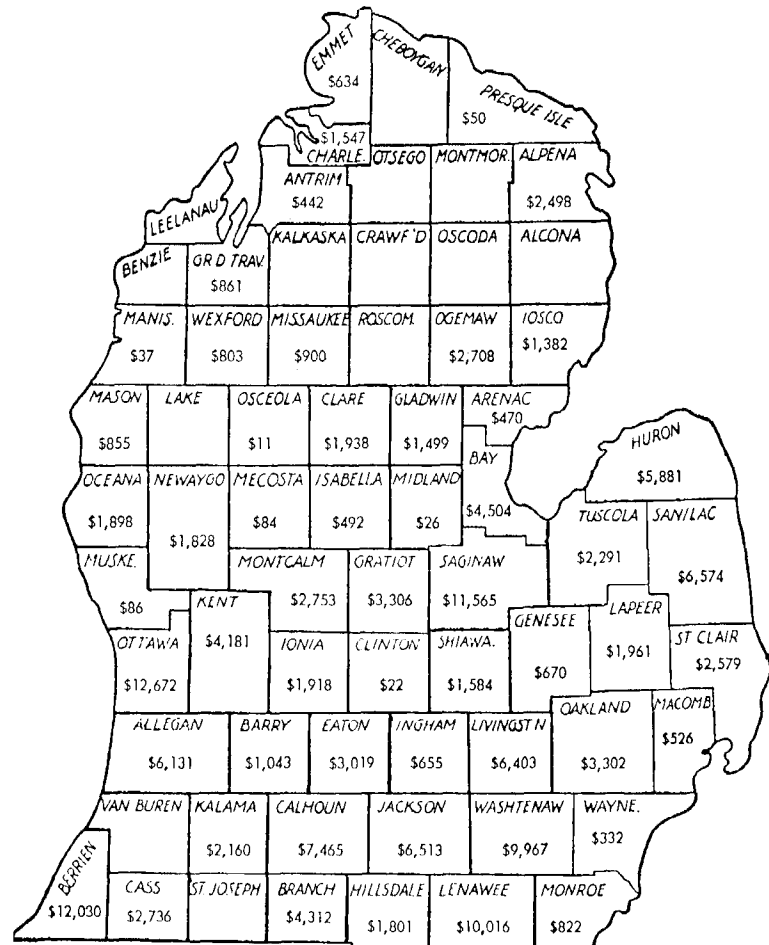

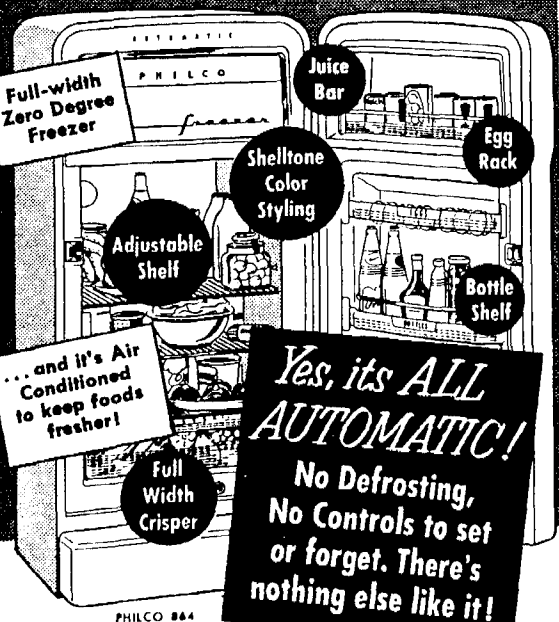

The East Jordan Red Devils picked up their second conference win of the season here Tuesday night, Dec 11 as they edged the visiting Gaylord Blue Devils 61 to 42.

The Jordanites jumped into the lead soon after the opening whistle on Gareth Thompson's two-hander from outcourt and were never headed. Gaylord kept within striking distance all the way however with the score by periods reading 9-3, 27-22, 35-29 and the final 51 to 42.

Larry Woodcock tallied 21 points on 6 field goals and 9 for 13 free throws to lead the local scoring. D. Mason was high man for the visitors with 15.

In Tuesday evening's Preliminary contest, the Gaylord Reserves topped the local seconds 56 to 41.

Playing at Mancelona Friday night, East Jordan's Red Devils held a slim 11 to 10 first quarter margin, but lost it to the Locomen 26 to 24 at halftime.

Paced by Ronnie Johnson who had 20 points, the Ironmen started to hit and outscored the Jordanites 20 to 9 for a 46 to 33 lead going into the final period.

East Jordan made a valiant try, outscoring Mancelona 15 to 7, but it was not good enough as the Mancelona five racked up its first victory of the season by a score of 53 to 48.

Cal Darbee had 18 and Larry Woodcock 11 for East Jordan. Dick Holstad and Bob Hardy had 10 points each for the visitors.

Mancelona dumped in 22 field goals, nine out of 17 free throws and had 14 personal fouls. East Jordan, on the other hand, had 18 field goals, 12 of 24 free throws and 15 personal fouls.

The Jordanites were accompanied to Mancelona by Keith Anwar, East Jordan high school principal, in the absence of Coach Gayle Saxton who remained with his father, Harry Saxton, who died Friday evening.

While the East Jordan Red Devils were losing to Mancelona Friday night, the Charlevoix Rayders were winning over Boyne City 55 to 44. Grayling edged past Gaylord 55 to 53 and Harbor Springs was trouncing Pellston 73 to 59.

In a game that got off to a slow start Friday night, the Charlevoix Rayders, underdog in the meeting with Boyne City, went into a 19 to 8 first quarter lead over the Ramblers, held on to a 29 to 22 halftime advantage and a 38 to 33 lead going into the final quarter when the Ramblers closed the gap to three points before Charlevoix pulled away for an 11 point victory.

But Gaylord was not doomed to go down without a fight so they slowly cut the Vikings lead and with two minutes remaining tied the score 53-all.

Grayling, otherwise, has a slight edge and may win by a slim margin.

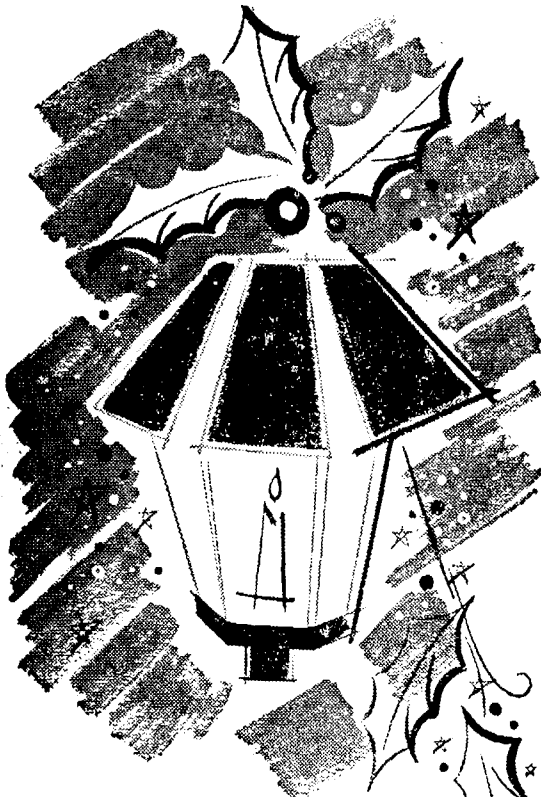
The Mancelona-Gaylord game on the Blue-Devils' floor will be

1-2-3-4 HOLIDAY PEANUT BRITTLE is simple to make and good to eat. (UPPER LEFT) Butter the porcelain surface of your range and sprinkle it with 1/4 cup or more of unsalted peanuts. Melt two cups of granulated sugar in a heavy skillet, stirring constantly with a wooden handled fork. No liquid is needed. (UPPER RIGHT) When the mixture is a caramel-colored liquid, smooth out any lumps. Now act quickly! (LOWER LEFT) Pour the syrup over the nuts and spread it with a spatula. It hardens in a matter of minutes. (LOWER RIGHT) When it is brittle, crack the candy into pieces and store in tightly covered containers. Decorated candy jars or coffee cans make perfect gift containers.

Pre-Plan Your Holiday Meals

Christmas is fun, but it means added work to prepare extra food, your family and yourself for the occasion. Evelyn Zwemer, of the home management and child development department of Michigan State University, suggests a few time and energy savers for you.

"Pre-planning pays off," states Miss Zwemer. Start your Christmas planning as soon as you have finished the leftovers of your Thanksgiving turkey. Follow through on your plans, too. For instance, you may empty one drawer to be used to store only Christmas equipment such as special cookie cutters, molds, centerpiece accessories and wrapping material.

Make room in your kitchen for the added supply of goodies. Your work will be greatly simplified if you check the storage situation in your kitchen now. You will be well organized for the rush.

Rule number one: store everything nearest the place it is first used. For example, the flour sifter will be at the mixing center, not near the range. Your soap powder or detergent needs to be stored near the sink, not in the mixing center. In some cases

there will be duplications; for instance, you may need the salt at the range just as often as you need it in the mixing center. The answer to your problem is two salt shakers. Extra steps mean wasted time and energy, so make life easier for yourself.

Your freezer will be your best friend during the holiday rush. By bringing your inventory up to date, you will know what you have and what you need to buy. Plan to use those things which have been in the freezer for a long time in your pre-Christmas menus. Then you will be sure to have plenty of room in the freezer for the Christmas turkey, breads, cakes and emergency casseroles to help you through the season.

Plan ahead and improve on your kitchen organization, so you will be ready to sail through the holiday work and enjoy yourself with the rest of the family.

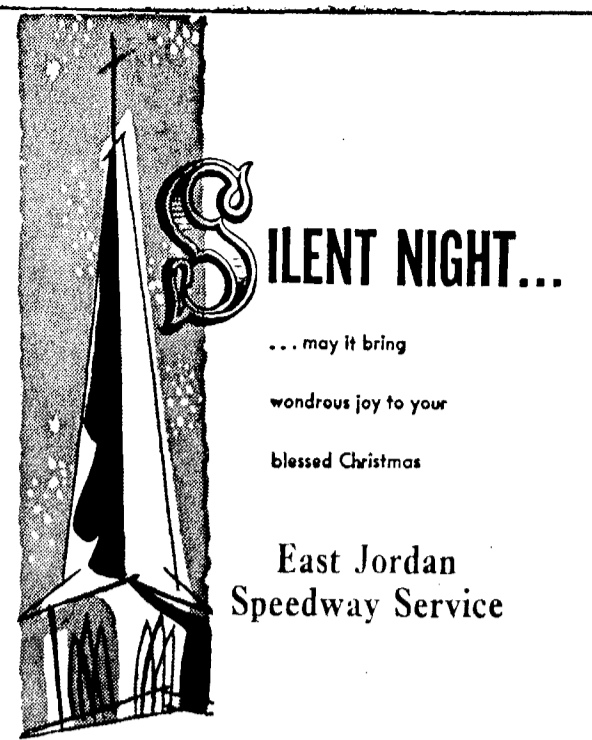
Monogrammed napkins, matches or coasters are good gift suggestions for that person on your shopping list that has everything.

Lester Bell, Michigan State University forester suggests winding an embroidery hoop or a circle of cardboard with white crepe paper or satin ribbon. Then cover the ring with colored tape or ribbon. Place the mistletoe spray in the ring and fasten it with a big bow at the top. Suspend the kissing ring in a doorway or arch and let the mistletoe do its work.

Flower growers can force a chrysanthemum to bloom any day of the year by regulating the length of time that the plant is in contact with light. So, chrysanthemums are available to the homemaker at almost any time during the year. Chrysanthemums are very popular plants to have around the house over the holidays.

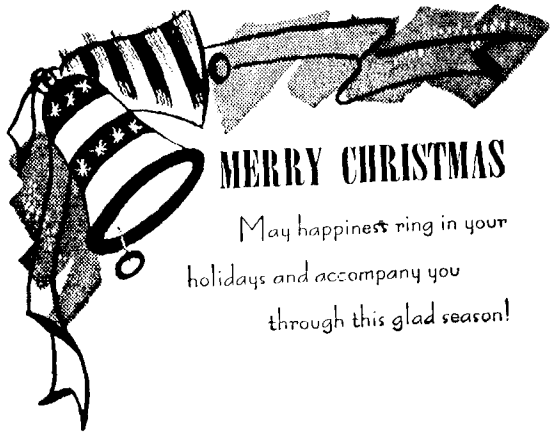

Make Your Own Christmas Decorations

A wreath to hang on your front door as a welcome sign to all your holiday guests can be easily made out of Styrofoam or Tuflite, a material very similar to Styrofoam. Wrap your Tuflite or Styrofoam wreath base with plastic gold roping or other roping that is available on the market. There isn't any need to wrap the upper left hand corner of the wreath because that is where your greens will be placed. Your greens may be stuck in the base or fastened with wire. Wire insures that they will stay permanently in place though. Among your greens fasten magnolia leaves which have been sprayed with gold, or other waxy leaves sprayed with gold. The gold spray is available at your local art and hardware store. Clusters of medium size red balls add the needed accent to make your wreath complete.

Cut flowers can be worked in to your holiday decorations in many ways. Here's one suggested by the Michigan State University horticulture department. The materials you will need are: a flat wicker basket, a block of Oasis or Sno-Pak (new materials available from your florist that hold water), a small vase or bowl to hold the Oasis or Sno-Pak, approximately two and one half dozen red carnations, seven pine cones, a variety of greens and a can of snow spray. Oasis or Sno-Pak are materials that hold two to three times their own weight in water and will keep flowers as though they were in regular water. To get water into it emerse the Oasis in water that completely covers it. Place a heavy object on top of

No doubt you will find a myriad of uses for plastic bags at Christmas time. To clean them, just rinse them out and dry them between dish towels as you do a nylon fabric. Turn them inside out and repeat the rolling between the towels.

Thinking about flocking your own Christmas tree? Paul R. Krone, professor of horticulture at Michigan State University claims that it is cheaper to buy a Christmas tree already flocked than to purchase the equipment to flock the tree yourself. Prepare for the holiday rush now. Pack ice-box cookie dough in small, well-greased soup cans; store in freezer until ready to bake. Then cut out the bottom of the can; push out dough and slice it.

If you are planning to cover your holiday turkey with foil while it is baking, remember to use a temperature of 450° F. or your turkey won't be done in time for dinner. To brown the turkey, remove the foil.

it to keep it submerged. Leave the material in the water for at least one half hour. It should be completely covered with water at all times.

Put the Oasis or Sno-Pak containing the water in a small bowl and place it in the middle of the flat basket. In the small dish with the Oasis or Sno-Pak put some water so you won't have to replenish the water very often. Next spray your greens with the snow spray and then arrange them in any manner you like.

The greens used in this particular arrangement are spruce, Scotch Broom (the very tall, thin greenery), Lycopodium and Jade.

Add your carnations to the arrangement by sticking them in the Oasis or Sno-Pak. Your pine cones should be cut off about three-fourths of the way down the cone so that you have something left that looks like an open rose. The cones are the last piece to be added to the arrangement.

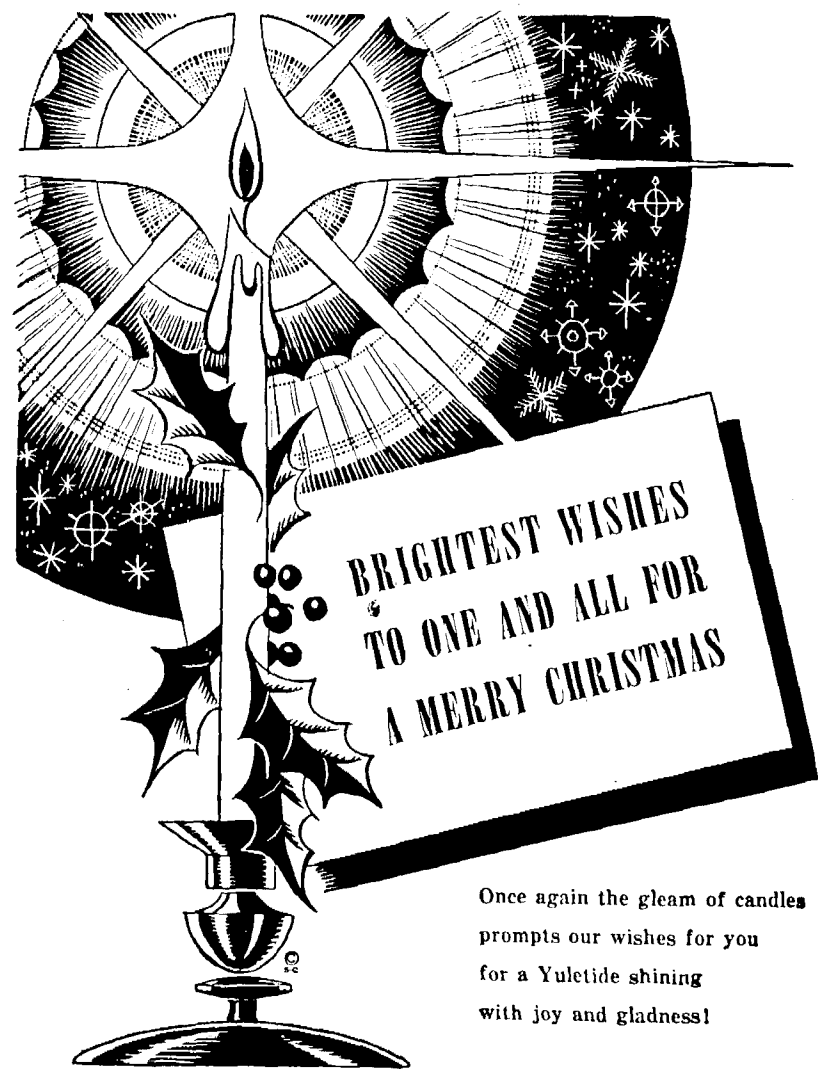

Heavy Meal Deserves Light Dessert

Dessert can make or break your perfect holiday meal.

The dessert should be keyed to the rest of the menu, advises Roberta Hershey, extension specialist in foods and nutrition at Michigan State University. When you serve a full course meal made up of several heavy foods, as is so often the custom around Christmastime, a light dessert will please the palates of your guests. Miss Hershey suggests serving ruby apples on such an occasion.

Wash four medium baking apples; remove cores. With a small sharp knife pare thinly around stem end of each to remove about an inch of skin. Place apples in a shallow pan or baking dish, leaving about an inch of space between apples. Mash 1/2 cup jellyed cranberry sauce with a fork and combine with 1/2 cup water and 1/2 cup sugar. Pour over apples.

Bake uncovered in a moderate oven (400° F.) for 35 to 45 minutes until soft throughout. Baste the apples frequently with sirup in the pan. Serve the dessert warm. The apples also help to fill the too often neglected fruit requirement in our diets.

Cranberry ice is another light Christmas-flavored dessert. Drop four cups of cranberries in four cups of boiling water; cook until they are tender and then, run them through a sieve. Add two and a half cups of sugar and one tablespoon of lemon juice while the berry mixture is still hot. Cool the mixture and freeze it in a mold. Miss Hershey serves the red ice with colorful Christ-

mas cookies.

On the other hand a light lunch may be followed by a much richer dessert. Cranberry punch includes nutritious fruit and the traditional Christmas cranberry.

Mix one cup uncooked rolled oats, 1/2 cup all-purpose flour and one cup brown sugar. Cut in 1/2 cup butter until the mixture is crumbly. Place half of this mixture in an 8 x 8-inch greased cakepan. Cover with one pound

cranberry sauce (jellied or whole). Top with balance of mixture.

Bake 45 minutes at 350° F. Serve the crunch hot in squares topped with scoops of vanilla ice cream. The recipe serves six to eight.

Remember Miss Hershey's suggestion when you plan your yuletide menus. A light dessert tops off a substantial meal; a richer dessert fills in the light lunch menu.

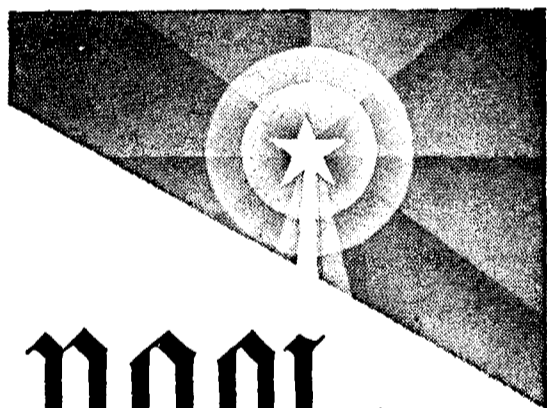

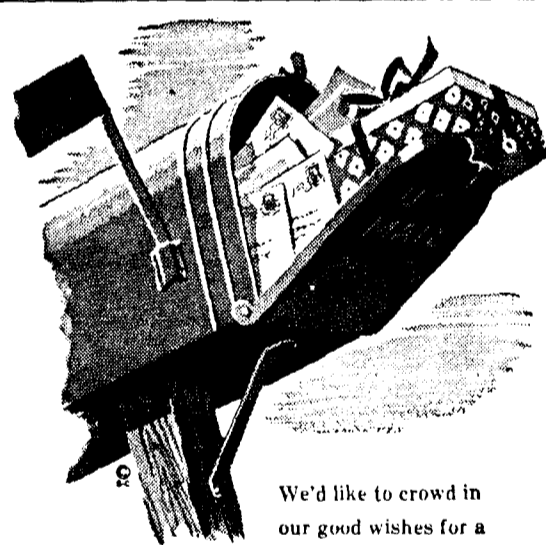
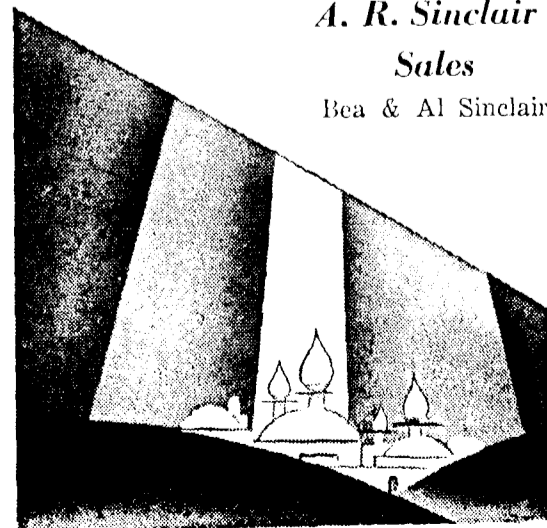

How To Select A Christmas Tree, And Make It Last

Does your Christmas tree shed its needles long before you want to take it down?

Lester Bell, Michigan State University extension forester, offers advice on the selection and care of your Christmas tree to help you get the most enjoyment from it.

Some trees hold their needles much longer than others. Red, white and Scotch pines have excellent needle holding ability. In the low humidity and high temperature of your home, you may expect these trees to hold their needles from the second week of December into January. Firs will hold their needles thru the holidays; spruce are the first to shed their needles.

Its fragrance is one of the most noticeable features of an evergreen. All of the pines, the white pine in particular, have a very pleasant fragrance. Firs have quite a pleasing fragrance but that of the spruces is sometimes objectionable.

After you have decided whether a pine, spruce or fir best suit your needs, you must choose your individual tree. Bell lists a

few important things to consider in your selection. The most attractive tree is quite dense and has good balance. The setting for the tree will dictate what type of balance you need.

A tree with three full sides and one rather flat side is perfect to use against a wall. A tree in a corner needs only two full sides while a tree in a picture window must have four attractive sides. A good taper is also

important. The sides of a perfect tree taper at a 30 degree angle from the bottom straight to the top. The more closely a tree resembles a symmetrical cone the more attractive is its shape.

A dark green to blue-green tree is the most beautiful, while a greenish-yellow tree may look pale. Watch for trees that look pressed together; they probably have been cut very early and stored. These trees are not fresh

and will not be attractive very long.

Bell reminds you that the average ceiling is eight feet high; when you have to cut the top off to make it fit, the tree looks chopped off. Unless you plan to cut the bottom off to use as foliage, buy a tree that fits the room.

After you choose just the right tree, take care of it. Bell directs you to cut one and one-

half inches from the trunk and place the tree in a pail of water until you are ready to set it up. Use a stand which holds water to keep the tree fresh and safe, and replenish the water frequently. Water is as effective a fire retardant as the latex base sprays.

For the safest, most attractive tree make a wise selection and give it lots of water, Bell concludes.

Tell him the truth, declares Ben Ard, family life specialist at Michigan State University. Parents expect their offspring to tell them the complete truth in all situations; then, they should tell their children the truth.

By telling the truth, you avoid having to patch up broken dreams and misunderstandings when their "knowing" friends chide them about their not knowing there is no such person as Santa. Besides injuring their faith in their parents for leading them astray, children feel silly in the eyes of their friends. It puts them in the position of having to defend their parents.

Ard explains that children should know from the start that there is no red-suited jolly man who flies through the sky at night behind eight reindeer and comes down the chimney of every good boy and girl. But, he adds, explain to your children that Santa is accepted as the spirit of Christmas and of giving. Better still, Ard encourages you to let children be a part of this giving. Let them feel the thrill of making, wrapping and giving their gifts to family members and friends. And let them take part in the wonderful tradition of trimming the tree and making Christmas cookies.

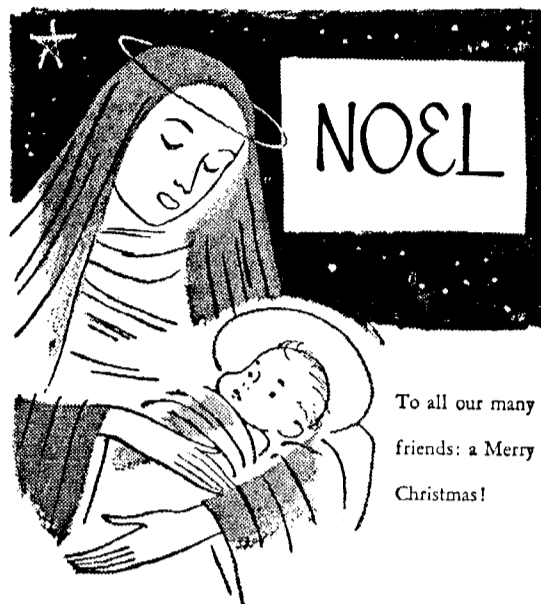
Those who think every child should have the experience of believing in Santa Claus recall their own childhood beliefs with the fondest of memories. But, Ard contends, because it happened in very early childhood, they don't remember the unpleasantness of learning there was no Santa Claus and of realizing they had a "bum steer" from their parents. Ard suggests the story of giving is a more healthy one to tell your child than the one of Santa.

Hot Christmas muffins may be made by adding cranberries to any good plain whole wheat or bran muffin recipe that you have. Use the raw berries, either ground or whole. Add about one cup of berries to two cups of flour.

Variety Is Key To Pretty Gifts

Package wrapping can be a highlight of the Christmas season.

Margaret Werner, textiles, clothings and related arts instructor at Michigan State University, suggests some ideas for making your packages original and the topic of conversation.

Miss Werner recommends collecting your equipment for wrapping in one work area. You will need a variety of papers, ribbons, seals, tape and various trims for the packages such as pine cones, balls, holly, mistletoe, string tinsel or candy canes. There are prints, solid colors and tissue to choose from in wrapping papers. Wrapping packages in the same color scheme is very interesting; try using shades of pinks and reds together. Or, gold paper with accents of moss green is attractive. Remember, never have your paper fighting for dominance over the ribbon. The ribbon and paper should complement each other.

Cotton or rayon ribbon that will stick by moistening is now available on the market. Because there isn't any need to tie this ribbon, you can do much more with it. Free leaflets on how to make bows are available at most ribbon counters.

Much of your originality shows up in the trim you add to your packages. Children's gifts may have a pom-pom of ribbon or a candy cane or bells tied on them. Sequins or tinsel applied on ribbon with rubber cement, always add highlight to a gift, suggests Miss Werner. Another decorative trim is made by outlining a can or writing out a name with rubber cement on wrapping paper and then dusting with glitter. This trim looks best on plain papers or foil paper and makes the package easy to pack for mailing.

Gold balls surrounded by a cluster of silver string tinsel placed in the center of a pom-pom of gold ribbon on gold foil paper makes a long remembered package.

Fun For Kids During Busy Holidays

Potato printing is a craft that will keep children busy during the holiday season. The equipment needed is a potato, a dull knife, some tempera paint, paper, a flat brush and some absorbent paper toweling.

Mrs. Ruby Niebauer, related arts professor at Michigan State University, recommends first cutting the potato in half widthwise and then blotting the cut surface of the potato on absorbent paper toweling. The secret to success in doing potato prints is to remove as much moisture as possible from the potato before applying paint.

Next, use a variety of tools such as a dull knife, a spoon, an ice pick or a pencil to make a design on the cut surface of the potato. The design can be abstract or real.

Once you have your design on the potato, dip your brush into some paint and apply the paint to the cut surface of the potato. With sufficient paint on the design (it doesn't require too much) merely blot the painted potato surface on a piece of paper. The design comes out better if you press to some extent. Continue this same process until you have the sheet of paper filled or you wish to change designs.

If you wish to switch the color of your design, rinse off the paint from the potato with water and blot the potato on some absorbent toweling. Then apply the other color of paint.

Potato prints can be used on fabrics as well as on paper. To apply them to fabrics you must use textile paint plus extender. First wash and iron your material. Next, use one-half the amount of extender as you use paint. Follow the same process as you did using paper. Allow the paint to dry 24 hours and then iron the fabric.
