County School Boards Fear Loss In State Aid Funds





If The County Tax Allocation Board Cuts Schools One Mill

IN THE LEGAL MECHANICS of Michigan tax laws, school districts share in state aid money in porportion to the amount of money that is allocated to your schools by local taxing units. Schools receive 100% state aid payments ONLY if they levy 8 or more mills based on the State Equalized Valuation for operational purposes.

This year the county tax allocation board reduced the schools from 8 to 7 mills on a "tentative basis". They can make their decision permanent at their final meeting May 25, or they can allocate 8 mills to the schools, the same figure schools received last year.

Here's what will happen should the board adhere to its tentative decisions:

The East Jordan School District would lose \$16,491.00 in State Aid Payments and \$6,644.00 in direct tax money for a total loss of \$23,135.00. This amounts to a loss of \$25.91 per pupil in the school enrollment.

The total loss to the schools in state aid and local tax revenue would amount to \$94,319.00 in all eleven (11) of the county's school districts. In all fairness to everyone concerned, it must

be explained how the situation arose. For several years townships have received oneholf mill. But last year a new law. Public Act No.

half mill. But last year a new law, Public Act No. 88, 1959, was passed which gave townships showing a need in their budgets a right to receive as much as one mill of the 15 mills to be divided among county, schools, and townships.

Many Charlevoix county townships submitted budgets for one mill for township road construction purposes and other operational expenses. It is their legal prerogative to do so. But there are virtually no township roads in the county; virtually every road in the county is a county or state road.

The one mill requested by townships would do little to improve roads. Some townships like Chandler, Hudson, and Wilson would receive amounts as little as \$78.00, \$197.00, and \$385.00 respectively. The largest township in the county, Eveline, would receive only \$2,381.00 for road construction or other operational purposes. In fact, all townships in the county would receive only \$8,996.00 total. That, according to competent road building authorities would pay for slightly less than one mile of graded and graveled secondary road.

But the tragedy in this mystery of tax law is that while the townships GAIN \$8,996.00, the county as a whole — and that includes the townships (we're all members of the county as a taxing unit)—would LOSE \$68,549.00. That figure is arrived at by adding direct tax money of \$7,-976.00, plus state aid payments of \$60,573.00 for a total of \$68,549.00 forfeited revenues.

However, a single year's loss in tax money isn't the complete picture created by the strange quirk of tax law.

County residents must face up to consequences with a "delayed action" effect.

As the result of loss of tax revenue several school districts now operating with slight balances will have to go before their electorate next year, asking for substantial increases in millage for operational expenses. The amounts they will have to ask for will vary in accordance with their financial status. All districts will have to ask for extra operational milage to offset the loss in state aid. Some may be able to continue to operate at extra millages as low as one mill. But all will have to ask for some kind of financial assistance.

There are alternatives that could save the potential return in State Aid money and Local Tax Revenue, and still net the schools their forfeited funds.

ALTERNATIVE NO. 1

If townships need money for roads, as they have requested from the county tax allocation board, they could vote one-half mill (\$8,000) or one mill (\$16,000), depending on the final allocation, and gain the \$60,-573.00 loss of state aid to schools in the county — thus saving their dwindling school budget dollars.

ALTERNATIVE NO. 2


The county electors could vote extra millage for county operation so that schools could still get eight mills and thereby meet the provisions of state tax laws — if townships continue their requests for road money. That, in general, is the situation that now confronts the county. All the schools in Charlevoix County, even with 8 mills, will be operating on less than the proposed budgets require.

This is the specific story for East Jordan. One mill will be necessary to meet the loss and three additional mills to meet budget needs. In Charlevoix the ratio is one plus three, to meet budget needs. In Boyne City the ratio is one plus $1\frac{1}{2}$ to meet the needs.

These examples are typical of the needs of other districts in the county.
