Marshall Acker Dies In Calif.

Funeral services will be held 2 p. m. today (Thursday) at Winchester Funeral Home in Charlevoix for Marshall W. Acker, 77, who died in Carmel, California, Monday following several months of illness.

Rev. Lawrence Tenhopen, of the First Congregational Church will officiate with burial in Brookside Cemetery.

Mr. Acker was born March 8, 1888 in Media, Penn., and prior to his retirement was vice president and a member of the board of directors Olin-Matheson Company, of Alton, Ill., a nationally known munitions firm.

Mr. Acker was an East Jordan area summer resident for 20 years and maintained a large estate off highway M-66 north, along the shores of Lake Charlevoix. He was well-known in northern Michigan.

Residents wishing to honor the memory of Mr. Acker may contribute to the organ fund at the Congregational Church of Charlevoix or make donations to Charlevoix hospital, it was said.

Mr. Acker was a member of the First Congregational Church of Charlevoix; a member of the Grosse Pointe Yacht Club, the

Circumnavigators Club of Detroit and the Detroit Athletic Club.

Surviving in addition to his wife, Maree, are one son, Worth, of Philadelphia and one daughter, Mrs. John Merz, of St. Louis, Mo. He also leaves a sister Mrs. Graham Staebler of Media, Pa. and five grandchildren.

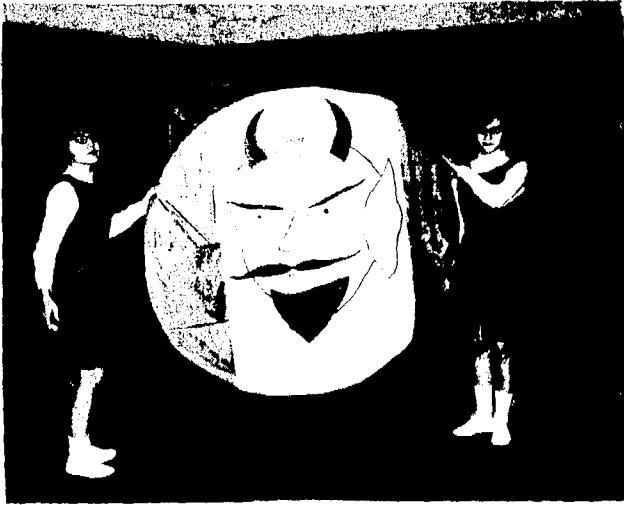
Help! Help! Community Chest \$900 Short

Sportsmen's Park Reports Biggest Year

The Jordan River Sportsmen's Club park sold 12,000 bags of corn in 1965 to visitors who paid a total of \$970.56 to feed the swan, birds and other wildlife, according to caretaker Elmer Green.

It was a happy year for park operations, Green said, with a balance of \$86.66 over the previous year.

The purchase of corn for the birds and hay for the deer cost \$657.53 and the total park expense for 1965 was reported to be \$1,240.90.

Monies for park maintenance comes from various sources, Green said, and they include \$250 from the Charlevoix County Board of Supervisors, \$100 donation by Dr. Westgate and a \$10 donation by Dr. David Pray. Money from sale of corn is also used for park operations. In 1965 total monies received amounted to \$1,330.56.

The wildlife park, one of the finest in northern Michigan, attracted thousands of visitors in 1965; not a day, winter or summer, goes by without someone visiting the area.

Green said the club is extending its appreciation to everyone who aided park operations in any way.

X-Way Comes North

A dual-lane freeway from Grand Rapids to Mackinaw City, is planned by the State Highway Department.

Highway US-131 now extends from the Indiana border to north of Petoskey. The section of the highway from Three Rivers north to north of Grand Rapids has been reconstructed to a dual-lane, divided freeway.

The department has scheduled a meeting of interested citizens in Cedar Springs to discuss construction of the two-lane highway through that area. Proposed now is to extend the highway north of Howard City as the plan develops for the northern route.

In addition, the highway department is taking bids on three road jobs in Charlevoix county; 0.3 miles of reconstruction of US-31 in Charlevoix. Estimated cost, \$75,000; 1.4 miles of reconstruction of US-31 north from the south county line. Cost is \$121,000; 2.2 miles of relocation of M-66 in and south of Charlevoix. Cost \$280,000

The department is taking bids on reconstruction of two sections of US-31 in Antrim County.

US-31 is the highway running from traverse city through Charlevoix and on to Petoskey, not to be confused with 131, which runs north from Grand Rapids to Mackinaw City.

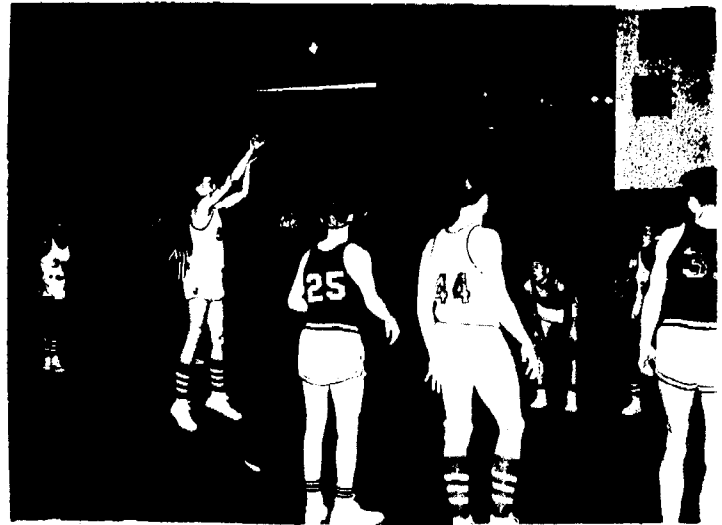
On the local court Harbor Springs out shot the Devils from the floor but were unable to stop fouling East Jordan's taller men who ground out a win via the

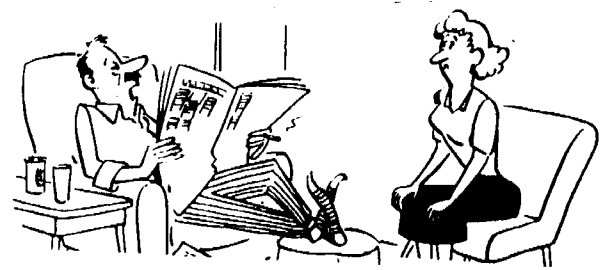

If Not Now, When?

It will be a long time, if ever, before controversy over the deeds of the 89th Congress ends. And it will be a long time before the full effect, for good or ill, of the mass of unique legislation it passed is fully felt and understood.

But one thing is certain--the 89th has been a spender with a capital S. Time magazine reports succinctly: "In all, the 89th spent \$119.3 billion--a total unprecedented in peacetime and one that will require decades to pay off; interest on this year's national debt alone came to \$11 billion."

It now remains to be seen what spending on this staggering scale will do to the dollar's worth. Federal deficits, as painful past experience tells us, are breeders of inflation. And, ironically, inflation is the worst enemy of the people of small means whom much of the new legislation is supposed to help.

If the government cannot come near to balancing its budget in boom times, when tax revenues are at enormous levels, when can it? The dollar's value has been degraded by about half in the postwar years. What will be left of it in a few years? No more important question than that confronts the American people.

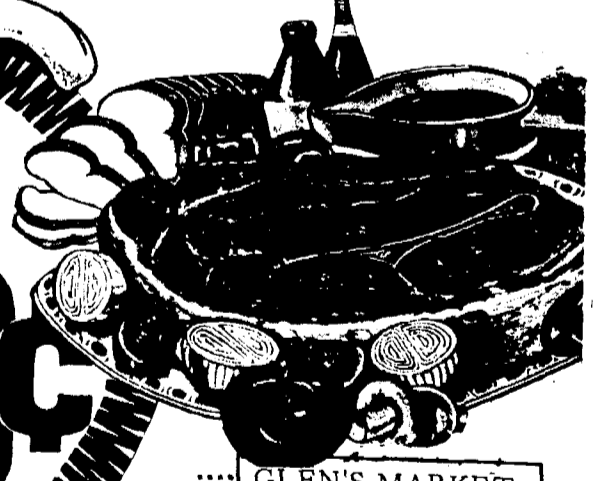

City Attorney Klevorn appeared concerning the leasing of that portion of the Community Building not used for city purposes and requested further data before drawing the lease.

Moved by Alderman Shepard, seconded by Alderman Olson that a Lincoln Welder be purchased from Fochman Motor Co. for \$93.00 complete. Motion carried all ayes.

Moved by Alderman Shepard, seconded by Alderman Stanek that Clifford Mayhew be raised to \$2.10 per hour. Motion carried all ayes.

Moved by Alderman Morrison, seconded by Alderman Stanek that the cost of perpetual care be \$50.00 per burial and that it be deposited in a Perpetual Care Fund, interest from said fund to be used for Cemetery Maintenance. Motion carried all ayes.

Moved by Alderman Morrison, seconded by Alderman Shepard that Loren Willson be allowed five (5) gallons of gasoline per week for using his car for city business. Motion carried all ayes.

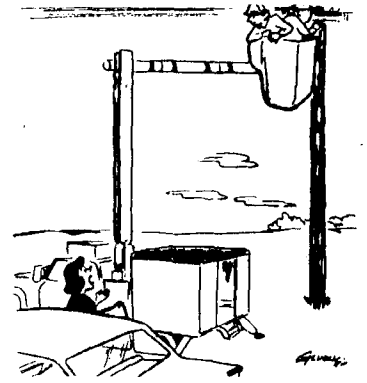
