The following is the activity list for the Jordan Valley Festival opening at 10 a.m. Saturday morning, July 3rd with an aerial salute.

The Kiddies' Parade will move at 10 a.m. after forming at the Field and moving down Main Street and back to the G.A.R. Park, where treats will be served to the kiddies.

The theme of the Kiddies' Parade this year will be "Song Titles", so you can rest assured that you will see some fantastic floats. There will be a rest period until the formation of the big parade which will form at 3 p.m. at the school house and move at 3:30 p.m. over the regular line of march. An aerial salute will let everyone know that the big parade is on the way. The parade this year will again be headed by the Guard from the United States Coast Guard Air Station, Traverse City.

I am expecting many new floats and, of course, the many beautiful queens in their colorful attire which really makes up a beautiful parade. One of the features of the parade will be the 40-et-8 train from Lansing entered by Siegel Hardware and the American Legion Post of East Jordan. This is really something!

At 3:15 p.m. just before the start of the parade, Kinchloe Air Force Base will have a fly over East Jordan and I know it will be quite a spectacle. Dynamite, the famous clown, will also be on hand before the parade, during the parade, and after the parade, and I know the kiddies will get a big kick out of the many routines. Following the completion of the parade there will be a double parachute drop over Jordan Harbor at 5 p.m.

After the parade the Little Leaguers will have a baseball game at their Westside diamond. At 8 p.m. at the big building at the Tourist Park there will be a square dance. The chairman, Irah Richter, has obtained the services of Cliff Hendricks of Ft. Lauderdale, Florida as the caller, so let's fill up the floor for a good time. The time is 8 p.m. to 10:30 p.m.

Sunday, July 4th

Regular church services at all churches Sunday morning.

Sunday afternoon starting at 2 p.m. there will be motor boat races sanctioned by the American Power Boat Association, Detroit and sponsored by the East Jordan Chamber of Commerce and the Top O' Michigan Outboard Racing Club, with the approval of the United States Coast Guard.

This will be the largest event of this kind ever held in this part of Michigan outside of the Top O' Michigan Marathon Race. Visitors are going to see some of the most powerful outboard racers that ever hit the water. There will be several classes and several heats in each class. The races will begin at 2 p.m. and continue until 6 p.m. Come prepared to see some mighty fine races during the afternoon.

Immediately after the races there will be another double parachute drop over Jordan Harbor. At 7 p.m. a soft ball game will be held at the Westside park. At 8 p.m. there will be a boat parade forming at Ric's Boats and moving to the city dock and return.

To top off the festival at 10 p.m., there will be the gigantic display of fireworks over Jordan Harbor.

The carnival sponsored by the East Jordan firemen, located at the Westside Park, will be here the 3rd, 4th and 5th.

So come over and see what is going on and be sure and bring the kiddies.

Launching the eleventh summer of stars at Cherry County Playhouse, the ground crew have arrived in Traverse City and have begun the count-down for the opening night, July 10.

Producer Ruth Bailey, who introduced the star system to Michigan summer theatres in 1955 when she produced Traverse City's first theatre in the round, has moved the stars under a new styrofoam dome after a decade of performances under a tent. This week she settled in Traverse City for the season, having put the final touches on the 1965 schedule of plays.

The head of the theatre department at the University of Cincinnati for the last 15 years, Paul Rutledge, is Cherry County's general manager for his second year. Rutledge has directed over 225 plays and has produced summer theatre for over 15 years. A specialist in international theatre, he has traveled extensively in Europe.

Victor A. Knox, of Sault Ste. Marie has announced he would not be a candidate in 1966 for election to Congress from the 11th District of Michigan, a post he held for 12 years from 1953 to 1964. Knox, who has served the citizens of Northern Michigan in local, State, and Federal offices for more than three decades, said that personal reasons involving family and business considerations prompted the decision. The Michigan Republican issued the statement in response to requests from numerous sources that he seek to regain his former Congressional post.

In making his announcement, Knox stated his intention to preserve his close ties with affairs in Northern Michigan and pledged his active support for the candidates and principles of the Republican Party. He expressed concern over the fiscal extravagance, the bureaucratic stifling of individual liberty, and the leadership failure in foreign affairs that are currently prevailing in Washington.

LETTERS TO EDITOR

The following letter is from Marian Donaldson in Zambia, Africa, dated June 8th.
Dear Editor,

We are in the cold season in Zambia now. In many ways it is comparable to the winter season in the States. The leaves are falling, the grass is brown and the wind is blowing. All we lack is the snow. Early morning temperatures are in the low forties. During the day the temperature rises into the sixties and low seventies.

The last week of April four other missionaries and I visited Kariba Lake for a short 2 day vacation. We left Choma at 4:30 a. m. on Monday morning so we could be in Lusaka when the stores opened at 8:30 a. m. After spending most of the day shopping we headed for Kariba Dam.

There are only two ways to get to Kariba--by road or by air. We took the former. The distance from Lusaka to Kariba is about 75 miles. The last 42 miles are on winding, hilly, good gravel road. We arrived there about 7:30 p. m.

Tuesday morning we visited the Dam. Kariba Dam is a double-curvature arch dam with a maximum height of 420 ft. and a crest length of 2,025 ft. It carries a 40 ft. wide road on the top, making it possible to cross from Zambia to Rhodesia. The dam itself contains approximately 1,275,000 cu. yd. of concrete. There are six flood gates, each 30 ft. high by 31 ft. wide, whose combine discharge capacity is 336,000 cusecs.

After passing through customs, we passed to the Rhodesia side. On the Rhodesia side is a good lookout spot overlooking the Dam. From the lookout spot we could see Kariba Lake on two sides. Lake Kariba is the world's largest artificial lake. The capacity when full is 40,837,500 million gallons. The length from tip to tip is about 175 miles, the maximum width is 20 miles, and the total area about 2,000 square miles.

While visiting on the Rhodesia side, we snaked our way up the hillside to the circular, open-air church in the city of Kariba. This was built by the Italian employees of the main constructors of the dam. Inside is a large stone containing the names of those who lost their lives during the construction of the dam. Also atop one of the hills is the Kariba Hotel. This air-conditioned hotel is situated 1200 ft. above the lake, and overlooks it.

We were unable to take in the tour of the underground power station because of lack of reservations. These must be made in advance. In this tour visitors are taken down 600 feet to see the impressive generators and turbines.

One week after our visit five of the flood-gates were opened. This was the first time since 1963 that five flood-gates have been opened.

After our visit to the Dam we spent the remainder of the day swimming in Lake Kariba.

Many people have inquired about the diet of the missionaries. Basically it is essentially the same as what we eat in America. We do eat some of the African dishes, but not everyday. We have meat and potatoes, eggs, macaroni, cheese, fresh and canned vegetables and fruits and frozen fish. Many of the miss-

He was named a communications representative in 1952 and later was a sales representative and a commercial operations assistant at Flint before coming to Petoskey.

Harrold is a past vice president of the Flint Junior Chamber of Commerce and was a member of the West Flint Optimist Club. He also headed a Boy Scout troop in Flint.

Water Skiing

The water skiing season has hit the Jordan Valley area along with the opening of summer resorts and northern Michigan outdoor activities.

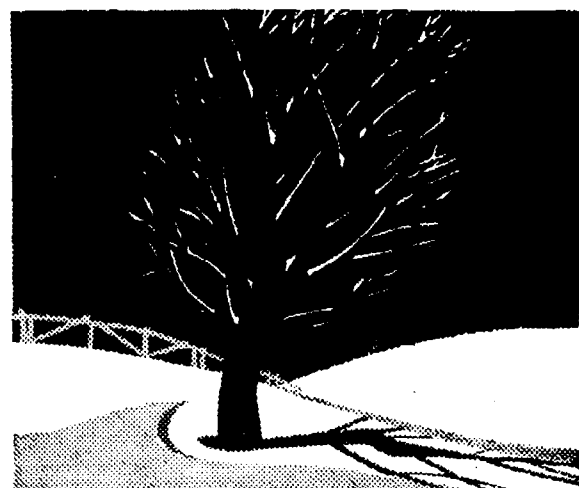
Caution is the word to all water skiers in the south arm of Lake Charlevoix as more and more young folks take up the summertime sport. Both the driver and the skier should acquaint themselves with regulations governing water skiing through the county sheriff's boat patrol department.

Dry land technique can take guesswork out of learning to water ski and its a quick way to get the "feel" of the skis and gain self-confidence.

Former national ski champion Tom Dorwin told the News-Herald last week that the dry land technique is a simplified form of instruction that can be given anywhere, even in your living-room. He is now an adviser to Evinrude Motors.

Although the day was cool and the season not yet underway, the youths at left demonstrated the dry land technique. Grasp the tow line handle, have the instructor lower you down to a sitting position. The tow line handle should be just in front of your knees. The instructor should pull the tow line, slowly raising you to a standing position. Don't try to stand up. This will simulate the manner in which you will be pulled to the surface when actually water skiing. Repeat the procedure several times.

ORDINANCE NO. 107

AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE THE FILLING OF TANKS OR CONTAINERS WITHIN THE CITY OF EAST JORDAN: TO ADOPT BY REFERENCE THE REGULATIONS PROMULGATED BY THE COMMISSIONER OF MICHIGAN STATE POLICE.

THE CITY OF EAST JORDAN ORDAINS:
Section 1. REGULATIONS ADOPTED.

The Flammable liquid Regulation pertaining to the filling of tanks or containers as promulgated and adopted by the Commissioner of the Michigan State Police on May 28th, 1963, as prescribed, and authorized in Sections 3, 5 and 5A of Act 207 of the Public Acts of 1941, as amended. This amends the Flammable Liquids Regulations as they are published in the Michigan Administrative Code, 1955 Annual Supplement, pages 7 - 49, and in the 1961 Supplement, page 2127, is hereby adopted by reference as in this Ordinance modified.

Section 2. REFERENCES IN ACT AND REGULATION.

References in the Public Act and Regulation to "governmental unit" shall mean the City of East Jordan.

Section 3 NOTICE TO BE PUBLISHED.

The City Clerk shall publish this Ordinance in the manner required by law and shall at all times keep complete copies of the Regulations at the Office of the Clerk for inspection by the public at all time.

SECTION 4.

Any violation of this Ordinance shall be a misdemeanor and shall be punishable by a fine of not more than \$100.00 or a term of confinement in the County Jail for not more than ninety days or both fine and confinement.

Section 5.

This Ordinance shall take immediate effect due to the fact that lives of inhabitants are endangered by violation of some

of the provisions.

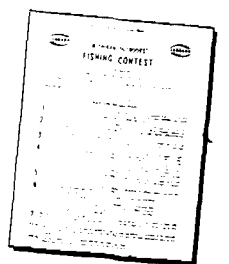

ionaries grow some fruit and/or vegetables. We are able to grow oranges, lemons, grapefruit, paw paw and mangoes. Any vegetable that is grown in the states can be grown here. We do most of our own baking, though cookies can be purchased. Cakes, rolls, sweet breads, pies and doughnuts or fried cakes cannot be purchased either ready made or ready to bake. There are few package meals such as macaroni and cheese, pizza, or Italian spaghetti. Rice and curry in a package meal can be purchased. We make our own ice cream, though ice cream is available if you are living in town. Jello and pudding mixes are also available.

I will try to write again soon and tell you more about life in Zambia.

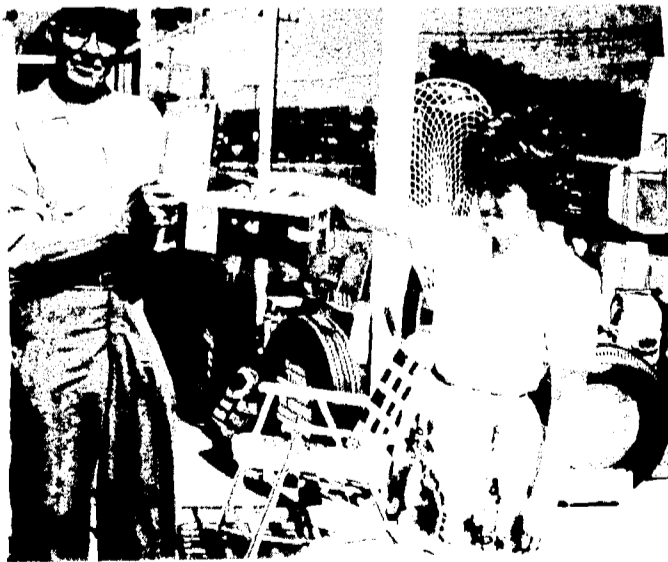

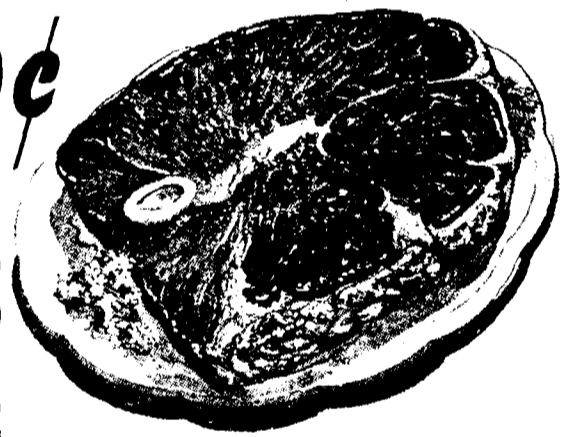
