East Jordan school district voters gave the six millage request a 26 vote majority in special election at the city hall last Thursday.

Board of education secretary Greg Boswell said there was a total of 482 votes cast.

There were 253 votes in favor of the six mills and 227 against it. Two votes were spoiled.


The six mills assessed for one year on property within the school district were asked by the board of education to raise funds for school operational purposes.

At the school's regular election in June, the millage proposal was defeated and Thursday election was the second try to obtain the necessary funds.





RESIDENTS APPRECIATE FESTIVAL

Nearly one thousand people attended East Jordan's fourth annual Portside Arts Fair in the community building last week-end as it developed into one of northern Michigan's summer highlights.

The arts festival filled East Jordan's downtown area with tourists both Saturday and Sunday.

The project has done much over the years to increase both local and area appreciation of the arts and those folks sponsoring the event are to be highly commended. A small group of residents have given their time and effort to plan and carry out the work and there is much evidence that our residents appreciate the fine in they are doing.

A CALL FOR HELP

A call for help to ready Boswell Field Stadium for painting is being issued this week by the school and it is hoped that many residents interested in football and other sports will pitch in and help. In the past few years many residents have from time to time helped with needed work at the field and it is believed that the job now needing to be done will receive the same enthusiastic support. As development work progresses at the field it is becoming the finest in the north country.

INDUSTRY CREATES JOBS


Job creation in private industry is at a 22-year record high, and employees are earning record wages. Employment in manufacturing climbed to almost 18.1 million jobs in June, up 244 thousand from the previous month, according to figures released by the United States Department of Labor.

This is a record peace-time total of factory jobs, and comes within only 6,000 jobs of the November 1943 all-time record when the economy was at a wartime peak. These figures serve to reiterate the fact—that private industry is the prime source of job creation, and that a favorable business climate should be maintained in order to continue to open up more jobs for a working America.

In commenting on this record, Harold C. Goldstein, a labor department official, said, "We are within a whisper of the highest level that manufacturing employment has ever attained in the United States."

The rise in nonfarm payroll jobs since June, 1964 was 2,211,000, the biggest year-to-year increase since 1959 when the country was coming out of a recession.

The average factory work week in June of 41.3 hours and average overtime of 3.6 hours were the highest since 1945. Average hourly earnings in June of \$2.62 boosted weekly earnings by 68 cents to a record of \$108.21. This was 4.5% higher than the year-earlier figure.




