Legion Members Burn Mortgage

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THERE SHE GOES! After fifteen years of paying off a mortgage, American Legion members of the Rebec-Sweet Post 227, East Jordan, gathered at the post Saturday night to burn the mortgage. Sixteen years from the time the Rebec-Sweet Post building was destroyed by fire on Main Street, members gathered in the new building to burn the mortgage on the new facilities. The celebration was held at the post Saturday night.

William Bennett, past fourth zone commander, East Jordan past master and president of the chamber of commerce, traced the history of the American Legion activities for the some 175 guests present.

Bennett recalled the big fire that destroyed the former post, the work of cleaning up the aftermath and the long months of constructing a new building. He told of the mortgage that was necessary and of the many hours put into rebuilding and refurnishing by American Legion members.

Merle Crowell gave a history of the local post from the time it was formed up to the time the building burned.

Auxiliary President Eva Peterson gave a history of the women's auxiliary activities at the new building.

A framed photo story of early American Legion activities was presented the Post by Tom St. Charles and Vern Whiteford.

The evening's ceremony was opened with prayer by post chaplain William Drenth and was closed with a prayer by William McNeil, lower 11th district chaplain, of Alpena.

The program was preceded with a buffet supper under arrangement of the Jassamine Rebeckah Lodge, of East Jordan.

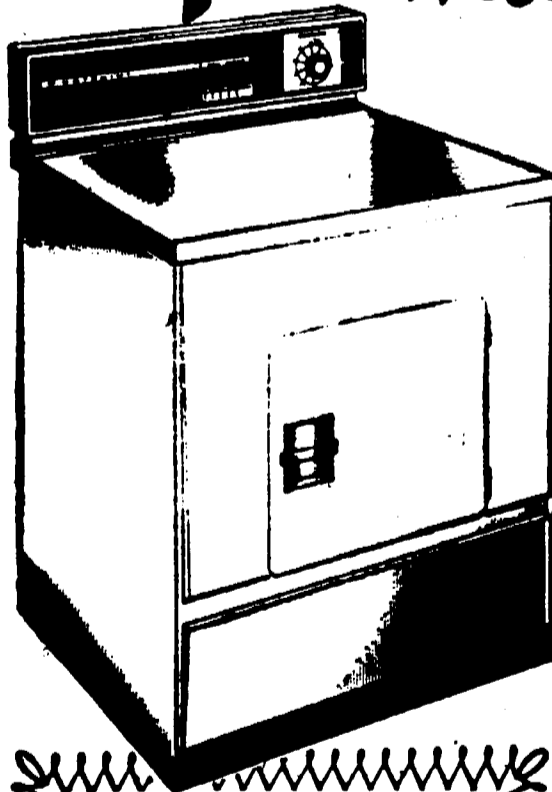

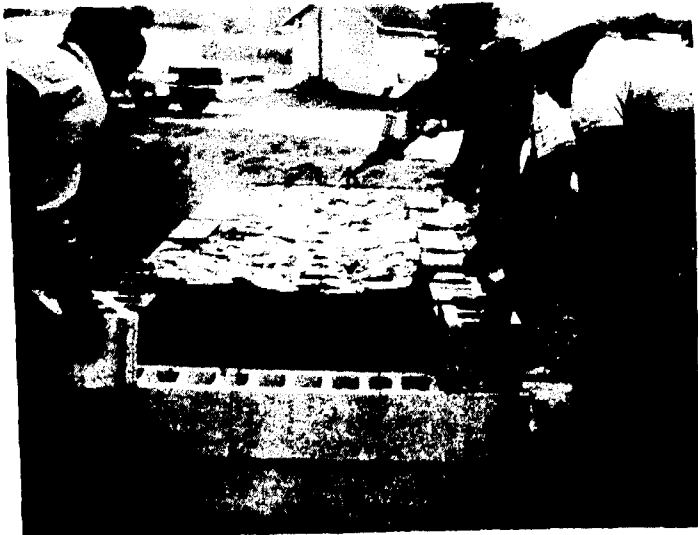

MRS. HUGH GIDLEY

The first woman president of the East Jordan board of education, Mrs. Hugh Gidley, has spent many years in community civic work.

Elected to the school board five years ago, Mrs. Gidley was the first woman member of the school's governing group. In July of this year she was elected to the presidency of the board.

Mrs. Gidley was born Evelyn Kunkle in Chicago, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Kunkle. Later she lived with her parents in Grand Rapids, Detroit and Boyne City.

While in Boyne City, Mrs. Gidley was graduated from high school and later attended Ferris Institute and the University of Michigan. Although she has a commercial teaching degree, she has never taught school.

She was united in marriage in Petoskey in 1939 to Hugh Gidley, of East Jordan, the son of Mr. and Mrs. James Gidley. The Gidley family has operated a drug store in East Jordan for more than 65 years.

The Gidley's have three children. James is a teacher in Alba; Sally is employed at Detroit Edison Com-

pany and Nina is a Junior at East Jordan high school.

Mrs. Gidley is an Elder at the Presbyterian Church where she has held many church offices. She is vice-president of the East Jordan Garden Club and is a former girl scout leader.

For several years Mrs. Gidley has been on the board of directors of the East Jordan Community Chest. Currently she is secretary of the board.

Along with several other East Jordan women, Mrs. Gidley helped start occupational therapy sessions at Grandvue hospital. The patients were encouraged to do sewing, weaving and other crafts. The women also held card playing sessions at the hospital for the older folks, helping them to become interested in something besides their ailments. The sessions were in progress for three or four years until a new therapy program was established at the hospital.

Driver Training Receives Heavy Industry Boost

More than 1½ million high school students will take a course in driver education during their sophomore or junior years—56% of all those eligible—in the 12,720 schools in the 50 states offering this instruction as a part of their curriculum, according to the Automotive Safety Foundation.

The services of 25,575 school teachers will be required, and the average cost of training each student is \$50. The total amount spent annually on driver education in American high schools is estimated to be approximately \$75 million.

A large share of this cost is borne by the automobile manufacturers and dealers as a public service project. Out of the 15,285 cars used by the schools for practice driving, 9,778 have been provided by dealers on a free loan basis.

However, this is but a small part of the investment made by industry on programs related to the safety, durability and reliability of automobiles, as well as other forms of accident prevention.

UNTAPPED RESOURCES

Now that many of the mysteries of the universe are closer to solution through the space program—a comparable challenge for knowledge faces us in the depths of the ocean.

The combined government and private programs in oceanography total over 1½ billion dollars per year, a financial outlay one-third as large as the United States space program and growing at a more rapid rate.

Both the industry and Department of Defense programs seek support. A prime example of the need by all concerned in the field, is the exploration of the oceans for mapping as well as the development of resources.

We approve the legislative recommendation of Rep. Paul G. Rogers (D. Fla.) for the establishment of a National Commission on Oceanography. It would authorize the President to appoint a commission to investigate the current status of the U. S. in the field of oceanography and recommend a future course of action best geared to our national needs and development programs.

The commission would be composed of five persons from the field of industry, five from government, and five from the universities and laboratories participating in oceanographic work.

It would be given two years to complete its assignment and submit a report to the President and Congress. It is hoped that the result will enable industry to proceed independently in those areas where it is best fitted, and to work with scientists and government in the attainment of greater knowledge and achievement in developing the oceans' resources for mankind.

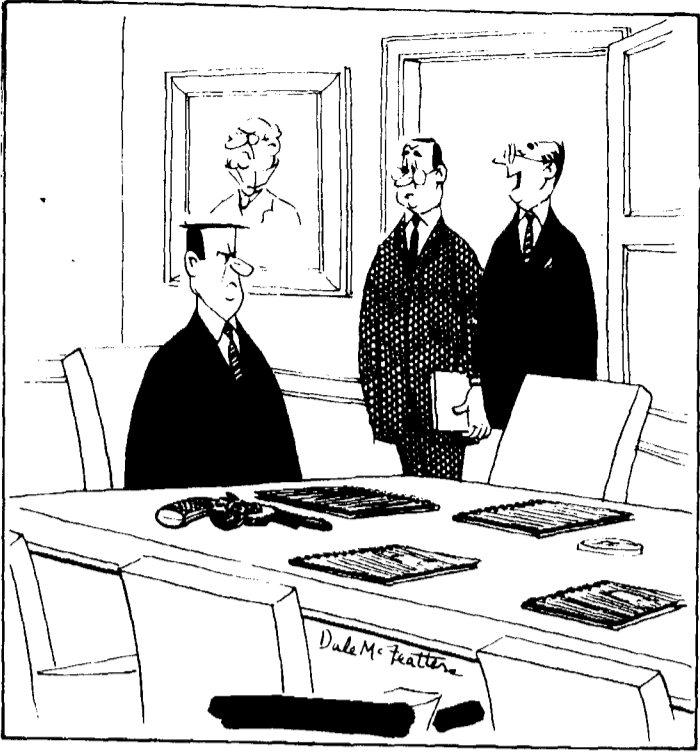

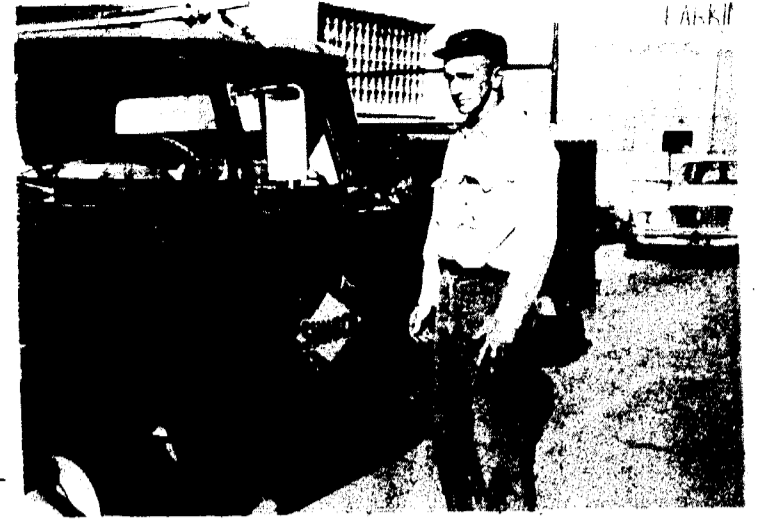

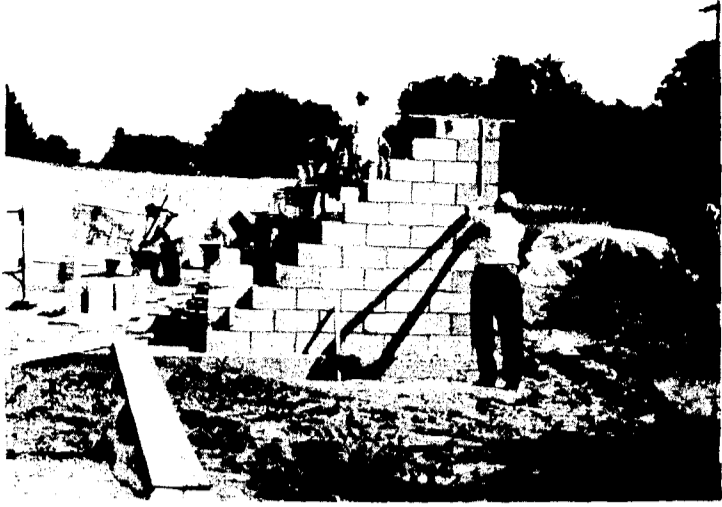
