Red Devils Open Season Friday Night

The East Jordan Red Devils, under a new head coach, will field a well balanced squad against Kalkaska in the school's non-conference opener at Kalkaska, Friday night.

Barry Johnson, who takes over Red Devil coaching duties after two years at Hillman, replacing Wes Fleet at the local school, hopes to better last year's opening score against Kalkaska.

The team met the locals on Boswell Field last year with East Jordan showing first night jitters in a contest that ended 6-0 in the Devil's favor.

Friday's start will probably see Mike Egan or Don Gee quarterbacking with Ted Sherman as fullback; and it looks like Tom Drenth will start at center.

Others expected to make up the initial outfit are Bill Breakley, Bill Chase, Phil Goebel, Sam Reid, Brad Jones with Bill Dougherty. In addition Jim McKinnon, Gary Anderson and Jerry Schenck will probably see action as the season progresses.

The East Jordan squad which has enough experience to better its last year's record of three ties and four losses, will meet old rivals, Boyne City on October 1st and Charlevoix October 29th.

Services were held at 10 a. m. Monday, September 13 at Watson's Funeral Home in East Jordan for Donald Ellsworth Jones, 57, who died at Garden City, Long Island, September 9th from a heart attack. Rev. Daniel Axt of the First Presbyterian Church officiated and burial was in Sunset Hill cemetery, East Jordan.

Mr. Jones was born May 29, 1908 in Maybee, Michigan. He attended Wyandotte High School and the University of Syracuse. On January 11, 1932, he married Harriet Hoyt of Chittenango, New York. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. A. Hoyt of East Jordan. Mr. Hoyt came to East Jordan March 1, 1891, and was a lumber inspector with the East Jordan Lumber Company until he retired. Mrs. Jones died October 6, 1964, at Philadelphia.

Mr. Jones was a consulting engineer with Grefco, a general refractories company with headquarters in Philadelphia. He was a member of the University Club and Engineer's Club and attended the Presbyterian Church of Bryn Mawr, Pa.

Surviving is one stepson, Captain J.J. Hoyt of Brooklyn Navy Yard, New York, five step-grandchildren and one sister, Margaret Heimbokel of Atlanta, Michigan.

Relatives and friends to attend the funeral were Mr. and Mrs. C.L. Hoyt of Iola, Kansas, Mrs. R.F. Durant of Quincy Illinois, Miss June Hoyt of Huntington Woods, and Miss Kathryn Stanford of Ludington.

REDUCING TOMORROW'S CRASHES

Some of today's automobile accidents actually started to happen months or years ago. The mishaps could very well have had their inception in the inadequacies of catch-as-catch-can driver-instruction given to those behind the wheels of the cars involved.

It is gratifying to note, therefore, that the availability of accredited driver-education courses in high schools across the nation is escalating; that some states have made it compulsory.

The school training goes far beyond the mere mechanics of the driving operation. Students are made safety-conscious by thorough classroom drilling in careful driving rules and regulations. Included are text book theory, written projects and films on proper driving attitudes and behavior. A standard minimum course consists of 30 hours of classroom work and six hours of practice driving.

The whole idea is to instill a deep sense of responsibility in the trainee for the life, limb and property of the car-riding public and pedestrians.

These courses are expensive to operate. The amount spent annually in the schools in 31 states providing driver education has reached \$75 million. A large share of the cost, according to the Automotive Safety Foundation, is borne by automobile manufacturers and dealers, as a public service. For instance out of the 15,284 cars used by schools for practice driving, 9,778 are loaned by local dealers.

It seems to us that the automobile industry merits commendation for this and its many other vital aids to the achievement of greater safety on the country's thoroughfares.

National Boom in Education

Education today is in the midst of a great boom. During the past year, some 53 million people—or 28% of all Americans—were enrolled in school. Total cash outlays for public and private schools amounted to an estimated \$36 billion, up more than tenfold from \$3.4 billion in 1940.

Nearly 2 1/4 million persons were employed as teachers, instructors and professors.

we Americans have been going to colleges and universities since seventeen ought something and we haven't yet learned how to keep the answers well ahead of the situations.

Perhaps we should dump the whole thing into an electronic computer and catch a pan of solutions to our annoying situations. For surely the country cannot depend upon me to do it alone.

Heavens! I can't compute worth a hoot.

Maybe President Johnson should demand that all citizens create answers before they get themselves mixed up into situations. And if they refuse, he could threaten them with fresh legislation that would make them work hard and save their money. That's probably the meanest penalty one can think of in these times.

Yes, if we could put the answer ahead of the situation, our streets would be free of the switch blade, riots would cease and peace would race willy nilly throughout the land.

When that day comes the telephone company can have full reign over its white and yellow pages and the rafters won't hardly ring at all.

Need A Used Gun?

Hunters in the market for used guns to replace their old blunderbusses may find it worth their while to stop by at the Conservation Department's Region II Repair Shop in Gaylord during Sept. 16-17 and Sept. 20-21.

On display at the shop from 9 a. m. to 4 p. m. during each of those four days will be nearly 30 rifles and shotguns which are to be sold to the highest bidders.

The firearms, confiscated from game law violators, range in price from a \$7 Springfield rifle (.22 caliber) to a \$145 Winchester rifle (30-06 caliber).

Sealed bids for the weapons will be accepted at the Gaylord repair shop until 10 a. m., Sept. 22, when they will be opened.

Listings of the firearms being offered will be posted at county

courthouses and the Department's regional and district headquarters. Bid forms may be picked up at these Department offices and the repair shop in Gaylord.

Moved by Alderman Stanek and supported by Alderman Morris that \$5000.00 be transferred from the Water Receiving fund to the Water Operation and Maintenance Fund. Motion carried all ayes.

Moved by Alderman Shepard and supported by Alderman Morrison that Ordinance 108 governing a self-liquidation bond issue for the expansion of the Tourist Park be approved. Motion carried.

Ayes: Aldermen Peters, Shepard, Morrison, Morris, Stanek, and Olson.

Nayes: None.

Bids were received from Hodgkiss and Douma, Inc., of Petoskey and from John Martin (Tri-City Concrete) of Charlevoix, for the laying of asphalt road surface.
