The 1965-66 East Jordan Community Chest campaign fund drive will swing into action, Wednesday, October 13th with eleven captains assigned to collection areas, according to action taken by the board of directors.

The night before the annual drive opens in the city, the chest has planned a "kick-off" meeting for all solicitors 7:30 at the Jordan Inn. Workers will be briefed on campaign procedures and drive kits will be handed


The Crack-Down

This article is written for what it might be worth for we have no proof of it's final success.


founded earmarks of adult foolishness.

in an old Indian lore book he tried it, and noticed a marked improvement in his trees through that year.

As our lovely two huge elm had begun to show Dutch Elm disease effects in the very top-most branches, we were anxious to try anything to save them. We therefore broed a hole into each tree (slanting downward) large enough to accommodate the neck of a pop bottle, to a distance of about three inches, then with a smaller drill into the center of the trunk. This drilling was done below the first large branch.

Last fall a Quart of turpentine was fed into each tree, by means of the inverted bottle. Then the hole was corked. Early this spring the cork was removed and a quart and a half of turpentine was taken up by each tree, and in June another quart was given to each tree.

This year there are no branches dying and no showers of small twigs and leaves that occurred all last summer, which was so very evident as one elm spreads over our concrete drive. We feel encouraged and will repeat this process again this fall and next year.

Though this would not be practical to some elm in heavily wooded areas, to try to save residential elms takes little effort and expense in this manner.

The Indian lore article mentioned "feeding" turpentine as a remedy for diseases of elms, but no particulars were given as to amounts. Our elm are 30 to 32 inches in diameter and we have guessed as to the amounts of turpentine.

Because our elm look very much better than last year, we wanted to share this information with anyone who might care to try this experiment.

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

The home endeavors to give each child a normal home life as is possible, they live in cottages with home mothers in charge, each child has a share in the duties of keeping the cottage clean. Individual attention is given each child when needed. There are counselors on duty







The Farm Market

MILK-- The Michigan Milk Producers Assn. established a \$5.10 Class I price for August 1965 to July 1966, a 10-13 cent increase over year earlier levels. This, plus a reduction in direct shipment differentials averaging 6.5 cents, will strengthen Base prices in this period. Production will continue to be held in check by a tight labor situation, smaller hay and feed grain crops, and artractive hog and beef prices.

CATTLE--Rising prices this past spring encouraged a step-up in placements of cattle on feed, bringing the July 1 inventory up to 9 percent over the year before. The increase was in cattle weighing under 900 pounds, so that the impact would show up along in the fall and winter months.

HOGS--Hog prices should hold above \$20 through mid 1966 except for the seasonal lows along in November or December.

LAMBS--Lamb prices dropped

sharply since early June but should not decline much below late July levels, when Choice spring lambs brought \$23.50 at Detroit.

EGGS--Prices paid by wholesale distributors for Grade A Large eggs, 33 cents per dozen in late July, should increase seasonally into September and October.

WHEAT--Possible sales to Russia, growing concern over Viet Nam, excessive rain in Europe, drought in Australia and tight holding by farmers strengthened the wheat market in late July and early August. Central Michigan prices were around \$1.40 in mid August.

CORN-- The 1965 U.S. corn crop is estimated at nearly 4 billion bushels, 10 percent above last year. Market prices will likely be a little lower than on the 1964 crop and near the \$1.05 loan rate in Central Michigan.

DRY BEANS--Dry weather reduced prospects and August 1 indications were for a 5,947,000 cwt. crop in Michigan, down 20 percent from 1964. Elsewhere, however, larger dry bean crops are predicted.
