## Bond Ok Assures City 100-Unit Tourist Park

### Season Opens Saturday



Thousands of deer hunters are moving north this week for Saturday's opening date in hopes of bagging a deer in areas like the Jordan River Valley.

East Jordan's weather at presstime was anything but good for deer hunting, since it was raining and with no sign of snow in the woods. Temperatures stood at 40 degrees.

A number of people have been checking the valley within the past few days by car and by plane and they are not too happy with the number of deer reported in the woods.

However, state conservation department deer experts feel the kill will be somewhat higher over the state this year.

In connection with the deer season, East Jordan has two contests under way. Healey Hardware and Peters' Leonard Service are both offering prizes for the largest and smallest animals brought in.

### MILSTEIN SAYS DUNES PARK IS ASSURED, PATS CITY FOR TOURIST PARK OPERATION

Sam Milstein, son of Barney Milstein, of East Jordan, told Rotary Club members Tuesday noon that national approval of a federal park in the west Michigan Dunes area is practically assured.

Milstein, an employee of the Parks division of the conservation department, said that with the state conservation department in favor of a federal park in West Michigan, and with the support shown in Washington for it, congress will use the area as a

national recreational site. He expects the bill to be passed next year.

Milstein congratulated East Jordan on development and maintenance of its city-owned tourist park, saying that such municipally owned parks are a rarity in Michigan.

The speaker was brought to Rotary by his father, who was the club's program chairman for the day.

### Tourist Facilities To Be Tops In State

The East Jordan Tourist Park's \$30,000.00 face lifting job will get under way in the spring, it was announced by the city council Tuesday night.

Mayor Milton Meredith said the city is advertising for sale of bonds to obtain financing for the park's long awaited improvement.

Bonds for the work went on sale this week following approval of the action by the Michigan Municipal Finance Commission.

Attorney General Frank Kelly said in Lansing that: "The proceeds for these bonds will be used to finance the cost of acquiring and constructing improvements to the East Jordan Municipal Park. The bonds will run until 1976."

No city tax money is needed for the project, since the financing plan is set up on a self-liquidating basis with future park revenues meeting bond payments.

When park improvements are completed next summer, East Jordan will have a well equipped, state approved 100-unit tourist park.

The modern tourist facilities for visiting trailer owners will be unmatched north of Grand Rapids, it was said.

### IT ONLY WORKS ONE WAY

The average American family's principal lifetime investment is in a home. From the time the initial agreement is signed, until the final mortgage payment has been made, investments in homes help make any community a better place to live.

The home is also a major tax source for the running of the community. When the home is well cared for—and improved, it increases in value both to the owner and in community betterment.

Sometimes it is necessary to sell a home—so it is placed on the market. Then the federal government steps into the picture. If through diligence and care and other factors the value of the home has increased, the profit from the sale is subject to a federal capital gains tax.

To be sure, this liability can be deferred by investing in another residence, or if the owner is 65 years old or over, an exemption from capital gains of the first \$20,000 is permitted under certain conditions. But if the home is sold at a loss, the federal government will not permit a tax deduction.

I asked him how he got his car started this morning and he said he didn't have one.

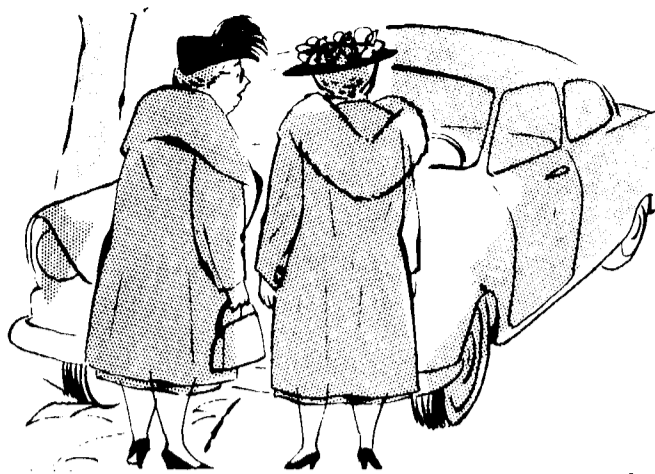
"I don't have a job," he said, "so I don't need a car. I've lived on a pension all my life and I've never had to do anything but vote Democrat and take soda."

### "PAP" TEST PROGRAM ANNOUNCED FOR CHARLEVOIX COUNTY WOMEN

A. F. Litzenger, M. D., Medical Director of District Health Department, has announced a continuing cervical cancer screening program for women 21 years of age and over in Charlevoix county.

Doctor Litzenger emphasized that women who have never had a "Pap" test for the detection of cervical cancer should take advantage of this program.

"Cervical cancer is one of the most easily cured forms of the disease when discovered early," Dr. Litzenger said, "But if it is not detected until such signs as pain and bleeding occur, the chances of successful treatment are decreased."

According to figures compiled by the Michigan Department of Health, 333 women died from cervical cancer in 1963.

"These were all needless deaths," Dr. Litzenger said, "because there is a technique

known as the Papanicolaou test which can detect the presence of cancer of the cervix in the early stages before any outward or visible signs are evident. If these women had been having a regular health checkup including a "Pap" test, most of them would probably be alive today."

"During this cervical cancer screening program the Michigan Department of Health will pay for the laboratory examination, while the women having the test will be expected to pay for the office call.

During 1962 over 1,450 women were screened for cervical cancer in Emmet and Charlevoix Counties; seventeen women were found to have cervical cancer. All of these women have been treated and are alive today.

Women who wish to have the "Pap" test should call their physician for an appointment.

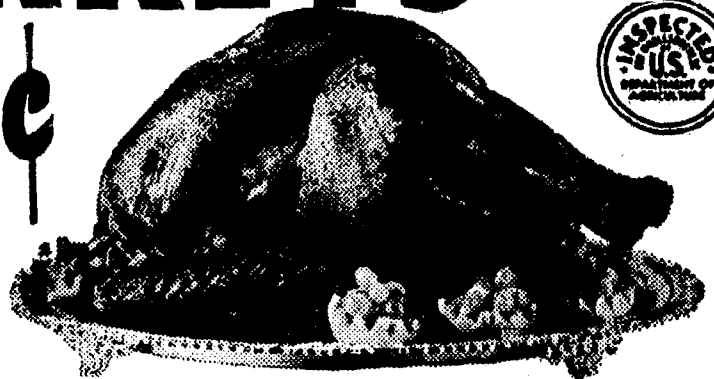

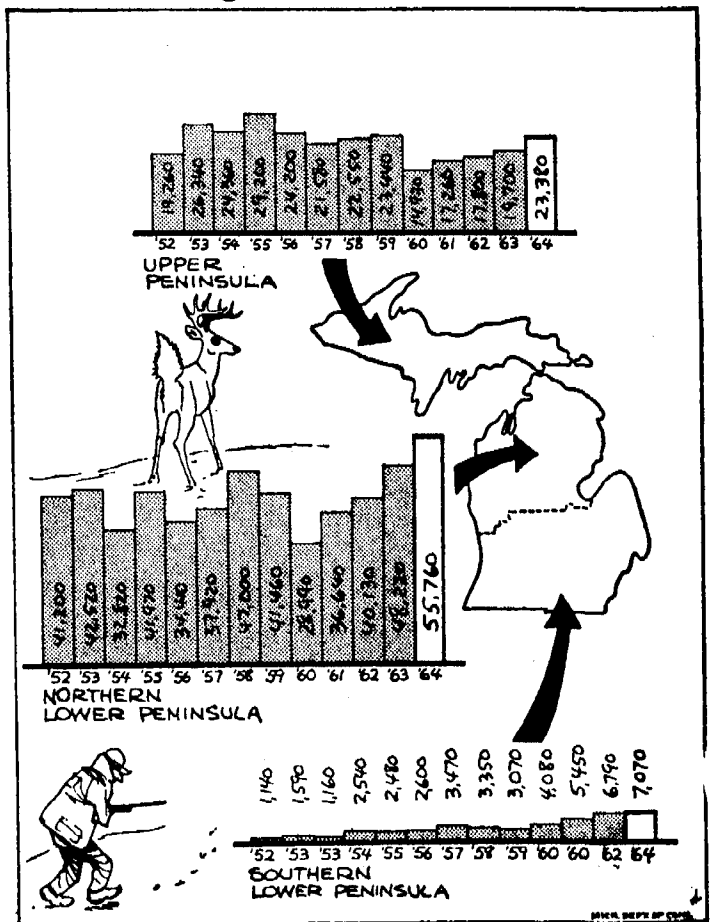

## Michigan Buck Harvest



As these bar graphs and figures show, buck kill has been on the upswing in each of Michigan's three regions for the last four years. State-wide, it was the best last year since 1946. In the Upper Peninsula, the 1964 take of antlered animals was above the 13-year average and tops for the last five seasons. In the northern Lower Peninsula, last season's buck harvest was the highest in 13 years. Last year saw sportsmen score their fourth straight record buck kill in the southern third of the state which is rapidly developing into a major deer hunting area.

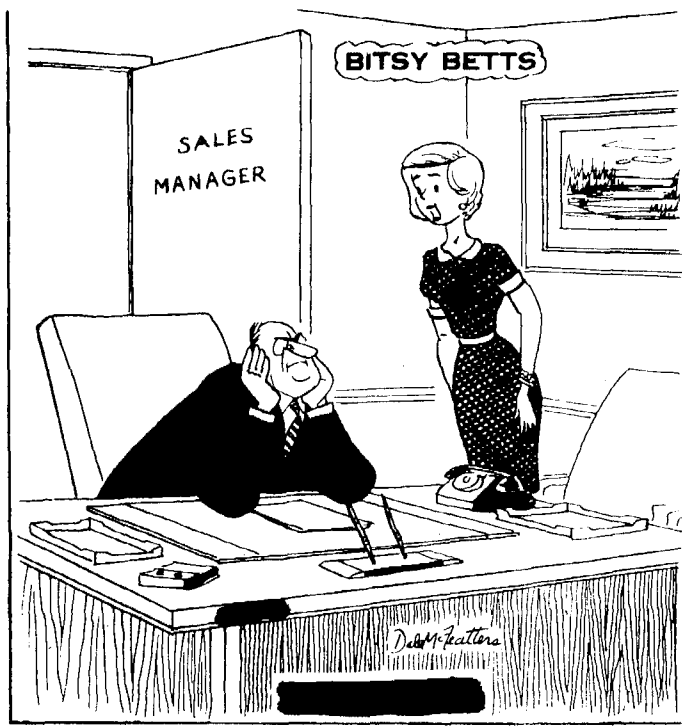
