Is Your Boy In Service?

East Jordan men serving their country around the world do not have to take part in a new U. S. service called "Operation Hometown Newspaper."

All East Jordan servicemen who forward their address to the News-Herald automatically receive the News-Herald each week.

The papers are paid for by the Community Service Club, a division of the East Jordan Community Chest. This service to our fighting men has been underway for more than 20 years.

"Operation Hometown Newspaper" has been announced by Dorothy Hughes, president, The American Legion Auxiliary, Department, of Michigan.

The announcement said that in cooperation with the department of Defense, servicemen in Vietnam may request and get hometown newspapers. The 14,000 American Legion Auxiliary Units around the U. S. will make provisions for newspapers to be sent to soldiers in Vietnam, it was said. The new project is in cooperation with the American Society of Newspaper Editors.

Through the farsightedness of Community Chest members, East Jordan servicemen have benefited with this sort of project for some time, dating way back to World War II.

Postoffice Lists Yule Mailing

"Last Christmas the post office handled more mail than ever before, yet the operation was the most efficient in history," Postmaster Bennett said today.

The following mailing dates should be observed: Gift parcels overseas and to Alaska and Hawaii Air Mail by Dec. 10; Surface mail parcels to distant States by Dec. 5 and local or nearby States by Dec. 14; Greeting cards to distant States by Dec. 10 and locally by Dec. 15. If late in mailing, use Special Delivery, Special Handling and Air Mail for additional service.

Postmaster Bennett urged the use of first class postage on greeting cards. This assures their being forwarded if the recipient has moved or that undeliverable cards will be returned if a return address is on the envelope.

And last, use the recipients ZIP CODE in their address if you have it and your own (49727 for East Jordan) in the return address.

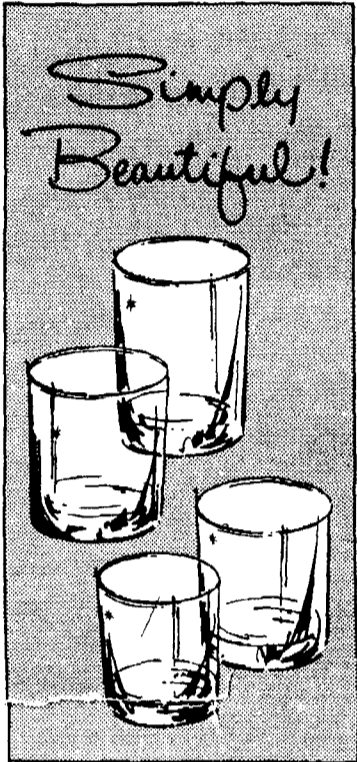

Industrial Upsurge Sets All-Time Record

E. J. Labor Paid \$4,000,000 Annually

East Jordan's industrial economy is keeping pace with other communities in northern Michigan and in some cases surpassing them.

Employment and payrolls have experienced a sharp rise within the past 24 months and manufacturing firms foresee no slow down through the winter months.

800 Drawing Checks

Industrial hirings have been brisk with nearly 800 men and women now drawing industrial pay checks in East Jordan.

Total number of industrial employees and the total weekly payroll are well above a News-Herald survey report conducted in 1963. Workers are now receiving more than \$18,000.00 per week over the total weekly payroll of two years ago.

Managers and owners of East Jordan's nine largest firms were questioned personally in the survey. Each firm was quick to cooperate with the tabulation work.

The constantly rising economy has moved East Jordan into an enviable position among northern Michigan industrial communities. Workers now are cashing pay checks at the rate of nearly four million dollars per year. Two years ago the combined industrial payroll was less than three million dollars for a twelve month period.

Bank Deposits Increase

East Jordan bank deposits are up some 10 percent over last year, reflecting the general economic situation. More than 500 residents cashed Christmas Club checks this month totaling more than \$60,000, according to the State Bank of East Jordan.

Belief among plant executives that the current economic situation will continue is shown by various plant additions and the establishing of two new plants, East Jordan Tool & Die, across from city airport, and East Jordan Plastics, off State Highway M-66 north.

This industrial survey does not include employees or payrolls at the East Jordan School, the City of East Jordan, The State Bank of East Jordan. The survey was intended only to report industrial activity.

The heavy industrial activity has brought fresh demands for more adequate airport facilities and the city of East Jordan has appointed two commissioners who are improving the field as rapidly as possible.

Increased hirings have been reflected in greater demands for housing. Many new employees arriving in the city seek rentals rather than purchasing houses. Rentals at various times have been difficult to find.

During the period of the News-Herald survey, opinions were expressed concerning the fact that East Jordan's heavy payrolls are not reflected on Main Street through developing retail business.

Skilled Labor In Demand

Concerning the often expressed opinion that "too many workers are living in other communities," it was said that East Jordan does not supply enough semi-skilled and skilled help to fill all the jobs available. The general opinion seemed to be that work is available for just about all of East Jordan's present supply of non-skilled labor willing and able to work.

Most common complaint among plant executives cooperating with the survey was the inability to obtain sufficient semi-skilled and skilled help in the area. Some executives suggested the critical situation be impressed upon high school students who are not now pointing their education toward any particular field.

Graduates without skills, it was said, are finding it increasingly difficult to move into industry. Many non-skilled workers are being hired, but will be replaced when skilled help is available, it was said.

A FEDERAL SCHOOL BOARD?

After the new federal school bill was put on the books, Congress had to dig up the money to implement its provisions. During debate on the bill, Representative Robert Michel, of Illinois, said, "Federal control of education is here...the foot is in the door and from here on we can expect the door to open wider toward federal control. One of these years we may wake up and see(that) the only school board member is Uncle Sam with a federal check.

Michel warned his colleagues that "this country is going down the road of nationalizing our education system from kindergarten through college...there is a cloak of secrecy surrounding the federal education movement." Supporters of the elementary and secondary education act of 1965 have expressed concern over what they call a determined effort to silence those who are in disagreement.

"Flagrantly dishonest in its language," says Congressman Michel, "and deliberately concealing the extent of authority which it grants, the bill is a delusion, mockery and a snare."

Congressman Michel cites evidence of the effort of the Administration to use a camouflage plan to replace the present state-local administration of American education. In 1961, "A Federal Educational Agency For the Future" was published as a government document. Michels says it was hastily buried when Congress asked questions about it. (Mich. Farm Bureau)

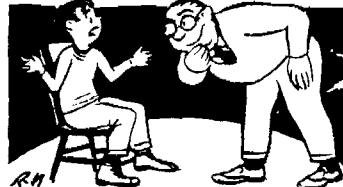

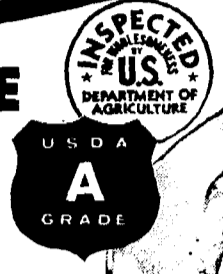
