Canning Employment May Double

Tool, Die School Okayed For E.J.

Northern Michigan's first tool and die apprenticeship program is expected to get under way at East Jordan high school in about three weeks.

It is expected that eight or nine area industrial plants will send about 21 apprenticeship workers to the classes, according to Walter Thorsen, who is sparking the program.

Following the organizational meeting last week it was said that classes will be held two nights a week in the scheduled

four year program.

Thorsen said the program has been sanctioned by the bureau of apprenticeship training, U. S. Department of Labor.

Members of an advisory board will be selected to aid the program, one member from each of the industrial plants taking part in the vocational schooling.

"The first classes are pretty well billed," Thorsen said, "but if everything goes as we expect, we might be able to start more classes at a later date."

E. J., Ellsworth, Central Lake School Merger?

School board members from East Jordan Ellsworth and Central Lake will meet February 15th to discuss a suggestion that merging of the three units be proposed to the Charlevoix-Emmet Intermediate School District meeting in Petoskey, February 22nd.

George Klooster, of East Jordan, said that since an earlier school district reorganization plan was not approved by the state, the various boards of education are now searching for new methods of reorganizing. Klooster was appointed by the Judge of Probate to the Charlevoix-Emmet Intermediate reorganization study committee.

Since the state turned down an earlier proposal on redistricting northern schools, it now has been decided to present a redistricting plan that will include all high school districts in this northern area.

Such a plan could result in redistricting and merging of the small school districts like Ellsworth and Central Lake with East Jordan.

Although no plan has been formulated yet, the merging of East Jordan, Central Lake and Ellsworth high schools will come up for serious discussion at the tri-school board meeting February 15th.

Rotary Supper Tuesday

There will be serving from 5 p.m. to 8 p.m. next Tuesday night at the East Jordan Rotary Club's annual Pancake Supper for the March of Dimes.

The supper, which is sponsored annually by the Rotary Club for the March of Dimes, is being held at the American Legion hall.

All Rotary members are selling supper tickets at \$1.00 per person, but those who wish may purchase a ticket at the door, according to Charles Landers, Rotary Club president.

School's Out

Schools in the Charlevoix-Emmet Intermediate school district will close next Tuesday in order that teachers may attend a scheduled institute meeting at Charlevoix high school.

There will be plenty of work in East Jordan for high school and college students as well as women this coming summer according to William Sherman of Sherman Brothers Canning Company.

Sherman told the News-Herald Tuesday that a U. S. defense department request for canned goods may double his company's output this year.

The canning company's production includes cherries, asparagus and snap beans. The company expects to honor commitments with its regular customers in addition to the government's request for fruits and vegetables, but it was said that the government can demand priority.

Sherman said the firm will probably have a 50 percent increase in production if labor is available.

The company employed 65 people last year and with the new defense department request that figure could raise to nearly 150 in the production periods of 1966.

Sherman said that with a 50 percent increase in production there would be a 100 percent increase in labor, 60 percent of which would probably be women.

Because most of East Jordan's eight manufacturing plants are operating at peak capacity, labor is now becoming a big factor in efficient operation; however, Sherman said his firm will do everything possible to increase production to meet the defense department's request for fruits and vegetables.

Sherman Thomas, manager, East Jordan Cooperative Company, has been elected president of the East Jordan Area Chamber of Commerce, Inc., replacing William Bennett.

Thomas was selected to head the chamber for 1966 at the first meeting of the board following the annual election of board members by the full membership, January 22.

The board named Tom Galmore

as vice-president and returned Ann Hite to the secretary's post.

The chamber's new treasurer is Jack Zoulek, of Dressel Realtors. He replaces Bill Sturgell, of R. A. Campbell Agency.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Sir:

It occurred to me that your readers might be interested in the part which summer residents play in their City besides buying groceries and other necessities, so I give you the following for your letter box:

I am no newcomer here. This will be my 17th year that I have had my Bellaire half log buildings at the north end of Eveline Orchards Resort on Lake Charlevoix. I usually plan on spending two months there, but since I retired last year I have spent three months. My place is not winterized, and gets too cold to spend more.

I thought it might be interesting to know my tax situation. I am about to send my check for this past year's taxes. I find an odd situation in tax payment. In Florida, you get a 4% reduction

if taxes are paid within less than a month. I find that my taxes in East Jordan have a collection fee of 1% added immediately that runs till February 15th.

I do not reside in East Jordan, and in fact, could not stay over winter at my place. Therefore there are of course no school children to educate.

Yet of my total tax of \$158.22, \$110.08 is school tax. They tell me, it is due to running buses out into Eveline Township.

It reminds me of the old legend about the goose that laid the golden eggs! I have friends who have cottages on Lake Otsego and Hubbard Lake who have much lower taxes, and the one on Hubbard Lake is a brick two story that could be used year round. It would seem that if there is not enough taxable property in the cities that

use the schools to support them, that a consolidation of three or four areas, like Charlevoix, East Jordan, Boyne City, and Ironton, to have one large high school, might be the answer. I understand this was once considered.

In the way of services I have received, the County Road Commission did grade the roads in to my place, even though they seemed to be unable to apply any calcium chloride to lay dust.

I did get an undesired contribution from some high school kids that broke into my cottage and broke my window and messed up the place during the winter. I can't really say that helped! My insurance company in the bank took care of it, not the parents of the students who were apprehended.

It would seem that some reasonable arrangement might be worked out, like either deducting that portion of the tax going to the City of East Jordan public schools, or else adjusting the tax to that portion of the year spent in residence. Then there is

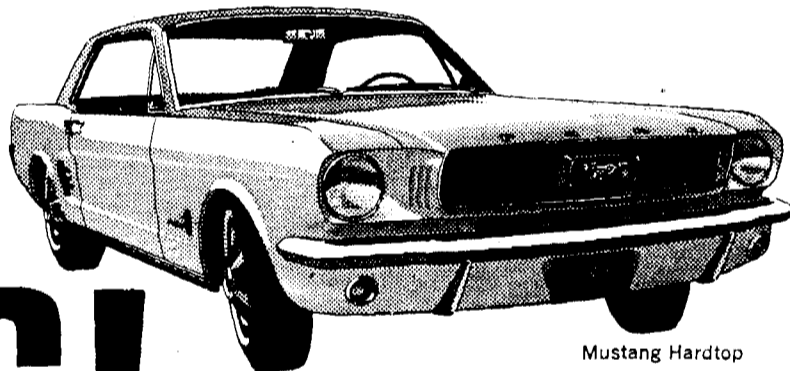

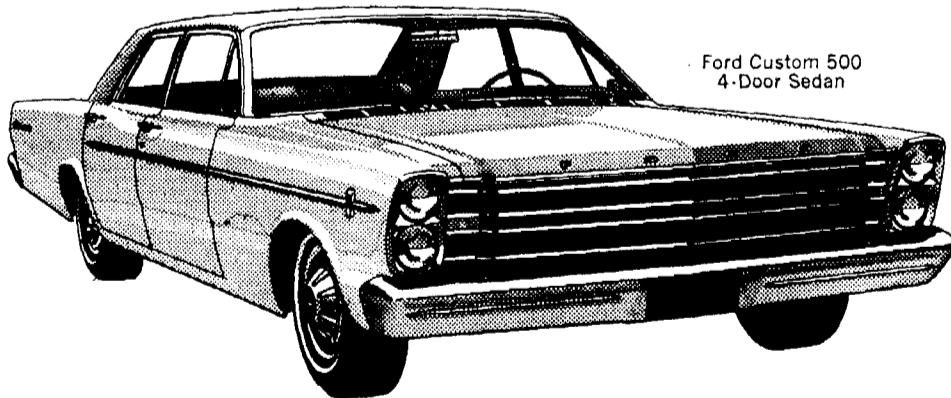

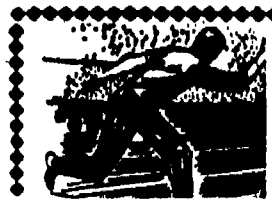

MARGARET H. HOYT WELLS
Services were held at 2 p. m. Saturday, January 29 at Watson's Funeral Home for Margaret H. Hoyt Wells, 76, who died at the Charlevoix Hospital January 26 following a two month illness. Rev. Daniel Axt officiated, and burial was in Sunset Hill Cemetery.

Mrs. Margaret H. Wells was one of the five daughters of Mr. and Mrs. L. A. Hoyt. Mr. Hoyt was a long time lumber inspector in East Jordan. The Hoyts moved to East Jordan from Muskegon in 1891 when Mrs. Wells was two years old.

Mrs. Wells was born February 10, 1889 in Muskegon. She graduated from East Jordan high school and Michigan State University. She was a teacher. On September 18, 1919 she married Arthur E. Wells at East Jordan. They lived in South Bend, Indiana; East Jordan; and Dearborn. Mrs. Wells was a member of the Dearborn Womens' Club, the Presbyterian Church, the D. A. R., the Extension Club, East Jordan Study Club and Garden Club.

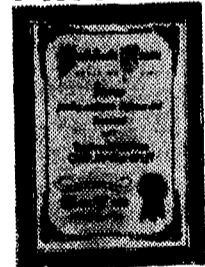

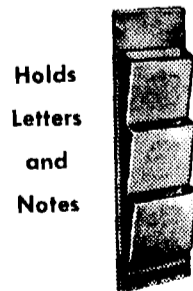

RETAIN STATE CONTROL

For more than thirty years, the individual states and the federal government have worked amicably together to provide the best equitable method of operating the unemployment compensation systems.

Now the Congress is considering legislation H.R. 8282 which would greatly revamp our national unemployment compensation program. It would shift control of unemployment benefit policies from the state legislatures to the Congress.

The proposed legislation would: 1. Establish a permanent system of federal extended benefits. 2. More than double the wage base on which the unemployment payroll tax is levied and would also increase the tax rate. 3. Set the stage for the abandonment of experience rating. 4. Establish federal benefit standards that would disrupt state laws and dictate benefit levels. 5. Force all states (after a maximum of six weeks' postponement) to pay regular benefits to people who quit their jobs voluntarily, who are fined for misconduct or who refuse suitable jobs. 6. Provide federal grants to encourage greater state spending for benefit liberalization. These proposed changes would federalize the effectively operating state unemployment compensation systems.

The added burden on the industrial community would hinder its ability to provide the necessary economic growth and new job opportunities. In fact, rather than sustain jobs it could destroy them.

COL. T. L. THACKER

A new manager has taken over the Air Force Logistics Command's Project Gold Rush. As assistant comptroller for cost reduction, Col. Thomas L. Thacker, of East Jordan, Michigan, takes over the position made vacant by the transfer of Col. Felix M. Turnipseed, Jr., to Warner Robins Air Materiel Area, Robins AFB, Ga.

Gold Rush contributes more than half of the Air Force savings in the Department of Defense Cost Reduction program.

Col. Thacker will direct AFLC's cost reduction program which has a FY 66 savings goal of \$1.388 billion. At the half-way mark for this year, over 50 percent of this goal has been reported. AFLC has surpassed its assigned Air Force Goals for the two years the cost reduction program has been in existence.

The new assistant comptroller comes to AFLC from an assignment in Turkey where he served as chief of Supply and Services, Sixth Allied Tactical Air Force (NATO), Izmir, Turkey. Prior

to his NATO assignment he was stationed at Eglin AFB, Fla., from 1957 to 1963 in various positions including director of Supply and Services and chief of Supply.

From 1954 to 1956 he was deputy director of Supply at Nouasseur (Morocco) Air Depot after serving four years as Air Attache Logistics Officer at Hq. Air Force.

Following WW II, Col. Thacker became the first professor of Air Science at Michigan Technical University, Houghton, Michigan. He served in this capacity from 1946 to 1950. During WW II he served three years overseas with the 52nd Fighter Group.

Col. Thacker is a graduate of Michigan State University. He was an instructor at East Jordan High School in Michigan for two years before entering the Air Force as a second Lieutenant.
